## 20th Anniversary for Pastor

Trinity Lutheran Church, Hicksville, will observe the 20th anniversary of the Rev. Edward H. Stammel, pastor, in a special service on Sunday, March 25, at 4 o'clock.

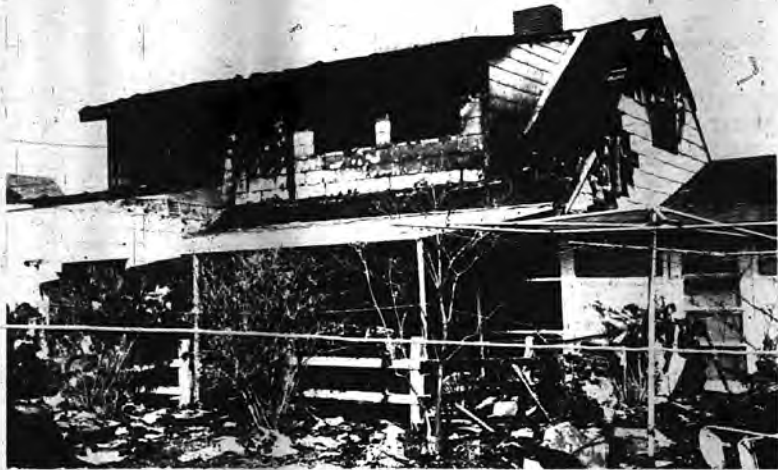
Born in Yonkers on Aug. 11, 1916, and after graduating from Concordia College in Bronxville and Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, Mo., he served a year at Trinity Lutheran Church in West Roxbury, Mass., before coming to Trinity Lutheran in Hicksville in 1941. He was ordained here on Mar. 23, 1942. There were 450 members in the congregation 20 years ago and today there are approximately 2,000 members. There are 1,400 children in the parochial school, established in 1952, and the Sunday School. Trinity Lutheran Church was organized in Hicksville (as the German Lutheran Church) in 1850. Rev. Stammel is the ninth pastor in the history of the Church.

FLAMES WERE ROARING out of windows and the roof when Hicksville Fire Dept. was called to the Henry Kutzing home at 4 Thimble Lane at 10:19 last Thursday morning. This picture was taken the following day. Fifty volunteer firemen led by Chief Walter Werthessen with five pieces of fire apparatus fought to contain the flames, returning to head-

quarters well after 12 noon. The ramps had to hold up roof sections with pike poles in their battle with the intense heat and flames. Two volunteers were treated for smoke poisoning. ## Town to Help Clean-Up Apr. 2-7

The week of April 2 to April 7 has been set for the annual Spring Clean-Up campaign by the Town of Oyster Bay for the Mid-Island area including Hicksville, Jericho, Syosset, Plainview, Old Bethpage and Bethpage, according to Supervisor John J. Burns.

Councilman Louis A. Sisla, chairman of the Town Board's Committee on sanitation, stated that the purpose of the drive is to

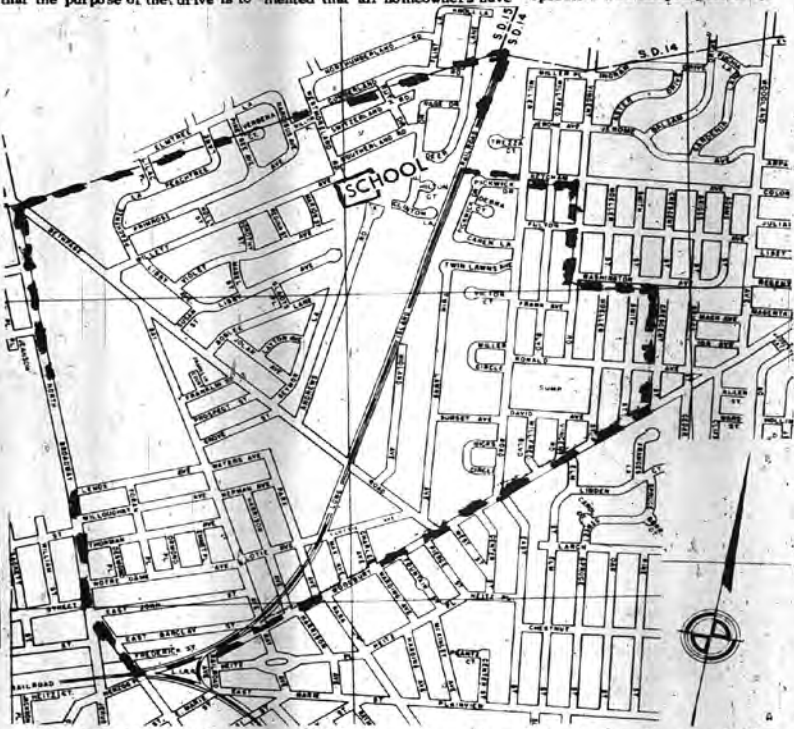

## School District Birthday Year Coming to Close

The year marking the 65th Anniversary of the formation of Hicksville Union Free School District back in 1896 is coming to a close. In a day and age when so many surrounding school districts have achieved Union Free status, less than 10 years ago, the fact that Hicksville voters approved this form of educational government 65 years ago is of twice the passing interest.

The 65th Anniversary Year was designated last spring by the Board of Education to focus public attention upon the event. Schools and P-TAs were encouraged to hold special programs and many of them did. Some of the schools staged special programs and exhibits, linking the past and the present.

The Nicholas St. School was a box-like structure about a quarter of its present size, in 1896. Over the years the building was added to, renovated, time and time again.

## Phone Alarm Starting April 1

by Myron A. Konter

At an interview with Paul Kardel, the able Fire Chief, and Richard Post, the dynamic Public Relations representative of the Jericho Fire Department, it was learned that commencing with April 1, a new local fire alarm system will be instituted. The alerting system of sirens at night will be ended. However, the sirens will still blow during the day. A central telephone will be located at the firehouse dispatcher receives a telephone call, he dials one digit, which automatically rings all the home phone numbers of the volunteer fireman, with a ring other than their usual phone ring. A central number makes a tape recording of what the dispatcher says. The firemen, by picking up their phones at home, can be notified of the kind and extent of the fire and its location. As a result, some firemen can save time by going directly to the fire.

The telephone system which will be utilized day and night, eliminates the necessity of sirens and whistles blowing at night. The volunteer firemen will be better prepared for they will know exactly what kind of fire they will be tackling. The response to the fire alarm will be much quicker than it is now. Further, an alarm, due to a loud television or Hi-Fi, will be eliminated.

During the next few weeks, Jericho Fire Department will distribute literature pertaining to the new alarm system and cards upon which will be affixed a square telephone sticker which reads, "IN CASE OF FIRE DIAL OPERATOR AND ASK FOR JERICO FIRE DEPARTMENT." This sticker is to be placed underneath the phone cradle.

Fire Chief Kardel, has requested all residents to cooperate with the Fire Department. A blue flashing light on the front of a speeding automobile means a volunteer fireman is responding to a call. All residents should observe it and always give them the right of way. Our fire chief further urges all in the community to be more fire safety conscious.

The Jericho Fire Department responded to 106 fire alarms in 1961 and up to March 14, of this year they have already responded to 32 fire calls. This is an alarming increase in the number of fires. More fire prevention should be practiced. Booklets on fire prevention and a self-home fire inspection form are always available free at the firehouse.

There are 75 to 80 volunteer firemen in the Jericho Fire Department with seven modern pieces of equipment. They are doing a splendid job and our community can be proud of their foresight in putting into play the latest devices and techniques in combating fires.

The Veterans Administration says no. Veterans benefits are tax free with one exception. Interest earned by GI life insurance dividends left on deposit with the VA must be reported and that is only on the interest itself not the dividend.
