More than 4,000 Cast Ballots:

Kunz, Bruno Win; Pool Bonds Sunk

George W. Kunz and William A. Bruno Jr. were elected to the Hicksville Board of Education, Wednesday, in a heavily contested election in which more than 4100 persons cast their ballots. The swimming pool bond issue was defeated with 1174 in favor and 2867 voters opposed.

All other propositions were approved, although there were more no votes on the school and library budgets than any time in recent history. The ten million dollar budget for the coming year was approved with 2344 in favor and 1544 opposed.

Rev. Nicholas Nappi, serving on the library board by appointment, was elected to a full five-year term. He received 1691 votes and his opponent, George W. Martin, 1472.

Kunz polled 2660 votes while Robert F. Mathieson, his opponent, received 1458.

Bruno received 2144 votes and his opponent, Phyllis Newburger, 1720.

The \$395,000 bond issue for a swimming pool was defeated in each of the seven voting districts. Kunz won in all seven districts while Nappi won all six others.

All areas reported heavy voting thru out the day. East St School racked up a record-breaking 800-plus votes with 1100 registered. Total vote in Lee Ave., another heavy registration district, was a shade under 800.

The terms of Bruno and Kunz official start on July 1.

MAKES STATEMENT

William A. Bruno Jr. issued the following statement after the official tally was completed, Wednesday night:

"I consider my election tonight to the Hicksville School Board as a mandate from the people to hold the tax line to probe the brain-picking of school children through the medium of ultra - secret psychological tests.

"I will dedicate myself to such an investigation to determine whether the rights of parents and children are being properly safeguarded in the giving of such tests and in making up children's cumulative test files based on such test findings.

"The 'Blacky pictures' will receive special attention in as much as the text of the Blacky booklet itself describes 'that test as a 'psychoanalytic' tool aimed at inquiring into the 'psycho-sexual development' of any child subjected to it," he said.

Robert F. Mathieson said he was grateful to the many people who expressed their confidence in him by their votes for his candidacy on Wednesday.

New Bd Members: Their Plans

Based upon the pre-election campaign literature and statements of the successful candidates in Wednesday's annual school election of Hicksville School Board members several startling and unusual things can be anticipated. The term of newly elected 3-year candidates starts on June 30.

GEORGE W. KUNZ: Favors increasing the budget for recreation to make it possible to transport, by bus, summer recreation youngsters to town beaches for free swimming lessons. (About 8,000 enroll in the summer program and at the rate of 80 per bus, which is about double normal capacity, this would require about 100 buses. Since the budget for the coming summer makes no provision for this, swim-minded youngsters may have to wait for 1963 to start learning.) He also favors spending \$395,000 for construction of permanent classrooms at the high school. Actually, this can not be achieved without a new referendum vote. Regarding the so-called "Blacky tests", he says he "likes dogs".

WILLIAM A. BRUNO JR: His term may start before June 30 since the Board has indicated, without formal vote, that it might be agreeable to appointing to fill the David Hurwitz vacancy with the successful candidate on May 2nd, which is Bruno. He urges holding the line on taxation, but since the budget for 1962-63 was approved by the Voters on Wednesday, he may have to wait until next Spring to "hold the line" when the 1963-64 budget is prepared. He also stands opposed to psychological testing of children unless approved in writing by parents of children involved.

COFFEY of the PTA Council deserve a tip of the hat for a fine job in getting a big turnout. Last year there were less than two dozen on hand. Be sure to drop by Mid Island Plaza on Saturday (1 to 8 PM) or Sunday (1 to 6 PM), this weekend, to see the Arrowhead District Boy Scout Exposition. Many special exhibits are promised. RED MERTZ is due home from the Plainview Hospital this week after undergoing surgery. PASTOR "Skipper" ROGERS was a guest of honor at the Hicksville Kiwanis recently. We see PETE O'PETRALIA is out of the hospital. Recent graduates of a Little League Umpire School are ART LEWANDER, chief ump for the Internationals this year, and FLEM HARDING, EDWARD MORRIS of Hicksville, county franchise commissioner, told a Levittown meeting recently that electrification of the LIRR from Mineola east to Hicksville would make possible a non-stop run from Hicksville to Manhattan of only 25 minutes. Electrification out from Mineola has been a topic of talk for at least 25 years.

HARRIET one of the executive staff at the former Little Inn, soon to be Martel's, became a grandmother this week, an 8-lb. girl, ELIZABETH. The Parade will be held in Mineola on the evening of June 22nd, which is a Friday night. Thursday night, June 21, will see the 1st business session of the convention and Saturday afternoon, June 23rd, will see the election of new officers for 1962-63. Saturday evening at the Mineola Post clubhouse will be the scene of the installation of Officers and the Inaugural Ball. Always a pleasant duty for our own Post Commander is the departure the very next morning, June 24, at 7 A.M. for Hempstead Post clubhouse, of OUR Boys State representative for Colgate University for the annual Boys State Meeting there.

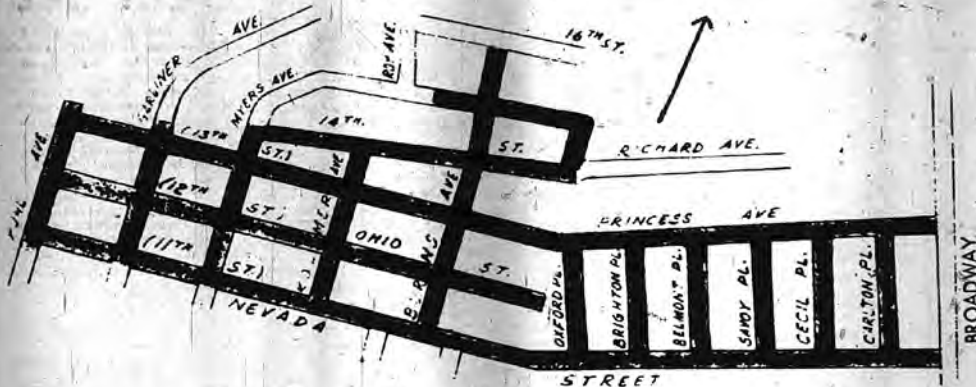

Stock Market

In answer to several queries from readers about my market studies in the last column, let me point out that a week elapses from the time of preparation of this column to its reaching your front door. Thus, when you saw my opinions written a week earlier that the market would probably break to new lows before support emerged, the action was already taking place. I feel today the same as I wrote two weeks ago, i.e., the market will emerge from this wide-swinging trading range into new high territory in time for Wall Street's almost discarded hope of a late spring-early summer rally.

After making new lows last week, the stock market as measured by the Dow Jones average began a selective recovery. This first attempt to rally after a month of steady decline should be considered "technical" and might be expected to falter in the 705-715 resistance area of the D.J.I. A "technical" movement is one counter to the prevailing trend that arises more from an abatement of pressures, or else from exhaustion of heavy buying or selling climaxes, permitting a recovery movement, than from a sudden dramatic change in the "fundamental" picture. Fundamentals, in contrast, may be defined as the basic, motivating forces, other than psychological, which cause a stock to rise or fall. Included in these basics would be earnings, yield, new products, etc.) Unfortunately, the technical forces and the fundamental forces rarely work hand in hand, other-
