## 14th Postmaster In 106-Yr. History

Irene L. Murphy of 85 Blueberry Lane, Hicksville, became the 14th postmaster in the 106-year-history of the Hicksville Post Office when she was sworn in Friday evening by Postal Inspector Louis Bader. Her 13 predecessors were all men. The Hicksville office is one of the largest on Long Island and it is among the 300 largest in the nation.

Mrs. Murphy who grew up in Bayville and has had broad experience in publication work and public relations was, prior to her appointment by President John F. Kennedy, active in Democratic politics. She has resigned as co-leader of the 4th Assembly Democratic Zone and former Hicksville Democrat leader.

Her appointment is subject to confirmation by the United States Senate. She succeeds Harry C. Cotter of Park Ave. who retired as of Friday, July 7, after 35 years in the postal service including postmaster of Hicksville since 1955.

She is the wife of Francis P. Murphy an economist, and the mother of two small children, a boy aged 4 and a daughter, 11, who is in the 6th grade at the Waldorf School, Garden City.

Eight Nassau Post Offices have lady postmasters: Jericho, Massapequa, Atlantic Beach, Glenwood Landing, Lynbrook, Roosevelt, Roslyn and Woodmere, but none are as large as Hicksville (which includes Plainview) from the standpoint of revenue and business.

### NAVY VETERAN

Mrs. Murphy is a veteran of World War II and served three and a half years in the US Navy. She holds a master's degree in public law and government from Columbia.

Her civic activities include presidency of the East Nassau Auxiliary of the United Epilepsy Assoc and she is chairman of the Hicksville-Levittown fund committee of the Nassau County Council of Camp Fire Girls.

As one of the largest post offices on the Island, she is scheduling a press conference for July 21 when a proposal will be advanced to encourage the largest commercial mailers in the community to deposit half of their mail in the morning, rather than wait until 5 o'clock when most new drop their mailings. Also scheduled is the formation of an advisory council of the largest mailers in cooperation with the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce.

### HONOR COTIER

The letter carriers of Hicksville gave a testimonial dinner in honor of retiring Postmaster Cotter at Tom O'Brien's Restaurant on South

Broadway, Sunday evening. About 70 persons attended including Mrs. Murphy, E. Quigley, Brooklyn Postmaster; and Pat Foley, Bethpage Postmaster.

While Hicksville has never had a woman as postmaster before, it did have a lady mail carrier during World War II - Arina Seebeck.

Since the post office was established in Hicksville 106 years ago, the following have been postmasters: David Sammis, 1855 to 1857; E. H. DeLangullette, 1857 to 1861; David Sammis, 1861 to 1863; Henry Bannhr, 1863 to 1865; E. H. DeLangullette, 1865 to 1869; Ernest Liebke, 1869 to 1885; W. C. Miller, 1885 to 1889; Ernest Liebke, 1889 to 1894; Henry J. Nickolaus, 1894 to 1897; John G. Wickler, 1897 to 1902; August Hauser, 1902 to 1904; Ernest Poole, 1904 to 1913; John Puvogel, 1913 to 1922; John Banschbach, 1922 to 1934; William C. Mollitor, 1934 to 1955; Harry C. Cotter, 1955 to 1961.

Hicksville did not become a first class office until July 1, 1944. A couple of years ago the office, under Cotter, achieved million-dollar a year status and is expected to exceed two million dollars shortly.

Within the past two years, many West Birchwood residents have had trees planted on the curbs. Mainly sycamores, and some maples. During the past month, many leaves on these trees have turned brown and on many trees, leaves have fallen. This is not a disease. When any tree is transplanted, it suffers the loss of thousands of fiber roots. These roots supply the tree with moisture. During warm summer days, much of the trees water supply to the leaves is lost through evaporation. If the new young fiber root system of the tree cannot replenish the moisture fast enough, the tree leaves will turn brown or very often fall.

With the return of the cool wet weather, the tree will often rehabilitate itself. More so the sycamore than the maple as they grow faster. Your answer to this may be "But I water my tree constantly." This may be very true, but your tree may not have enough fiber roots to carry the water up to the tree. This doesn't mean to stop watering your tree, but it is a reason why your tree is not reacting to your constant watering.

To help rectify this condition, on your trees, feed them with a well balanced fertilizer and mulch each tree with a good covering of peat moss.

A flash fire completely destroyed the residence of Harold and Adele Zorn, 169 Forest Drive, Birchwood Park, Tuesday afternoon between 4 and 5:30 p.m. The loss was estimated at \$30,000 by observers.

Tuesday night at dusk, the site of the blaze was crowded by throngs of neighbors gazing at the burned out shell of what had once been a beautiful home.

In interviewing neighbors of the Zorns it was stated that the fire was initially reported to the Telephone Co. at approximately 4 p.m. and that it was almost a half hour before the first firemen reached the scene.

Zorn, who was alone in the house, when the fire was discovered, called in the alarm. According to Telephone Co. records, the first call came in at 4:21 and was for the Police Dept. The phone company reported that the address given for the fire was Birchwood Homes and the receiver was left off the hook making it impossible to get further information. The Jericho Fire Department, according to its log, sent their equipment to the scene of the fire at 4:32, presumably notified by the Police Dept.

During the interim, a neighbor phoned in an alarm to the telephone company at 4:27, according to the company's log, and the Syosset Fire Dept. was notified, soon arriving with its volunteers.

Zorn's wife, Adele, was at the Jericho Country Club with their three children during the fire. The one casualty was a pet bird. The fire gutted the entire house and destroyed all personal property.

### View from the Hatch

If you think they're making seats smaller this year, you're wrong. Pygal curves - or rear ends, as they are known to we laymen - are getting bigger.

Less than a century ago, rear ends averaged four inches smaller than they do today. As recently as 1930, rear ends measured two inches narrower.

Although the shape that rear ends are in may be only of casual interest to the layman, the size and direction in which they are headed are of vital concern to the manufacturers of seats as well as to the proprietors of theaters, movies, auditoriums and stadiums.

Twenty years ago, a theater could install a seat 19 inches wide and be confident that he was offering his patrons the utmost in luxury. Today's seats must range from a minimum of 20 inches to at least 22 inches in width. And of course, the entire pygal technology has undergone remarkable changes. It becomes immediately apparent that today's curves do not match the indentations of 20 year old seats.

To what do we owe our growing pygal? Observers attribute the added dimension of their science to richer diets, more food, less exercise, and more sitting. From kindergarten through college, a student will spend 15,000 hours in the executive position.

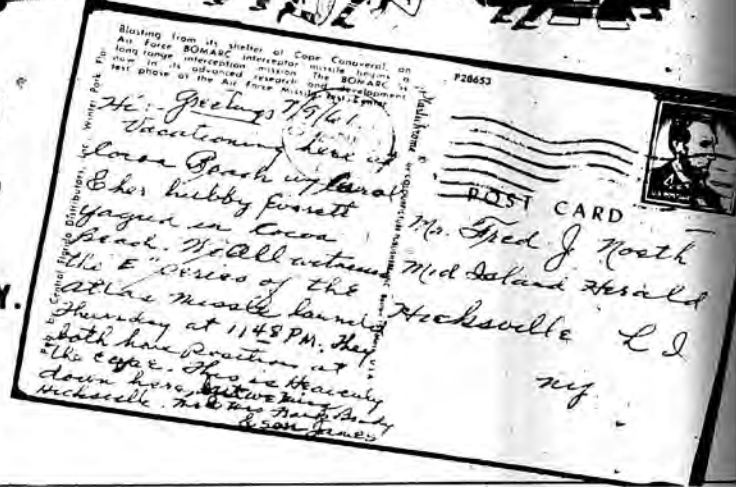
