## AN EDITORIAL:

### The Inconvenience Is Brief

The construction work in connection with the elimination of railroad crossings at grade is proceeding according to plan and the contractor is making every apparent effort to permit the freest possible flow of traffic. However, there are detours and delays as temporary tracks are placed at the various intersections.

The detours and delays, which don't appear to occur on Saturdays, have caused retail business in down town Hicksville to fall off alarmingly. Jointly, the business people urge all their patrons to keep cool and not assume that the conditions will last for any great length of time.

A plan has been worked out cooperatively by the contractor, police and town officials to make the construction period as painless as possible. However, because of the magnitude of the job there must be some inconvenience for brief periods of time.

The temporary crossing is set in place at Jerusalem Ave. and work is moving progressively from street to street. What may seem like a mess this week can be no problem at all the following week. So if you find the going tough one day, please don't assume its going to stay that way. Come back another day. And remember, the streets are almost empty of traffic on Saturdays.

## 3500 to Parade Memorial Day

Approximately 3500 adults and youngsters are expected to take part in the five-division parade which will precede the Hicksville Memorial Day exercises next Wednesday morning, May 30. The parade will start from the Mid Island Plaza at 10 AM sharp. Services at the Memorial Mall next to the Junior High on Jerusalem Ave start at 11 AM.

In the event of severely inclement weather, the program will be held in the Junior High School auditorium starting at 10:30 A.M., according to James W. Rock, past commander of the VFW Post and chairman of the Memorial Day committee.

The program this year is under the leadership of the VFW with all community veteran groups participating. Malcolm Gertzen of Hicksville, past state commander of the Amvets, will be marshal of the parade. His co-marshal will be Spanish American War Veteran "Skipper" Dow.

The parade route will be the same as last year. Assembly is at Mid Island Plaza off North Broadway. Promptly at 10 o'clock the parade will move south on Broadway to Old Country Rd., go west on Old Country to Jerusalem Ave. and south on Jerusalem to the Memorial Mall. Nine school bands will take part.

Honored guests in the parade will be Hicksville Gold Star mothers.

As the marching units reach the corner of Jerusalem Ave. and Second St., near the public library they will be announced by loudspeaker this year. All residents are invited and urged to turn out Wednesday to witness the parade and take part in the solemn services at the Mall.

Do not allow them to walk. 3) Most important of all, if any unknown and uninvited guests should appear at such a party, don't wait for trouble to start, CALL THE POLICE IMMEDIATELY (WE 1-7700). Try to get a description of any car that may be involved, and, if possible, the license number.

I have been assured by the Police that immediate police action will be taken to prevent any disturbances here in Birchwood. Our Civic Assoc. can be successful in combatting such a problem as this only if it has the support and co-operation of all the residents. I pledge to you my best efforts to try to make Birchwood the safe and secure place we would like it to be. I know I can count on all of you to cooperate with me to the fullest in this endeavor.

## Bd Chairman Makes Promise

Stressing responsibility to the community and courtesy to each other, our new Civic President, George Frankel, officially opened the first Board of Directors meeting of his administration.

The first and most important order of business, the election of a Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Board, turned out to be the easiest and least controversial issues of the evening. Leon Newman, by acclamation, was elected Chairman, and Lottie Stein no less unanimously, became Vice-Chairman. Leon immediately appointed Dr. Walter Sugarman as parliamentarian and thus in a few short minutes, he said, the prospect of long drawn out meetings was reduced on two counts.

Three Board vacancies, due to resignations, had to be filled and, following precedent, the next three people in the order of votes polled during the election, would be asked to fill them. They are Leo Geyer, Al Kauf and Marie Gerna.

The Board recommended that the Jericho School Board be contacted on two possible changes in their setup. One, to eliminate the yearly registration required to vote in school elections and two to raise their School Board from 5 to 7 members. It was pointed out that many school districts, including Syosset, simply require a signature, at voting time, corroborating residence and it has worked out fine. The increase to seven on the school board, was held to be a more desirable situation because of the greater scope usually needed in this field.

The Syosset Education Committee proudly reported that all their recommendations, approved by the board, were accepted and so voted by our residents.

The Health, Welfare and Safety Committee reported that because the parents of the George A. Jackson School pupils still continued to ignore the signs prohibiting entering the circle at the main entrance, steps would soon be taken to make it physically impossible for them to drive in. Many of the stop signs in the community were also being ignored and the police were going to be asked to patrol the area more thoroughly.

Based on a report of the Town Planning Committee that the gas station at the Merry Lane entrance to our community had been allowed to become untidy in its surroundings with garbage cans, broken fence posts and deteriorating bricks on its wall, the Board will send a letter of protest to the Town Board. Mr. Wolfman, owner of the station, will be apprised of this.

## Civics Urge Jericho School Changes

The Board of Directors of the Birchwood Civic Assoc has passed the following resolution effecting changes in the Jericho School District.

- Remove the necessity for annual registration
- Increase the number of members on the school board from five to seven

The VILLAGER strongly supports these resolutions. Confusion and annoyance has always resulted from this need to separately register every year. Many people who have come down to vote were unable to do so, because they were told that they were not eligible because they had failed to register. Others did not come to vote because they were under the wrong impression that they were not eligible to vote and finally many did not know whether or not they were eligible so remained away from voting places to avoid embarrassment.

Our Syosset residents, when voting in school matters simply write their name and address in a book just prior to entering the voting machine. This method has proven successful in Syosset and other school districts and should be adopted by the Jericho school district in time for the next school vote.

Increasing the members of the Jericho School Board the VILLAGER feels, would increase the efficiency of its operation. It would decrease the tremendous work load on each school board member. The skills and background of these additional members would be an asset and great aid to the school board.

We urge the School Board to consider these resolutions and to approve them in the very near future.

### Stock Market

by Leon Newman

Wall Street has a long established and well deserved reputation for its ability to find a suitably descriptive phrase for most occasions. While many reasons are now proffered for the break of the past several weeks, "loss of confidence" is the most commonly heard phrase. After the fact, in truth, however, it is a matter of record that many stocks had been sliding long before the administration took its adamant stand against the steel price increase. That, the Laos crisis, the continued outflow of gold, the SEC investigations -- all merely accelerated and made more precipitous the reaction which had been its own seeds months before.

I do not pretend to know what normalcy is that many analysts say the market is returning to. To me it is not a plateau upon which we can permanently stabilize an everfluctuating, ever-changing stock market or economy, but only an unrecognizable point we pass through. Thus, in falling from the heights it is conceivable that we may drop too low before rising to a starting point of equilibrium. The record-smashing Monday, May 14, illustrates this on a very short term basis. The popular Dow Jones Average fell to 626 in the A.M. and rallied to close at 646. The next day it rose to 660 before settling back again. Somewhere we must have passed through several times a short-term point of stabilization for this gyrating price pendulum. While this was heralded as a selling climax and a reversal of the downturn, and I must agree on a short term basis (note the swift rally from 626 to 660), my intermediate studies indicate that in the process of developing a base the market could make a new closing low before a sustained recovery takes place.

In spite of anticipating new closing lows and a protracted period of building a base, the studies also depict a much healthier market today than when I wrote a couple of months ago in this column of the likelihood of a climactic penetration of the lower of the year, which then stood at about 680. The second and optimistic part of these "Internal market health" studies I wrote about still seems likely, that is, that we have not seen the end of this bull market. There is much vigor left in it and it should become apparent when this intermediate reaction runs its almost completed course.

It is noteworthy that several large funds stated publicly last week that they were increasing their holdings during the break. While the high-priced volatile stocks attracted most of the headlines and attention as they broke former support levels thereby setting off a chain reaction of stop orders (a stop order is one that stipulates buying or selling at the market when a certain price is struck), some strong resistance to the waves of general selling pressures was noticed in certain issues in the following groups: International Oils, Textiles, Auto suppliers, Airlines, Golds and Aircraft-missile.

When a reluctance to go lower can be found among so many groups in the face of a generally breaking market, it is obviously just as foolhardy to indulge through emotionalism in indiscriminate dumping of securities now as it may have been to chase them to astronomical heights last year. I find this especially so in view of the aforementioned studies based on price: volume: movement: velocity formulae which indicate most stocks have had

## AMENDMENTS TO THE HICKSVILLE PARKING ORDINANCE

RESOLVED, that the Ordinance regulating parking on the hamlet of Hicksville, Town of Oyster Bay, adopted October 19, 1948, be and it hereby is amended as follows:

Section 4 shall be amended by adding subdivision 15 to read as follows: ONE WAY

15. Liszi Street - One Way - traffic to flow in a westerly direction from Woodbury Road to Ketchams Road.

Section 9H shall be amended by adding subdivisions 10 and 11 to read as follows: TWO HOUR PARKING 8 AM to 7 PM EXCEPT SATURDAYS, SUNDAYS AND HOLIDAYS

10. Raymond Street - east and west sides - Two Hour Parking 8 AM to 7 PM Except Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays - from the north curb line of Old Country Road north to the south curb line of Clinton Street.

11. Henry Place - both sides - Two Hour Parking - 8 AM to 7 PM Except Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays - starting at the east curb line of Raymond Street east to the west curb line of Park Avenue.

Section 11B shall be amended by adding subdivisions 37 and 38 to read as follows: NO STOPPING HERE TO CORNER

37. Old Country Road - north side - No Stopping Here To Corner - starting at the west curb line of Park Avenue, west for a distance of 32 feet.

38. Park Avenue - west side - No Stopping Here To Corner - starting at the north curb line of Old Country Road, north for a distance of 30 feet.

Section 17B shall be amended by adding subdivisions 282 and 283 to read as follows: ARTERIAL STOP

282. James Street - Arterial Stop - traffic approaching southbound on Kiwanis Place shall

## Library Corner

While recognizing that there is an increasing demand for public libraries to become multiservice organizations, the Hicksville Public Library Board and staff are firm in their conviction that their primary function is to maintain and develop a book collection that has sufficient variety and depth to meet the potential general needs of all members of the Hicksville community.

The book needs in Hicksville are great. Where the average percentage of registered library borrowers throughout the country is less than 20 percent the Hicksville Public Library has about 50 percent of its inhabitants registered as borrowers. Where the average number of books borrowed per inhabitant per year is about four books per person, nationally the average in Hicksville is seven books per person.

The rapid growth of Hicksville as a community plus the typical characteristics of its citizens as relatively young, mentally alive adults who are also still learning their occupations, has brought about extraordinary pressures for providing a book collection suitable for their needs.

Beyond this the school population places a tremendous demand on our book facilities. We do a great deal of book ordering with the school population in mind; while

at the same time maintaining our identity as a public, and not a school, library.

In order to satisfy these demands, the Hicksville book collection has been more than doubled since 1956 and presently numbers more than 70,000 volumes. The relatively large proportion of our budget allocated for book purchases indicates that future growth in the size of the collection will be comparable.

Those people who worried, when we moved into our addition in 1958, about the scarcity of books in relation to shelf space should be happy now. But soon it will be our turn to worry about finding enough floor and shelf space for the books. This problem, we know, must be solved, in this day and age of rapid change, by finding more space rather than limiting the size of the book collection.
