Bd Considers Future Action :

Allen Tosses Out School Praying

The Hicksville Board of Education may decide this Friday night at its regular meeting what future action it may take, if any, regarding the decision of State Education Commissioner James Allen that a stanza of the National Anthem may not be used as a prayer. Allen, in a ruling dated Tuesday of this week, said the Star Spangled Banner may be hummed, sung or recited in public schools but cannot be labelled "a prayer."

Allen in his lengthy decision, which apparently was designed as a guide for other school boards in the state, ruled that the action of the Hicksville School Board on June 29 in unanimously adopting a "prayer which may be said" in Hicksville schools was illegal. He ordered that the resolution adopted by the School Board "be set aside and vacated."

He thus upheld the appeal of Miriam Rubinstein of Sixth St., Hicksville, who was represented by her attorney-husband, Alfred. Allen did not rule on a second petition of Mrs. Rubinstein to have William A. Bruno Jr. removed from the Board of Education. She charged that Bruno took the oath of office "with a mental reservation." The decision on this petition is anticipated shortly.

The School Board will probably receive a report from Attorney Joseph Catalano on what course of action is open to the Board in view of the decision of the State Education Commissioner.

The Commissioner's ruling which runs five doubled spaced pages said: "It is clear that the Board's action (in adopting a prayer) is illegal. School administrators classroom teachers and other employees of the school system are agents of the Board and if similar action were undertaken by them the same legal objection would prevail."

He also said: "While I can find no legal objection to the provision of a period of silent meditation there are, however, valid reservations as to the educational value of a practice in which the teacher cannot have a positive and direct role."

"Both the Federal and State Constitutions quite definitely intend to bar the use of the public schools for religious instruction or for the impartation of religious tenets."

City Fire Boss Leads Volunteers Labor Day

New York City Fire Commissioner Thompson and a couple of other professional New York City fire officials will join with the officers and officials of Hicksville Fire District in leading the 34th annual Labor Day volunteer firemen's parade thru Hicksville on Monday, Sept. 3rd.

Commissioner Thompson will march with the Hicksville Fire Commissioners. Chief George David and Deputy Assistant Chief Charles Strossler will march with Chief Walter Telender of Hicksville Dept. and his assistants. Also heading the parade which will include 34 bands of musicians, thousands of volunteer firemen and their ladies auxiliary members and hundreds of fire trucks will be the Ladies Auxiliary of Hicksville Department which won top honors for best appearance at the recent State Firemen's Assoc. parade and convention at Albany.

James Taxter, chairman of the Labor Day Invitational Parade and Drill, will be grand marshal of the parade. The parade will start at

9:30 AM sharp, rain or shine, from the Marie St. firehouse. It will move west of Marie St. to Jerusalem, south on Jerusalem Ave to Old Country Rd. east on Old Country Rd. and Carl St. to Broadway and north on Broadway to Mid Island Plaza where a reviewing stand is erected. Contests on a special course on the Plaza parking field with seating for thousands starts at 1 PM sharp.

Distinguished guests during the Day at the contests will include Joseph F. Carlini, Speaker of the New York State Assembly.

More than 70 trophies to be awarded on Labor Day to the winners of competitions, including parade appearance, are now on public display at the Downtown Administration Annex of Hicksville Schools at Broadway and Marie St.

The colorful, award-winning St. Ignace Girls Cadet Corp will again appear in this year's Labor Day parade. The Corps has just returned from Albany where the girls led the Hicksville Fire Dept. in the State Convention Parade. Following the Labor Day appearance, the Corps is scheduled to march in the Holy Name Candlelight Procession at St. Plus X Preparatory Seminary in Uniondale on Sunday, Sept. 9th. The Cadets have also been booked to perform at Freedmanland on Saturday, Sept. 15th at 2 P.M. Later appearances are scheduled for Wading River and New York City.

As a preliminary to its Labor Day appearance, the Cadets will perform at the Mid-Island Plaza on Saturday morning, Sept. 1, at 10 o'clock.

New and Old Teachers Meet

Orientation and conference programs for the 600 or so teachers of Hicksville public schools, including new and returning teachers, will be held the two days prior to the opening of schools for the first term on Thursday, Sept. 6.

Approximately 13,000 boys and girls will be reporting for school. New teachers will have an orientation program on Tuesday, Sept. 4, in the Senior High School starting with registration at 8:15 A.M. There will be welcome remarks by Donald F. Abt, superintendent of schools; discussion of retirement, Social Security, state and federal taxes and bonding led by Anthony Gerczycki, business administrator. After a coffee break, the morning session continues with Health Insurance plans explained by Gerczycki. After lunch the speakers will include James Curran, presi-

dent of the Hicksville Classroom Teachers Assoc.; William J. McCarthy, assistant to superintendent introducing administrators; Mrs. Betty Garrison, head-student teacher, and at their home schools the new teachers will meet their principals, tour buildings and receive building assignments.

The new 26-room addition of temporary-type classrooms to the Junior High School is expected to be ready for opening day. This school is expected to have a total population of 3,000 students.

The new Willet Ave. Elementary School for kindergarten to 4th grade with John Maher as principal will not be ready for the first day. Instead, by plan, the 58 students will be temporarily housed in East St., Woodland and Burns Ave.

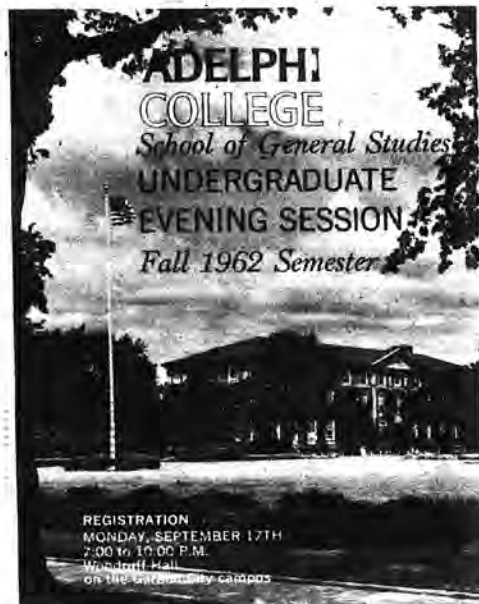

On behalf of all the members of the Birchwood Civic Assoc. at Jericho, Inc. whose children attend school in the Jericho School District, Acting Supt. of Schools, and the Jericho School Board for their decision playing all grades except kindergarten on full session in September pending opening the Canticus School.

As your "Civic President," I feel that it is important that all our members should be cognizant of the steps taken by our Civic Assoc. on this issue. Here is a brief summary of events:

1) The Jericho School District published a schedule for the fall term placing grades Kindergarten through Three on split session at the Jackson School ONLY.

2) The Civic Assoc. in response to many complaints, from members, formed a Special Committee to investigate the reasons for putting only the Jackson School on split session.

3) The Special Committee met; the site of the Canticus School was examined; a meeting with Dr. Westfall was requested.

4) The Special Committee met with Dr. Westfall on Tuesday, July 31, to ask why the Jackson School only had been chosen for split session. Dr. Westfall proposed three alternative plans. The Committee recommended that Plan No. 2 (K to remain as is, all other grades on full session) be adopted in lieu of the published schedule.

On Thursday Aug. 2, at the regular open meeting of the Jericho School Board, after much discussion, the School Board reserved decision.

6) On Thursday, Aug. 23, the School Board adopted Plan No. 2, the plan advocated by the Civic Special Committee. At this meeting Dr. Westfall publicly thanked the people for their help.

As I said in my last article, we were always "confident" that the spirit of cooperation which has characterized all our conversations that the adoption of this plan by the School Board will result in the greatest educational benefit to all the children of the District.

Just as it is the duty of the members of the School Board to administer the School District to the best of their ability, so it is the duty of the officers and members of the Board of Directors of your Civic Assoc. to represent your viewpoint to the best of their ability on any issue affecting our Civic life. Fruitful Board Meeting Is Quick

In one of their shortest, most orderly and yet very fruitful meetings the Birchwood Civic Assoc. Board of Directors held their regular monthly meeting, Tuesday night, Aug. 21.

The unfortunate but unavoidable delay in the opening of the new Canticus School posed many problems and hardships. Not the least of these was the danger of many of our students being forced into split sessions. The Board unanimously went on record to vigorously and publically oppose any plan that would impose a split session on any class other than Kindergarten, anywhere in the Jericho School District during the 1962-63 school year.

Just about the only ray of light to come out of this situation is the fact that the delay of a few months would undoubtedly bring about a savings in the projected Jericho School Budget. This savings, it was agreed, would no doubt be reflected in the surplus at the end of the school year.

The Board also agreed to notify the Jericho Water District, in writing that for their next election two additional pollingplaces, more evenly distributed were badly needed. In the past only one election point was used and this was so far

No Split Session For Jericho

At the special Jericho School Board Meeting held Aug. 23rd, the Board unanimously voted to accept the administration's new recommendation for no split session, (K to remain as in the past).

Dr. Westfall, in his statement advised that this decision was reached due to the delay in completion on Canticus and by the concern shown by the community. All class sizes are the same as they would be if Canticus had been ready to open on schedule. Sufficient accommodations for all classes has been managed by utilizing rooms suitable for classrooms, but not normally used as such. Mr. Siskind (Princ. of Canticus) will have his temporary office in the Williams School.

A new progress report was given on Canticus School. The architect felt that we could occupy the school in approximately six weeks, although it would not be completed at that time.

Special Committees.. A Must!

Jericho, a small dot on any map, has faced, and will continue to face its own symptoms of a world wide problem known as "population explosion". It has contained the problem in a fairly progressive fashion providing the means of a comfortable suburban life for a population that seems to grow almost hourly. This, we think, is particularly true in the field of education, where facilities have expanded in an orderly fashion under the guidance of professionals, and devoted volunteers.

There are, however, few quasi-governmental agencies, boards or committees that operate without the advice of, or consultation with the citizens of the particular area concerned. In Jericho, this has been a fact of history, and we can be proud of the special committees of our Civic Assoc. that have concerned themselves with this field.

Recently, Dr. Leon Westfall, acting Superintendent, of the Jericho School System, met with the Education Committee of the Birchwood Civic Association. The problem? A project split session at the Jackson School, (the only school to be so afflicted), to continue until such time as the Canticus School will open. The solution? The kindergarten classes will be on split session again, but ALL OTHER CLASSES will remain on a full time, one-session basis as heretofore. And no child will receive less than his full share in the educational system.

If ever the worth of a Civic Assoc. was proven; this was the time. If ever the need for wide-awake Special Committees was to be affirmed, this was the time. There is no moment, we believe, when our duly elected officials can not benefit from direct consultation with the citizens whom they represent.

We do not hold with any policy that states, "don't say anything, they'll find a solution without us".

 (1.0) It is hereby declared and that the taxicab industry in the Town of Oyster Bay is deemed to be of public interest as a vital part of the transportation facilities of the Town, and that regulation is necessary to secure adequate and safe transportation for the inhabitants of the Town and to prevent undue aggravation of traffic and parking problems of the Town.

ARTICLE (II)
DEFINITIONS
 (2.0) Unless otherwise expressly provided the following words for the purpose of this Ordinance shall have the following meanings herein indicated:

(a) **Town:** the unincorporated area of the Town of Oyster Bay, outside the city of Glen Cove and the incorporated villages located within the Town of Oyster Bay.

(b) **Taxicab:** a vehicle engaged in the business of carrying passengers for hire, having a seating capacity of less than eight persons and operated on a fixed route for the fare for which is determined by a meter installed thereon.

(c) **Limousine:** shall include a chauffeur vehicle seating not less than five persons and more than seven persons, used solely for hire in connection with funerals, weddings, amusements, sports and similar functions, the fare for which is determined by a flat rate contract and which bears a "Z" registration plate or other special New York State motor vehicle registration, and operated without a meter.

(d) **Person:** includes an individual, a partnership, any unincorporated association, a corporation and a legal entity.

(e) **Owner:** a person owning or controlling one or more taxicabs or limousines and causing any such vehicle to be driven upon the public highways for hire.

(f) **Driver:** any person driving a taxicab or limousine upon the public highways for hire.

(g) **Stand:** a public place adjacent to the curb of a street or highway which has been so designated as reserved exclusively for the use of all taxicabs licensed in the Town.

(h) **Passenger:** shall include a person other than the driver who is an occupant of a taxicab or limousine and for the purpose of this ordinance, such person or persons shall be presumed to be a passenger for hire.

(i) **Operator:** shall include the group of a passenger for hire within the Town of Oyster Bay, and shall be synonymous with the word "fare".

(j) **Business:** shall include a stage act of transporting a passenger or passengers for hire.

(k) **Terminal:** shall include a base of operation of the owner of the taxicab or limousine.

(l) **First Passenger:** shall mean the first passenger.

ARTICLE (III)
OWNER'S LICENSE
 (3.0) It shall be unlawful for any owner of any taxicab or limousine to permit the same to be operated upon the public highways of the Town of Oyster Bay without having a valid owner's license thereon, as hereinafter provided.

issued hereunder shall be issued as of the date of the granting thereof and shall expire on the last day of February next succeeding such date, unless sooner revoked by the Town Board or suspended by the Town Clerk.

Sec. (3.2) Every person who desires to own and control a taxicab or taxicabs, limousine or limousines upon the public highways within the Town of Oyster Bay shall file with the Town Clerk a written application in duplicate upon the forms to be furnished by the Town Clerk verified under oath stating:

(a) The name and address of the applicant, specifying in the case of any unincorporated association the names and addresses of each member thereof, and in the case of any corporation the names and addresses of each officer, director and stockholder thereof.

(b) A complete statement by the applicant, specifying the amounts of all unpaid judgments against the applicant and the nature of the transaction or acts giving rise to said judgments and the names and location of the court in which and the date on which each was entered.

(c) All offenses, misdemeanors or felonies of which the applicant and any member thereof, if an unincorporated association, and any officer, director and stockholder thereof, if a corporation, has been convicted, stating the name and location of the court in which and the date on which such convictions were held and the penalties imposed therefor.

(d) The experience of the applicant and each member thereof, if an unincorporated association, and each officer, director, and stockholder thereof, if a corporation, in the transportation of passengers.

(e) Any facts which the applicant believes tend to prove that the public convenience and necessity require the granting of a license.

(f) The number of vehicles to be operated by the applicant and a description of each such vehicle, including the make, model, passenger seating capacity, year of manufacture, New York State registration number, and identification or serial number thereof, and, if it has ever been in any accident, the date and nature of the accident and a description of the damage done to such vehicle.

(g) The age and citizenship of the applicant and each member thereof, if an unincorporated association, and each officer, director and stockholder thereof, if a corporation.

(h) The location of any and all depots and terminals proposed to be used by the applicant.

(i) Any other relevant information which the Town Clerk may require.

Sec. (3.3) Every applicant for an owner's license, and every member thereof, if an unincorporated association, and any officer, director, and stockholder, if a corporation, shall at the time of submitting his application also (a) submit two individual photographs of the applicant taken with thirty days prior to the date of the application, 1 1/2" x 1 1/2" in size and such pictures must be in a true likeness of the applicant and must show head, shoulders and uncovered neck.

(b) be fingerprinted under the direction and supervision of the Town Clerk unless said photographs and fingerprinting are specifically waived by the Town Clerk upon showing facts which in his discretion warrant the waiving of these requirements.

Sec. (3.4) If the Town Clerk shall find that further tabular service in the Town and particularly in the area in which the applicant proposes to operate is required by public convenience and necessity and, from the statements contained in the application for a taxicab owner's license, and upon completion of any investigation deemed necessary, that the applicant is qualified and able to perform such public transportation and to conform with the provisions of this ordinance and the rules and regulations of the Town of Oyster Bay, then the Town Clerk upon the certification of each taxicab proposed

to be operated by the applicant pursuant to Article XXIII hereof, and the furnishing by the applicant of proof of insurance as hereinafter provided, shall issue a license stating the name and address of the applicant, the date of the issuance thereof, the number of vehicles the applicant is authorized to operate, the numbers of the license medallions assigned to such vehicles, and at the same time the Town Clerk shall issue for each vehicle licensed hereunder, a license card bearing the words "Licensed Taxicab", an assigned number and the date of expiration of such license, together with a license medallion bearing a like number and the words "Licensed Taxicab", otherwise such application shall be denied.

(A) Before making any findings as to whether public convenience and necessity justify the issuance of a taxicab owner's license or the licensing of additional taxicabs, the Town Clerk shall cause to be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the Town of Oyster Bay a notice stating that application has been made for the licensing of a vehicle or vehicles as taxicabs, the number of vehicles for which such application has been made and containing a statement that written arguments as to whether public convenience and necessity require the licensing of such vehicles must be filed with the Town Clerk on or before the date fixed therein, which date must be not less than eight days after the date of such publication. Any arguments so filed must be considered by the Town Clerk in making his findings as to public convenience and necessity.

(B) If the Town Clerk shall find from the statements contained in the application, and upon the completion of any investigation, that an applicant for an owner's license or for a supplementary owner's license for a limousine or limousines is qualified and able to conduct the business of operating the limousine or limousines and to conform to the provisions of this ordinance and the rules and regulations adopted under this Ordinance, then the Town Clerk, upon the certification of each limousine proposed to be operated by the applicant pursuant to Article III hereof, and the furnishing by the applicant of proof of insurance, as hereinafter provided, shall issue a license stating the name and address of the applicant, the number of vehicles the applicant is authorized to operate and the date of the issuance thereof, and at the same time the Town Clerk shall issue for each vehicle licensed hereunder, a license card bearing the words "Licensed Limousine", an assigned number and the date of expiration of such license, and otherwise such application shall be denied.

Sec. 3.5 In making the findings required by Sec. 3.4 hereof, the Town Clerk shall take into consideration the number of taxicabs already in operation in the Town, particularly in the area in which the applicant proposes to locate his depots and terminals, whether existing transportation is adequate to meet the public needs, the probable effect of additional taxicabs on local traffic conditions and the character, experience and responsibility of the applicant and the adequacy of the service which the applicant proposes to give.

Sec. 3.6 The Town Clerk may in his discretion, before the issuance of a license under this Article, require the applicant and any others having knowledge of the facts to submit to an examination under oath and to produce evidence relating thereto, or hold a hearing upon such application as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 3.7 Every owner licensed under this Article who shall desire to add to the number of taxicabs he is then operating shall file with the Town Clerk a written application under oath stating:

(a) The name and address of the applicant.

(b) The applicant's owner's license number.

(c) Any facts which the applicant believes tend to prove that the pub-

lic convenience and necessity require such addition.

(d) A description of each such additional taxicab including the make, model, passenger seating capacity, year of manufacture, State registration number and identification or serial number.

(e) If the Town Clerk shall find that the addition of such Taxicab or taxicabs is required by the public convenience and necessity, and that the applicant has complied with the requirements of Article III, Section 3.4 hereof, then he shall issue a supplementary owner's license stating the name and address of the applicant, the number of the license medallion assigned to such vehicle and the date of issuance thereof, and at the same time the Town Clerk shall issue for each vehicle licensed hereunder a license card bearing the words "Licensed Taxicab", an assigned number and the date of expiration of such license, otherwise such application shall be denied.

Sec. 3.8 In making the findings required by Sec. 3.7 hereof, the Town Clerk shall take into consideration the matters specified in Sec. 3.4 and Sec. 3.5 hereof, including the sub-divisions thereof.

Sec. 3.9 Any license issued under this Article may be renewed annually for additional periods of one year each from the date of expiration upon the filing of an application containing all the information required by Sec. 3.2 hereof, except the facts with respect to public convenience and necessity which are required by subdivision E thereof, and upon the approval of the Town Clerk pursuant to Section 3.4 and 3.5 except as to the finding of public convenience and necessity.

Sec. 3.10 No license shall be issued or renewed under this Article which shall permit the use of any vehicle as a taxicab or limousine unless and until it has been inspected pursuant to Article XXIII hereof and certified to the Town Clerk as conforming to the provisions of the Article.

Sec. 3.11 Each applicant shall, before the issuance to him of a license under this Article, file with the Town Clerk evidence that he is insured against public liability in the limits of \$10,000 for personal injuries to each person, and \$20,000 for personal injuries for each accident and \$5,000 for property damage which insurance shall be maintained in force during the period covered by the license.

Sec. 3.12 The owner's license issued hereunder shall not be transferable. However, the Town Clerk in his discretion may dispense with the advertising and other conditions required prior to the issuing of an owner's license when an owner already licensed in the Town of Oyster Bay sells a taxicab or taxicabs, limousine or limousines to another who himself has an owner's license in the Town of Oyster Bay. All medallions shall be returned prior to the sale and new medallions will be issued.

Sec. 3.13 Medallions issued hereunder shall not be transferable.

ARTICLE IV
TAXIMETER REQUIRED

Sec. 4.0 All taxicabs operated under the authority of this ordinance shall be equipped with taximeters which shall conform to the specifications set forth in this ordinance and such others as may be adopted from time to time by the Town Board. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate or to allow to be operated any taxicab without such taximeter. In the Town of Oyster Bay after February 28, 1963.

ARTICLE V
TAXIMETER SPECIFICATIONS

Sec. 5.0 Basis of fare calculations: Taximeter shall calculate the fares upon the basis of a combination of mileage traveled and time elapsed. When the taximeter is operative with respect to fare registration, the fare registration mechanism shall be actuated by the mileage mechanism and the fare registering mechanism shall be actuated by the time mechanism.

whenever the taxicab is held at the passenger's instruction. Means shall be provided for the driver of a taxicab to maintain the clock mechanism either operative or inoperative with respect to the fare registering mechanism.

Sec. 5.1 Operating position: It shall be shown on the taximeter's face whether the mechanism is set to operative or inoperative, and if operative, the character of fare registration for which it is set. While the taximeter is cleared, the indication "not registering" or an equivalent expression shall appear. If a taximeter is set to be operative, the indication "registering" or equivalent expression shall appear.

Sec. 5.2 Accumulated fare: The fare indication shall be identified by the word "fare" or by an equivalent expression. Values shall be defined by monetary signs.

Sec. 5.3 Extras: The registration of charges for extras shall be shown as a separate item and shall not be included in the fare registration. These charges shall be identified by the word "extras" or by an equivalent expression. Values shall be defined by monetary signs.

Sec. 5.4 Protection of indications: Indications shall be displayed through an entirely protected glass or plastic face securely attached to the metal housing of the taximeter.

Sec. 5.5 Visibility of indications: Indications of fare and extras shall never be obscured or covered except when a taximeter is cleared.

Sec. 5.6 Flag: A flag shall be provided. The position of the flag and its associated lever arm shall be mechanically defined, and displacement from any one of the positions shall be sufficiently obstructed so that the accidental or inadvertent changing of the operating condition of the taximeter is improbable. The flag shall be at its highest position when the taximeter is cleared, and in this position, the whole of the flag shall be above the level of the taximeter housing. Possible movement of the flag to an operating position immediately following its movement to the cleared position shall automatically be delayed enough to permit the taximeter mechanism to come to complete rest in the cleared position.

Sec. 5.7 Control for extras registration: The knob, handle or other mechanism shall be inoperative whenever the taximeter is cleared.

Sec. 5.8 Permanence: Whenever wear or deformation of ratchets, pawls and similar combinations will affect the accuracy or consistency of indication of a taximeter, such parts shall be of such material and hardness that wear or deformation resulting from use will be reduced to the practicable minimum.

Sec. 5.9 Sealing: Adequate provision shall be made for affixing lead and wire seals to a taximeter and to other parts required for service operation of the complete installation on a taxicab, so that no adjustments, alterations or replacements affecting in any way the indications, rates or accuracy of the taximeter can be made without mutilating the seal or seals.

Sec. 5.10 Position and Illumination: When mounted upon a taxicab, a taximeter shall be so placed that its face is in plain view of any passenger seated on a rear seat of the cab, and shall be so placed that the flag shall be visible from the sidewalk when the flag is in the "for hire" position. Its face shall be artificially illuminated after sundown so that it is clearly visible to rear seat passengers.

ARTICLE VI
TAXIMETER INSPECTION

Sec. 6.0 All taximeters shall be subject to inspection from time to time by the Taxicab Inspector. It shall be the duty of the said Taxicab Inspector to inspect, test, and seal every taximeter at least once every six months calculated from the date of licensing or last inspection. Said taximeters shall be sealed at all points and connections which, if misadjusted, would affect their correct reading and record.

Sec. 6.0 All taximeters shall be subject to inspection from time to time by the Taxicab Inspector.

The Taxicab Inspector shall keep a record of the identification of every taxicab, meter number and date of inspection thereof in his office. A fee of \$1.00 shall be charged for each inspection. No taximeter which is inaccurate in registration in excess of 3% shall be allowed to operate in any taxicab, and when an inaccuracy in excess of 3% is discovered, the taxicab involved shall immediately cease operation and be kept off the highways until the meter is repaired and in proper working condition. It shall be the duty of said Taxicab Inspector to make an immediate inspection of any taximeter when complaint is received that the said taximeter is registering incorrectly or not in accordance with the rate posted in the taxicab and set forth in this ordinance. In the event a change of rates is made, the taximeter shall be adjusted to the new rates and the taximeter shall be immediately inspected, tested and sealed by the said Taxicab Inspector.

ARTICLE VII TAXIMETER OPERATION

Sec. 7.1 Each taximeter shall have thereon a flag to denote when the taxicab is employed and when it is not employed. It shall be the duty of the driver, when the taxicab is in service, to throw the flag of the taximeter into registering position. Upon the completion of the service by the taxicab it shall be the duty of the driver to call the attention of the passenger to the amount registered, to raise the flag so that the taximeter shall be returned to the non-registering position and its dial cleared. It shall be unlawful for any driver operating a taxicab to throw the flag of a taximeter into a registering position when such vehicle is not actually employed, or to throw or maintain the flag in a non-registering position when such vehicle is employed. It shall be unlawful for any driver of a taxicab to display the flag of the taximeter in such position as to denote that he is employed at a rate of fare different from that authorized under the provisions of this ordinance. It shall be unlawful for any driver of a taxicab to tamper with or alter in any manner the taximeter on such taxicab.

Sec. 7.2 Each taximeter must be furnished with a tamper-proof switch and system of electrical distribution so that when the taximeter flag is in the vacant or non-earning position, the vacant sign on the top of the taxicab will be lighted and when the meter flag is thrown to an earning position, the fare indicator on the taximeter will be lighted.

ARTICLE VIII LICENSE REQUIRED

Sec. 8.0 It shall be unlawful for anyone to conduct the business of repair, or installation of taximeters in the Town of Oyster Bay without first obtaining a license therefrom from the Town Clerk.

Sec. 8.1 Applicant shall file with the Town Clerk a written application in duplicate upon the form to be furnished by the Town Clerk verified under oath stating:

(A) The name and address of the applicant, specifying in the case of any unincorporated association the names and addresses of each member thereof, and in the case of any corporation the names and addresses of each officer, director and stockholder thereof.

(B) A complete statement by the applicant, specifying the amount of all unpaid judgments against the applicant and the nature of the transaction or acts giving rise to said judgments and the name and location of the court in which and the date on which each was entered.

(C) All offenses, misdemeanors or felonies of which the applicant and any member thereof, if an unincorporated association, and any officer, director, and stockholder thereof, if a corporation, has been convicted, stating the name and location of the court in which and the date on which such convictions were held and the penalties imposed therefor.

(D) The experience of the applicant and each member thereof,

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If an unincorporated association, and each officer, director and stockholder thereof, if a corporation, in the transportation of passengers.

(E) Any other relevant information which the Town Clerk may require.

(F) It shall be unlawful to conduct the business of taximeter repair, or installation, in other than a properly zoned location which provides adequate off-street parking.

ARTICLE IX REGULATIONS FOR TAXIMETER ESTABLISHMENTS

Sec. 9.0 General Provisions:

(A) License must be conspicuously displayed in the premises and must be visible at all times.

(B) When a fraudulent meter or any meter so constructed or installed as to be in violation of this ordinance is presented for repair or adjustment, the licensee of the taximeter establishment or its agent shall immediately notify the Town Clerk.

(C) The Town Clerk will furnish a taximeter repair report book to each licensee. Entries must be made in legible English, with ink, when installation or repair is completed. If any books or records are lost or stolen, the Town Clerk must be notified immediately.

(D) An approval stamp must accompany the taximeter and both shall be delivered to the Taxicab Inspector.

(E) The stamp will be pasted on the face of the meter, on the inside of the glass so as to be clearly discernible from the outside, but not to obstruct the meter readings. NO OTHER PASTER OR POSTER SHALL APPEAR ON THE FACE OF THE METER EXCEPT THOSE AUTHORIZED BY THE TOWN CLERK.

(F) The taximeter, cable and switch must be properly wired and seal installed upon completion of the repairs. The seals will be provided by the taxicab inspector assigned to that duty.

(G) A permanent daily record of all repairs to, or replacements of, taximeter, cable, or appurtenances shall be kept in a book, written in ink, in legible English at the time repairs are made. This record shall be available for inspection by the Town Clerk and the taxicab inspector at all reasonable hours and shall include the following:

- (1) Date of repair.
- (2) Repair report number.
- (3) Name of owner.
- (4) Address of owner.
- (5) The State registration number of vehicle.
- (6) Make of meter.
- (7) Number of meter.
- (8) Description of repairs made (including repair or replacement of cable or appurtenances.)

(H) All taximeters purchased or sold by licensee shall be recorded. A report, in writing, of such transactions shall be forwarded without delay to the Town Clerk.

ARTICLE X RATES OF HIRE - RATE CARD REQUIRED

Sec. 10.0 No owner or driver of a taxicab shall charge any sum for the use of a taxicab other than in accordance with the following rates:

(A) Mileage rates: Thirty-five cents (35¢) for first 1/3 of a mile, ten cents (10¢) for each additional 1/4 of a mile.

(B) Doubling fares: The first person or persons to hire a vehicle shall have exclusive rights to it, and no driver shall take of additional passengers. However, the hiring passenger may, in his discretion, pick up friends or acquaintances, and such action shall not be the concern of the driver. Each such additional passenger will be at an additional charge of 25¢ which charge will be shown on the meter as an extra.

(C) There shall be no charge for children under seven years of age traveling with an adult.

(D) Waiting time: Ten cents (10¢) for each 2 minutes of waiting time or fraction thereof.

(E) Trunks: Fifty cents (50¢) for each, which charge shall be shown on the meter.

(F) Hand Baggage: There will be no charge for hand baggage up to

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two pieces for each passenger and a charge of twenty-five cents (25¢) for each additional piece of hand baggage exceeding two (2), which charge shall be shown on the meter.

(G) Service charge: There shall be a charge of twenty-five cents (25¢) for all requests for taxicab service made by telephone.

(H) Every taxicab operated under this ordinance shall have a rate card setting forth the authorized rates of hire displayed in such a place as to be in view of all passengers.

ARTICLE XI RECEIPTS

Sec. (11.0) The driver of any taxicab shall, upon demand by the passenger, render to such passenger a receipt for the amount charged, either by a mechanically printed receipt or by a specially prepared receipt supplied by the owner and approved by the Town Clerk on which shall be the name of the owner.

ARTICLE XII RATE, FARE AND FEE REVIEW

Sec. (12.0) Rates, fares and fees may be reviewed periodically by the Town Clerk, but they must be reviewed by the Town Clerk at least once in every five years beginning with the effective date of this ordinance. All changes of rates, fares and fees shall be subject to the final approval of the Town Board.

ARTICLE XIII CRUISING PERMITTED

Sec. (13.0) Cruising shall be permitted by taxicabs in the Town of Oyster Bay except in those areas of the Town of Oyster Bay as designated from time to time by the Town Clerk as non-cruising areas.

Sec. (13.1) Cruising shall not be at a speed which will unreasonably interfere with or impede traffic.

ARTICLE XIV SOLICITATION OF OTHER COMMON CARRIER PASSENGERS PROHIBITED

Sec. (14.0) No driver, owner or operator shall solicit passengers at any intermediate points along any established route of any other common carrier.

Sec. (14.1) Limousines, as defined under this ordinance, will not be permitted to use the taximeter or to be governed by the metered rate.

ARTICLE XV DRIVER'S LICENSE

Sec. (15.0) (A) No person shall operate any taxicab or limousine upon the public highways of the Town without having first obtained and having then in his possession a New York State chauffeur's license and a driver's license, issued as hereinafter provided.

(B) No person shall operate a taxicab or limousine on the public highways of the Town of Oyster Bay unless such taxicab or limousine shall be duly licensed as herein provided.

Sec. (15.1) Every driver's license issued under this article shall be issued as of the date of the granting thereof and shall expire on the last day of February next succeeding unless sooner suspended or revoked.

Sec. (15.2) Every person desiring to drive a taxicab or limousine for hire upon the streets of the Town shall file in duplicate an application for a license so to drive with the Town Clerk, which application shall be in writing upon forms to be furnished by the Town Clerk and verified under oath and shall state:

(A) The name and address and age of the applicant.

(B) A full description of the applicant including his height, weight, color of eyes and hair, any scars or marks and the nature of any physical infirmity from which he may suffer.

(C) Recommendation by two residents of Nassau County, not related to the applicant, who have known the applicant for a period of one year or more and who will vouch for the applicant's sobriety, honesty and general good character.

(D) Whether or not he is a citizen of the United States.

(E) The names and addresses of the applicant's employers during the last ten years prior to his application.

(F) All violations of any traffic

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law, ordinance or regulation for which the applicant has been arrested or convicted within 18 months prior to the date of the application and all crimes for which the applicant has ever been arrested or convicted, stating the date and place of each such arrest and the name and location of the Court in which and the date on which each such conviction was had and the penalty imposed therefor.

(C) The number and date of expiration of the applicant's New York chauffeur's license.

(D) Whether or not any operator's or chauffeur's license held by the applicant has ever been revoked or suspended by the State of New York or any other State, and if so, by what court or other authority, on what date, for what cause, and if suspended the period of such suspension.

(E) Any other relevant information which the Town Clerk may require.

Sec. (15.3) Every applicant for a driver's license shall, at the time of submitting his application, also:

(A) Submit two individual photographs of the applicant taken within thirty days prior to the date of the application, 1 1/2" x 1 1/2" in size and such pictures must be a true likeness of the applicant and must show every neck, shoulders and uncovered head.

(B) Submit a certificate from a physician, duly licensed to practice in the State of New York, certifying that, in his opinion, the applicant is not afflicted with any physical or mental disease or infirmity which might make him an unsafe or unsatisfactory driver.

(C) Exhibit his current New York State chauffeur's license for inspection.

(D) Be fingerprinted under the direction and supervision of the Town Clerk.

Sec. (15.4) Upon the receipt of any application, the Town Clerk shall refer the same to the Nassau County Police Department for such investigation as it shall deem necessary or desirable and report thereon.

Sec. (15.5) Upon the receipt of the report provided for in this Article, the Town Clerk shall issue a taxicab or limousine driver's license to the applicant if he shall find that the applicant holds a New York State chauffeur's license and is a fit and proper person to drive such vehicle considering his age, experience, police and accident records, character and driving ability, otherwise such application shall be denied.

Sec. (15.6) At the time of issuance of such license the Town Clerk shall also furnish to the applicant a numbered badge, which must be conspicuously displayed on the outer clothing in the hollow of the left shoulder of each licensed driver. Such badge shall be returned to the Town Clerk upon suspension or revocation of the taxicab or limousine driver's license.

Sec. (15.7) The driver's license issued hereunder shall not be transferable.

ARTICLE XVI APPLICATIONS TO TOWN BOARD

Sec. (16.0) Any applicant who shall have been denied a license under this ordinance may apply to the Town Board for a review of the action of the Town Clerk as hereinafter provided:

(A) Such application to the Town Board shall be in writing, signed and acknowledged by the applicant and shall state the ground or grounds on which the applicant claims that the determination of the Town Clerk was erroneous.

(B) Such application shall be filed with the Town Clerk by the applicant within twenty days after notice of denial of his application by the Town Clerk has been mailed to him or delivered to him in person.

(C) Upon the filing of such application, the Town Board shall hold a hearing thereon pursuant to the provision of Article XVII hereof.

(D) At such hearing the Town Board shall consider the applicant's application upon the record before the Town Clerk in connection with the Town Clerk's consideration thereof and in its discretion may receive new or addi-

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tional evidence in support thereof or in opposition thereto.

Sec. (16.1) The Town Board after such hearing may affirm the action of the Town Clerk or direct the Town Clerk to issue a proper license, pursuant to this ordinance.

ARTICLE XVII HEARINGS

Sec. (17.0) Whenever it shall be provided herein that a hearing shall or may be held by the Town Board with respect to any matter:

(A) Such hearings shall be held on a date and at a place and hour designated by the Town Board.

(B) The Town Clerk shall give notice thereof, stating the name and address of the applicant or licensee holder concerned, the subject matter of the hearing and the date, place and hour thereof designated therefor by mailing a copy thereof to the applicant or licensee holder concerned at the address shown upon the most recent application of such applicant or licensee, at least ten (10) days before such hearing.

(C) In the case of a public hearing, the notice required in paragraph (B) of this Section shall also be published at least once a week for two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the Town of Oyster Bay, the first publication to be at least ten days before the date fixed for such public hearing.

(D) The applicant or licensee holder involved shall be entitled to be represented by legal counsel and to present such competent and material testimony or other evidence in his own behalf as may be relevant to the subject matter of the hearing.

(E) All witnesses shall be sworn and examined under oath.

ARTICLE XVIII ISSUANCES OF LICENSES

Sec. (18.0) The fees for filing applications hereunder which shall be paid to the Town Clerk at the time the application is filed shall not be refundable and shall be:

(A) For each taxicab or limousine owner's license \$20.00

(B) For each taxicab or limousine owner's supplementary license \$10.00

(C) For each vehicle licensed as a taxicab or limousine \$10.00

(D) For each taxicab or limousine driver's license \$2.

(E) The relocation and addition of any terminals, within the Town of Oyster Bay \$10.

(F) For each taxicab or limousine substituted \$4.

(G) For replacement of a license \$10.

(H) For the replacement of each driver's license or badge \$2.

(I) For replacement of each taxicab or limousine license card \$2.

(J) For taximeter repair establishment \$100.

Upon the filing of any application under this article, and payment of the required fee, the Town Clerk shall issue the same if he shall determine from his investigation and from the statements contained in the application that the applicant is a proper and qualified person, and that the said applicant in all respects conforms to the provisions of this Ordinance and the rules and regulations adopted under said ordinance.

Sec. 18.1 Every license issued hereunder shall be signed at the direction and in the name of the Town Clerk and sealed with the seal of the Town of Oyster Bay.

Sec. 18.2 The Town Clerk shall keep a record of the name and address of each person to whom a taxicab or limousine owner's license has been issued under this ordinance, showing the date and number of such license and all renewals, suspensions and revocations thereof, and a record of each taxicab or limousine licensed hereunder, stating the make, model, passenger seating capacity, year of manufacture, New York State registration number, and identification or serial number thereof, and the name and address of the person owning said taxicab or limousine, and a record of each driver's license issued hereunder showing the name and address of such driver, his New York chauffeur's license.

Sec. 21.0 It shall be unlawful for the owner or the operator of any limousine to solicit business on the streets of the Town of Oyster Bay, at any taxicab stand, or at public transportation station. All limousines when not actually hired, shall be kept at the permanent operating location designated with the Town Clerk.

ARTICLE XXII
PERMANENT OPERATING
LOCATION: REGISTRATION;
CHANGES OF LOCATION

Sec. 22.0 The owner of more than one motor vehicle which is for hire within the Town of Oyster Bay, shall have a permanent operating location or terminal within the Town of Oyster Bay for such motor vehicle when such motor vehicle is not actually in operation.

A sign shall be displayed at such location advising the public that such location is the permanent operating location or terminal of the company and designating the kind of business carried on at such location. Such operating location, or terminal shall be registered by

the owner of the motor vehicle with the Town Clerk and the owner shall notify the Town Clerk of any change in the operating location or terminal of the motor vehicle. Such location shall be in a proper zone area and shall be sufficient to accommodate all vehicles for hire assigned to such location.

ARTICLE XXIII
CONDITION AND INSPECTION OF
TAXICABS

Sec. 23.0 Every vehicle operated upon the street of the Town as a taxicab or limousine shall be kept clean, sanitary, fit and of good appearance, and in a safe condition for the transportation of passengers.

Sec. 23.1 The Town Board shall establish reasonable rules and regulations for the inspection of taxicabs and limousines operated upon the streets of the Town.

ARTICLE XXIV
PENALTIES

Sec. 24.0 The violation of any provision of this ordinance shall be an offense against the ordinance, which shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$100 or imprisonment for a period of not exceeding twenty (20) days for each such offense, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

In addition, the licensee shall be liable to suspension or revocation of an license hereunder held by him.

ARTICLE XXV
RULES AND REGULATIONS

Sec. 25.0 The Town Clerk shall from time to time promulgate such rules and regulations as he deems necessary, not inconsistent with the terms of this ordinance.

ARTICLE XXVI
SEVERABILITY AND EFFECTIVE

Sec. 26.0 If any clause, sentence, section, paragraph or provision of this Ordinance shall be adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder of this Ordinance, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, section, paragraph or provision directly involved in the controversy in which said judgment shall have been rendered.

Sec. 26.1 This Ordinance shall take effect as of March 1, 1963. The original Ordinance to regulate the operation of Taxicabs in the Town of Oyster Bay adopted by the Town Board on December 29, 1959 and amended December 27, 1960 be and the same is hereby repealed as of 11:59 P.M., February 28, 1963.

AMERICA - KNOW JOHN BIRCH!

THE JOHN BIRCH SOCIETY is named in honor of one of the greatest young men that America has produced.

John Birch was a Christian missionary, from a farm near Macon, Georgia, who was in China when we entered World War II. His heroism, accomplishments, and nobility of character were to make of him a legend which the Communists could not allow to live.

On July 4, 1942, John Birch officially joined General Chiang Kai-shek's forces in Chungking as a volunteer. He organized Chen's intelligence service, rose to the rank of Captain in the United States Army, and served with unsurpassable bravery and brilliance throughout the war. He was frequently referred to, by both his associates and superiors, as the most important single man in our forces struggling against the Japanese in China.

Ten days after V-J day, while in uniform, on a peaceful and official mission for our government, John Birch was brutally murdered in cold blood by our "allies," the Chinese Communists. This was on August 23, 1945. He then became probably the first American casualty in that third World War, between the Communists and the ever-shrinking "free-world," which is still being waged against us seventeen years later; a relentless war of which there is no end in sight.

You had probably never heard of John Birch before our Society came into the limelight. This is simply because the Communists in Washington planned it that way. It took five years of persistent and determined effort on the part of his parents, aided by Senator Knowland and many other good patriots, to pierce the blanket of oblivion which had been so brazenly thrown over his life and death by Communist sympathizers in our government. As the *Saturday Evening Post* pointed out, in a long editorial on January 22, 1955, based on *The Life of John Birch*: "Amazingly, there were in Washington responsible officials who were

willful to suppress news of the murder of an American officer, apparently to prevent the American people from rising in their wrath and vetoing further appeasement of communism."

John Birch was killed by typical Communist tactics, as a part of typical Communist strategy, in a typical Communist-style war — a continuous undeclared war in which our enemies observe no rules of international law, of civilization, or of human decency. He commanded no armies, headed no government, converted no nations to his creed. His impact would have been of transient memory and comparatively small importance, had not that impact occurred at a time and in a way to supply particulars from which momentous generalizations can properly be projected. With his death and in his death the battle lines were drawn, in a struggle from which either Communism or Christian-style civilization must emerge with one completely triumphant and the other completely destroyed.

Partly for these reasons, but even more because John Birch — in all of his short but outstanding career — so typified the best of America, we have named our organization in his memory. If we rediscover some of our sounder spiritual values in the example of his life, recharge our determination from the spark of his courage, and learn essential truths about our enemy from the lesson of his murder, then his death at twenty-six ceases to be a tragedy. For in a full lifetime he could not have accomplished more.
