## Mollitor Was Postmaster During Years of Growth

William G. Mollitor of 127 Bay Ave. who died on Saturday, Dec 30, was postmaster of Hicksville during one of its periods of greatest growth and expansion. The 12th postmaster in the community history, he took office in 1934 and retired in 1955 during the centennial year of the office.

It was during his tenure that the office grew from a small location on Herzog Place (in what is today part of the main office of Long Island National Bank) to become one of the leaders in the state from the standpoint of sales volume, number of employees and amount of mail handled. The office has since continued to grow and expand.

During this same span of 21 years the Hicksville Post Office achieved first class status as of July 1, 1944.

The population of Hicksville and a vast surrounding open area served by Rural Free Delivery routes doubled and tripled during those 21 years. The section known as Island Trees came under Hicksville RFD and when Levitt & Sons built their big post-war development across the plains bordering Hempstead Tpke and called it Levittown, the Hicksville office was called upon to provide mail service. Eventually a branch was established for Levittown and today it is a first class office in its own right.

Mollitor was named postmaster upon the sudden death, in office, of John Baumback. When Mollitor retired as Postmaster in 1955, Harry Coder, since retired also, was named to succeed him. Long active in the volunteer fire department of Hicksville, which he served for over a quarter century as a member of Co. No. 2, "Bill" Mollitor was also a member of the Exempt and Benevolent Firemen's Assoc. of Hicksville.

After his retirement from the Post Office, he became affiliated with Seaman & Rosenbaum Inc.

He resided at the Henry I. Smith Funeral Home, Newbridge Rd., Hicksville, where the Fire

Among the several firsts for the Hicksville Post Office while he was in office was the special flight carrying mail from the Aviation Country Club to New York City and an inaugural helicopter mail flight which took off from Duffy Ave for New York airports.

Willet Ave is the main arterial road of Hicksville, just below the Jericho Fire-School District line, is scheduled to deadend at a chain-link fence at the point where it presently turns north into Westmoreland Rd. The prospect has generated the interest of the Hicksville Fire Commissioners, the Town of Oyster Bay and Nassau County Planning Commission, among others.

Actually the prospect has been most evident for several years but has currently come into focus with the start of construction on the Willet Ave elementary school.

Voters of Hicksville School District some three or more years ago approved the purchase of a school site on Willet Ave. The property included the point where Willet Ave turns into Westmoreland (see map). In 1959 the voters approved the construction of a school there, but the project was delayed by court action.

The issue was finally resolved in favor of the School District. Bids were awarded and construction on the building is currently underway. It was then learned that the District plans to erect a gate at the end of Willet Ave (see map), which will then be the entrance driveway into the school area, and to seal off the end of Westmoreland Rd.

The Hicksville Fire Commissioners, hearing about the proposal, have been in touch with the Town Board and School Board by mail. They note that this is the principal access to the area to the east. There is another small street (Willow Pl) which runs off Primrose Ave. Scout Ave, Jericho, is another point of access to an area which contains more than 100 homes in Hicksville Fire District.

However, use of Scout Ave would make it necessary for the volunteers and equipment to go out of Hicksville to answer an alarm in Hicksville. Some members of Hicksville School Board questioned by the HERALD are reluctant to just leave the area open because they fear there would be an element of liability on the part of the school district.

The section east of the controversial corner is currently the scene of additional home construction. The fire district line on the north and the LIRR further east places these homes in a pocket which is only accessible thru Willow Place if Willet Ave is deadended.

The Nassau County Planning Commission has advised the Town Board that it has always considered the free flow of traffic on Willet Ave into Westmoreland Ave an essential. There are 193 dwellings either built or planned for the area east of this point.

How this all came to pass is of some interest. A builder was planning to erect dwellings on the Willet Ave proposed school site. In fact, the builder had started a model home on the plot prior to action by the School District.

The School District, under the right of condemnation as a municipal body, after the favorable vote of the community, moved to acquire the entire tract. If the builder had gone thru with his project, in the normal course of events, he would have decided that street area at Willet and Westmoreland to the town.

In view of the sharpened interest in the question, the matter may be among those on the agenda for the Hicksville School Board meeting this Friday night, Jan 5th.

## AMENDMENTS TO THE HICKSVILLE PARKING ORDINANCE

RESOLVED, that the Ordinance regulating parking in the hamlet of Hicksville, Town of Oyster Bay, adopted October 19, 1948, be and it hereby is amended as follows:

Section 9A shall be amended by adding subdivision 23 to read as follows: **TWO HOUR PARKING**

23. Andrews Road - Two Hour Parking - north side - starting at a point 400 feet of the east curb line of Bethpage Road, east for a distance of 1500 feet.

Section 9H shall be amended by adding subdivision 6 to read as follows: **TWO HOUR PARKING**

6. West Cherry Street - north side - Two Hour Parking 8 AM to 7 PM Except Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays - starting at the west curb line of Jerusalem Avenue - west to the east curb line of Division Avenue.

Section 11 shall be amended by adding subdivision 26 to read as follows: **NO PARKING**

26. Andrews Road - south side - No Parking - from the east curb line of Bethpage Road, east for a distance of 1900 feet.

Section 11B shall be amended by adding subdivisions 32 and 33 to read as follows: **NO STOPPING HERE TO CORNER**

32. Willet Avenue - north side - No Stopping Here to Corner - starting at the east curb line of Bethpage Road, east for a distance of 100 feet.

33. Willet Avenue - south side - No Stopping Here to Corner - starting at the east curb line of Bethpage Road, east for a

distance of 25 feet.

Section 11B subdivision 25 shall be **RESCINDED**.

Section 17B shall be amended by adding subdivisions 271, 272, 273, 274, 275 and 276 to read as follows: **ARTERIAL STOP**

271. West Cherry Street - Arterial Stop - traffic approaching north and south on Nelson Avenue shall come to a full stop.

272. Meran Place - Arterial Stop - traffic approaching north and south on East End Avenue shall come to a full stop.

273. Garden Street - Arterial Stop - traffic approaching north and south on East End Avenue shall come to a full stop.

274. Berkshire Road - Arterial Stop - traffic approaching south on Haverford Road shall come to a full stop.

275. West Avenue - Arterial Stop - traffic approaching east and west on Malone Street shall come to a full stop.

276. Ronald Avenue - Arterial Stop - traffic approaching north and south on Moeller Street shall come to a full stop.

Section 22 subdivision 1 shall be amended to read: **NO PARKING POLICE CARS ONLY**

1. South Oyster Bay Road - No Parking Police Cars Only - starting at a point 292 feet south of the south curb line of Woodbury Road - south for a distance of 38 feet.

## Floyd Bennett Loses Tower Sign Fight

The long fight with Floyd Bennett over tower signs atop their Jericho Store is finally over, and Jericho residents have won by a K.O. There will be NO tower signs!

After the hearing on Dec. 7 before the Town Zoning Board of Appeals, there were several meetings between the local residents, represented by Ira Hyams and Daniel Sirota, and Floyd Bennett, represented by Joseph Glass. The Birchwood at Jericho Civic Assoc. was represented by Irwin Baunel and George J. Frankel. A committee of several residents of Merry Lane and Hazelwood Drive was also present.

As a result of these meetings, Floyd Bennett amended its application for a variance to erect a tower sign, and was granted the following variance for a FACE sign:

"Granted an amended sign on Dec. 21, 1961. Conditioned that: (1) Sign be composed of 12 boxed letters, each measuring 5' in height by 7' in width. Spaced 3' apart in two rows reading: FLOYD BENNETT. Totalling in overall width of 67' beginning at a point at the top of the existing railing located on the top of the parapet wall. (2) Conditioned that a time mechanism be installed to insure the shut-off time of the sign 15 minutes after the store closes and further conditioned that this sign shall not be illuminated at any time that the store is not in operation. (3) Illumination shall not exceed 240 watts for each letter. (4) Each box letter shall be made with a yellow plexiglass face with letter superimposed thereon."

This sign is to be constructed on the wall facing the Birchwood Shopping Center, entirely on the side of the wall away from Hazelwood Drive. The wall facing Broadway will have two small neon face

## Teen-Agers Add Lively Lift To New March of Dimes Drive

Slave auctions in this Civil War Centennial Year? It can—and does—happen here, with the flower of American youth on the block.

But in this century, there's a difference. Now it's all in a good cause. Members of the New March of Dimes Teen Age Program (TAP) auction their services to the highest bidder among local merchants. The money goes to support The National Foundation March of Dimes attack on birth defects, arthritis and polio.

It's all part of TAP members' lively approach to volunteer community service. They also sponsor walkathons (hundreds of the Thirties!) in which teams from rival schools move toward the finish line as dimes are contributed. They dance for dimes at casual sock hops and formal balls, man concessions at school sports events, and hold community car washes.

Through such ingenious fun-for-funds projects, TAPs raised nearly three-quarters of a million dollars during the 1961 March of Dimes.

For the 1962 New March of Dimes in January, tens of thousands of the youthful volunteers are literally "on TAP." In more than 75 per cent of The National Foundation's 3,100 local county chapters, active TAP committees are determined to hit new highs in fun as well as funds.

Adult advisors who work with TAPs point out that underlying the outward frivolity of the teenagers' projects is a deep awareness of the need for increased research and progress in the fight against crippling birth defects, arthritis and polio. During the year, many youngsters assist in local patient services by reading to disabled children, writing letters for severely crippled arthritis or working as hospital aides.

A prime year-round responsibility of TAP members is distribution of information about National Foundation Health Scholarships to students in high schools and colleges. Each year, more than 500 four-year scholarships with a full value of \$2,000 apiece are offered for study in medicine, nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy and medical social work. TAP members know the desperate need to reduce the shortage of manpower in the health professions by encour-

aging students to undertake careers in these fields.

Leader of the Teen Age Program for the 1962 New March of Dimes is national chairman Katherine Anne Keith, 18, of Columbia, Mo. Blonde, brainy and born to be busy, Katie will handle her major responsibilities as top TAP while she pursues an ambitious freshman schedule at the University of Missouri.

On the basis of past performance, juggling scholarship and volunteer service won't intimidate Katie. She was 1961 Missouri state TAP chairman during her strenuous senior year in high school. Under her leadership, Missouri TAPs showed record gains in membership, services to chapters and funds raised for the March of Dimes.

At the same time, Katie maintained grades that ranked her third in her graduating class of almost 300 students. She was a National Merit Scholarship finalist and received the Kiwanis Good Citizenship

award. She was business manager—and occasional sports-writer—for the school paper, treasurer of the National Honor Society, queen of the major social function of the school year, had a lead role in the school play, "Teahouse of the August Moon," and actively participated in math, history, English and French clubs.

She also teaches a Sunday School class at Missouri Methodist Church in Columbia.

After a summer in Europe, including study at the Sorbonne in Paris, the energetic Katie began to plan for a banner year of TAP activity for the March of Dimes.

"Teenagers who are looking for a sense of satisfaction along with fun and friendship are missing a bet if they don't check TAP activities in their local March of Dimes chapters," she said. "A TAP committee isn't just another youth organization; it's not merely a club to serve youth. Instead, it gives us an opportunity to serve our communities."

EDITORIAL:

# Keep Mitchel Flying

The HERALD has requested the opportunity to speak at the public hearings scheduled by the FAA, Jan 16 and 17 at Mitchel Air Force Base on the future disposition of this 1,112 acre tract of land which has served the nation and Nassau community as a military base and flying field.

We believe that a portion of this vast area, which is about one-third the total area of present-day Hicksville school district, should be continued in operation as a flying field.

If Mitchel is closed to flying forever, it will be the departure of the last quasi-public flying base in the County. Without it, we can envision the day when homes will be demolished and land levelled in the not too distant future to provide an airport for Nassau.

We believe that all the things that are planned for Mitchel can be accomplished (space for the County College, industrial parks, etc) and still leave some room for aviation.

It seems weird, in this modern day and age, to force the closing of a fine airport when the entire world is involved in flying and space.

Nassau has been called the Cradle of Aviation, with good cause. From the runways of Roosevelt and Mitchel Fields came many historic and important exploits in aviation. But some folks seem determined to kick the slats out of the cradle, for reasons best known to themselves.

Hicksville has for many years been in the direct take-off path of the Grumman field. In recent years this runway was extended. If you have ever flown over Hicksville, you will note that this runway aims directly for the heart of Hicksville as an arrow does for a target.

And yet, over the years, we have heard never a single complaint about flying out of Grumman's with the possible exception of a few months after the war when some foreign airline was servicing its equipment there.

Those foreign airliners were four-engine jobs. At Mitchel, in the future, we are talking about single and twin-engine craft.

The pressure being exerted by our two daily newspapers, the LI Press and Newsday, to dig up the Mitchel runways is beyond belief. These two publications have never been known to join in any project --- and yet, curiously, they are wedded on this "close Mitchel to flying" shot gun campaign. And what a campaign: distortion of the worse sort.

Mitchel may have had its days numbered. Unless a sponsor is found for a municipal airport, there is some question as to whether it will ever officially receive and god-speed aircraft.

But Nassau without an airport is unbelievable. We are for additional educational facilities at the former Air Base. But we believe, sincerely, that these things can be done WITH flying facilities. If you agree with us, you will write to Mr. Oscar Bakke or Stanley W. Bobskill, FAA, Federal Building, New York International Airport, Jamaica 30, New York, and tell them so. We did.

Dear Sir:

My parents always ask me to bring my boy friends home so they can have the opportunity to meet them. I have refused to do so because I feel that my parents will embarrass my friends and me. I am over 18, have a good job and I think a good upbringing. My parents still wait up for me when I am out on a date and question me as to everything I do or did. I feel like I'm being squeezed into a corner. I've thought about moving

into my own apartment but I'm afraid of hurting my parents' feelings. What shall I do?

Dear RLM:

You may be over 18 physically but not mentally. You sound more like a spoiled brat than a mature adult. If you believe that your parents will embarrass you it is only because of your own feelings of insecurity. You state that your parents have given you a good upbringing. Apparently they have forgotten to teach you something about

respect for parents. They are still interested in your welfare and well being. If they haven't been able to meet your friends it is no wonder they are interested in your activities. Being over 18 does not mean that you no longer have any need to account for your activities. If you are travelling in the right company your parents would make your friends feel welcome. If you have the wrong type of friends, your parents with their greater experience, would be able to guide you into the right channels. Your embarrassment, if any, should be for your own shortcomings.
