## Lucia McIntosh Suggested Sits to Vet Hospitals

Religious services will be held at 9:45 this Friday morning for Lucia McIntosh, long-action in Hicksville civic and fraternal affairs, died at her home, 25 W. Cherry St., Tuesday. She had been ill recent years. Rev. McDonald will conduct the services at Wagner Memorial Home. Interment will be in LI National Cemetery.

Ms. McIntosh, born in Czechoslovakia in 1888, during more than 40 years residence in Hicksville was in the forefront of many community events. She was the president of the Ladies Auxiliary of the Charles Wagner Memorial Legion Post, serving from 1922 to 1924 and again in 1927. When the first local Paralegal Assoc. was organized in Hicksville in 1933, she was unanimously elected the first president and served two years. She was a past Matron of Eastern Star, Order of Eastern Star, past District Deputy of the organization. She was one of the members of the Women's Club of Hicksville which began at the Hicksville Deafblind Assoc.

Ms. McIntosh was also a member of the Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc. and served actively on the Rule Committee which was to bring the question of incorporation of Hicksville as a city to a vote in 1953.

### SOUGHT PARK

One of her favorite projects was the establishment of a community park in Hicksville to provide some of the open area and a place for recreation and relaxation.

Ms. and Mrs. William McIntosh celebrated their 40th wedding anniversary, two years ago on New Year's Eve. On that occasion she said, "We have seen so many changes in our 40 years and like the modernizations but we still have that two of our dreams not materialized: a park for Hicksville and a government Post office building."

Surviving are husband, William; daughter, Mimi Mulvey, and two children. The Eastern Star will hold services at Wagner Funeral Home.

Mrs. McIntosh was not only the first president of the Legion Auxiliary here but also served as County Chairman of the organization. She was credited with being the "Mother" of regularly organized Sunday visits to various veterans' hospitals in the State and throughout the nation.

At the suggestion of Mrs. McIntosh, in 1922 the Post, Auxiliary and community joined and a group of 35 took homemade pies, fruits, nuts, ice cream, candy, cigarettes and other articles to Kings Park Hospital. County Welfare Chairman Harry Tappen and State Legion Commander William Deegan were impressed and set the wheels in motion to make these visits part of the Legion's Rehabilitation program.

The project has continued to this day.

## Blackley Dies In Hospital

George H. Blackley of 32 Grand St., Hicksville, who for more than a quarter century was active in community civic and union affairs, died early Tuesday morning at Shadowbrook Hospital. The Rev. Mr. Blackley was a Hicksville resident for 35 years. A retired painter, he was recording secretary of the Painters and Decorators Union for over 30 years. For 40 years he was also a member of the Brotherhood of Train-

son, Fred; his daughter, Dorothy McPartin and two grandchildren, Ann Louise and Tommy.

## Radio Salute See Crossing Contract To Us Mar 11 Let During Summer

As part of a series called MASSALL, U.S.A., Radio Station WFYI, key station of the Herald Tribune Network at Roosevelt Field (1520 on the dial) will broadcast "The Hicksville Story" on Saturday, March 11, from 11:00 AM to 12:00 noon, with a repeat broadcast at 4:35 PM on Sunday, March 12.

Included in the hour-long program, which will give a picture of Hicksville - past, present and future - will be two prominent local citizens heard by remote book-up from the WFYI Skyway Patrol airplane as it flies over Hicksville; reports from Hicksville schools and libraries, business groups, and municipal offices; the High School band, orchestra and chorus; prize-winning essays on "Hicksville-1976" by Hicksville High School students; and many other features concerning Hicksville and her citizens.

During the week leading up to March 11, WFYI will schedule short reports on Hicksville clubs and organizations, voiced by local officers of those organizations.

After a series of conversations held both in Albany and Oyster Bay, Supervisor John J. Burns, Senator Henry M. Curran and Assemblyman Edwin J. Fehrenbach announced jointly today that plans for the Hicksville RR Grade Crossing Elimination are substantially complete.

There are a few minor modifications being made at present. However, plans in final form are being submitted to the State Public Service Commission for their final approval. From the present status it is anticipated that the contract will be let during the coming summer. Right-of-way acquisition will be undertaken as soon as final contract plans are approved.

Fehrenbach, Curran and Burns pledged themselves to their efforts to expedite the completion of this grade crossing elimination.

## Concert Assoc Hears Quartetto

On Monday evening, Feb. 20, the Mid-Island Concert Assoc. presented a concert at the Hicksville High School auditorium, featuring the distinguished Quartetto Italiano.

Six years ago, when this illustrious ensemble made their American debut, Virgil Thomson, critic of the New York Herald Tribune, referred to the group as "the finest string quartet, unquestionably, that our century has known." The performance the Quartetto gave last week, was an excellent argument in favor of Mr. Thomson's point of view.

In addition to the precision and elegance which was always characteristic of the performances of the Quartetto Italiano, last week's concert displayed a vigorous and breadth of conception which drew salutes of "Bravo" and applause from an enthralled audience.

This rare combination of elegance and strength was eloquently demonstrated in the performance of Beethoven's Quartet in F major, Op. 135. Without ever forcing the sound beyond the resonance capacity of four stringed instruments, the group created the illusion of an orchestra by masterful control of dynamics and shading.

The concert opened with Haydn's "Toy" quartet which was played with a complete realization of the classic quality and humor inherent in this composition and closed with a sensitive reading of Ravel's quartet in F major.

The Quartetto graciously responded to the enthusiastic applause of the audience by playing a movement from Verdi's quartet in E major.

The Hicksville Community Band will present its next concert on Wednesday evening, March 8th, at 8:30 P.M. under the direction of Charles F. Gouse. The performance will take place in the auditorium of the Hicksville High School.

Featured soloists for the evening will be R. Gerard Pellerin, alto saxophonist, who will play Reed's "Hillside for Saxophone and Band" and J. David Ais, trombonist, who will be featured in the "Trombone Concerto" of Rimsky Korsakov.

Pellerin is the director of the Hicksville High School bands, and Ais is director of instrumental music at the Fork Lane School. The band will offer selections by Sousa, Goldman, Barber and Mahler. Of special interest is William B. Strickland's new transcription of the "Adagio Cantabile" from Beethoven's "Sonata Pathétique".
