Westbury Hills Backs Park

The Westbury Hills Civic Assoc last week joined a growing list of civic units supporting the creation of a Nassau County Park on the former Press Wireless acreage in the northwest corner of Hicksville. The Nassau County Board of Supervisors has taken action to formally acquire the property, embracing 125 acres, for a park area, The executive committee of the Birchwood Park Civic Assoc of Westbury, more commonly known as the Westbury Hills Civic Assoc, adopted a resolution June 14 praising the County Supervisors for their action on acquiring the land. A spokes man commented on the opposition attributed to the Westbury Hills Jewish Centre, said to focus in Imperial Gardens, declared "The only connection between our community and the Center."

Suburban Gardener by Ralph Pignataro

Leaf spot disease on most lawns has become worse instead of better. If your lawn suddenly looks brown or yellow, check the individual blades of grass. 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


