## DEADLINE WEDNESDAY: Bruno, Mathieson Only 'Official' Candidates

Robert F. Mathieson and William A. Bruno Jr are the first two official candidates, not opposing each other, for positions in the Hicksville School Board election of May 2nd. As of Wednesday of this week they were the first and only candidates to file petitions for positions on the ballot.

Mathieson is seeking the position vacated by the expiration of the term of Robert Eaton who asserts he is retiring as of June 30 when his term runs out. Bruno has filed for the vacancy on the Board last held by David Hurwitz who resigned when he left the District last December. The Board of Education has indicated that the successful candidate for this post will be appointed to serve during May and June, prior to the start of the full three-year term on July 1st.

The deadline for filing of designating petitions for places on the May 2nd ballot is next Wednesday, April 18th.

In the meantime, it is reported that there may be a contest for the five-year vacancy on the Board of Library Trustees. Rev. Nicholas Nappi, assistant pastor of the Hicksville Methodist Church, has been holding the office by appointment since the resignation of Leon J. Galloway.

Mathieson and Bruno have issued further statements regarding their candidacies which are published in this issue.

It has been reliably reported that petitions are in circulation for at least two other school board candidates; George W. Kunz, who has issued a statement for publication voicing opposition to the swimming pool proposition and some comments on the recreation program, and for Phyllis Neuberger, advocate of a new junior-senior high school structure on the Press Wireless property.

## Pool Sponsors Explain Issue

The construction of a \$395,000 indoor swimming pool to be attached to the existing Hicksville High School will be submitted for approval to the voters. This separate proposition will appear on the ballot of the regular annual school election, May 2nd, as ballot Proposition No. 4, according to the Recreation Advisory Committee.

The Recreation Advisory Committee had been studying such a proposal for several years. Subsequent to the submission of a detailed report to the Board of Education a decision favoring a public vote was made.

The Advisory Committee made the following statement:

"The plan calls for multiple pools including a 75 foot, six lane, low depth tank as well as a deep tank for diving, scuba and synchronized swimming. The design was made with the aim of attaining maximal instructional use. During evenings and weekends recreational and community use of the natatorium is anticipated.

"The pool will provide an opportunity for every child in the community to learn, at least, survival swimming. It will complement the physical education program since it will serve as a teaching station. Considering the week long schedule the pool will probably be the most used school facility in the community. The support of the taxpayers is urgently requested," the committee concludes.

## Stock Market

BY LEON NEWMAN

At the time of the writing of this column, a hitherto desultory market has persistently gone lower in all but two sessions in the last 2 1/2 weeks in the face of comparatively good news, particularly from Detroit. Thus the market, including the Auto Stocks, is not responding well to good news. Action of this sort usually implies more of the same. Since we find nothing dynamic in the short term part of our studies, we can only conclude that the near term outlook for the averages is not bright, and that an attack on the lows of the year, and even a climactic penetration beneath them, is foreseeable. At lower levels, we believe it is quite likely strong support will enter, and prepare the way for a dynamic rally, since our studies indicate the major up-trend has yet to attain its peak. If this hypothesis is proved to be correct, one can see that proper stock selection and timing is of

paramount importance.

Over a year ago, the stock market as measured by the Doe Jones Industrial Averages touched the 700 level. Since then it has meandered about it, or below it, by 30 points. In short the fluctuation for the composite of thirty blue chips has been less than 9%. Indeed, after one year it is at the exact starting point for a net gain or loss of zero 3/4. What a contrast to individual stocks! One doesn't buy or sell averages. The stocks comprising it often take as sharply divergent paths as the ones outside the group.

While the averages, per se, have no direct, lasting influence on a specific situation, they are useful (1) to answer people who persist in asking "How's the market?", (2) as a rough and broad measurement of general investment psychology (3) as a quick, but superficial basis for evaluating present fundamental statistics in the light of the yields, prices, earnings, ratio, etc.

In addition to the day to day studies of individual stocks, new re-

ports, etc., we have worked on an original theory of studying the averages within the strict confinement of mathematical formulas. Only time can prove its accuracy. But more on that, other techniques, various industries, etc., at another time.

to keep the public informed.

A candidate, he said he has studied the section of the Education Law relating to the legal obligation of trustees and feels there may be room for greater Board cooperation with text books and curriculum. He stated flatly that he is opposed to psychological testing of children without the written consent and approval of parents, particularly with such devices as the so-called "blackie test".

In the area of encouraging greater community interest in the operation of the School District, he said that a study of recent meetings of Board of Education indicated that frequent executive sessions are held, often during the early part of regular sessions, which are very discouraging to the public which may be deterred in attending public meetings. Such executive sessions which the public for periods of up to two hours, making long waits in the school corridors necessary for those excluded.

He said that while he recognized the occasional need for executive sessions, he felt such gatherings should be held late in the evening after the principal business of the board has been concluded at a reasonable hour when the public can attend.

## An Editorial:

## A Different Election

There are several factors regarding the election of members of Hicksville Board of Education on May 2nd which sets the election of 1962 apart from those held in recent years.

For one thing, no incumbent member of the Board is seeking re-election. This leaves the two seats to be filled on May 2nd open to any bidders. The candidates are also confronted with a bit of a problem, as a result. Normally the incumbent runs on his record and/or the record or lack of achievement of the Board as a whole during his tenure.

In this election, the candidates are confronted with the necessity of selling themselves as against other non-incumbent competitors for the vacancies.

Another thing that sets this election apart has been the delayed announcement by candidate and the 11th

hour filing by candidates. Normally, Hicksville voters have received public notice of candidacies by mid-March and in some cases candidates have declared themselves as early as January.

This causes some difficulty for the voters who have a limited period in which to get acquainted with the various candidates and to make their individual evaluations.

We are glad to see the PTA Council is going ahead with its candidate's forum; however, we feel the date of the forum is too late to be of any real value make up their minds. The forum will be held 48 hours before the voting.

This fact is most obvious: Unless you are registered (and you get a final opportunity on April 21 and April 25) you will not be able to vote on candidates, on the school and library budgets, and on the pool on May 2nd. 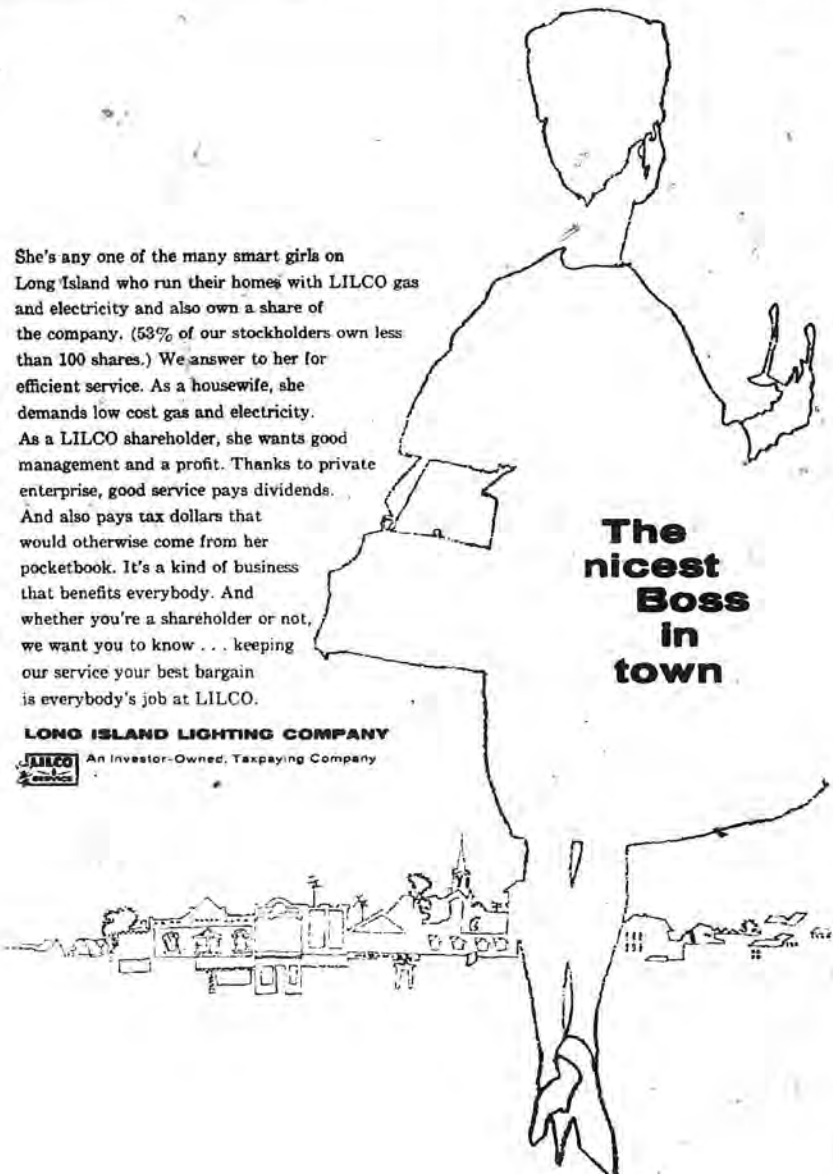

## Kunz Explains Candidacy

To the Editor:

In announcing my candidacy for the School Board, I am recognizing the wishes of many of my friends who have been urging me to run. Although I am aware of the old adage that you lose more friends than you gain by serving on the Board, those who have been urging me to run, and I will have to face that risk now that my decision has been made.

Like so many of you, I have become somewhat alarmed over the direction in which our educational policies seem to be heading. The way of thinking, education and recreation are two different things. I can assure you I have trouble enough teaching my own children that play and study do not mix, and I'm little disturbed by the fact that those influencing our educational policies seem to feel differently.

At a time when a portion of our students are still on double session; at a time when our County's leaders are asking us to sacrifice; at a time when we are competing with an enemy striving to control our minds with an ideology that is entirely foreign to our concepts and heritage as Americans, our children should be devoting more of their time to studying — not swimming!

So, too, instead of expending their efforts on proposals to build an expensive and luxurious swimming pool, our Board members should be concerning themselves more with the education of our children, and not so much their recreation.

No one, of course, can argue that a swimming pool would not, in some way, enhance the community. In a similar vein, a Cadillac could look good in all our garages, and a pool in our own backyards could enhance our standing in the neighborhood. Nor can one argue that swimming is not a good form of exercise. It does provide a measure of pleasure to many, including myself. But can we really afford it, when there is so much else we might do? Must our officials be burdened with the obligation of overseeing swimming facilities when, today, they hardly have enough time to devote to purely educational matters?

We all know the amount of time our Board members spend now in operating the district. We know, too, the burdens imposed on our school administrators and staff on matters relating solely to education. Would it not be more prudent, therefore, to apply the money and time necessary to operate a swimming pool to enhance and enrich the minds of our students?

All of us, I'm sure, have felt the effect of increased school taxes over the years. None of us really mind too much as long as our money is spent wisely. If the taxes collected are channeled into educating our children — fine and good! But when the time comes that money destined for education is drawn off into areas of recreation, then I think all of us had better sit up and take notice!

To paraphrase an old saying, maybe we'd better ask ourselves, "Is this dip necessary?"

I will have more to say on this and other subjects as the campaign progresses. For now, I wish to state that my candidacy will be keyed to the theme of sensible spending, with a fair and just determination of the educational needs of our children.

## Opposed to Pool

To the Editor:

It seems unbelievable that members of a Board of Education could possibly lose their sense of values to such an extent that they set some sort of record for speedy consideration and advocacy of a proposal to spend some \$400,000 for the construction of a swimming pool, while at the same time they continue to delay any positive action to alleviate over-crowding at the Junior and Senior High.

How in the world can they justify their actions in the hasty approval of this proposition to spend at least \$400,000 of tax money for an obvious luxury, but at the same time feel there is no rush to ask for the small additional funds which are needed to move the 26 "Temporaries" to the Senior High? More than 2 years ago the taxpayers approved the plan to move the "Temporaries" to the Senior High because the need for additional classrooms was acute. While our School Board spends a great deal of its time, discussing the merits of high or low diving boards and underwater observation windows for a swimming pool, our Senior High students are told that next term they will have to attend school on a staggered session basis, with one less school period each day.

Are the members of our School Board so out of touch with reality that they believe the taxpayers will approve the construction of a luxury swimming pool while so many of their children attend school on split or staggered sessions, and while our younger children attend the Nicholas Street School which dates back to the 19th century and should be a museum instead of a school?

Perhaps the sponsors of this swimming pool proposal have managed to convince the School Board that this is a very popular proposal. It may be popular with the sponsors but my own discussions with residents indicates that the vast majority of Hicksville residents are shocked at the audacity of such a proposal, at a time when taxes are still increasing, crowding in the schools is still increasing, and the hours of instruction in our schools are decreasing. Great Scott, let's put first things first. When we've made certain that each of our children has a seat in a classroom for a full day of instruction, then and not before then, can we afford to consider the luxury of a swimming pool.

Frankly, I'm very much surprised that such an eminent citizen as Dr. Lowell Glatt, (with whom I was honored to serve on the late Citizens Advisory Committee To The Board of Education) has endorsed this pool plan. I know that Dr. Glatt has always been concerned about the lack of adequate school rooms and has been active in movements to raise the standards of our school system to new heights. How then can he now support the spending of precious tax money for a pool when the terrible need for classrooms exists and grows worse? Are Dr. Glatt and the others of the sponsoring committee willing to accept overcrowding and a shorter day at the Senior High School, so long as the students can swim in a pool? Is it reasonable to offer our High School students a swimming pool when they need classrooms? The College Entrance Exams do not test the swimming ability of a student but
