

# Wast Public Works Schedule

## Million-Dollar Storm Drainage Project By Town In Addition to RR Elimination

The community of Hicksville is currently the scene of several large-scale State and Town public works projects which will continue for months to come. In addition to the ten million-dollar State program for elimination of rail road grade crossings, there are several extensive storm water drainage jobs underway which will see streets and avenues ripped apart in a million dollar program.

The Town of Oyster Bay projects were reported in the HERALD individually as they were announced. The full effect of one drainage project was felt this week with the close down of Old Country Road.

The grade crossing program appears to be moving apace with temporary tracks now in place across Jerusalem Ave., Bay Ave. and Bethpage Road. Temporary passenger shelters have been erected in the former freight yard and loading platforms are developed.

Practically all the structures and buildings in the right of way of the three miles of temporary run-around tracks have been levelled and the laying of tracks is underway.

Five LIRR trains were delayed up to an hour and three-quarters between 2:30 and 4:15 p.m. Monday, at Hicksville in a dispute between trainmen and the crossing elimination contractor, Hendrickson Bros. While 14 trainmen were on the job as flagmen, their spokesman said more men were needed to insure safe operation of the rail road while the contractor with a bulldozer and crane worked near the tracks.

Councilman Carl Grunewald, working with the general contractor and county police, has developed various alternate routes for the movement of highway traffic around the grade crossings this summer while the abutments of reinforced concrete are being poured for the elimination project. He has promised to make these

available to the HERALD as they go into effect. The plan calls for prohibiting of parking on certain streets.

Meanwhile, more than a million dollars will be spent by the Town Board on major storm water drainage projects here. A quarter million is the estimated cost of a plan for drainage on First to 10th Sts., west of Jerusalem Ave., including Division Ave. in the vicinity of the Senior High School and south.

On a greater scale and the probable cause of the close-down of Old Country Rd. earlier this week is a \$700,000 town drainage project for the area bounded by Woodbury Rd., Old Country Rd. and the LIRR, including the full length of Park Ave.

There are also smaller scheduled jobs including resurfacing, shoulder stabilization, curbing in various parts of Hicksville under Town Highway Superintendent Thomas R. Pynchon.

The assorted public works ac-

tivity is resulting in the demolition of many old landmarks and many stately trees. The town has a plan for replanting trees when old ones are removed.
