After Saturday Marathon: School Budget Tops Record \$10 Million

Hicksville Board of Education after a marathon session which concluded at 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon finished work on the proposed 1962-63 School District budget which stands at an all-time record of \$10,227,000.62 which is slightly less than a million dollars above the requirements for 1961-62.

After a half dozen special sessions, including the eight-hour session last Saturday, the Board approved \$50,969.62 off the budget as proposed by the Administration. The cuts were in non-instructional expenses.

The Board held a special session last Thursday night on the budget, another regular meeting on Friday night on the agenda, and then resumed work on the budget on Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. Most of the sessions were conducted with the bare minimum quorum of four members.

A specific forecast on the tax rate under the proposed budget is impossible at this time. It was pointed out, since the total district assessment will not be officially fixed until August. Also, the exact status of anticipated state aid has not been determined since it is the subject of current legislative consideration in Albany.

The area of instructional services, always more than half of the gross budget, accounts for almost six millions of the ten million dollar gross.

NO STATION WAGON

A proposal, for the third year, to include a station wagon for the use of the School Superintendent and supervisory personnel was deleted from the budget.

The School Board will hold an open preliminary discussion of the proposed budget in the Senior High School at 8 o'clock on Monday night, April 23. The vote on the budget takes place on Wednesday, May 2.

Registration of voters for the school and library budgets as well as the election of school and library trustees is set for Saturday, April 21 from 10 AM to 5 PM and Wednesday, April 25, from 4 PM to 11 PM. Persons who registered at the annual meeting in May of 1961 or for the special referendum of Nov. 14, 1961, need not register again. All others are required to register. There are 5,381 persons currently on the rolls as registered and they will receive a postcard advising them of the fact.

In answer to a frequent question at this time of the year, District Clerk Fred J. North pointed out that there is no provision in the State Education Law to provide for

Madden Gets Borneo Leave

Joseph F. Madden, of 8 Edgewood Dr., Hicksville School District Recreation Director, has been granted a four-month leave of absence with pay from his duties to accept an American Specialist Grant to work in Borneo. The leave is effective from May 1 to Sept. 1, this year.

The "with pay" provision was granted in order to enable Madden to continue his retirement and hospitalization benefits with the School District. He will sign over to the District his pay of \$700 a month from the Federal government.

Madden's letter of appointment came from James A. Donovan Jr., acting chief, American Specialist Branch, Office of Cultural Exchange, Department of State in Washington. The grant also includes round trip transportation and a per diem of \$15.

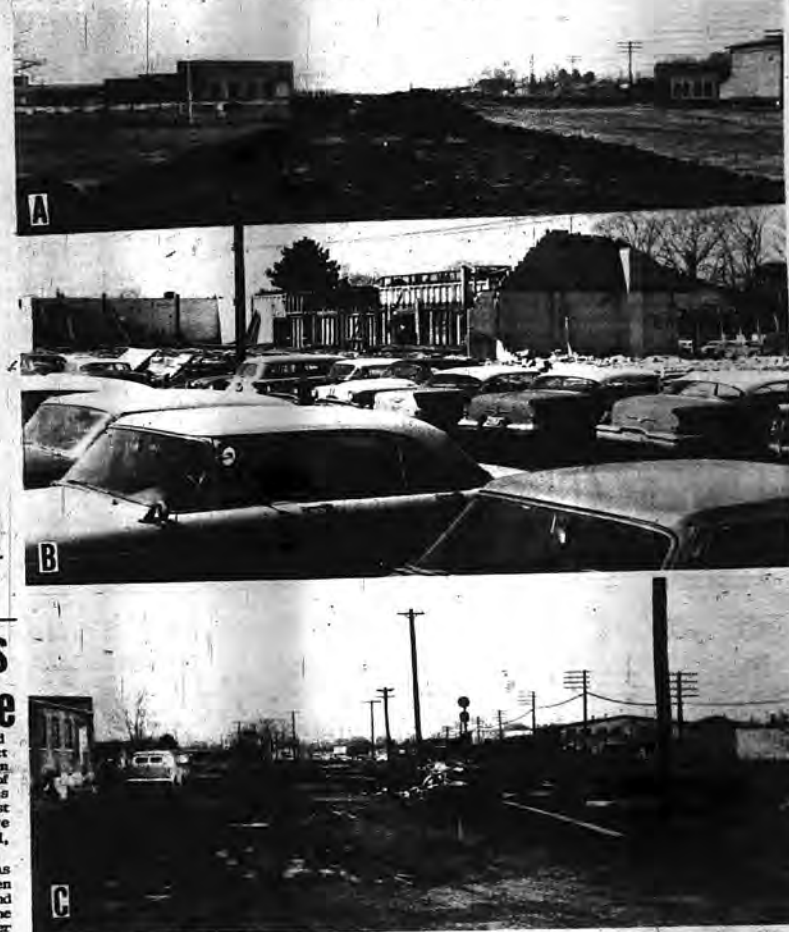
In granting the leave of absence, Board members individually stated that they felt an honor had been shown to the District in his selection. He has recommended that Louis Millevolte be named director of the Summer recreation program for July and part of August. The Board did not act on this recommendation.

Madden has promised to provide the HERALD readers with periodic reports of his activities in Borneo, absentee registration or voting.

No candidate have announced themselves to date for the two vacancies on the Board of Education. The terms of David Hurwitz, who resigned when he moved to Plainview in November, and Robert D. P. Easton, who will not seek re-election, expire on June 30th and are to be filled at the May 2 election.

It is anticipated that Rev. Nicholas Nappi, assistant pastor of Hicksville Methodist Church, who was appointed to the Library Board in December when Leon J. Gallaway resigned will seek election for a full five-year term.

Ask Patience During Construction

The arrival of spring will find the long, long awaited Hicksville RR grade crossing elimination program in full swing. The dirt has already started to fly and all that faces the motoring public for the next few months is congestion, short nerves and detours.

Town Supervisor John J. Burns will be a guest speaker at the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce meeting at 9:30 AM tomorrow (Fri) morning at the Seaman and Eisenman basement meeting room. His topic will be the elimination program.

Evict Commuters

Commuters were starting to be evicted from parking fields in the vicinity of the Hicksville RR station this week as the giant grade crossing elimination program got underway in earnest.

Those using the field next to the depot (west of Jerusalem Ave.) were given notice that about half the field will be needed effective this week. Notices were placed on car windshield wipers and handed out in the station.

The area between Broadway and Jerusalem Ave. (the so-called Plaza field) will be cleared of cars on Tuesday, April 3.

Hendrickson Bros., the general contractor, this week disclosed some details of the operation and its scope.

A company spokesman disclosed that the Hicksville depot, which is now 100 feet west of Jerusalem Ave., will be replaced during construction with a temporary station 200 feet west of the present station. Entrance to the temporary

station will be from W. Barclay Street.

A new station will be built on the platform of the viaduct between Jerusalem Ave. and the new route of Newbridge Rd. (about where Jackson Ave. now dead-ends).

The contractor, town officials and the Chamber of Commerce is pleading with everyone to be patient during the construction program.

The Job Ingredients

The Hicksville Rail Road grade crossing elimination program has been described as the largest single project of its kind ever tackled by a contractor on Long Island. Here are some of the ingredients involved:

- 5,000,000 lbs of structural steel for bridges.
- 46,000 cubic yards of concrete for retaining walls.
- 7,000,000 lbs of steel to reinforce concrete.
- 340,000 cubic yards of fill for embankments.
- 10 miles of electrical duct work.
- Three and a third miles of temporary tracks.
- Demolition of buildings on 34 separate parcels.
- Demolition of 175-foot water storage tank.
- Five miles of drainage work, using pipe 18 to 36 inches in diameter.
- Contractor's price tag: \$8,760,045.

Jericho Red Cross Active in Year

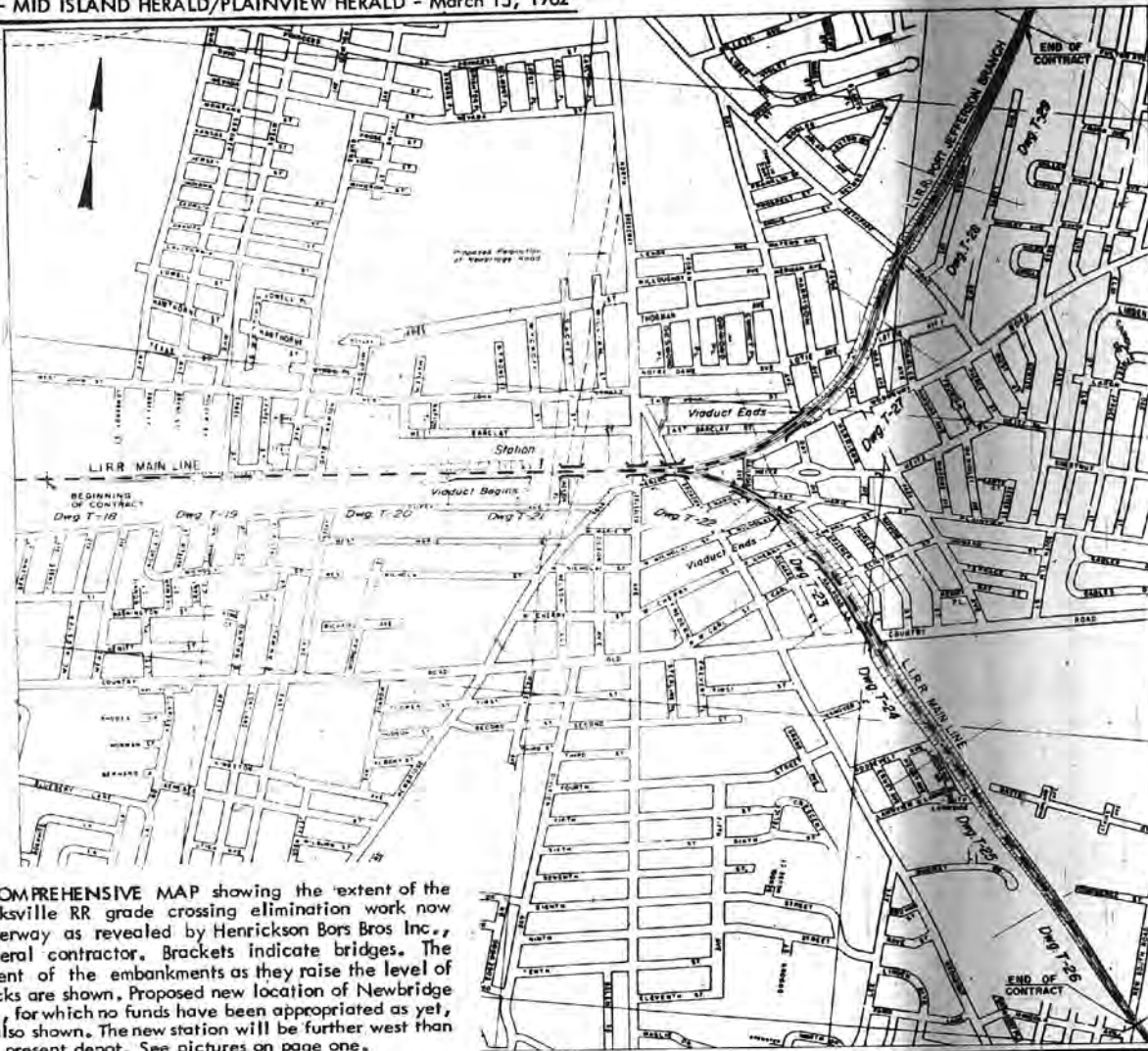
