School Administrator 33 Years:

Dr Lamb to Retire As Superintendent

Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, superintendent of Hicksville Schools, who has been with the district for seven years, announced this week that he is planning to retire from public school administration as of July 1. The announcement came as a considerable surprise, although Dr. Lamb pointed out that he has been the chief administrator of various school systems for 33 years.

In a memorandum to the Board of Education, announcing his intention to retire at the end of the current school year, Dr. Lamb stated:

"The things which needed to be done when I came to Hicksville seven years ago have been accomplished. Perhaps foremost has been the eradication of bitterness and strife so that educational progress was possible. Your administrators have operated harmoniously as a team and have worked harmoniously with all members of the Board; and Hicksville has ceased to be joked about in the press.

"The educational program that has been developed here has brought the community even more credit than could have seemed possible seven years ago. It has been proven here that an excellent instructional program can be achieved without extravagance.

"It has been a source of satisfaction," he continued, "that 'Tomorrow's Citizens' and other informational bulletins have been able to provide a fine understanding between the schools and the community.

"I feel assured now that the people of Hicksville will not retreat from their present educational stature, and that they will never again allow their community to become an object of newspaper ridicule. My work here is done. I mean this in all humility. Little could have been accomplished if the people of Hicksville had not accepted and followed educational leadership.

"Little could have been accomplished without dedicated board members, a group of great administrators, thousands of wonderful boys and girls and hundreds of dedicated and capable employees of all kinds. Nothing worthwhile could have been accomplished without the will of Almighty God from Whom comes 'all good and perfect gifts'."

Sound Triple Call for Firemen

It was a busy, busy afternoon and evening for Fire Chief Charles Saurer, who will be leaving from office in a matter of days and the volunteers under his command late yesterday (Wed).

Three alarms were sounded at 3:22 PM when fire broke out in the Eli Kagan home at 19 August Lane, off Acre. Damage to the dwelling was extensive and the cause is being investigated by the Nassau County Fire Marshall's office.

The fire apparently started in the garage area and quickly spread throughout the home and out the attic. No one was in the house at the time. Among the casualties of

the fire was a 1960 Valiant parked in the garage.

About 60 ramps were on the scene for about 3 1/2 hours. When the second and third calls were sounded for the same location, a plea was made in Grumman Engineering Aircraft Corp Plant at Bethpage for all Hicksville volunteer firemen to respond. They were dismissed to help battle the flames.

The firemen had just about returned to the fire house with their apparatus at 7 o'clock last night when another call came in. This was for a smoke fire in the Garden apartments on Richard Ave. The cause was apparently trash in a waste can.

Camping Topic for Arrowhead

Monday, March 27, at the Hicksville High School, the Arrowhead District, Nassau County Boy Scout Council, held its last Committee meeting for the 1960-61 Scouting Season. At this meeting were Ben Barley, Camping and Activities Chairman for the Council; Fred Weber, Council Commissioner, and Jerry Zetler of the Hicksville Board of Education who devoted the District Finance Committee.

One of the highlights of this meeting was a report by Barley on the sub-committee on the Arrowhead District in the Council. A statement was made that Arrowhead District is a Pace Setter in the Boy Scout units in the area registered for summer camp at the last count of 1,700 boys per period of two weeks, in 1961 and projected to 1,050 boys per week. In the meantime, Camp Ontario in the Skill area was acquired by the Council which in 1961 will see 1,000 boys per week with a projected weekly count of 2400 boys in 1963.

The 1963 figure breaks down to an area of one acre per boy, and that the council feels the boys need. Over and above these two camps the Council, feeling that more space was necessary for the boys, bought another camp at Skills near Ontario. This is known as Alder Lake will accommodate at the present time 100 boys per week with well over that number in 1963 as facilities are developed. The Council has provided in these camps many sources of fun and adventure for the young boys of our community.

Present 97% of the Scout units are their own leadership. From the units as opposed to less than 5% seven years ago. District Commissioner Jack Larimer announced that an Assistant District Commissioner will be appointed to help organize the units. Webelos are boys in the transition period between Cub Scout and Boy Scouting. Cub Scouts should contact the District Commissioner Staff if interested in becoming a Webelo den.

S. Carpenter, Chairman of the District Finance Committee

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reported that although the District goal in the last finance drive was \$13,500 only \$9,800 has been raised to date. This is for monies required to operate the Council Scouting program adequately and thereby deriving benefit to the District at long with the others.

It was reported that the Scout Swimming program at the Plainview High School Pool was successful, with 85% unit participation. Two additional Scout Swimming programs are slated to start, one beginning in September through to the end of the year and the second to start in January 1962. All men with interest in water activities and desire to help operate the program contact Phil Weimer at WELLS 8-2738.

The Leadership Training Committee has concluded the University of Scouting for the Season. The next training opportunity offered by the District will be the Junior Leaders Training Conference scheduled for April 15 from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. to be held at the Hicksville High School. Basic Cub Scout and Boy Scout Leaders Training are scheduled for May 11, 18 and 25.

A Jericho Medical Center will shortly be built. The building will be located on Jericho Tpke. between the gas station on Jerry Lane and the Jericho Country Club. This projected construction indicates the tremendous growth in population in a short period of 5 years.

The Jericho Medical Center will be a beautiful building which will be 22 units plus a lower level. The building will be a split-level type building and will be fully air conditioned. Irving Brand, the first President of the Birchwood Civic Assoc. is the builder of the Medical Center. It is his intent to make this building a source of pride and benefit to the residents of our and

surrounding communities.

Renting of space in the Medical Center has already commenced. It is reported that many medical specialists have expressed considerable interest in occupying space in the building. It is expected that the Center will attract many of the best recognized professionals from other areas as well as many of our local doctors and dentists seeking larger quarters.

The construction of the building will commence as soon as the weather permits and occupancy will take place in the fall. The location of the building assures our community that no building will arise on Merry Lane below the gas station.

Jericho Library Drive Receives Big Response

Campaign for Jericho Library is being intensified with a door to door canvass in an effort to acquaint all residents of School District 15 with the necessity of a library for our rapidly growing community. Members of the Friends of Jericho Library and their supporters canvassed many sections of Jericho on March 26th and collected over \$300 in donations for circulars and flyers.

With voting set for May 3rd, a call has gone out for qualified individuals to file petitions for Library Trustee. Five will be elected in May if the library is

approved by the electorate. Petitions may be obtained from Mrs. Lenor Sirota, 20 Merry Lane. Her phone number is WE 8-1749. Petitions require 25 signatures of District 15 taxpayers and should be turned into Mrs. Sirota no later than April 16th so that they may be forwarded to the School Board Clerk by April 19th for inclusion on the May 3rd ballot.

The drive for the library has been officially endorsed by the West Birchwood Civic Assoc., the Birchwood Park at Jericho Civic Assoc. and the Princeton Park Civic Assoc.

Board Votes Cub Scout Okay

The West Birchwood Civic Assoc. Board of Directors at its meeting April 2 voted unanimously to approve and sponsor a Cub Scout Pack in this area. The request for this action was made by Lou Visentin of Orange Drive. Mr. Visentin will appear at the general membership meeting on April 20th to explain the Scout program and ask for volunteers to act as leaders and Den mothers.

The Board also voted to advance a sum of money not to exceed \$150, for a Little Theater Group presentation as part of an association general meeting on June 12th. The production will be offered free to Civic Association members.

It was noted that all candidates for Jericho School Board will be invited to appear at the General meeting April 20th at the Cedar Swamp School. The West Birchwood Board has previously endorsed the candidacy of Dr. Art Garin.

It was voted that the Board and Block Captains will help the education committee in a drive to register all voters for the coming school board and library votes.

Other matters discussed were proposals to write letters to the school board recommending that it investigate the advisability of a direct fire alarm system connecting the schools with the fire house and a letter to the Board of Health concerning conditions of the slum area and the area behind the homes of Sullivan Drive. The constitution of the Jericho Civic Assoc. Joint Council was to be studied by a committee.

President Carl Denney reported that the Community Welfare Committee has been working on the problem of cleaning up and landscaping the Rockland Drive and sump areas. The town has been contacted by the committee and action has been promised. The existing problem of disintegrating cement driveways and sidewalks was referred to this committee and it was recommended that the same course of action be taken as last year. In the past all bad concrete sections were repaired by the builder before the streets were accepted for dedication by the Town of Oyster Bay.

Suburban Gardener

"Thinking of landscaping your home? Don't rush into it. Landscaping your home can be just as important as furnishing. First you should weigh your individual circumstances. Such as: are you going to maintain your property yourself? or is a gardener. How large is your family? How many children are presently involved or will be at a later time? Do you like trees? Do you know what is involved in maintaining them? Where do you want shade?

I could go on putting questions like these before you indefinitely and you may recoil with horror and reply, "Isn't the landscaper supposed to know this?" You ought to realize that a landscaper can see things only thru his own eyes and if you know absolutely nothing he has no choice but to landscape your home as he sees fit.

Now his job may look beautiful at the beginning but as you live with it and acquire some knowledge about plants and arrangement you may see errors which should have been avoided.

Most people think only of the front of their home and forget about the back yard except for placing a few trees here and there. But stop and think! How many times have you had a lawn party on your front lawn? Are you one of the many who dropped a slab of concrete down by the back door, called it a "patio" and placed a few trees around it? Did you go "halfway" with your neighbor in planting flowering shrubs

What Is Board of Education?

On May 2 the people of the Jericho School District will be asked to elect two members of our community to serve on the Board of Education. The local board of education is a unique system of control of schools unknown in most countries of the world, where federal or state agencies control the local schools. In N.Y. State each town or district elects 5 members of the community to act as official, legal trustees of the schools. These members, the Bd. of Ed., serve for 3 year terms, usually alternating the years of expiration, so that not more than two members will leave the Bd. at any given year; THUS MEN SERVE WITHOUT PAY for the 3 yrs. One of the 5 members is elected by its members to act as the president of the Bd., and in Jericho the current Board President is Samuel Hecht.

Duties & limitations of Board of Education are governed by the laws of the state and the Jericho Bd. retains legal counsel in an attempt to check their proposed actions against these laws. Among some of the items handled by the Board of Education are:

1. Hiring (and firing) of administrative, teaching, custodial and other non-teaching personnel.
2. Presenting an annual budget for running the schools.
3. Surveying the school - age population for school building needs and proposing such buildings to the public when they believe it to be necessary.
4. Adopting policies (after careful study and weighing suggestions from the administration and other knowledgeable persons) affecting the education of the children of the entire community.

The regular Board of Education meeting for Jericho open to the public is the third Thurs. of each month, but the Board usually meets for special meetings also; it has been estimated that our Board of Education meets over 40 times a yr., usually until well after midnight!

In order for us to effectively continue local control of schools, we must all vote on May 2 the men we feel will do the best job of running our biggest investment - SCHOOLS FOR OUR CHILDREN!!!
