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Organized Red Cross in 1917: Janet A Magill Was Long Active In Community Affairs

Janet A. Magill, who for more than 40 years was very active in community affairs and in 1917 organized an auxiliary of the American Red Cross in Hicksville before the Nassau County Chapter was organized, died Tuesday of this week after a long illness. The burial office and requiem will be said at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church at 10 a.m. Saturday with Rev. Dominic K. Ciannelli officiating.

Janet Magill (nee Vanderwerker) was born in Glen Falls, N.Y. 75 years ago. Her late husband, William, died on May 10 of last year following a heart attack. His residence was at 63 Old Country Rd., Hicksville.

She had been hospitalized for more than 10 years. She is survived by a sister, Marguerite Randall of Atlantic City, N.J.

Besides her Red Cross and community service activities, Mrs. Magill was past matron of Emma Chapter of No. 676, Order of Eastern Star. She was also a member of the Charles Wagner Post American Legion Auxiliary.

The Legion Auxiliary will conduct services at Henry J. Stock Funeral Home on Friday night at 8 p.m. The Eastern Star will conduct services at 8:30 p.m.

Interment will be at St. John of Jerusalem Cemetery. She is reposing at the Henry J. Stock Funeral Home, Newbridge Rd., Hicksville.

While Mrs. Magill was active in many civic and political causes her principal interest over a long span of time was the American Red Cross.

The following account of her activities with the Red Cross was prepared with her assistance by the HERALD Editor in 1948:

It was on Mar. 22, 1917 (55 years ago) that a group of people, the members of a dancing class and tennis club, were called together by Mrs. Magill for the purpose of organizing an auxiliary of the Red Cross. The organization was completed and Mrs. Magill was elected chairman.

The first headquarters during those days of World War I were in a large back room in the Marrs building (Broadway east side, just south of Marie St.) donated by Glueker & Simon who with Miss Mary Keller, Hicksville only female veteran of World War I, helped with the unit's first assignment: interpreting during a military census.

Soon the group was in full production of hospital garments, surgical supplies and bandages as well as knitted sweaters and other garments. Much of the cutting was done by Mr. and Mrs. William Wetterauer in their factory on W. John St.

The auxiliary soon outgrew its first quarters and financed the rental of the old Post Office building where the Rainbow Restaurant stands today. Small contributions monthly from the growing membership financed this rental.

At this time the Nassau County Chapter of Red Cross was organized by the late Mrs. Henry P. Davison, combining all the activities of the Red Cross in the county and Hicksville became a branch with Bethpage and Farmingdale as its auxiliaries.

In addition to the workroom

and other activities; the Hicksville branch led by Mrs. Magill provided the base hospital at Camp Mills (later called Mitchell Field) with pudding, cakes, fruit and fresh vegetables at least once a week. Trips were also made to Baldwin where the Hempstead Machine Gun Co. was stationed. The housewives and merchants of Hicksville and the farmers for miles around vied with each other in supplying the food and fresh vegetables that made up the contributions.

After the end of World War I the Hicksville Red Cross branch entertained returning servicemen at three different welcome home parties. These parties were held in the old Opera House on Nicholas St. with entertainment, food and dancing and were the occasion of the presentation of commemorative medals given by a friend of the Branch.

With the Armistice the local Red Cross activities lessened and objectives nearer home were adopted.

In 1923 while continuing as Branch Chairman, Mrs. Magill became (Continued on Page 12)

Grunewald to Take Position As Town Councilman Shortly

A. Carl Grunewald of 31 Violet Ave., Hicksville, will soon be appointed a Councilman of the Town of Oyster Bay and a member of the Town Board. He will succeed Henry McInnes, First St., Hicksville, who is scheduled to assume a position with the sanitation division.

The Town Republican Executive Committee, on Monday, agreed to recommend these two appointments to Oyster Bay Supervisor John J. Burns and the Town Board. It was confirmed by Town Leader Thomas Pynchon. This action is expected to take place within a week or so.

Grunewald, who has been chairman of the Town Zoning Board for Appeals for several years, will become the fourth Hicksville resident to serve on the Town Board since Councilmatic system was adopted in the 1930s.

John R. Brandt was the first councilman. He was succeeded by Frank Chlumsky. McInnes has been the third to hold the position and in point of years of service is the "veteran" member of the Town Board with more years tenure than any other member.

The position as Councilman will have to be filled by election to finish McInnes' expired term in November. And while the office is filled by town-wide vote, it is anticipated this may become a local "race" with the Democrats selecting a candidate from Hicksville also.

Another Step For Highway Work

Superintendent of Highways Thomas R. Pynchon reported today that another step is being taken in his planned program to achieve frequent and scheduled cleaning of the nearly 800 miles of Town roads.

He said that the Town Board has approved the purchase of six additional power street sweepers which will be added to the 16 already in service.

Other additional equipment pending award to successful bidders include two heavy duty motor graders which are used for surface grading in the summer and snow plowing during the winter. The Town highway equipment fleet will also soon receive two new heavy duty trucks used for carrying materials, plowing snow and sanding for ice control.

A contract is also pending for

additional road repair and improvement materials to be delivered on jobs as required. The contract is for about 250 cubic yards of yard-mixed concrete. Pynchon said that most of this will be used on highways although some will be consigned to other departments having outside facilities such as parks and beaches.

Just a reminder to all members that at the next meeting, Monday night, April 2, a complete report in the expansion program, as approved by both the Building Committee and Hicksville Legion Hall, Inc., will be given to the membership. As the interest in this project is running swift and high, as evidenced by the \$13,000 already invested by 102 members through the Century Club Plan, the turnout should be large and interesting. I must report that American Legion Baseball has been for many years one of the major "mercantile" projects of the Nassau County American Legion. It appears to have played its last season. With the new season rapidly nearing only two Posts of the Nassau's 58 have made application to enter the annual elimination tournament. Only Waukegan, last year's Nassau champion and state quarter finalist, and Oceanide are ready to go this year. Several other who had been fielding teams in the past years have suddenly fallen by the wayside, causing the last break of the dam. The tournament cannot be run with less than 6 teams and with a total of 58 could-be, and should-be sponsors, the chairmen in charge have just about thrown up their hands and placed it in the laps of the Gods, so to speak. The reasons for the failure to field at least six teams are many but for example, take Hicksville's case. We entered a team for the first time in 1953 and we wound up winning the championship of Nassau on the first try and went on to Newburgh to play in the state

elimination contests. We had teams for several years after that and finally had to give it up for the reason that the available ball players could not very well play ball on Saturdays as they had to work. Yet, this seems to be only Hicksville's problem as nowhere else have I heard of this situation, but rather all reports seem to say the same thing, "We just don't have the \$350 it takes to sponsor the team." Mind you, the matter of \$350 which could split among several sponsors in each town (a Legion Post does not have to necessarily be the sponsor) seems to be the key to the entire situation. This is in Nassau County, reputedly the richest county in the entire United States and enough sponsors cannot be found to keep a program going that has on a national basis produced 17,000 teams each year since 1926? And as added dividend, for examples, such players as Yogi Berra, Whitey Ford, Mickey Mantle, Warren Spahn, Roy Campanella, Ted Williams and many, many others are all graduates of American Legion Junior Baseball. came the Treasurer of the Nassau County Treasurer and held that office for over 40 years. Her husband served the same period as volunteer general accountant and assistant treasurer of the County Chapter. Both gave thousands of hours to this volunteer service.

In 1933 the Hicksville Branch became the focal point for renewed activity when the Depression provided the opportunity for further Red Cross service. A work room was set up to provide work on garments which in turn went to those in need. Some 3,000 bags of government flour and free milk for needy children were handled during a three-year period.

When the second World War became to Europe in 1939, the local Red Cross answered the call again and War Relief Production turned out an amazing quantity of garments.

When Mrs. Magill gave up the Branch chairmanship to devote her time the Chapter, Mrs. Arthur Huetner became local chairman.
