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## Library Seeks Expansion Vote

# Nicholai Parents Gripe to Board

Announcement that the Library Trustees seek a November referendum vote upon a \$297,000 addition to the Public Library and appearance of about 50 parents objecting to the assignment of their children to Nicholai St. School in the fall highlighted a lengthy Hicksville School Board meeting, Friday night. It was also disclosed that Dr. Felix McCormick of Columbia will present a preliminary report on his newest study of long-range school facility requirements on June 29.

During the six-hour session which concluded at 2:30 Saturday morning a wide range of topics came under consideration. Vice President Herbert Johnson presided in the absence of President Robert D. P. Eaton. Elizabeth Scherer, Library Board president, and Library Director Kenneth Barnes informed the School Board they plan a referendum in November upon a \$297,000 bond issue to finance an addition to the Library at the corner of Jerusalem Ave. and Second St. The addition would provide for a new and larger auditorium as well as book stacks and other facilities which they said are needed.

Under the Education Law the referendum must be conducted by the School District. The School Board has recently indicated it plans to submit some proposals of its own to the voters, possibly in November. These might include a plan to acquire additional property next to the new Willet Ave. Elementary School and a new District Administration and Warehouse building.

When discussion at the meeting began to focus upon the actual need for an addition to the Library, Johnson suggested those questions might better be asked at a meeting of the Library Trustees. The next Library Board meeting, Mrs. Scherer said, will be Wednesday, June 20.

**Object to Nicholai**

Capacity of the teachers' lounge in the Senior High School where the School Board meets was taxed

by a turnout of about 50 spectators, most of them parents of children who will be assigned to Nicholai St. School as third graders in the fall.

After spending about two hours on the library referendum, the Board at 10 PM changed its agenda to hear objections to Nicholai St. School, the oldest school building in the District.

Several years ago the Board of Education, at the suggestion of the Administration, designated Nicholai, to house third graders exclusively since the shift in community population has left few youngsters in the immediate area to fully utilize the 15-room building.

As a result, third graders are transported from other neighborhoods to Nicholai. Some of those objecting, Friday night, claimed they would rather have their children on split or double sessions in a neighborhood school than go to Nicholai. Charges were voiced that the building is "a fire hazard" and has inadequate lavatory facilities.

Utilizing Nicholai to house 450 students in the fall will result in full time sessions from the second to sixth grade, School Superintendent Donald F. Abt said.

A suggestion voiced by one parent that the District abandon the use of Nicholai for educational purposes was applauded by the audience. Early this week it was reported that a petition is actually in circulation demanding that Nicholai be abandoned.

The School Board voted unanimously that a study be undertaken by the Board and Administration with a view to possible alternate solutions to the questions raised at the meeting.

However, it appears unlikely that the Board will seriously consider abandoning Nicholai at this time. Later in the meeting the Board voted to approve the installation of new lavatory fixtures there at a cost not to exceed \$1200 as provided in the budget and recommended by the Administration.

The two-story frame building was completely renovated and modernized at a cost of \$85,000 about eight years ago. It is the only District school building with a sprinkler system which automatically triggers the fire dept. alarm system.

## School Board Sets Record for Session

Hicksville Board of Education at its meeting on June 8 racked up a new record high of 58 motions or legislative proposals, an all time high since such record-keeping began five years ago. The last previous high was 54 motions or resolutions offered at a meeting held Dec. 11, 1959.

Forty motions in an average for most regular sessions of the school board which thus far this year has heard the words "I move..." 1208 times at 42 meetings, including 22 special sessions.

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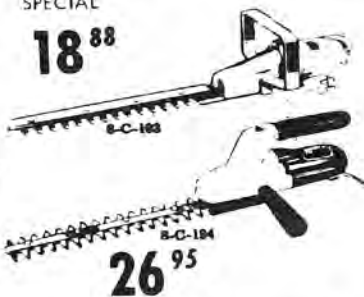
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## Kershow in Training

## An Editorial:

### Two Bargains

Quote from the last issue of the Jericho School News:

"It may be of interest to note, however, that the average family with two children at school and a home assessed at \$10,000, will only pay about \$550 under the rate voted for next year. If we consider that it costs about this much to send only one child to summer camp for eight weeks, perhaps we gain some perspective on this real 'bargain' called public education. (Incidentally, we've yet to hear of a child getting into college on the basis of his performance at summer camp)"

We second the above statement. It may be worth while recalling at this time that in 1960 and 1961 a proposal to establish a library in Jericho was defeated. The cost would have been no more than \$20 a year to the average taxpayer. The Hicksville Library fee is already up to \$15 a year to Jericho residents. If public education is a bargain at \$500 per year, a Jericho public library would have been even a greater bargain for the community at \$20. per year.



### LODGE WINS 6 AWARDS AT CONVENTION

They have stated that this new association between the two schools assures all parents that the M.I.H.D.S. will benefit, in a large measure, from the experience of the oldest established Hebrew Day School on Long Island.

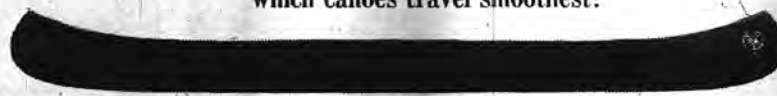

## Christian Mothers Crown Blessed Virgin Mary

At the meeting of the St. Ignace Loyola Auxiliary of Christian Mothers, Hicksville, held in the school hall May 28, the crowning of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Queen of Heaven, took place. It was a most memorable and moving occasion.

Mr. M. Venard, O.P., thanked the mothers for the support and cooperation she has received from them since her appointment as school principal last September. Mr. Venard mentioned that at a recent bus trip to Rye Beach for grades five through eight, a good time was had by all and complimented the mothers on the children's good behavior. Classes in Speech Therapy will be conducted in the Public Schools during the summer. The course will be limited to those meeting the most help. Effective in September, Mr. Venard said the girls uniforms may be made up in a flared pleated skirt; the choice is the parents. Sister advised that the Girl Cadet Corps needs recruits. Commencing in September, each class will have one period a week of Art Study which will be directed by a special Art Teacher.

First prize in the Poster Contest given by the Chiropractic Association of New York for students in grades 7 through 9 was awarded to James Lane, a student in St. Constantia's class. He competed with over 7000 students. The prize was a \$25 Savings Bond.

Mrs. Dorothy McNeely reported that the Communion Luncheon held on May 26 was a spiritual and social success.

The guest speaker, Miss Mar-

garet E. Stephenson, spoke on the life and work of Dr. Maria Montessori and the Montessori training course. Dr. Montessori's field was mathematics and science, not education. She was a brilliant neurosurgeon and studied mental and nervous diseases in both the adult and the child for two years. Her interest was aroused while working among the defective children in San Lorenzo, a slum quarter of Rome. Her method of training these children was highly successful and even greater success was noticed when these methods were applied to the normal child. Children in a Montessori School are grouped by ages rather than by classes, usually three-to-six, six-to-nine, and nine-to-twelve. This is a natural grouping because the method approaches a child's intellect through his senses, as they develop. Instead of formal teaching, Dr. Montessori gave special apparatus suited to the attitudes and potentialities of children of different age groups. To her surprise, she saw that even to the very young, the most attractive subject was mathematics. Specially designed blocks, color charts, weight, and three-dimensional letters come into use as the respective senses mature.

The kaleidoscopic perceptions afforded the child through his senses, his muscles, his intellect and emotions, group and re-group themselves into patterns from birth to maturity. The child of three, for example, has a wealth of perceptions, and even as he has imposed order on language from within himself he undertakes to control the environment in which

he feels secure by ordering it. He identifies things which look alike. He distinguishes among things which look different. He links with things and people their identifying words. Instruction is highly individual and always proceeds from the known to the unknown at the child's own pace, not that of his teacher or his group. Not confined to the attainment level of his age group, the child is free to proceed from project to project as his interest develops and as rapidly as he can grasp the subject matter.

The Montessori method avoids the extreme of the external discipline of the traditional school and of the non-external discipline of the ultra progressive. The teacher's role is that of mentor and helper. She makes possible an ordered approach to learning in a non-competitive spirit. Results prove the method and the results are astonishing. The average Montessori-trained child can write at four, and begin to read at five. At seven, he knows the nomenclature of many natural sciences and can distinguish the various classes of invertebrates. He grasps quickly the rudiments of algebra and geometry.

The moderator, Rev. Leo J. Goggin discussed the stand the bishops of the United States are taking regarding Federal Aid to Education. If Federal Aid is given to schools, parochial schools should not be denied their share. Nowhere in the Constitution does it say that such aid is "clearly" unconstitutional or "clearly" constitutional. Between now and September, the Diocese of Rockville

Centre will establish a course of action. It is not the intention of the bishops to alter or attempt to change political views but rather to define our rights and the legal situation. It should be well understood that the bishops' views are not articles of faith. It was recommended that we should read literature and attend lectures dealing with this subject. Fr. Goggin advocated the reading of "A Catholic Viewpoint on Education" by Neil McClusky, S.J., published by

Doubleday. 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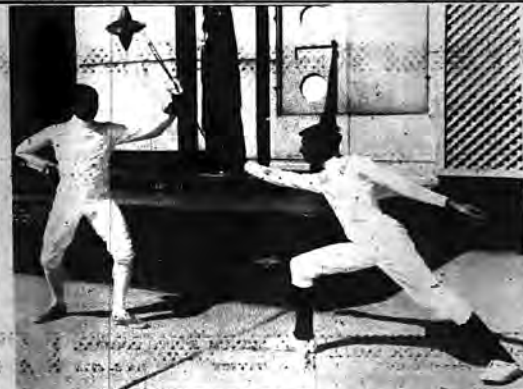

### McCormick Report

The final, finished report is to be delivered in the fall. However, he will give an oral preliminary report to the Board of Education at its next meeting on Friday night, June 29, starting at 7:30 P.M.

### Operation Abolition

The Board approved a request of the Hicksville War Veterans Council, 5 to 1, for the use of the High School Auditorium on June 29 for the showing of a movie, "Operation Abolition".

Charles A. Niklas in making the application noted "it is a proven fact that the student riots during the San Francisco session of the House Un-American Activities Committee in May 1960 were Communist inspired." He said the film shows how the riots were engineered.

### Other Business

New Board Member William A. Bruno Jr. proposed that the Board direct the Administration to refuse to buy any materials in the future from Science Research Associates of Chicago, publisher of psychological and other tests.

He said SRA is the publisher

of material by Langston Hughes and charged that Hughes has been cited by the Senate Internal Security Committee "as one of those in America who most often are sponsors of Communist front organizations. In all, he has been cited no fewer than 70 times for affiliation with organizations known as Communistic and subversive."

"H.A. Overstreet likewise has been cited as a Communist front by the California Senate Investigating Committee on Education," he added.

Bruno read "Goodbye Christ" which he said is a godless poem laced with blasphemy and authored by Hughes. Copies of the poem were distributed to the audience by Bruno during a recess in the meeting.

The Board voted, with Bruno opposed, to table the issue for further consideration at a policy committee meeting.
