## Parents Pushing To Close Nicholai

While claiming that they hope Hicksville School Board and District will not "hit the headlines", a group of residents who want the District to abandon the use of Nicholai St. School for classrooms appeared to be doing their share to whip up a storm and a big audience for the next regular meeting this Friday night, June 29.

Charging that Nicholai St. School is "a disgrace...fire hazard...has only 16 desks for 450 children...has outdoor fire escapes which are a hazard in winter...has no gymnasium and during certain hours it cannot be reached quickly by fire apparatus in case of emergency", a mimeographed circular is headed "Is the pot simmering in Hicksville?"

It is stated by Don Jacobs, apparently spokesman for the group calling for the shutdown of Nicholai, that a petition with 1,000 signatures will be presented to the School Board this Friday night in the Senior High School.

The circular wonders: "Are we about to follow the hardly envious and of our neighboring community and hit the headlines with our next school board meeting? We hope not." The literature concludes with the statement: "Let's have the desires of the people reflected in the decisions of the Board we elected. We stand for the discontinuance of Nicholai St. School for any and all classes."

The petition itself charges that a member of the Fire Dept has refused, unofficially, that during certain hours "it would be impossible to get apparatus within a block of the building."

Meanwhile, Florence Sklarz, president of Nicholai St. School P.T.A., in a published statement appeared to take issues with the petitioners who call themselves the Committee on Nicholai and as-

serted: "I do object most strenuously to those parents from the Fork Lane School who have suddenly become so vociferous about Nicholai St. School being a fire-trap, etc...."

"Until such a time when every child in Hicksville can walk to his neighborhood elementary school and be on full session, this seems to be the best solution offered at the present time."

Donald F. Abt, superintendent of school, has stated at a meeting of the Board of Education that inspectors and other authorities have officially declared that Nicholai St. School is a safe structure for use as classrooms.

## Thunder Storm Moves Graduates

A smashing thunderstorm Sunday afternoon drove the 48th annual commencement exercises of Hicksville High School for a record breaking class into the auditorium of the school. It had been scheduled for the athletic field.

Presentation of diplomas was conducted by Robert D.P. Eaton, president of the school board. Principal Leon J. Galloway presented the class and Superintendent Donald F. Abt presented the awards.

There were 52 State Regents Scholarship winners.

## Psychologists Rap Abt, School Board

The issue of psychological testing in Hicksville Public Schools which has been the subject of closed door executive session consideration since May 11, exploded into the open this week with the circulation of a Newsletter of the Nassau County Psychological Assoc.

William A. Bruno Jr., member of the Hicksville School Board who campaigned for election on the position that such testing should only be undertaken with parental approval and consent, said he was aghast at the unwarranted attack voiced in the Newsletter against School Superintendent Donald F. Abt and the School Board. He charged that the secrecy of the executive session, wherein all

Board members are pledged to silence of off-the-record discussions and topics, was flagrantly violated.

He noted the revelation by the Psychological Assoc., which he felt will come as a shock to the other school board members, that Hicksville students have been used as a training area for those studying to become psychologists.

Ten single spaced pages of the Newsletter are devoted to a rehash of correspondence and telephone calls between Jack Herman, President of the County Assoc.; Louise Cameron, chief psychologist of Hicksville schools; Erasmus L. Hoch of the American Psychological Assoc.; School Superintendent Abt and others.

"My lips have been sealed regarding this matter by the executive session rules of the School Board," Bruno asserted. "But the Psychological Assoc. president, who prates of 'professional conduct, others involved in this situation on a 'professional level' are apparently not concerned with such delicacy when they freely circulate inaccurate information as fact and hurl such accusations as 'the gross lack of confidence the school superintendent and school board have displayed in the unprofessional treatment of professional personnel.'"

## Psychologists Rap Abt (Continued from Page 1)

"The School Board was advised on May 9th, thru an advance copy of the agenda as prepared by Mr. Abt, that psychological testing would be on the program for the meeting of May 11th. Miss Cameron was present as the meeting began, in public session, when Mr. Abt requested an executive session. We all tramped to an adjoining room and what was said to us has remained off the record and secret until it was spread all over the place by this Newsletter. The matter has not been brought up again at a public meeting of the Board since May 11. Now we learn, from the Newsletter that Miss Cameron on that date, before the meeting, called upon Hoch of the APA, that he brought pressure to bear to cancel her appearance at a scheduled public meeting. In fact, according to the Newsletter she wrote Hoch on May 28 and thanked him for 'prompt help at a time when it was needed.'"

Bruno noted that the Nassau County Assoc. President does not feel the issue is a matter of ethics: "We are bringing this matter to your attention," Herman wrote Hoch on May 29, "because we are quite concerned about what is happening in Hicksville, and its possible consequences. \*\*\*As you can see, attempting to solve the problem on ethical grounds does not really confront the issue." He also wrote: "We have good reasons to believe that these are not isolated events, but part of a coordinated, authoritarian attack on psychologists in the schools, and that behind this is an attempt to control or eliminate in the so-called 'frills' in education, or those aspects of our education-institutions that smack of 'liberalism'."

At the June 8 School Board meeting Abt told the trustees that he had discontinued all psychological testing in the school district, except IQ tests, pending the Board determination of a policy on such testing.

The Newsletter also noted that Long Beach school psychologists "have changed the name of certain tests to the 'The Whitely Test'."
