Girls Surpass Boys in Fitness Test

One hundred and fourteen Hicksville boys and girls took part in a physical fitness test sponsored by Hicksville School Recreation Dept. on May 13, at Hicksville High School. The American Assoc. of Health, Physical Education and Recreation test items were used. An average of 82.96 was achieved by the participants but the girls beat the boys 83.34 to 82.31. Awards were donated jointly by the local Republican and Democratic organizations. The achieved average score based on 100 demonstrates that this group of youngsters did comparatively well. Norms differing according to age and sex were used.

A 98 was scored by Janet Murtha which was the highest of the day. Janet did 50 sit-ups (maximum required) made a 6 foot 3 inch standing broad jump and ran fifty yards in 7.3 seconds. Miss Murtha is a 6th grade student at Dutch Lane School.

Robert Herdenfelder a fifth

grader at Old Country Road School was the highest scorer among the boys. He averaged 96.5. In the sit-ups Robert did 99 (max required), his broad jump measured 5 feet 7 inches, the time for 50 yards was 7.8 seconds. The boys were also required to compete in the pull-up. Robert did seven of these.

Kenneth L. Foran, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence R. Foran, 16 Foran Place, Hicksville, has been chosen to be a participant in operation crossroads Africa this summer. The participants are selected from all racial, social, religious, national and economic groups by a thorough screening process for fitness, citizenship achievement, academic ability, inter-group experience international concern, dedication and leadership qualities. They are required to make thorough preparation, travel hard, undertake primitive living, engage in manual labor, join in an experience of living, traveling and studying with African students at the village level and make a minimum of fifty speeches regarding their experience upon their return.

After a week of orientation in Washington, D.C., by specialists of African area studies, experts from African, European, The United States Governments and the United Nations, Ken will fly to Africa. He will visit four African countries - Ghana, Nigeria, Togo and Dahomey. There will be ample opportunities for meetings and seminars with political and government leaders, educators and business men European and African Officials, Labor leaders and village chiefs.

Operation Crossroads Africa, a person-to-person relationship in depth, was conceived as an effort to relate students of high leadership potential of all backgrounds of the western hemisphere to the African continent in creative, positive and constructive ways and to prepare for future work in understanding Africa.

Ken, a Hicksville High School graduate, class of 1959, is a second year student at Dartmouth College Hanover, New Hampshire and a member of the platoon leadership class, United States Marines Corps.

ANSWER ON POOL

To the Editor:

I would like to reply to AVP, Hicksville, letter regarding a school swimming pool.

When I moved to Hicksville about six years ago, I was amazed. I could hardly believe that here was a town so archaic in planning as to have existed some hundred years without a public park, skating rink, path for bicycles or municipal outdoor pool or indoor school pool. Here was town completely dedicated to industry, it's older residents and gas stations; here was a town, an old historic town, with no physical attributes. Why? Could someone answer me? Unfortunately, we cannot undo what has already been done but with some civic-minded citizens at the helm of this town, perhaps we can still give our children a decent background. We must progress.

Progress means also a responsibility toward each other and especially towards our children. We must try to give our children a well-rounded education, both academically and athletically, in every direction. Hicksville is proud of its high achievement record in regard to our schools. We must get ahead in other directions, too. If we educate ten thousand children both in mind and body, and if only three of them turn out to be a John F. Kennedy, a Jonas Salk or an

Suburban Gardener

It's almost unbelievable to think that just 90 days ago all our shrubs, trees, and even ourselves were buried in snow.

Now that everything is in bloom or just beginning to be so, it's time to think of what to expect and do next.

Sometime this month many plants will begin to turn yellow and drop their needles. Don't be alarmed because this is normal. This occurs primarily in hemlock and yews so if you have already fed your plants there is no need to run to your nursery to buy more plant food.

Whenever we get 5 or 6 days of cloudy, wet weather such as we have experienced this spring, fungus diseases in the lawn will become active. Spraying for fungus in your lawn should always be on the preventative basis since once you have a fungus in your lawn you can only hope to prevent it from getting worse by spraying. The two best lawn fungicides to use are Actidione and Ortho Lawn and Turf Fungicide. Always consult your local nurseryman as to application and timing.

Last but not least, anyone owning a birch tree must spray NOW for birch tree minor. The three best materials are Malathion, Lindane, and Sevin.

A. Beef Flank Steak.
- Q. Where does it come from and how is it identified?**

Deviled Ham Dip

Mix one 4 1/2-ounce can of deviled ham with 1/2 cup dairy sour cream. Stir in 1 teaspoon grated onion and 1 tablespoon chopped parsley. Serve with either crackers or potato chips.

It's always fun to discover a new recipe for a fruit in season, especially when it's such a well liked fruit as strawberries.

This pie calls for fresh strawberries mixed with sour cream, coconut, marshmallows and pineapple. That's why it has been named Fruit Salad Pie. You'll find it an elegant treat to serve at a dessert party.

Fruit Salad Pie is so quick to prepare. Simply mix and chill the ingredients over night. The next morning spoon them into a baked pie shell. Garnish the top with whole strawberries and slice into taste-tempting wedges.

The crust is certain to be tender and flaky if you use lard. Reba Staggs, home economist, says that lard is the best shortening for pastry.

Fruit Salad Pie
1 cup sifted enriched flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
4 to 6 tablespoons lard
2 to 4 tablespoons cold water
Fruit Salad Filling
Mix flour and salt. Cut lard into flour until crumbs are about the size of small peas. Add cold water, a little at a time, mixing quickly and evenly until dough just holds into a ball. Use as little water as possible. Roll to about 1/4 inch in thickness. Line a 9-inch pie pan and crimp edge of pastry. Bake in a very hot oven (450° F.) for 8 to 10 minutes. Cool. Spoon chilled Fruit Salad Filling into baked pie shell. Garnish with strawberries.

Fruit Salad Filling
1 pint strawberries
1 can (8 1/2 ounces) pineapple tidbits, drained
1 1/2 cups miniature marshmallows
1/2 cup shredded coconut
1 cup dairy sour cream
Reserve 5 to 8 strawberries for garnishing pie. Cut remaining strawberries in half. Combine strawberries, pineapple, marshmallows, coconut and sour cream. Allow mixture to chill in refrigerator overnight before spooning into pie shell.

Spareribs Are Barbecued In A New Style

What's your favorite way of preparing spareribs? Barbecuing, probably. It's certainly a popular flavor combination.

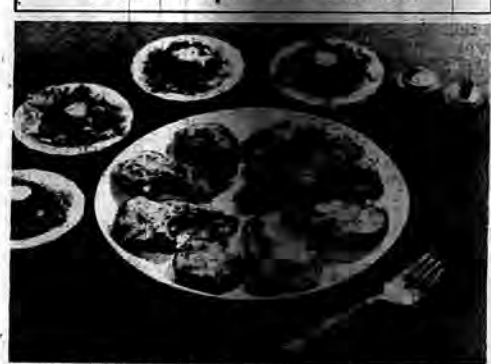
Although you may have your own recipe for barbecued spareribs, next time try this tangy, new-style Barbecued Rib and Lima Bake. The barbecue sauce is somewhat unique, since it contains orange marmalade for a hint of sweetness.

You can easily cut a side of spareribs into serving size pieces for preparation and serving convenience. (You'll notice that the rib bones are joined by cartilage to the breast bone.) Separate the ribs from the breast bone by cutting through the connecting cartilage with a sharp knife. Now cut between the ribs making pieces containing 2 or 3 ribs each. The breast bone section should be cut, too. Reba Staggs, home economist, recommends allowing about 1/2 pound of spareribs per person.

Barbecued Rib and Lima Bake
3 pounds spareribs, cut in serving pieces
1 pound dried lima beans
4 cups water
1 bay leaf
2 teaspoons salt
2 cans (8 ounces each) tomato sauce
1 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup orange marmalade
1 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon prepared mustard
1 tablespoon vinegar
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

Place spareribs, beans, water, bay leaf and 2 teaspoons salt in a large kettle. Cover tightly and simmer for 1 hour. Pour off liquid and remove bay leaf. Place beans and spareribs in a 3-quart casserole. Combine tomato sauce, onion, marmalade, 1 teaspoon salt, mustard, vinegar and Worcestershire sauce. Add to beans and ribs. Cover tightly and bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for 45 minutes. Remove cover and continue baking 15 minutes or until done. 6 to 8 servings.

Pork Chops Are Stuffed



Of course you can be creative in preparing meals! Try a savory rice and vegetable stuffing for 1-inch thick rib pork chops and watch the pleased expressions of your family.

Adding imagination to family-favorite meats goes over well at mealtime. Take pork chops for example. Why not use some of that creative talent of yours and prepare them with a stuffing?

Reba Staggs, home economist, says rib chops are best for stuffing. They should be at least 1 inch thick. Make a slit into each chop from the rib side. If the chop has two rib bones, cut between them. Be careful not to cut all the way through to the fat edge. Then place the stuffing into the pocket and broil as usual.

Rice-Vegetable Stuffed Pork Chops
6 rib pork chops, cut 1 inch thick
1 cup quick-cooking rice

1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon sage
1/2 cup hot water
3 tablespoons lard or drippings
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/2 cup water

Make a pocket in each chop along the bone. (Chops cut from this side hold the stuffing better.) Combine rice, onion, green pepper, 1/2 teaspoon salt, sage and hot water. Stuff each chop with rice-vegetable mixture. Brown chops on both sides in lard or drippings. Season chops with 1 teaspoon salt and pepper. Add 1/2 cup water. Cover tightly, and cook slowly 45 minutes to 1 hour or until done. 6 servings.

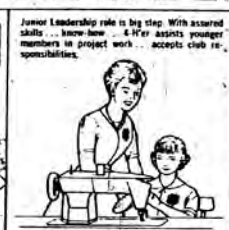
Meat Important When Reducing
Lean meat is important in the reducing diet. Meat leaves you with a feeling of satisfaction and prevents hunger pangs for a longer period than other foods. Meat is an excellent source of high-quality protein and contains a number of important minerals and vitamins.

Fruit Kabob Garnishes
Fruit kabobs are good company for broiled meats. Use any combination of pineapple, apples, pears, oranges, bananas and cherries. Thread chunks of the fruit on skewers. Brush the fruit with melted butter or margarine. Broil the kabobs during the last few minutes the meat is broiling until they're slightly browned and heated through.
