EDITORIAL:

Selfish Opposition to Park

Regretfully and somewhat bitterly we admit there is opposition to the proposal that the County of Nassau acquire a tract of land in Hicksville, embracing 25 acres, and designate it for a public park. Our bitterness stems not from the size of the opposition which is somewhat microscopic, but from the very fact that there is very selfish opposition.

Some of those opposed charge "power politics" and say it is a move to eliminate houses and thus deprive them of a school in their area. This is ridiculous. Houses there would have mandated a school but not necessarily in that area.

This is Hicksville's final opportunity to acquire a substantial open area for the enjoyment of future generations. We can't possibly lose under this proposal if the County and we anticipate that the County will carry thru on its announced plan and purchase the land. If you feel as we do, you will declare your endorsement by writing today to County Executive A. Jolly Patterson and the Board of Supervisors, Mineola, N.Y.

Funeral services will be held at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church at noon, Saturday, for William Magill of 63 Old Country Rd., Hicksville, who died at Meadowbrook Hospital yesterday (Wed.) morning. Eighty-four years of age, Mr. Magill had been taken to the hospital following a heart attack. He is resting at Henry J. Stock General Home on Newbridge Rd. He is survived by his wife, Janet, and a brother, Harry, of Bronxville, N.Y.

He had been volunteer general accountant and assistant treasurer of the Nassau County Chapter of American Red Cross since 1917. William A. Miller, Jr., chapter chairman of Nassau Red Cross, expressed the "deep sorrow of the Chapter at the great loss" to the Red Cross organization and noted the thousands of hours devoted by Mr. Magill to the program. He was one of the original commissioners of the Hicksville Water District.

Section 4.4 New Installation Charges

An installation charge for water service connection will be made throughout the District on the following basis:

Regular Service:

Size	1"	1 1/2"	2"
Charge	\$75.00	\$125.00	\$230.00

The above charges are for copper service, including 3/4" 1" and 1 1/2" services. 2" service is galvanized wrought iron.

The service charges for all of the above services shall be made for each premise into which water shall be introduced into the cellar of such building for permanent consumption.

For all regular services the following materials and services shall be furnished by the District for the charges indicated above.

5/8" services:

- 5/8" water meter
- Extension service box and rod
- 3/4" Corporation stop
- 3/4" Curb stop
- Tap and inspection of facilities.

For all service connections above 3/4" like materials and service shall be installed except that the size of the meter, Corporation stop and Curb stop shall be 1" 1 1/2" or 2" respectively.

The following charges shall be made for 3/4" and 1" pit service:

Size	3/4"	1"
Pit service	\$110.00	\$165.00

In connection with the above charges the following materials shall be furnished by the District:

- 5/8" Water meter
- Extension service box and rod

3/4" Corporation stop

- Two ring type valves
- Tap and inspection of facilities
- Meter pit, complete

The installation for the 1" meter pit service shall include all of the foregoing items except that the meter Corporation stop and Curb stop shall be 1" instead of 3/8" as indicated above. (1" Meter)

The meter, curb stop, extension service box and rod shall be set by the applicant or consumer at his own cost and expense. Where premises into which water is proposed to be installed has no cellar such service shall be a Pit Installation.

Included in all pit installations and included in the cost thereof set forth above are:

- Underground meter pit cover
- Curb stop
- Corporation stop

Purchased as part of the aforementioned service but installed by the consumer at his own cost and expense are:

- Ring type valves
- Meter and curb box

which materials shall conform in all respects to the requirements and regulations established by the Board of Commissioners and by these Ordinances.

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

We presented, during the recent campaign, a list of areas that we felt could be altered in the budget. By the time this is published we will have again sent our recommendations to the School Board. It is our hope that these areas will be carefully studied. We hope too, that the opposition of the voters will not lead to the often threatened "austerity budget." Such an act can only be interpreted as a punishment for the people who will be "taught a lesson not to defy the will of the Board."
