Plan Triple Towers for Episcopal Church

Ground was officially broken last night for the new main church building of Holy Trinity Episcopal Church at ceremonies conducted by Father Dominic K. Ciannella, rector of the congregation. The ceremony was held at 10 o'clock in the parish hall where services are now conducted. The adjoining of the proposed new \$250,000 structure at the corner of Jerusalem Ave. and Old Country Rd. is a landmark which has been driven into the ground marking the area to be encompassed by the new building. Two cords were stretched

from stake to stake, with a third cord surrounding the entire area. The configuration thus formed the Greek letter X, symbol both of the Cross and of the Name of Christ. Following the procession, during which the Litany for the Church was said, the congregation, choir and assistants sang the stirring hymn, "The Church's One Foundation."

Completion of the new church building is scheduled for Easter-tide of next year, which falls in April. Designed by Seth Heller, senior architect partner of the firm of Heller and Knowles, styling is contemporary and in harmony with the large parish house which was dedicated in 1955. The curved, sweeping walls of the church will terminate in a clear glass narthex which will connect to the present parish house in which supplemental seating will be placed on Feast and Holy Days. The profile of the church is unique in its architectural emphasis on the Blessed Trinity by means of triple towers which will rise 35 feet above the ground. One tower is above the high altar, another above the altar of the Blessed Virgin, and a third above the baptismal font.

This latest expansion is another step in the long and steady growth of the Episcopal congregation in Hicksville over the past 63 years. The first Mass was celebrated in September 1898 by Father Henry B. Ryan, Archdeacon of Nassau County. Two of the original members of that congregation are communicants of the parish today. They are Mrs. William C. Jaegle who lives at 519 Old Country Road in Plainville and Miss Louise Augustin of 275 Broadway in Hicksville. The former church, which was razed two weeks ago to make way for the new structure, was consecrated in 1942. In recent years, however, the congregation has outgrown its facilities, necessitating the offering of the Holy Sacrifice seven times each Sunday.

When the new church is completed, attendance will be more pleasant and comfortable. It is also expected that an increasing number of newcomers will find a welcome and place in the life of the parish congregation, according to Rev. Ciannella.

Win Contract For Incinerator

The Town of Islip on June 12th, awarded a contract in the amount of \$423,000.00 to Dobson Construction Co. of 320 N. Hwy. Hicksville, for the general building construction of a new 300-ton incinerator for the town. The firm of Dobson Construction is also actively engaged in the construction of the L.I.R.R. passenger stations at Belleroose and Floral Park; construction of Plainville Water District's Plant No. 5 and the new home for Aetna Electrical Distributing Corp. in Hicksville.

To Travel Europe

Brono Szczepanski and family of Bethpage, along with Mr. and Mrs. James Petinato and Anne Phillips of Hicksville, will be among the many persons who will travel the United States and Europe this summer to attend a series of being held in Kansas, New York this week. For ten consecutive weeks a convention will begin in a major city, including Copenhagen, Denmark; Hamburg, Germany; London, England; Paris, France and San Francisco, Calif.

Szczepanski, acting as spokesman for the group said that they have been planning the trip since 1958.

President Allen S. Carpenter says he is confident the meeting can conclude by midnight. His term ends on June 30th as does the term of Board Secretary Walter W. Schreiber. However, apparently as a precaution, Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, superintendent of schools, whose term also ends at midnight, has announced the meeting will start at 7:30 PM instead of the usual 8:15 PM.

Few meetings in the past year have ended before 1 A.M. The last meeting on June 2 was over at 2:45 A.M.

After midnight, June 30th, Donald F. Abt, now assistant superintendent, will start his five-year contract as Superintendent succeeding Dr. Lamb. At the same time Howard Scholefield will start his one-year term as assistant superintendent, succeeding Abt.

The term of office on the Board continues for Vice President Jerome Zettler, who could conduct the Board meeting if it runs after midnight. Other incumbents are Robert D.P. Eaton, said to be a strong contender for election as president; David Hurwitz, Herbert Johnson and Cornelius McCormack.

Francis Sabatella was elected in May to succeed Carpenter on the Board, starting July 1, and George Jackson was elected to succeed Schreiber.

The term of District Clerk Fred J. Noth and District Treasurer Herbert Backman also technically ends at midnight June 30. The Clerk normally records the actions of the Board and prepares the meeting minutes. The Board could designate one of its own members to serve as Clerk, if the meeting goes past midnight.

Normally, the Board of Education at the reorganization meeting which is set by law (it falls on Wednesday, July 5 this year), formally greets newly elected Board members, designates dis-

trict officers such as the Clerk and Treasurer. At this meeting the Board also elects its own officers; i.e. President, Vice President and Secretary.

The contract with School Attorneys Michael Sullivan and Robert Corcoran also terminates on June 30th; however, it contains an open end arrangement which permits the Board to continue their services for 30 days beyond the concluding date.

The start of the new fiscal year is expected to bring some changes in the lineup on the Board of Education. Hurwitz and Eaton, incumbents, openly supported the election effort of Sabatella and Jackson last May, and may thus form a four-man majority on the seven-man Board. Zettler, Johnson and McCormack had been closely identified with Carpenter and Schreiber whose terms are expiring.

Campaign literature for Sabatella and Jackson had called for an end of "Carpenter's Cronies" and was particularly critical of the District Clerk and District Treasurer. Such pre-election material had also pledged the community smaller class sizes, denounced the use of temporary-type classrooms and at the same time promised economies.

Among the earliest problems of the new Board of Education will be the very question of the temporary-type classrooms and progression of other phases of the two-million-dollar construction program which was tied up in litigation for over a year.

With the last legal hurdle now passed, the Board of Education is scheduled to call for bids on moving of about 20 temporary-type rooms to the Junior High sometime in July. The first order of business at Friday, June 30, meeting will be a report meeting with School Architects, Knappe & Johnson.

487 High School Graduates

Hicksville High School will graduate 487 boys and girls, slightly less than the number in the class last June, in an outdoor invitation-only ceremony on the high school athletic field starting at 5:30 PM. Approximately 10 percent of the class or about 50 will be receiving a record-high number of scholarships this year, according to Principal Leon J. Galloway.

School Goes On For Hundreds

While Friday, June 23, is the last day of the term for the Hicksville Public Schools, hundreds will be attending classes during the summer months ahead.

In addition to elementary and high school summer schools, band and orchestra, this summer will see a new program in summer elementary reading established by the Board of Education at the request of the Administration.

Three volunteer parents will work with the program at five school centres weekly during July and August under the direction of reading consultants of the District.

This program is for children in grades one, two and three. Many primary children lose ground in their reading achievement from June to September. Assistant Superintendent Donald F. Abt told

the School Board, in addition to other phases of the program, libraries in the five school centres will be open.

Sessions will be held seven Mondays at Burns Ave., Tuesdays at Dutch Lane, Wednesdays at Fork Lane, Thursdays at Lee Ave. and Fridays at Woodland Ave. School.

There are 621 children from all elementary public schools and three parochial schools attending summer elementary school at Lee Ave., starting July 5.

Three hundred boys and girls are enjoyed in summer band which will be conducted at Fork Lane and Burns Ave. Schools. Another 100 will be enrolled in two summer high school bands and an orchestra at the High School.

Thirty-five days of summer high school under the direction of Leon Galloway, principal, starts on July 5.

How Not to Select a School Bd Candidate

Recently our Civic Assoc. recommended a candidate to the School Board who was in favor of the approval of the Syosset School Budget. At the same time, our Civic Assoc. recommended a no vote on the Syosset School Budget. Since that time, I have heard many statements criticizing our position as being inconsistent.

It is my firm belief that the position taken by the Civic Assoc. was proper. Members of the School Board have many duties and functions to perform besides the budget. Administration, curriculum and hundreds of other subjects pertaining to the education of our children are constantly presented to the School Board for decisions. It is true that many of the policies

proposed by the School Board cannot take effect unless monies are appropriated to put these policies in action. However, there are valid reasons to recommend a defeat of a School Budget when that budget contains items that can be decreased or eliminated without affecting the education of our children. Therefore a candidate's opinion of the budget is merely one of the factors to be weighed in determining his qualifications.

It would indeed be a sad state of affairs if our Civic Assoc. appraised the qualifications of a School Board candidate by whether or not he agreed or disagreed with our opinion on that year's school budget.

Some of the School Board candidates during the past election

stated that they were against the school budget for this coming year. We were not satisfied with the reasons given by these school board candidates. In our opinion, they did not measure up to the qualifications experience, etc., of the candidate we recommended. It is very easy for a school board candidate to express dissatisfaction with the budget, in the hope that many people are against higher taxes, and will therefore vote for him. This type of candidate should not be elected to the School Board unless he can show valid reasons for his objection to the budget as well as other qualifications which will make him the caliber of School Board member that will be an asset to the future education of our children.
