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Includes Silence, Anthem:

School Bd. Adopts 3-Part Ritual

The 13,000 public school students of Hicksville today have a three-part ritual to follow each class day, including the singing of the fourth stanza of the Star Spangled Banner and a moment of silence. The School Board adopted an opening exercise, Friday night, following receipt of Education Commissioner Allen's ruling on the "prayer issue."

Board member George Kunz proposed the following resolution which was unanimously adopted:

"(1) That each school day shall begin with the voluntary recitation by teachers and students of the Pledge of Allegiance to our beloved flag of the United States of America.

"(2) That a period of silent meditation be set aside at the beginning of each school day to be spent in silent prayer or meditation according to the beliefs or desires of the individual pupils.

"(3) That immediately following all classes shall sing a verse or

verses from our National Anthem, The Star Spangled Banner."

School Superintendent Donald F. Ait announced yesterday that he has decided that the third part of this program shall be the first and last stanzas of the Star Spangled Banner.

The last stanza includes the four lines which had previously been designated as a "prayer" which may be used in Hicksville schools in its decision of June 29.

There were indications during the week that the School Board may have a formal statement for the community regarding the decision of Commissioner Allen.

Great Neck Sets New State Record at Drill

Fair skies favored the 34th annual Hicksville Fire Dept. Labor Day firemen's parade and drill, Monday, when the perennial winners -- the Oyster Bay Rough Riders -- captured first place in four out of seven events to take home top honors. An estimated 10,000 persons saw the competitions at Mid Island Plaza.

Great Neck set a new state record of 6.6 seconds in the pumper event and accumulated 19 points during the day and second place. Oyster Bay garnered 23, Elmont was third with 15 points.

James Taxter, chairman of the Labor Day event, was grand marshal of the parade which numbered 3,141 persons with 175 pieces of fire apparatus. There were 1,825 volunteer firemen in the parade and 213 members of ladies auxiliary units.

The six divisional marshals were Ex-Chiefs Charles Sauer, B. Medard, O'Connell, Walter Wertheissen, Harry Borley, John Lockie and Vincent Braun.

Participants included the Levittown, Penna., fire dept which won a trophy for the best appearing unit from outside of Long Island. It was their first attendance at the Hicksville event.

Other long-distant companies came from Pennfield, outside Rochester; Matnydale and Thornwood. Parade winners were: best appearing unit over 50 men, Freeport; best appearing under 50 men, North Merrick; most men in line, Levittown; Best drum corps, Roosevelt; best band, Freeport; best ladies unit over 50 members, Wadsworth and best under 50, East Meadow.

A new leg trophy was won for the first time by North Merrick as the best appearing unit with the most men in line based on percentage of the total unit.

Designate United States Week

Hicksville Board of Education designated the fourth week in October as a "United States Week" to be observed annually "as a means of instilling in the youth of Hicksville School District a deeper appreciation of the magnificent heritage of the US and the freedoms for which it stands, as well as stimulating students to take more interest in the study of the history and traditions of the United States."

The actual details of the observance will be left to the school administrators.

The resolution to establish this policy was offered by William A. Bruno Jr., who had first proposed the program in July. It was adopted Friday night by the Board unanimously.

In other action at the Board meeting, the first since Aug. 10, the School Trustees approved the installation of \$905 worth of outside lighting at East St. School in response to complaints of vandalism at the school building.

Board President Jerome Zettler appointed Cornelius McCormack as board liaison to the Council of Parent Teacher Assoc. Approved the hire of School

Architects Knappe & Johnson and Industrial Appraisal Co to appraise school buildings and contents to determine current assessable values.

Postponed upon the recommendation of School Attorney Joseph Catalano, of a schedule conference with the Library Trustees regarding a proposed referendum on an addition to the public library pending the clarification of certain technical questions by the State Education Dept.

The next regular meeting of the School Board is set for Friday night, Sept. 14, at the Senior High School.

The Board heard a report that various construction projects in the District are behind schedule as of Aug. 27 (according to Building Consultant Robert Petross) as follows: Senior High Addition, 17 working days; Willet Ave. School, 26 days; Junior Addition, 18 days and East St Addition, 18 days.

The Junior High Addition was expected to be ready for classroom use on the first day of school, Sept. 6.

Sign Up Adults For Fall Classes

Registration for the Hicksville Adult Education fall semester will take place in the cafeteria of the Hicksville High School on Division Ave. between 7:30 and 9:30 P.M., Monday through Thursday, for two weeks starting on Monday, Sept. 17th. Classes will start on Monday, Oct. 1.

The Adult Education program will include a large variety of occupational extension courses in the fields of Auto Mechanics, Secretarial, Management, and Blue Print Reading. These and others are designed to assist those seeking job advancement opportunities.

A special preparatory course for the High School Equivalency Test, for those who did not complete their formal high school education, will be included in the program. There will also be an opportunity to take courses leading toward the New York State Regents Diploma.

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Summer Thunderstorm Back in 1868 Started Talk and Fire Department

(Editor's Note - This article, the seventh in a series, commemorates the birth of Hicksville's volunteer fire fighting organization as written by William Quaritus in 1919 for the Long Islander.

(Sixty years ago in 1902 Hicksville Fire District was organized with its Board of Commissioners to provide tax funds to equip the volunteers. Before that all funds were raised by contributions, tag days, carnivals and other benefits.

(Sixty-nine years ago in 1893, the Fire Dept was organized, bringing together various fire companies under one chief. The first fire company, Hook and Ladder, had been organized in 1869.)

In the summer of 1868 a thunderstorm spent its fury in the village of Hicksville and lightning played hide and seek in many places until finally it struck the barn on the Rohrbach place on Old Country Road near the Rail Road station. The out-buildings were consumed.

For many days and nights thereafter the formation of a fire department was discussed in Berger's Brewery, the delanguillette general store, the Herzog general store, the Grand Central Hotel, then run by a Mr. Hendrickson, and also at H. Hahn's store.

Things seemed to be at a standstill for several years. The next event in the fire dept history was an exhibition of a Balcock fire extinguisher at the rear of the delanguillette's store. Of course the boys of the town were present and also many of Hicksville's leading citizens.

The company were noted: F. Herzog, E. H. delanguillette, William Kluebe, Jacob Christ, H. Hahn, John Quaritus, E. Liebk, C. G.

Voigt, C. Recht Sr., D. Wetterau, A. Heitz, Mr. O'Hara, F. Becker, Tom Kyle, Wallace Wallenbush, L. Koch, Mr. O'Brien, N. Hoberst, A. Parke, Mr. Rohrbach, C. Wolferts, Mr. McGinnigle, Jack Dexheimer, Messers Duffy and Molloy, J. Tropps and William Freytag, and also a colored man known far and near as "Nigger Pete" (Editor's Note - We'll have a special article about "Nigger Pete" in a subsequent issue).

Well, that extinguisher worked so well Hicksville had to have one for years it occupied a place in the Grand Central Hotel.

FIRST FIRE TRUCK

Later came the Hook and Ladder truck and the boys of the town thought it was the "grandest affair" they ever saw. It was the creation of Jacob Christ Sr. and David Christ.

It had many buckets suspended from it and it was decorated in red and gold, while the brass work was all shining. To it was hitched the best team in the village, driven and owned by delanguillette. There was also a mascot, the same being "Nigger", a little Spitz dog owned by the man who drove the team. The truck was driven over Broadway several times, between Mr. Hahn's store on the north and to Limberg's corner on the south.

There were toasts to the little apparatus at every corner and none were of sparkling water, for prohibition wasn't in power then. There was a fire after a while at the Waltrouther's place, but lack of water kept the firemen from helping to save the building.

After another rest period Hicksville began to "welcome strangers within its gates" and the village grew and spread out, as very soon it was possible to secure a chemical

engin of capacity and power and the folks "jest wanted to see how it worked", so a big bonfire was built and that engine just knew how to put the fire out of business and did it. Great was the crowd, loud was the praise and strong were the toasts.

FORGIE BUILDING BURNS

Some time afterward "Fire! Fire! Fire!" rang out the cries and the boys with their apparatus, went to the burning Forgie building in which place Mr. McAlister now resides. The firemen saved the building and went home to talk about it and strange to say every man was sure he had been the conqueror. Corbett's place had a defective flue and a blaze found lodging place between the partitions, but again the firemen were victorious.

Soon afterward Mr. delanguillette allowed the firemen to build a little place on his land near the present firehouse in which to house the chemical engine. It was a cute little building about the size of a modest garage, it had a hip roof and a little tower finished with a flagpole. The manager of the Corbett estate was so thankful for the good work of the firemen a short time before that he donated a bell for the tower. William Quaritus has a photograph of the modest little structure (copy of it with this article) presented to him by Mrs. J. H. Hahn who was a daughter of E. H. delanguillette.

When the little building was completed the late Charles H. Voigt lettered on the front in a very neat style, "Chemical Engine Co., No. 1."

One fire worthy of mention must not be omitted. It must be remembered that these firemen were not paid fighters -- just volunteers -- but most any night they were gathered together at the Grand Central. One cold winter's night, when the mercury seemed anxious to stay around zero, and the wind whistled, the alarm of fire was given. The southeaster sky was aglow. The gallant firemen thought not of freezing weather, but of Manager Kloenn's words, "Hurry up, boys, some lives may depend upon it."

Little Chemical Engine Co. No. 1 sped down Broadway, turned Old Country Road corner, crossed the railroad tracks and bumped over rough, hard roads. After a while the scene of destruction was reached and burning quickly was only a keep of kill-a-calf roots and other

brush, it would take more than one issue of the Long Islander to complete a record of all the deeds of those brave men, so we leave it to the reader to guess.

Winters have come and gone, old faces passed away and strangers have filled their places, horses no longer hasten fire apparatus to the scenes of conflagrations for motive power is used instead,

but the spirit of Hicksville's fire fighters is as strong as ever, and they heed every cry of those who are being driven out of their homes by the fire fiend. Hicksville is proud of her firemen, their firehouse, apparatus and courage. The Hicksville Fire Dept. today is one of the finest on the island.

A Word About Today's Fire Dept.

Hicksville's present day Fire Dept is the latest word in modern equipment. Walter Telender is chief of seven companies of volunteer. Equipment has been standardized to cab forward Macks for the most part. It includes two aerial hook and ladder trucks, high pressure pumpers, flood lighting and emergency electrical supply, an ambulance and chief's car, all in two-way radio contact with main headquarters on Marie St., scene of the first firehouse. One company is housed in its own building on Woodbury Rd at Briggs St. and two other companies occupy a firehouse on Strong St. off W. John St.

All the equipment, the men in uniform and the ladies' auxiliary will lead the big Labor Day firemen's parade in Hicksville, as they have for 34 years, next Monday morning starting at about 9 o'clock.

The Fire Dept. ambulance which answers an average of two calls a week was acquired by contributions of residents to a community committee headed by Herbert Johnsen and Jerome Zettler. A proposal to appropriate \$15,000 for a new ambulance to replace the original vehicle came before District voters together with the annual budget on Tuesday night, Sept. 4. Thirty five persons voted approval of the budget and all five special propositions.

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Hook and Ladder Accident

When the fire truck had been in the possession of Hook and Ladder Co., about a year, while on the way to the Jericho store fire in 1894, the rear axle of the truck broke in two causing nearly all the members of the company, who were seated on the truck, which was being hauled by a team of horses, to be thrown. Two of them received broken legs, August Peters and Nicholas Schmitt. Since then the old truck has been in continuous service, but with age has become unsafe.

In 1912, a number of the ladies of the village wishing to be of some assistance to the firemen, met and organized into a ladies' auxiliary of the dept and have grown in strength and proposed and have in several instances proved of great assistance to the dept.

In 1914 through the Board of Fire Commissioners, an electric fire siren was installed and a call number system established which is known and understood by every resident, even the little children. This alarm, which can be plainly heard for a radius of ten miles, replaced the old-fashioned bell and locomotive.



SECOND FIREHOUSE was built at a cost of \$6,000 and dedicated on May 30, 1906. It was replaced with the modern brick building dedicated Jan 2, 1932. The frame building was sold, lifted off its foundation and moved to the south side of E Marie St. and converted into a bar and meeting hall.

Library Corner

The phenomenal popularity and success of Dr. Benjamin Spock's COMMONSENSE BOOK OF BABY AND CHILD CARE indicates the tremendous surge of interest on the part of parents in accurate and practical information about child rearing. In many households this book is indispensable as a guide to the baby's early development.

There are, however, a large number of other excellent works at the Hicksville Public Library to help parents to understand as well as to meet many of the problems and challenges of parenthood. One of the most important of these is the comprehensive series of the Gesell Institute of Child Development and the Yale Clinic of Child

Development. Some of the individual titles are THE CHILD FROM FIVE TO TEN and YOUTH: THE YEARS FROM TEN TO SIXTEEN BY Gesell and Ilg and THE FIRST FIVE YEARS OF LIFE BY Arnold Gesell. These attempt to give descriptions of typical child behavior at various age levels and can prove useful if the reader will bear in mind that his or her youngster need not develop exactly according to these outlines in order to be normal and healthy. Elizabeth Hurlock's CHILD DEVELOPMENT and Lawrence G. Stone's CHILDHOOD AND ADOLESCENCE are examples of two other surveys which cover the normal child from conception to adolescence.

Books on the early years include Dr. Spock's pictorial record of the first years in a baby's life in a home with older children, called A BABY'S FIRST YEAR, Samuel Wishik's FEEDING YOUR CHILD provides detailed information on the diet of infants and pre-schoolers, and ALL CHILDREN WANT TO LEARN by Lorene Fox describes toys, equipment and planned creative play for young children.

Glady's Jenkins' THESE ARE YOUR CHILDREN and Mary and Lawrence Frank's HOW TO HELP YOUR CHILD IN SCHOOL are examples of the material available on school age children.

For the turbulent years of adolescence, there are Dorothy Baruch's HOW TO LIVE WITH YOUR TEENAGER a concise, well written guide and Jerrold's THE PSYCHOLOGY OF ADOLESCENCE which again gives a picture of the normal development at this period, while stressing the need for adolescent self-understanding. UNDERSTANDING YOUR PARENTS by Ernest G. Osborne turns the tables, in that it was written for adolescents, but should prove useful to parents seeking to understand their own motives and drives at this time in their children's lives.

The preceding titles represent but a small selection of the books on children available at your library. There are, in addition, a number of excellent pamphlets published by the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare's Children's Bureau, the Department of Child Development of the New York State College of Home Economics and by many other sources, which are available in our pamphlet file.
