#### AN EDITORIAL:

### The Timing and Nicholai's Future

At a time when the Hicksville School District can begin to see around the baige in our elementary student population, there comes a rather vocal demand that the Board of Education forthwith discontinue the use of Nicholai St School building for classrooms bousing 450 children. We have been advised that a petition making this demand will be submitted to the School Board at its next regular meeting on June 29. The sponsors of the petition are some of the parents of children who have been assigned, as third graders, to Nicholai for the fall term. The request appears to be poorly timed. The School Board on the same evening will receive a pretiminary report from Dr. Felix McCormick and the petition of the same evening will receive the pretent of the petition of the same evening will receive the pet

of School Board consideration for more than five years. The key has been, and probably will continue to be, the release date on the build-ing whee all the elementary students are housed

in the other school buildings of the District. Nicholai is an old district building and lacks much of the ahiny aluminam trim and tiled corridors of more recent structures. However, it is valued at more than \$400,000 by the insurance people. In the latest inspection by the county fire marshals office it was given a complete clean bill of health. Protests from parents of 3rd graders assigned to it have been heard with the start of each new term. However, this marks the first time that parents have actually urged that their youngsters be placed on split seesions, with reduced class hours, rather than learn their 3 Rs in Nicholais.

And of course abandonment of Nicholai's 15 reduced and classes.

Evidence of the positive decline in elementary school enrollment can be found in two facts: 24 temporary-type classrooms have been released from elementary level and moved to the junior High School, and the District will, for the first

High School, and the District will, for the first time in many years, required fewer elementary eachers next year.




