County Ready To Plan Park

First step toward the development of the former Press Wire property in North West Hicksville as a County Park will take place Monday when Supervisor John J. Burns moves a resolution at a meeting of the Board of Supervisors designating a consulting engineer.

Andrews & Clark Inc. will be given the work. County Executive Anthony Patterson is authorized by the resolution to sign the contract which provides that the total fee will not exceed \$75,000. It will include a surveying fee of \$50 per acre, 1 percent for consultation time and 4 percent of final construction costs.

There are about 120 acres in the property. Plans will include a city roads maintenance garage and offices for the north shore section of the Highways and General Engineering division of the Nassau Public Works Dept. In addition to county park and recreation facilities.

It is reported that Hurwitt, who is an assistant principal of a Queens Junior High School, is about to move from Hicksville to Plainview.

He served seven months less than a full three-year term as a member of the Board of Education. In the election campaign of 1959 he ran with Robert D. P. Eaton and Morton Cohen. Hurwitt defeated Fred J. Noth while Allen S. Carpenter defeated Cohen in a race for a two-year term. Eaton was re-elected. He was elected President of the Board of Education this year.

Eaton defeated Herbert Backman who has since been twice named treasurer of the district.

The third candidate that year was Frank Hester who ran for all three vacancies.

Funeral at Bolton Landing For Retired Superintendent

Less than six months after he retired as Superintendent of Hicksville Public Schools, Dr. Wallace E. Lamb died on Monday at his home in Englewood, N.J., of a coronary thrombosis. He was 56 years old and was widely known as a historian and educator. Funeral services were scheduled to take place today (Thurs) at Bolton Landing, N.Y., with interment at a family plot. Flags on all schools in the District were lowered to half mast in his honor.

Dr. Lamb came to Hicksville as an assistant superintendent in 1954 and the following year succeeded Dr. Erie H. LeBaron as the superintendent. When he retired on July 1 of this year, he had completed 33 years as a chief administrator of various school systems.

In 1956 he had declined an appointment as State Commissioner of Education in Maine. In the summer of 1959 he was educational consultant for the Educational Facilities Laboratory of the Ford Foundation.

At the time of his retirement, Dr. Lamb declared: "The educational program that has been developed here has brought the community even more credit than could have seemed possible seven years ago. It has been proven here that an excellent instructional program can be achieved without extravagance."

"I feel assured now that the people of Hicksville will not regret from their present educational stature, and that they will never again allow their community to become an object of newspaper ridicule. My work here is done. I mean this in all humility. Little could have been accomplished if the people of Hicksville had not accepted and followed educational leadership."

SOUGHT COLLEGE

One of the projects which received much of his attention and was encouraged by the Board of Education was to seek the establishment of a community college in the Hicksville area to serve the coming tens of thousands of high school graduates in the county.

Upon his retirement, he was succeeded by Donald F. Abt who had been assistant superintendent. Dr. Lamb moved to Englewood, N.J., and joined the faculty of the College of Education at the Teaneck campus of Fairleigh Dickinson University as associate Professor of Education. Before coming to Hicksville in 1954 he had been supervising principal at Greenport, in Suffolk, since 1950.

Dr. Lamb was the author of

several history books dealing with his native Lake George region. He was co-author of "American History" with Dr. Howard Wilson and of "A Concise History of Education" with Dr. Grover Morehart. He leaves his wife, Almeta Wiley Lamb; two sons, Bert W. and Robert B. Lamb, and two grandchildren.

Dr. Lamb was Hicksville's third superintendent of schools. E. A. Van Slyke, first superintendent, now lives in Hensonsville, upstate; and Dr. LeBaron, second superintendent, resides on Halsey Ave., Hicksville.

It is felt by this writer that only experienced personnel can do this and keep the Department at this high plateau. Mr. Hawhurst's reasons for running is to maintain the Department at this level, the opposition candidate is running because of a rumored rift between the Ladies Auxiliary and the Fire fighters. Election Tuesday On Water Board

Kiel Opposed By Simpson

Residents of Jericho will have the opportunity to elect a Water Commissioner on Tuesday, Dec. 5th. The candidates are Charles Kiel, Jr., of Glenwood Landing, the incumbent and Raymond Simpson, of Jericho.

Voting will take place that day between 4 P.M. and 10 P.M. at the Water Commissioner's office on Northern Blvd. (route 25A) right off route 106, next to Rothman's Restaurant.

The estimated income for 1962 for the Jericho Water District, one of the largest in the state, totals \$855,295.00. The district encompasses Jericho, Syosset, East Norwich, Upper, Lower and Old Brookville, Westbury, Oyster Bay Cove, Woodbury, Muttontown, Old Westbury, parts of Greenvale, Roslyn Harbor, Glen Head, Glenwood Landing, Laurel Hollow, Locust Grove and a small portion of Plainville.

The district has three Water Commissioners: Howard P. Kreutzer, Edward P. Bracken, and Charles Kiel, the incumbent. Each is elected to a three year term and elections are staggered so that only one post is filled at a time. Commissioners receive a salary not in excess of \$1000, a year, based on a \$25. per meeting fee. Yearly budgets are set by the Commissioners.

Mr. Simpson, a professional engineer, who has been designing water treatment and distribution systems for the past ten years, announced his candidacy for the office at the last meeting of the West Birchwood Civic Assoc. Board of Directors. He told the group that in his opinion "we pay a comparatively high rate of 30¢ per 1,000 gallons of water." He stated figures based on a survey by the American Water Works

Assoc. showing comparable rates for 497 other districts as averaging 12.3¢ per thousand gallons of water. In addition, he pointed out that taxpayers are required to pay another .05¢ per \$100. assessed valuation.

"It is difficult for me to understand why the cost is so high," Mr. Simpson said, "when we realize that practically no treatment is required for the water. It comes from artesian wells."

Mr. Kiel, also a professional engineer, in association with LILCO and has had 36 years experience in construction, operation and maintenance of gas and electric facilities. According to Mr. Kiel who was reached at home by telephone, 30¢ per thousand gallons of water is a low rate. "You cannot judge the cost of water per gallon alone," he said. The tax rate to the town is part of the price you pay. In 1961, the cost was 11¢ per hundred of assessed evaluation. In 1962, the rate is being dropped to 8¢ per hundred."

"Some rates may appear lower," Mr. Kiel cited that "Plainville pays 29¢ per thousand gallons, and then pays a town tax of 19¢ per hundred dollars of assessed evaluation. Hicksville also pays 30¢ per thousand gallons, but their tax rate is 16¢ per hundred of assessed evaluation."

While Mr. Simpson suggested that the rates were too high, Mr. Kiel insisted that there would be no point in lowering one rate to raise another. "We don't charge anything for the rental of fire hydrants," he pointed out. "If we charged for such rentals, town taxes for the fire department would necessarily go up. There are many such factors to be considered," he continued. "We're one of the few districts on Long Island that is free of debt. We've always taken pride in the way we've kept ourselves out of debt. And we are very happy that we have been able to reduce the town tax rate."

Mail Early For Christmas

Stressing the need for everyone to cooperate in the 1961 "Mail Early For Christmas" Campaign, Hicksville Postmaster Irene L. Murphy said today, "Early mailing of all Christmas cards and gifts is the biggest single factor in getting everything delivered before Christmas."

She stressed three rules: Wrap your Christmas gifts securely - Be sure they are addressed clearly and correctly - and Mail all your gifts and cards early.

The Postmaster added: "I hate to see folks take chances on mailing poorly wrapped packages. Despite careful handling every year, too many packages break open in transit and too often we have to puzzle over names and addresses which are incomplete or simply cannot be read at all."

"If you have any articles of unusual size or bulk, better check with the Post Office before attempting to mail them," the Postmaster warns. The limits on size and weight of packages varies, depending on where you mail your package from. As an extra precaution against loss, Postmaster Murphy advised placing both your return address and the recipients address inside the carton or package before it is wrapped.

If you use Christmas stickers or seals, put them on the back of your Christmas cards and packages so that they will not conflict with the address on the front. Make sure that correct postage is firmly affixed to each card and package. When mailing gifts, it's a good idea to place a piece of transparent cellophane tape over the address portion of the label to prevent defacing it in transit. And always be sure, of course, to include the recipients full name, street address, city, zone and state.

Because the entire Christmas mailing period is primarily a battle against time, "Do it now" is the slogan from here on in. Don't put off your Christmas mailings while you still have ample time because this means that dreaded pile-ups will occur at the Post Office, causing unavoidable slowdowns in deliveries as the holiday approaches.

The Postmaster asks the cooperation of all business firms to delay mailing circulars and catalogs until after December 25th, to keep the mails clear for the Christmas rush.

The Postmaster said she is most appreciative of the interest and cooperation shown by the mailing public so far, and reminds us that all mail going long distances should be sent by Dec. 10. Christmas packages for local delivery should be mailed not later than Dec. 15, and be sure to mail your Christmas cards for nearby destinations at least a week before Christmas.
