# Bd Appoints Abt As Superintendent

Donald F. Abt, assistant superintendent of Hicksville Schools since 1956, has been named by the Board of Education to succeed Dr. Wallace E. Lamb as superintendent upon his retirement the end of June. The Board action, by unanimous vote, took place at a regular meeting, Friday night.

Abt makes his home in Wantagh, is married and the father of three children. He has been with Hicksville schools since 1952 when he served for four months as administrative assistant prior to being named principal of Lee Ave School. He was at Lee Ave from 1952 to 1955. For a year prior to his appointment as Assistant Superintendent, he was principal of Hicksville Junior High School.

Born in New York City, the 43-year-old administrator was educated in Baldwin High School and received his BA from Hofstra in 1940. He received his MA from New York University. He was a graduate in arts and science, education, government and administration and has a doctorate equivalent.

His first teaching position was in Quebradillas, Puerto Rico, and English and social studies teacher in Arecibo, Puerto Rico, 1941 and 1942. He entered the armed forces in 1942.

After two years in the US Air Force, he taught at Southold, Amityville and Baldwin between 1944 and 1952, prior to coming to Hicksville.

His five year contract as Hicksville's Superintendent will start at \$19,000.

## Lutherans Arrange Novel Intention Week Program

May 7 marks the beginning of "Intention Week" at Trinity Lutheran Church, 40 West Nicholas St., Hicksville.

This is a new concept of approach to the matter of indoctrination of

the parishioner in creating an awareness to them of their personal spiritual involvement and stewardship obligations to their Lord and His church here on earth. The plan was devised and is being administered by the pastor, the Rev. Edward H. Stammel.

During a period of six weeks leading up to May 7th, a concerted effort has been made by the clergy and leading laymen of the parish to impart to the congregation, by picture and word story the fabulous history of Trinity since its humble beginning in 1850.

In this 111 year period, Trinity has been instrumental in establishing three sister congregations: Trinity Lutheran Church in Glen Cove, St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Bethpage and the Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, Plainview. Trinity was also the guiding force in the establishment

of the L.L. Lutheran Junior-Senior High School at Brookville, which will enter its second year in Sept. 1961 with an enrollment of over 600 students.

For almost the last 100 years, only three pastors have ministered to the needs of this parish. The first two, the Rev. Paul G. L. Mat-schat and the Rev. Wm. D. Rusch served almost 40 years each. The present pastor, Rev. Stammel is approaching his 20th anniversary. Pastor Stammel has, during this period, not only served the Lutheran Church at Large in many areas and was instrumental in the establishment of the Lutheran High School.

Particular emphasis, during this six week preparation period, has been directed toward the tremendous growth of the parish since 1950.

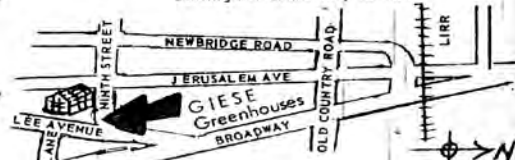

## Suburban Gardener

are now at the threshold most colorful part of the year. Mother Nature will make us forget the ravages of past winter, with a display of color that will make the countryside look like fairyland.  
Evergreens should be fed this time to insure maximum health. An acid fertilizer should be used on most evergreens, such as rhododendrons, andros, etc. A specific fertilizer should be used on these plants. Also should be fed at this time with a well balanced fertilizer. The fertilizer that you use on your lawn is very good for trees except dogwoods which should be fed with an acid fertilizer. Many homeowners have been with all the fertilizer have been giving their evergreens, they have noticed that the leaves are not the dark green they were when they were planted. This is because the leaves of all evergreens have a pH of 6.0 or better. So if you use a yellow apply limestone to the base of them and you will notice that in a few weeks they retain that dark green color.

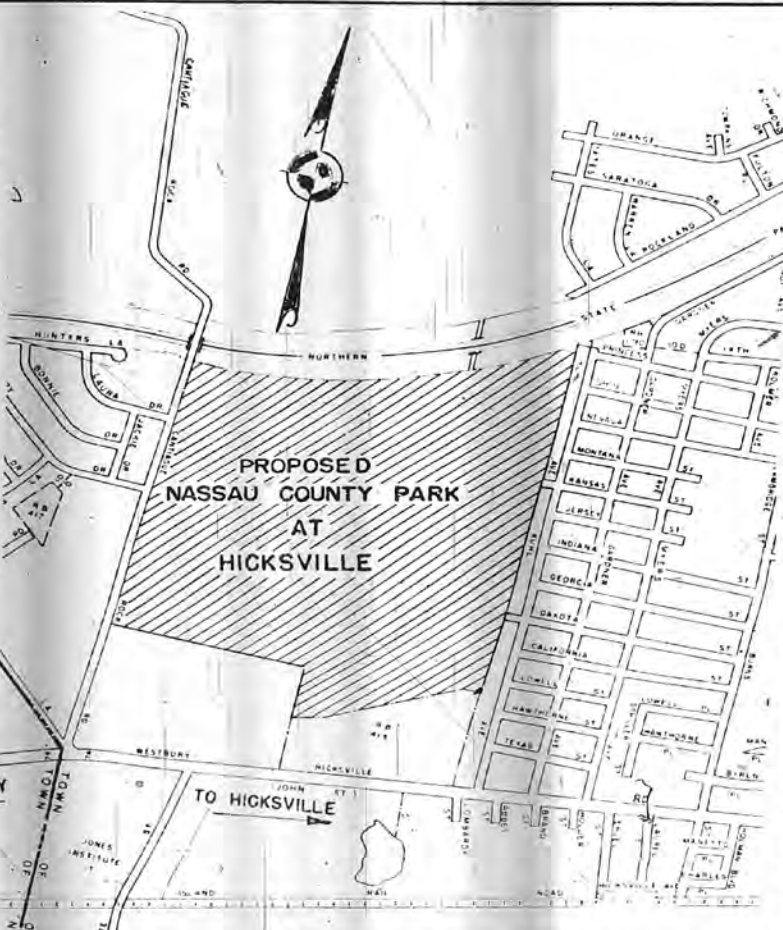

A public hearing before the county supervisors on the project is scheduled for Monday, May 29.

## W. Birchwood Streets Still Under Builder's Bond

The already-dedicated sections of West Birchwood have still not met with final approval of the Town of Oyster Bay or the Nassau County Planning Commission. The latter group continues to hold surety bonds posted by the builder at the time the streets were dedicated "conditionally" to the Town. These bonds will be released at such a time that the streets meet the standards set by the Planning Commission.

This information was contained in a letter from the Planning Commission to John Nason, Chairman of the Community Welfare Committee. Alfred J. Hicks, Deputy Director, stated that the bonds for Sections 10, 11 and 12 "are still in full force and effect."

The letter was in response to a query from the committee, which has long been conducting a survey of West Birchwood streets, seeking defective sidewalks, curbs and driveway aprons and poorly graded streets.

Mr. Hicks assured the committee that his office "has informed the developer that there are many corrections to be made and has directed him to proceed with same without delay."

This information is good news to residents of the affected sections. It means that the builder is still responsible for the streets and sidewalks in these areas. Once the sections are finally accepted, the individual homeowners will be required to repair their sidewalks and the Town (with tax money) will repair the streets.

The Planning Commission letter also asks that we "submit a list of defects" and they "would be pleased to determine the validity of all complaints." The Community Welfare Committee has been doing just this for the past year, but Nason strongly urges that each resident inspect his property and report defective sidewalks, curbs and streets to the Committee.

If you have anything to report, write the nature of the defect on a postcard, along with your name and address, and send it to Jack Boesch, 3 Ulster Place. He will see that the complaints are compiled and forwarded to the appropriate body.

As far as the new sections are concerned, the committee is pressing for speedy dedication. Murray Cammeyer has personally examined each street and his findings have been forwarded to the Planning Commission.

Meanwhile, the Committee has petitioned the Town for additional Stop signs for Rockland, Orange and Sullivan Drives. No action has been taken on an earlier request for these signs, but a recent accident on Rockland Drive makes it important that the Town answer our plea at this time.

## Park Permits

Sheldon Kantor, secretary of the West Birchwood Civic Association has obtained a supply of applications for two-year passes to Nassau County Park at Salisbury. Use of the extensive Salisbury facilities - from wading pools to golf courses - is limited to residents of Nassau possessing the necessary pass. There is no charge for the pass. The forms will be distributed soon.

## Dr Kaminester Is Director

A group of North Shore doctors has purchased the Long Island Doctors Hospital at Roslyn and will operate it under a completely new set up of staff and medical personnel.

The huge, red-brick, colonial building is undergoing a \$250,000 stem-to-stern facelift and will be ready to display the latest concepts in modern medicine at a community-wide "open house" about June 1. It formerly was called the Roslyn Park Hospital.

The building on grounds - once the site of the Turkish Embassy in America - will get a full refurbishing and renovation. The 70-bed hospital sits far back from the road in the midst of what once was the lush formal gardens for the embassy.

Dr. Chester E. Kaminester of Jericho, is the executive medical director for the institution. He emphasized that the hospital is an "all-new operation intent on offering the community the finest in medical services."

"It is a new operation in every respect - in equipment, furnishings and staff," Dr. Kaminester said. "We will spare no expense in providing the optimum of medical services while at the same time dedicating ourselves to the best interests of the patient and the community."

"There is a need for hospital services in Roslyn and adjacent communities and the Long Island Doctors Hospital will provide the best services possible."

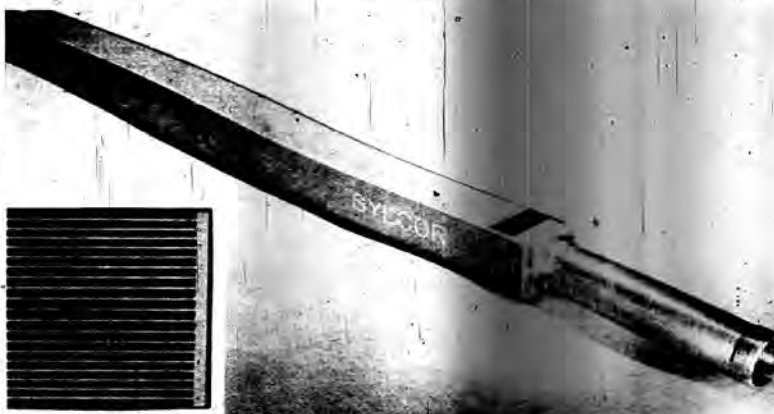
