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# Herald Editorial Opinion:

## Sloppy Reporting and Sloppy Thinking

Since July the Hicksville Board of Education has been developing a plan for the evaluation of text books being used or planned to be used in the local school system. This step is definitely the powers and duty of the Board of Education.

"To prescribe the text-books to be used in the schools, and to compel a uniformity in the use of the same, pursuant to the provisions of this chapter..."

After numerous conferences and sessions devoted to the text book question the Administration developed a plan which has been unanimously adopted by

the School Board. The plan puts the responsibility for recommendation of text books upon the school Administration within certain guidelines.

Now, four months later, a Garden City newspaper suddenly discovered Hicksville has a text book evaluation program and goes off frothing at the mouth editorially this week. As a responsible publication, the very least Newsday could have done was to establish the facts either by coverage of Board of Education meetings or by checking with authoritative sources.

If, as Newsday claims editorially, "The Hicksville School Board seems constantly to be embroiled in issues..." The appearance of embroilment stems from Newsday's own sloppy and inaccurate reporting. That county newspaper has never been considered a friend of Hicksville, whether it be in the matter of sports coverage or in any other field of activity.

We don't need them. However, the irresponsible holding up of our community and its institutions for ridicule and scorn is unpardonable.

## Pynchon Stimulates GOP Campaign

Oyster Bay Town Highway Superintendent Thomas R. Pynchon of East Norwich, former chairman of the Oyster Bay Republican Committee, gave a stimulating and aggressive boost to the GOP campaign, last Thursday night at a dinner for 400 Committeemen and their guests at the Holiday Manor.

Before Judge John P. Lomenzo of Rochester, candidate for State Comptroller, was the principal speaker of the evening. The event which marked the publication of a fund-raising journal by the Oyster Bay Town Committee became a testimonial to the Republican Committeemen. Town Chairman C. Bruce Pearsall, noting it was his second appearance before the full committee since taking office, declared he was proud of the job performed by the committeemen. He introduced the candidates present at the gathering.

Pynchon referred to the commit-

teemen as the "footsoldiers of politics" and called the dinner "a testimonial to your diligence, to your faith and your faithfulness, to your devotion to duty and your determination that there shall be an even greater tomorrow for our party."

He noted that the town committee today numbers 340, whereas there were but 68 members 15 years ago.

He said that the County under the leadership of Assembly Speaker Joseph Carlino reflects new drive and that impetus has been sustained and accelerated. In Bruce Pearsall, he said, the Township has "a man who can and will lead us with energy and pride to our certain and ultimate victory."

Discussing issues, Pynchon cited home rule as opposed to centralized government and the promise held out by home rule that local government might continue "Forward by Plan". He continued: "This has been the keynote of our unquestioned success on the town level. We need men in every phase of town government who will dedicate themselves to the proposition that 'personal home rule government is good government.' At stake is more than two town positions. There is at stake the continuance of progressive and planned programs under responsible Republican leadership.

"And although he is not a candidate this year, we Oyster Bay Republicans might well take note of the strides taken during 1962, not only at home but in the embattled halls of the County Government by a real champion of Republican progress -- our great Supervisor, John J. Burns.

He remarked that the present Comptroller wants to be a judge and that he, a judge, wants to become State Comptroller. "You can make both of us happy on election day," he told the applauding audience.

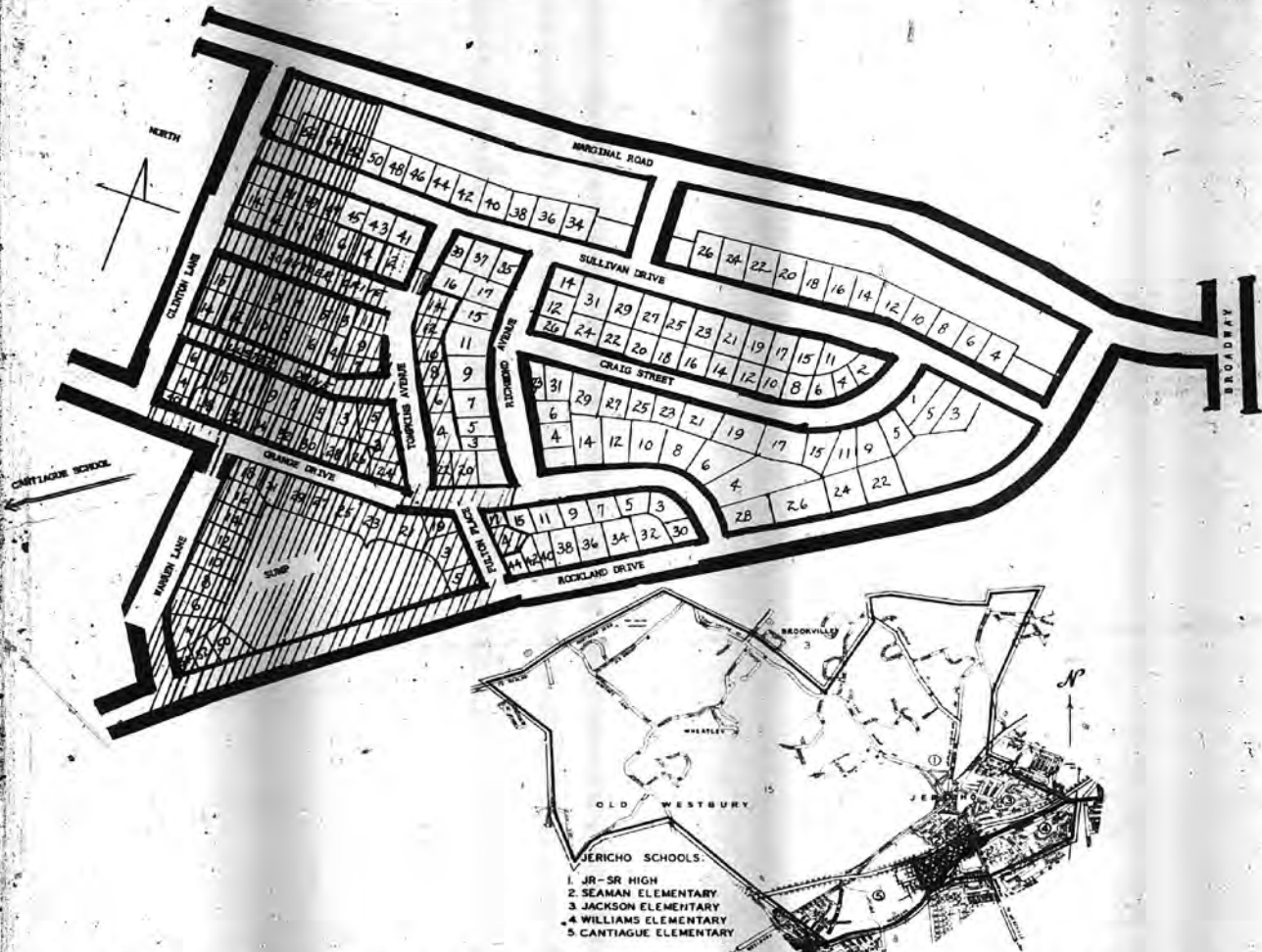

Over last year, the enrollment has doubled making it necessary for the school to move to 99 North Broadway, Hicksville. It opened there Sept. with an enrollment of 240.

The Regents-registered school offers a diversified program. It runs on a three level system

for students with no commercial training; for students with slight commercial training; and an advanced commercial program. It also features a life-time placement service. Besides the commercial training, the future executive secretaries have a chance to learn about proper make-up and hairstyling. There are also many social activities held throughout the school year, which starts in September, culminating with graduation in June.
