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## Special Events Observe U.S. Week in Our Schools

Keeping with the action of the Board of Education, the schools of Hicksville are observing United States Week during Oct. 22 to 26. The purpose of the observance is to re-emphasize events, customs and symbols related to the American Heritage of the country. It is expected that such an observance will cause pupils to have a greater sense of patriotism and an increased desire to be contributing citizens of the United States of this state.

The program in the schools will include such activities as assemblies, programs, art work, displays, positions, dioramas, discussions, films and readings. Each school has a planned program taken from the organized curriculum currently in use together with suitable current materials.

The history of the American flag was emphasized in the U.S. Week at the Burns Avenue school. Kindergarten children constructed a large flag to be displayed on a bulletin board in the school.

The history of the flag is being taught at all grade levels; the origin of the Stars and Stripes will be taught all children. During United States Week the Rock Lane School will have a special flag raising event.

Recently an American flag which has flown over the National Capitol at Washington was presented to the school by the United States Congress.

The Dutch Lane elementary school has appropriate events scheduled for the recognition of U.S. Week. The children in all grades, kindergarten through six, will participate in the origin of Colonial Self-Government as related to democratic

values will be the topic of the unit for the 4th grade.

The fifth grade has planned a field trip to Sagamore Hill while the sixth grade plans to go to the United Nations General Assembly. Committees of teachers at the Woodland Ave. School have planned detailed programs at each grade level for the observance.

The program for third grade is typical. Five great events in American history will be explored and related in time and importance to the American freedoms as they have developed. The areas are: Pilgrims, Washington and the Revolution, the Westward Movement, Lincoln and the Civil War and John Glenn and the Space Age.

The pupils will write stories and draw pictures about each area. Teachers will use records, books and films. Appropriate songs will be taught. The art work will be displayed on bulletin boards.

## Propose New Addition

# Plan Library Bond Issue Vote in Dec

Voters of Hicksville School District may be asked, during December, to vote upon a bond issue to cover the cost of addition to the Hicksville Free Public Library on Jerusalem Ave. near the corner of Second St. The Board of Education is expected to take action this Friday night upon the request of the Library Trustees that the referendum be held.

Earlier this month the School Board and Library Board held a joint, off-the-record session with their respective attorneys present; Joseph Catalano for the school district and Phillip Robinson for the library board.

Under the State Education Law, which governs the Public Library also, the special referendum would have to be conducted by the School District. The School Board would eventually sell the bonds if the proposal is approved. However, it is understood that the Library Trustees will indicate this Friday night that they are willing to underwrite the cost of the referendum (i.e. advertising, rental of voting machines, hire of election personnel) and this action will probably clear the way for the special bond issue vote.

The School Board, anticipating a final, published report from Dr. Felix McCormack of Columbia University Teachers College, has been mulling the possibility that they may have to go to the voters with some kind of a bond issue proposal on school and/or administrative space construction. The School Board members, generally, were reluctant to set up a referendum for a library question when they had a possible referendum of their own in the offing.

Recently in Plainview, the Library Board underwrote the cost of a referendum on a library building which was conducted under the same general sections of the law by the school district.

The cost of a referendum in Hicksville School District which involves some 50 persons and the rental of 14 voting machines has been estimated at approximately \$4,000.

Disclosure that a referendum may be in the works for December came from a press release from

the Hicksville Public Library Assoc. this week as follows:

"The Hicksville public Library Assoc. will hold its first meeting of the season in the library on Nov. 1st at 8:30 P.M. Members of the Assoc. are some of those people in the community who work in the interest of the library sponsoring cultural programs, acquainting the public with facts about the library, its budgets and needs.

"At the present time, the Assoc. is in the process of recruiting new members. A referendum to expand the library so that

it can continue to give the community the service and facilities it so urgently needs is going to be presented to the taxpayers in the early part of December.

"The Hicksville Public Library Assoc. will take a most active part in distributing publicity and working on behalf of the library in promoting the referendum. Therefore, the membership asks all those people who use the library and its facilities to come to this meeting, join the association and help the library maintain its fine record of valuable service to the community."
