HOW LONG?

Dear Sir: Is there a reasonable or fixed length of time for a couple to be engaged?

Dear LYB: The length of an engagement period is determined by many factors. The problem which many engaged couples face is usually one of economics. Can the man afford to support a wife? Has he completed his vocational (or professional) training? Is the wife willing to work after the marriage takes place? Sometimes the couple decides that the economic factors are not the important ones and decide to go ahead with the marriage. They often overlook items of greater import than economics.

The engagement period is a time for the boy and girl to get to know each other better; the time when they should really "let their hair down" in each others presence; the time when they should be learning of each others bad habits and faults. This is the time when they will discover whether or not they are compatible.

Too many couples rush into marriage with only a view through rose colored glasses. They refuse to recognize that their partners have faults. When the faults show up suddenly after marriage they are shocked to realize that their spouse is only human. The engage-

ment period is designed to avoid this type of sudden disillusionment. This is the time in which to mature and understand your partner better.

The length of the engagement period therefore will vary from a very brief time (where the individuals have achieved true maturity and understanding from their first meeting) to very long periods of time (where the individuals have not achieved maturity and are unable to adjust to each other and the idea of marriage).

OLD ENOUGH TO DRIVE

Dear Sir: Our 17 year old son insists upon using the family car for his dates. He claims that all of his friends drive cars when dating. I think he is too young to use a car on a date. Is there any way I can convince him not to use the car for his dates?

Ecker, will be remembered for a long time. We expect great performances from Jerry and he didn't disappoint us. Harold displayed outstanding comedy skill and was a perfect foil. Leon Newman, their captor, did some fancy mugging for his big photography scene.

Betty Goldstein brought a luminous quality to her portrait of Mary McLeod. Her warmth and humanity as she tried to make her husband see her as she was now, despite a youthful indiscretion, was a highlight of the play.

There were exciting moments from Phil Rosenthal, as the lawyer, Ben Ross, Adolph Lowler, the Doctor who serves as a catalyst for the exciting events of the day, Barry Jeffery, Isabel Davis, Al Ross and Howard Cole. This was, as I said before, a big cast. I'd like to mention everybody, but that would be impossible. Each small part added its share to the glowing whole.

Highway Forces Ready For Snow Fighting Job

"Town highway snow fighting forces are now on a 'stand-by basis' and ready to swing into immediate action against heavy snowfalls and icy conditions to keep Town roads open this winter," Highway Superintendent Thomas R. Pynchon announced.

Pynchon's "Plan of Operation", mapped out with department aides, establishes regular plowing schedules for Town roads covering main arteries, secondary roads and residential streets, in that order, calls for around-the-clock communications with weather authorities to obtain up-to-the-minute reports on storm movements and provides for maintenance of emergency snow clearing service for homeowners who need assistance during storms.

State highways located in the Town will also be plowed by the Town Highway snow-fighting forces as required by law, excepting the Long Island Expressway and its marginal roads which will be taken care of by State and County

forces, Pynchon pointed out.

"A special snow fighting unit has been organized to provide emergency service for homeowners where matters of health or related conditions are caused by severe storms. For emergency service during snow and ice storms homeowners are requested to call Walnut 1-6030-31-32 and the emergency snow unit will go into action if it is deemed necessary," Pynchon states.

Superintendent Pynchon noted that in a great many cases during last year's storms snow-plowing equipment was severely hampered by cars parked on residential streets. He urged homeowners to cooperate as far as possible with the Highway Dept. in moving their cars on to their driveways at the first sign of a snowfall. "This will enable our plows to do a quicker and more efficient job", he asserted.

BETWEEN DEADLINES



Bethpage last month celebrated its 25th anniversary. Without checking back as to exact dates, we'll assume that the celebration was the passing of a quarter century since the name of the community was changed from Central Park to Bethpage.

We read relatively little in the public prints last month regarding those historic days and how it all came to pass. We recall some details quite vividly because we attended many of the sessions and events.

Regrettably, some of the names of the leading figures in the name change episode were not recalled either.

Foremost in our mind in connection with the name change was the late Al Lang, a prominent civic figure, active in the water district and fire department. It was he who induced us to get interested in coverage of the campaign and its successful conclusion.

Other names that come to mind were Jack Gifford, William Ahern, Fred Kramer, "Happy" Norman and more.

The community at the time had an active group called the Central Park Improvement Committee which met in the old firehouse on Stewart Ave. (Now a confectionary distribution point). They discussed many projects to bring fame and glory to Central Park. One was to seek an extension of Stewart Ave. from Garden City out across the open plains to provide Central Park with a location on a main highway. (And curiously, Bethpage will soon have a six-lane super-highway running thru it, but from the north to the south instead of east to west—the North-South Expressway).

The committee also felt that Bethpage State Park then newly opened, was really in their community but that Farmingdale was stealing all the fame.

Another ambition was to bring Grumman Engineering Aircraft Corp. over from East Farmingdale.

The committee did quite well on that last project. Grumman was looking for a new and larger area in which to grow. Thru the Committee's cooperation and the late Judge John W. Anderson, then a member of the Town Board, the area was rezoned for Grumman's use.

In those days Grumman came to Central Park (Bethpage) with about 700 employees and among the first to join the staff was Jack Gifford who this month is retiring after 25 years service. Paul S. Gilbert, Grumman personnel director, was principal of Central Park's only school on Powell Ave. before joining the aircraft firm.

One of the big achievements of this committee, from a historic viewpoint, was getting the name changed from Central Park to Bethpage. There was a group in Farmingdale, including the then mayor, which vigorously opposed such a move—because they feared the loss of affiliation with Bethpage Park.

Old historic documents came to light—including the map of the old Powell purchase of most of today's State Park and Farmingdale from the Indians some three centuries ago.

However, Mr. Ahern was then (as he is today) a man of some

considerable connections and he, it was recorded, convinced the LI Rail Road and the US Postal Dept. to go along with the community wish. And it was just about that simple. The Postal authorities agreed to change the name of the local Post Office and the LIRR said, if the Post Office changes they'll rename the station.

And that was it. There was a parade and ceremonies the day they took down the old sign on the railroad depot (which has since been replaced with a more modern building) and substituted a brand new name plate.

We can't conclude this little report without particular mention of the Brooklyn Daily Eagle and its helpful role in the episode. There was then a local resident whose name escapes us, employed by the Eagle and this writer was the local correspondent for the newspaper operating out of an office in Hempstead.

David Robinson George, today promotion manager for Newsday, was our boss in those days. He was the Nassau editor. He later went on, as did several other former Eagle staffers, to become public relations director for the Long Island Rail Road.

The role of "Happy" Norman in the name change was somewhat unique. As part of the gala festivities in celebration, "Happy" with Jack Looney at the controls, demonstrated (probably for the last time) his ability as a stunt man by walking along the wings of a bi-plane hovering above the main street.

He leaped by parachute, to conclude the exciting day, and in landing sprained or broke his ankle. We'll see "Happy" remembers that historic day.
