4. Adopting policies (after careful study and weighing suggestions from the administration and other knowledgable persons afterting the education of the children of the entire community. tire community.

The regular Board of Education meeting for Jericho open to the public is the third Thurs, of each month, but the Board usually meets for special meetings also; it has been estimated that our Board of Education meets over 40 times a yr., usually until well after midnight!
