

The Hicksville Public Library, while working to provide a book collection that will meet the gen-eral needs of its borrowers, cannot of course, provide, within its own collection, books to satisfy all the specific needs of all members of the Hicksville community. As a public library is a medium-

As a public-subrary is a medium-sized community, we do not feel justified in developing highly spe-culized collections in certain sub-ject fields, since it would have to be done at the expense of other parts of the collection. We cannot, for example, provide professional liter-ature for the medical man, or a autre for the means man, or a completely satisfactory collection of books in his field for the skilled technical worker, or a collection that issufficient for the needs of a person intensely interested in a period of history. Fortunately, a modern library does not have to be safficient unor

does not have to be sufficient unto its own collection. If you need a particular book, or a book on a particular subject, which is not a valiable in our collection, you can request that we try to borrow i for you on interlibrary Loan.

The request is relayed by us to the Nassau Library System Head-quarters in Hempstead where it will be determined what libraries,

If any, in Nassau County own the book, and arrangements will be made to borrow the book for us. If no libraries in the county own the book, the request is teletyped to the State Library in Albany, from which the book will be mailedtous if any libra if available.

In the relatively rare event that the book is not available from any the book is not available from any of the above mentioned sources, and if the request is serious enough it is occasionally possible to apply to the Library of Congress for the loan of the book. Also, if the ap-plicant is certain that a given li-beary owns the book that we have been unable to borrow through regular chanels, we will attempt to borrow the book directly from that library.

to borrow the book directly from that library. If you used a particular book right away, it is occasionally pos-sible for you to borrow it directly from a neighboring library, pro-viding you secure a courtesy card from us which the other library will honor

It is in such ways as these that a library card can open book re-sources that extend beyond the lo-cal library collection.
