Scholefield Asst. Superintendent

Howard Scholefield, currently principal of Dutch Lane School in Hicksville and former assistant principal of Lee Ave. School, will be assistant superintendent of Hicksville Schools as of July 1st. His selection by a 5 to 2 vote of the Board of Education at a salary of \$14,000 was approved Friday night.

Scholefield will succeed Donald F. Abt, currently Assistant Superintendent, who will become Superintendent on July 1st. Abt has been given a five-year contract and

will succeed Dr. Wallace E. Lamb who is retiring from Public School Administration after 33 years.

Scholefield was assistant principal at Lee Ave. School in Hicksville when Abt was principal there. It has been learned that Scholefield was Abt's prime recommendation among several school district administrators for the office of assistant superintendent. The appointment carries a one-year contract.

He received his BS at Ithaca Col-

lege and his master's degree from St. Lawrence University. He did graduate work at Columbia and St. Lawrence and has the equivalent of a doctorate.

After four years at Chestertown Central, NY, as teacher and assistant principal, he was a teacher in Hicksville for two years. He served as Assistant Principal at Lee Ave. for one year and has been Dutch Lane Principal for six years. He taught the summer of 1960 at the University of Maine.

Answer To AVP

To the Editor:
This letter is intended as a reply to A.V.P.'s letter in the May 4th issue of the Mid Island Herald. I think A.V.P. stated his case against the pool very clearly. He also made his position against schools equally clear.

To gratify the wishes of some property owners without children he would like to reduce taxes by 75%. He does not specify how. Perhaps a sizeable reduction could be made if the United States were to terminate formal education when the children reached the age of twelve, then we could put them back to work in the mills and factories. The tax reductions might amount to about 30%. I cannot accept this as a practical or desirable solution.

My children and my neighbors' children, and grandchildren, are the future of our country. The Nation summons them to service, as soon as they enter upon adult life, and demands years of service from them. When they serve, they protect all our citizens, not just those with children. Today's

children need a far better education than we received. The world we are leaving them is vastly more complicated than the world of twenty years ago. The fantastic devices that they are called on to build and operate, the problems of automated society, the changing political ideologies, all demand the fullest growth and development of our youth.

Swimming and water sports require specialized athletic skills. Most parents today have neither the opportunity nor the ability to teach swimming skills to their children. It is obvious at any beach in the summer that most bathers are incapable of little more than wading up to their chests. It is a matter of record that most drownings occur within 40 yards of the shore.

I do not understand your statement that more teenagers can go wrong. Wherever I meet young people interested in swimming, I have met clean cut, energetic boys and girls interested in improving their skills. The school pool program itself promotes this healthy attitude and it is further fostered through such community organizations as the Red Cross, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts District Recreation and many others.

If your statements were valid about public and private pools being sufficient, then we would not be asking for this all year round facility. Most swimming instruction is best provided during the winter months, before the warm summer days bring their fresh quota of tragedy. Have you ever attempted to teach a child to swim during the one day a week that the family can get to the beach? The day that Dad doesn't have to use the family car to travel to work, if you have, then you too know in your heart why we need the Pool at the High School.

AN EDITORIAL:

May 3rd Revisited

The residents of our community, whose children attend schools in the Syosset School District, have received within the past week School Newsletter #5, sent out by the Board of Education. The newsletter advises that the school budget which was defeated on May 3 (2280 to 1967) will be re-submitted for another vote on June 6, 1961. There is no reduction, and only one change. The cost of librarians for elementary schools has been separated from the original budget and will be on the ballot as a second proposition.

Now, this was a possibility that was almost to be expected, and the voters will have another opportunity to express their wishes. We resent the newsletter's implication, however, that a vast damage has been done by the May 3 vote, that "our reputation as an enlightened community of intelligent, responsible citizens" was necessarily hurt because the majority of the voters disapproved of the budget.

We believe that the residents of School District Number 2 had ample time to study, discuss and digest the provisions of the original budget and that they voted as conscientiously as interested citizens should. The voters did, after all, re-elect every incumbent school board member, and we do not assume that the voters became huddle-headed only when they were dealing with the budget vote.

More urgently, we feel that the May 3 vote was a strong and clear mandate to the school board to submit an intelligently reduced budget, in line with the expressed wishes of the majority of the voters. It would seem that the voters have had more confidence in the school board than the board has in the voters.

We do support, wholeheartedly, the last sentence of the newsletter, which states, "... it is essential that every eligible voter go to the polls on our re-submission of the budget on June 6, 1961".

"If you have it, you don't need have anything else; and if you don't have it, it doesn't matter what else you have." Jerry Neuhaus has it! Call it charm, call it magnetism, call it personal chemistry or "star quality" — whatever it is, it makes a funny story funnier when Jerry tells it; it makes an angry mood explosive when Jerry has it; but particularly, it makes a stage act up when Jerry walks on it. I remember the first time I ever saw Jerry walk on a stage. It was three years ago in the "Richie Players' production of 'Annie's Waltz'. My husband and I had gone to our first community theatre performance, somewhat reluctantly. I think we were expecting a high school play, it was both astonished and delighted to find the production quite professional and skillfully performed. We were part of the dispersing undercurrent in the audience asking, "Who is he?" or "Is he professional?" "Yes," of course, was Jerry Neuhaus, acting as if the stage were his me, relaxed, funny and having wonderful time. No, he is not professional; although he has been entertaining people since he was a little boy playing in the streets, gathering crowds. His family was poor and his mother, who had been brought in Harlem with the Gershwins and Cantors and Berles, encouraged this outlet. Jerry used to go to Milton Berle's early performances and sit in the theatre for the time day, entranced. He was an emulating the star in amateur shows in the Bronx, and in doing specialty numbers and singing as M.C. at Youth Centers.

In the army he was with Special Services and army newspapers told glowing reports of the entertainment he provided for the men. After the army came a time of decision. Civics to Oppose Syosset School Budget Again June 6

At its regular meeting on Tuesday, May 16, the Board of Directors of the Birchwood Civic Assoc. voted unanimously to recommend a "No" vote to the Syosset School Budget when it is resubmitted on June 6th.

The Syosset Education Committee reported that, as a result of the telegram sent to each member of the Syosset School Board, a letter had been received from Mr. McGurk, President of the School Board, advising the Civic Assoc. that it would not be possible for the Board to meet with everyone who cared to discuss the budget, and that, at its May 8th meeting, the Board had decided to schedule another vote for June 6th. The SAME budget that was previously defeated will be resubmitted, except that the extension of library services in the elementary schools will be separate proposition. (See report on this elsewhere in this issue of THE VILLAGER). The Board of Directors voted to bring this matter before the Syosset Joint Civic Council and to ask for the Council's support.

The Board of Directors was addressed by Carl Gruenwald, Chairman of the Zoning Board of Appeals of TODAY. Mr. Gruenwald, appearing as a resident of Hicksville, presented to the Board the pros and cons re the establishment of a Nassau County Park on the Press Wireless property South of the Northern State Parkway in Hicksville. After Mr. Gruenwald had left, the Board discussed the matter thoroughly, and voted to support the establishment of such a park.

There will be a General Meeting of the Birchwood Civic Assoc. on Thursday, May 25th, at 8:30 P.M. at the George A. Jackson Reports, an amendment to the Constitution will be acted upon, and the situation re the entrance gates will be discussed. The highlight of the evening will be a talk by the President of Floyd Bennett Stores, Inc., Sherman Simon, on the plans and operation of the new store in the Birchwood Shopping Center. There will be a question and answer period.

Recommend No Vote on Budget

For the second time the Board of Directors of the Birchwood Civic Assoc. has unanimously voted to recommend a "No" vote on the budget which will be resubmitted for a second vote on June 6. The budget will be in exact form as originally proposed except that the additional librarians for the elementary schools will be placed on a separate proposition.

On April 30 your Board of Directors sent a telegram to each school board member requesting a meeting individually or with the entire board in order to present our recommendations for the new budget. No replies were received until after the school board reached their decision to submit the same budget. In a letter from Mr. McGurk, President of the School Board, we were advised that it would be impossible for the board to meet with individuals regarding the resubmission of the budget.

This appears to be a shocking change of policy in view of the sincere efforts of the school board members willingness to meet with all groups prior to the first vote. After diligent study we were going to make compromise suggestions regarding the resubmission of the budget. Full details of all these recommendations will be printed in next weeks copy of THE VILLAGER.

At this time we wish to emphasize that NONE of our recommendations affect the education of our children. We feel that the decisions of the school board should reflect the wishes of the Syosset taxpayers. It would appear that those wishes have been ignored since the budget is to be resubmitted without any reduction. If you voted "No" before, you should again vote "NO" because you will be again be voting on the same budget. Again we emphasize that you should not be swayed by the threat of austerity. Other school boards whose budgets were defeated this year have resubmitted substantially reduced budgets. We are confident that a second defeat of the budget will cause the board members to seriously reconsider and submit a reduced budget that will be acceptable to the taxpayers. Leon Newman

3; as well as amusing small groups of old friends with his talents for mimicry and story-telling. But the urge to perform dies hard. Jerry found the solution for someone who wants to act, who does want to take it seriously and learn, but who is not willing to give up a normal family life and make the sacrifices necessary for a life in professional show business; community theatre. He joined the Jericho Players, of the Birchwood Civic Assoc., and was pressed into service as a leading man, immediately.

Today he is also interested in the administrative end of the theatre group and is now President, a responsibility he takes very seriously. Meanwhile, he delighted audiences in "Anniversary Waltz" and "Happy Time" and they cheered for him in the stand-out bit role of the kooky jazz musician in "The Tender Trap". However, the drama "All My Sons" tapped something quite new for Jerry. He was doing a serious role for the first time and he was not completely ready for it; he did not know how to use his talents fully.
