65 Cast Ballots in '96 On Union Free School

Petition signed by 16 residents of Hicksville in 1896 requesting a meeting started the community towards the establishment of a Union Free School, 65 years ago. The meeting was held on Sept. 30 with 43 voters present. There were 43 votes in favor, 22 opposed.

Szendy Appeal Gets Deadline

A court-fixed deadline for action on the litigation which has tied up Hicksville School District two-dollar construction program approved by the voters in 1959, today loomed for March 15. Supreme Court Justice Mario Pittman had dismissed the case brought by Emil J. Szendy and Hans Goebel. The plaintiffs previously filed notice of appeal. Appellate Division has this denied a motion by the School District, Michael J. Sullivan, to deny the appeal but only on the condition that the printed record of the appeal be filed and the appeal be ready to argue the case at the April term beginning March 15. Appellate Division has cross-motions to permit to dispense with the printed records which is said to be a substantial item.

The School Board is encouraging all interested to join in the observance of the 65th anniversary of the Union Free School this year and has named Walter W. Schreiber, secretary of the Board, to assist in coordinating programs which may be undertaken by individual schools, PTAs and others. Right at the beginning in 1896 the voters decided to make the Board membership five trustees and it remained that size until a relatively few years ago when it was increased to seven. First members of the Board were Charles Voigt, Henry Puvogel, Andrew B. Heberer Sr., John C. Davis and August Hauser. Frank Marra, a newspaperman, was the District Clerk.

Hauser became the first president of the Board and Davis was elected secretary. Henry C. Stolz became the first District Treasurer. Before the first year was over, the Board found it necessary to replace the earlier one-room school house with a \$7500 building which became the original portion of today's Nicholas St. School. The budget for the first year as a Union Free School District is of some interest. It was \$3,520.

Allen S. Carpenter, president of the Board of Education, has been empowered to communicate with the representatives of various agency of community government with a view to a meeting to discuss and project community goals. Invited to participate in such a conference would be officials of the Fire District, Water District and various agencies of Town government.

The Hicksville School Board voted at its last meeting to authorize the President to contact other groups and discover if they are willing to participate in a conference.

Such a meeting, which was suggested by Carpenter as an extension of the plans being made to observe the 65th anniversary of the establishment of the Hicksville Schools as a Union Free system this year, it is hoped would lead to an exchange of mutual problems and a projection of municipal needs and desires in the future.

No date has been fixed for the initial exploratory meeting, Carpenter said, pending contact with the various commissioners and boards to discover whether or not they are interested.

The Board of Education has taken the initiative, it was noted, since the public school system represents the largest unit of local government from the standpoint of annual expenditures.

Recreation Advisors Detail Plans for Pool

Members of the Recreation Advisory Committee met with the Hicksville Board of Education, Saturday morning, in a discussion and presentation of the Recreation Advisory Committee's proposal for an indoor swimming pool and diving tank to be attached to the Senior High School. The School Trustees received some further details and indicated that their comment will be withheld pending additional studies. Estimated cost was approximately revised downward since the initial revelation some weeks ago. At first the cost was visualized in the area of \$5000,000. At the meeting, Saturday, the cost was lowered to an estimated \$350,000. Joseph Madden, chairman of the sub-committee on a pool, speaking as a "private citizen" advised the figures had been drastically revised "in the past 24 hours". Several phases of the present were handled by individual committee members. Daniel Madden outlined operations, Walter Hauser talked about the building and finances and Joseph Madden commented on program. Well D. Glatt, handled the presentation. Madden reported on visits to facilities which now have pools, said he had obtained an initial, volunteer estimate of \$100,000 as the cost of the pool building with needed \$100,000 for the rest of the installation including filter system, lockers, etc.

Hauser said the cost of \$350,000 could be amortized over a 30-year period at \$18,900 a year. Madden discussed the coming need for extra physical education stations in the High School and outlined school and recreational uses. He estimated the annual cost of \$50,000 with about \$20,000 for retirement of bonds and \$30,000 for operations and staffing for recreation. He said it was not inconceivable that revenue from non-school use (children, teens and adults) operating seven days a week could run to \$100,000.

Under questioning by Board of Education members, Madden revised his estimate of annual cost upward from \$50,000 to \$60,000. This would be without regular school instructional cost "because the District would need the additional physical education teachers anyway".

The session was opened with the playing of a tape recording of remarks by Robert Carr of the State Education Dept. speaking to the Recreation Committee on the value of a pool and aquatic instruction. Hauser told the Board that his figures on amortization of bonds was based upon the study of a table provided by a financial organization for 30 year bonds at 3 1/2 per cent.

The meeting between the Board of Education as a committee of the whole and the Recreation Committee representatives had been twice cancelled by severe snow storms during January and early February.

The spokesmen for the Recreation Committee urged the Board to engage the services of an architect to obtain more precise information regarding cost.

The Committee said, in answer to questions, that about 300 to 500 persons could be accommodated in the pool at one time. Bleacher seats are provided on the plans for 750.

Vice President Jerry Zettler presided during the discussion. President Allen Carpenter pointed out the problem of the Board of Education in the preparation of the budget for 1961-62 and the fact that the District was confronted with an increase in the school tax rate for the coming year.

10 Minutes More Sleep: LIRR to Feed Commuters Boarding 6:45 AM Train

Commuters to New York from Hicksville leaving on the 6:45 morning train are in for a new innovation starting next Tuesday, Feb. 28 -- a Dashing Dan Quickie Breakfast of tomato or orange juice, hot coffee and assorted Danish, crumcake, doughnuts and milk. It will be coffee on the house the first day. The bill of fare will be a la carte: 15c for 7-ounce cup of coffee, 20c for juice, etc.

The LIRR has worked out a dual use for its new full-time bar car. A 30-foot bank of coach seats have been removed to make way for an 18-foot bar and an 18-foot stand-up counter. There'll still be 65 seats at the other end of the car. Evenings the bar car will be on the 15-car 5:41 PM out of Hunterspoint Ave. on the Port-Jefferson run. Mornings it becomes the first of an 11-car train out of Port Jeff at 5:39 AM. The train carries about 1200 commuters to Jamaica and Hunterspoint mornings.

Evenings the fifth car on the train will be serving the now world-famous Dashing Dan cocktail and other bubbly. As for the breakfast service, the LIRR spokesman claims "hearty commuters will be able to get at least 10 minutes of extra shut-eye and their long-suffering, breakfast-fixing spouses as many extra hours of beauty sleep as their consciences will permit."

What's Cooking?

Here's a marvelous recipe if you are planning a late supper party. It takes a little work before time, but it can be made the day before serving, or it can be frozen successfully. I usually serve this recipe for about twenty people, tripling the quantities. However, here are quantities for eight servings:

JAMBALAYA

- 2 T. fat
- 1 C finely chopped onion
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 C diced cooked chicken
- 1 C diced cooked ham
- 12 tiny pork sausages
- 1 lb. shrimp
- 1 size 2 can tomatoes
- 1 C raw white rice
- 1/2 C chicken broth
- 1/2 tsp. thyme
- 1/4 tsp. black pepper
- 1/2 tsp. salt
1. Melt fat in large skillet. Add onion, green pepper, garlic, Cook slowly, stirring often until they are tender.
2. Add chicken, ham, sausages (fry sausages well and cut in 1" pieces before adding). Cook 5 minutes.
3. Add tomatoes with their liquid, rice, broth, thyme, parsley, salt and pepper. Turn mixture into a large casserole. Now add the cleaned, cooked shrimp and place gently into mixture so as to be evenly distributed.
4. Cover and bake in moderate oven (350) for about 1 hour or until rice is tender. This dish may be baked 3/4 hour, refrigerated, and at serving time heated long enough to finish cooking rice...about 25 minutes.

Suburban Gardener

Since we've been so rudely interrupted by all the snow, this column has been inactive. But sooner or later, we'll all have to face up to the damage left to us by one of the worst winters, in history.

Damage to shrubs and trees, strangely enough, would have been worse if it were not for the blanket of snow on the ground. This is due to the fact that all plants constantly give off moisture. This moisture has to be replenished and this winter the snow filled the role.

This may sound strange, but the worst is yet to come. March is noted for drastic changes in tem-

perature. These changes in temperature affect trees and woody plants more than evergreens. In March, the sap in the trees and woody plants begins to rise. As the sap begins to circulate, many times the temperature drops to below freezing causing the bark to freeze and crack severely. This is the cause of many fatalities. Do not expect many flowers from dogwood, forsythia, crab apple, rhododendron, azaleas, or any other plants that set up their flower buds in the fall as a good part of these buds froze in the zero degree weather that was experienced this year.

All broken branches on your plant material should be promptly pruned as soon as the weather

breaks. All pruned areas should be treated with tree paint immediately after pruning more so in the spring than any other time of the year because as I mentioned, the sap rises now and will bleed from all wounded areas.

If you are not sure of what you're doing, by all means call your gardener or nurseryman as extensive damage may be done by improper pruning. Dormant spraying is another must on mostly all plant material. Begin treatments as soon as the weather permits and maybe continued periodically until buds begin to open. Consult your local nurseryman as to type of chemical and proper application of same.

Next edition - winter damage to lawns.

Vet Exemption Saves Dollars

Are you paying more tax money than you should be? The answer is probably "Yes" if you're a veteran and have failed to apply for the Veterans Tax Exemption you're entitled to.

Very briefly, a veteran's assessment will be reduced by the amount of certain payments a veteran received when he left the service. Mustering out payments, state bonuses, disability compensation and since that time insurance dividends fall into this category.

It's probable that every single veteran will benefit from this exemption, so it's good business to apply for yours. And it's not too soon either, because applications must be received by the Nassau County Board of Assessors no later than May 16, 1961.

For the necessary forms, write to Veterans Service Agency, 320 Old Country Road, Garden City, P.O. Box 147. Apply soon, because there are numerous supporting documents that must be obtained before final application.

Remember, the money you save will be your own.

SPEAKER'S VIEW OF STATE ASSEMBLY

We had the opportunity last week to be in Albany and enjoyed the unique privilege of seeing the State Assembly called to session from a seat at the left of the Speaker of the Assembly, Joseph F. Carlino.

We accompanied Assemblyman Edwin J. Fehrenbach to the State Capitol on Monday morning. The Assemblyman now has a new office (room 409) with a window which looks out from the venerable building and straight down to the Hudson River. There was a mountain of about 1300 letters waiting for Mr. Fehrenbach and his efficient staff, Monday. More than 60 per cent of the mail was concerned with educational matters, including a strong plea for an increase in the basic state aid formula to \$450.

That day's mail, we were told later, came largely from Plainfield, North Massapequa and Farmingdale. Assemblyman Fehrenbach is a member of the Assembly Committee on Education. In addition to other committees on which he has served in the past has been added a new one on cities.

The Assembly came into session Monday night and as it worked out the reserved section was filled. Mr. Carlino invited us to take a seat next to him on the high rostrum. After the formalities wherein various Assemblymen called attention to distinguished guests, former colleagues and groups in the gallery, the business began. The first time Mr. Carlino dropped his gavel to bring the house to order we almost toppled off our chairs. What thunder!

There are 150 Assemblymen including three ladies. Eighty four are Republicans and 66 Democrats.

Most helpful to us during our all-too brief stay were Harvey Schluter of Hicksville, clerk of Assemblyman Fehrenbach, and the charming Isabelle, Fehrenbach's secretary. She again remarked, as she did the last time we made the trek to the Legislature, that it would help greatly if folks would include their addresses when they write their legislators.

We also had the opportunity to look in on State Senator Henry M. Curran and his counsel, Michael D'Auria of Plainfield, in Room 505. Mr. Curran is also getting a flood of mail, mostly on educational matters. By the way, Mr. Fehrenbach and Mr. Curran have jointly sponsored a bill which should receive new support in letters from Hicksville residents. It is a proposal to give Union Free School Districts, such as Hicksville, state aid equal to that given Central School Districts. In our case it would mean nearly \$200,000 a year. The bill is A1 482.

Sentiment we heard voiced about the Capitol was that "something will probably be done about increasing basic state aid" but that it is doubted, in well-informed circles, whether the boost will go as high as the \$450 being promoted.

For the use of ASTM-A36, A-245, Grade C, and/or A-303, Grade C, steel, the fabricator shall submit an affidavit in the form provided by the Building Department that all of the steel sections required by the plans and specifications of a proposed Architect or a Professional Engineer, for a specific building erected and that all of the structural steel sections that are furnished, fabricated and welded on this work meet the minimum requirements for structural steel as defined in the Standard Specifications of the ASTM-A36, A-245, Grade C, and/or A-303, Grade C, (1960), of the American Institute of Steel Construction. This affidavit shall be a prerequisite for the issuance of a permit."

"For a building using ASTM-A36, A-245, Grade C, and/or A-303, Grade C, steel, the fabricator shall submit an affidavit in the form provided by the Building Department that all of the steel sections required by the plans and specifications of a proposed Architect or a Professional Engineer, for a specific building erected and that all of the structural steel sections that are furnished, fabricated and welded on this work meet the minimum requirements for structural steel as defined in the Standard Specifications of the ASTM-A36, A-245, Grade C, and/or A-303, Grade C, (1960), of the American Institute of Steel Construction.
