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## Mid Island Average Income Higher Than County-wide

Average family income at \$9,491 in the Mid-Island area is almost \$1,000 higher than the average for Nassau County and substantially higher than the average income for the City of New York, according to 1960 census information just released.

The average family income for 19,710 in various comparative areas is as follows:  
New York City \$6,091  
Nassau County 8,515  
Suffolk County 6,795  
Hicksville 7,908  
Plainview 8,998  
Jericho 10,558  
Lewiston 7,467  
Hicksville with a population of 30,405, of which 3,373 are foreign born, has 12,012 families with an average income of \$7,908. Of all families reporting income, the best single group embraces 13 earning \$10,000 to \$14,999 a year. Six hundred earn \$20,000 to \$24,999 and 73 earn \$30,000 or over.  
Jericho in the area bounded on east by Robbins Lane, south by Hicksville school line, west by North Hempstead town line and

north by village of Brookville line, has a population of 10,623 or 2,636 families. Average family income for the section on the west side of Hicksville Road is \$9,548 and for the east side it is \$11,569 for a total area average of \$10,558. Earning \$25,000 or over are 116 families.  
Plainview has a population of 27,710 of 6,686 families with an average income of \$8,998. Forty one report earning \$25,000 a year or more.  
Lewiston has a population of 65,276 according to the 1960 census and 15,224 families with an average income of \$7,467. Forty report earning \$25,000 a year or over.  
The shifting local population is revealed by the fact that of 43,843 people in Hicksville five years ago and older in 1960, there are 28,131 living in the same house as they did five years ago. Today's population includes 15,131 who were living in a different house in the United States five years ago. Of this number 352 came from abroad, 446 from the south and 1,169 from the north and west.

## All Temporaries Finish Trip

All 24 temporary-type classrooms have been moved, as of Tuesday of this week, from four elementary school locations and are now on footings where they will be connected with the Hicksville Junior High School on Jerusalem Ave.  
The rooms were moved, four at a time on trailers, from East St., Old Country Rd., Fork Lane and Lee Ave. The remaining 26 units are still at Woodland Ave., Burns Ave. and Dutch Lane and are scheduled for eventual moving to the Senior High School on Division Ave.  
Robert Petross, building consultant of the Hicksville School District, reports that all units weathered their highway trips without mishap and in good condition. Those at the Junior High are scheduled for use starting with the fall term of this year.

## AN EDITORIAL:

### The Timing and Nicholai's Future

At a time when the Hicksville School District can begin to see around the bulge in our elementary student population, there comes a rather vocal demand that the Board of Education forthwith discontinue the use of Nicholai St School building for classrooms housing 450 children.  
We have been advised that a petition making this demand will be submitted to the School Board at its next regular meeting on June 29. The sponsors of the petition are some of the parents of children who have been assigned, as third graders, to Nicholai for the fall term.  
The request appears to be poorly timed. The School Board on the same evening will receive a preliminary report from Dr. Felix McCormick on his recent long-range study of building facility requirements of the District. Among other things, this report will probably disclose just how long the District will need to use Nicholai's 15 classrooms.  
There is nothing unique about the suggestion being voiced that Nicholai be converted to administrative use. This has been the subject of School Board consideration for more than five years. The key has been, and probably will continue to be, the release date on the building when all the elementary students are housed

in the other school buildings of the District.  
Nicholai is an old frame building and lacks much of the shiny aluminum trim and tiled corridors of more recent structures. However, it is valued at more than \$400,000 by the insurance people. In the latest inspection by the county fire marshals office it was given a complete clean bill of health. Protests from parents of 3rd graders assigned to it have been heard with the start of each new term. However, this marks the first time that parents have actually urged that their youngsters be placed on split sessions, with reduced class hours, rather than learn their 3 Rs in Nicholai.  
And of course abandonment of Nicholai's 15 rooms will raise havoc with the balance of the District. It will call for rechecking of other grades and classes.  
Evidence of the positive decline in elementary school enrollment can be found in two facts: 24 temporary-type classrooms have been released, from elementary level and moved to the Junior High School, and the District will, for the first time in many years, required fewer elementary teachers next year.  
Let's hear what Dr. McCormick has to report.

Anyone wishing to know all there is worth knowing about communism can get a cheap education with a wealth of materials costing nothing or ranging from 5 cents to \$1.50 in price.

The V.F.W. Americanism Department, has articles free of charge explaining what communism is, how it works and compare both communist and democratic philosophies.

In addition the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D.C., offers the public 63 pamphlets and books explaining what the House Un-American Activities Committee, Congress and other agencies have learned about communism in their investigations. These cost from 5 cents to \$1.50. Write to the Superintendent of Documents requesting the list of publications dealing with the various phases of communism. This liberal education can be bought for a total cost of \$19.30 if you were to buy all the available items. Here is an education for practically nothing and an example of Americanism on the march.

The film "Operation Abolition" can now be seen in Hicksville. Sponsored by the Hicksville War Council, this controversial film will be shown at the Hicksville Junior High School, Friday June 29 at 8:30 sharp. Admission is free. The film which lasts about 45 minutes will be shown promptly.
