Quarter Century Volunteer Is Commissioner Candidate

Ex-Fire Chief Charles F. Saurer of First St., a life-long resident of Hicksville, has announced his candidacy for the vacancy on the Hicksville Fire District Board of Commissioners. The present chairman, Harry Gleckler, will not be a candidate for reelection on Tuesday, Dec. 4.

There are two other candidates for the office besides Saurer, B. J. O'Connell, also ex-chief, and Cono Briganti have also filed outstanding petitions. Chief Saurer shows as his credentials 25 years of service in the Hicksville Fire Dept. rising through the ranks to Lieutenant and Captain of Engine Company 4. He was elected Chief in 1939 and served as chief for 23 years, driving, building and training as efficient a Fire Fighting force as he found anywhere. During his tenure of office as Chief, a number of new modern pieces of fire apparatus were placed in the Fire Fighting Arsenal. Chief Saurer gave unselfishly of his time and labor and his leadership gave impetus and drive to such departmental agencies as the Bureau of Fire Prevention, the rescue squad and ambulance service.

Upon retirement from office of Chief, Saurer became a charter member and delegate of the 9th Battalion Chief's Council. It is here that Chief Saurer has continued to draw upon his many years of experience to promote mutual fire fighting assistance, training commands and administrative techniques both his own and neighboring communities. As a member of the Chief's Council and Nassau County Firemen's Assoc., and the Fireman's Assoc. of the State of New York he is able to promote and absorb fire fighting techniques that can continue to be advantageous to the taxpayer. "The proposal to extend voting hours to the mutual benefit of all concerned is admirable," Saurer said this week. "There is, however, a far more important function of the Board of Fire Commissioners. Simply stated, it is the Board's responsibility and obligation to provide the best fire protection possible, to insure proper investigation and inspection of high fire incidence areas, production facilities and places of public assembly."

Saurer, age 46, resides with his wife Ruth and four children at 51 1st St. A Federal employee, he is a product and graduate of the Hicksville school district.

15-Year Look Into Future: New McCormick Report Due Soon

The new, updated and eagerly awaited McCormick Report on school facilities in Hicksville required for the next 15 years as well as trends in enrollment, population, etc. is going to be late in delivery and the Board of Education is not happy about it.

The contract between Teachers College, Institute of Field Studies, and the School District called for completion with a final written report due on or about Nov. 15. Donald F. Abt, Superintendent of Schools, told the Board last Friday night, Nov. 9, that Dr. Felix McCormick planned to present an oral report on Nov. 30 and the written report on Dec. 14. The project, costing a total of \$8,000, began on Feb. 15 of this year. There have been closed-door reports to the Board on the progress of the Report in June and September.

The Board voted unanimously, Friday night, that the "contract be implemented," i.e. that Teachers College get cracking and finish within the scheduled stated in the contract.

Among the points to be covered by the written report are the following:

Study of the community from the standpoint of population and housing characteristics, trend of housing development and school enrollments and influences of parochial school development programs.

Also detailed study of existing school plant with respect to proper location of building units for future use.

Financial implications in a projected building program are to be studied as well as trends in assessment, tax rates etc.

And finally a study of the community with a view to determining what school facilities should be provided immediately and over a minimum period of 15 years to care for school plant requirements.

OTHER ACTIONS

The Board, by a vote of 6 to 1, appointed Herbert Purick as auditor of the school district for the current fiscal year.

The Board went into executive session at 11:28 PM and William A. Bruno Jr., who had previously stated his objections to such sessions unless they are on personal matters, again voted no, read his statement and declined to participate. The subject of the meeting was to be concerning a letter.

When the session resumed Bruno wanted to know what went on and insisted that as a trustee of the district he is entitled such information. School Attorney Joseph Catalano ruled that he is entitled to such information if the Board plans to take action. No action was taken.

A special off-the-record session was set for this Friday night to meet with a delegation of the Classroom Teachers Assoc. Although the subject of the session was not announced it is generally presumed that a request to hike the teachers' pay scale is in the offing.

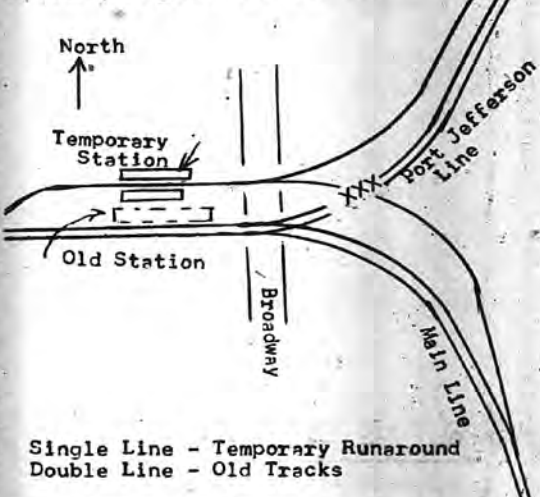
A record of some kind was set for action on the annual budget when Code 7 of the 1963-64 budget was adopted without dissent. This is the area on fixed charges such as bond payments and interest.

In the past the earliest portion of the budget has been tentatively adopted has been in December. The budget goes to public vote in May, 1963.

Colors Chosen For New Station

Some elections are down-to-the-wire contests. Others are downright runaways.

But Hicksville has the unique distinction of getting both in a single session of balloting.

The voting was at the Long Island Rail Road's Hicksville station. The candidates were the colors to be used on the new two level station that will be built as part of a \$13,000,000 state grade crossing elimination project.

The railroad, which makes a practice of asking its passengers what colors they'd like their

stations painted, installed a portable display and ballot box at the station. On display were eight choices in glazed brick for the outside and nine shades of ceramic tile for the inside. Commuters had 10 days to mark their ballots. Now the results are in.

First choice for the outside was white with a touch of black speckle to keep it from looking too stark. This got 129 votes. But the victory wasn't exactly overwhelming. Hard on its

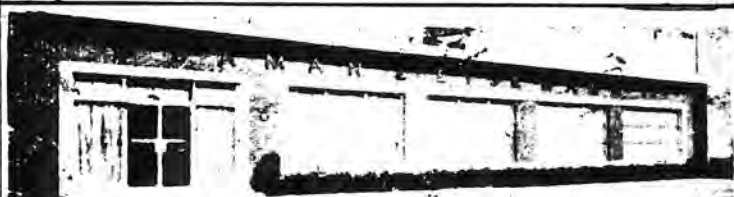

The Dec. 12 Library Referendum

Now Election Day has come and gone, there will be increased attention in the upcoming referendum upon a bond issue for \$298,500 to finance an addition to the Hicksville Public Library on Jerusalem Ave. between Second St. and Old Country Road.

We will attempt to publish as much material about this project as comes to our attention, both for and against. The HERALD has long supported the local Public Library, going back to the days when it occupied a single, second floor classroom in Nicholas St. School. We witnessed at least two proposals to build a library structure rejected, partially we suspect because they were somewhat elaborate.

We first promoted the suggestion to acquire the Duerk house at Jerusalem Ave. and Second St., a substantial brick structure, and this somewhat more modest proposal was carried. It seems the price was about \$30,000 if memory serves correctly.

Then came a tremendous expansion in our population and along with it the major addition which is today's library. Back files of the HERALD disclose that the corner stone for this \$312,000 project was set in place on June 6, 1957, slightly over five years ago. At the time it was pointed out that this building would take care of community library needs in this generation.

Then more than a year ago, a bookmobile was acquired to further expand the services and facilities of the library.

Now we have no doubt the library trustees and administration can make out a tremendous case why a new addition is needed at this time and the voters of Hicksville are going to have their chance to agree or disagree on Wednesday, Dec. 12. However, it seems a little odd that in less than five years time a building designed for the community needs "for a long time to come" requires a major addition which nearly matches the cost of the "long range" construction of 1957.

Or maybe five years is a long time. If it is, then a span of 20 to 30 years is a couple of lifetimes -- and that is the probable period of time in which the bonds will be paid off by the taxpayers if they approve on Dec. 12.

Library Explains Need for Extension

The Hicksville Public Library has released the following material about the Dec 12 referendum on an expansion bond issue. The statement is offered as received:

There are over 30,000 registered borrowers who borrowed more than 350,000 books in 1961. Circulating books, however, is only part of our service. Reference service, photograph records, and films, art exhibits, and special programs for children and adults are all part of our efforts to make our library a true intellectual and cultural center of the community. In order to sustain this program, we are asking you to support a referendum we are presenting to the people of the district on Dec. 12, 1962. The cost of the addition will be \$298,500.

WHAT WILL REFERENDUM PROVIDE?

The library has purchased property on the north side of the present building and plans to construct an extension there. The new wing will have two floors, the upper floor to be an extension of our present main floor, providing space for 40,000 additional volumes and seating capacity for 82 readers. The seating space will be used largely by Young Adults, with an office for a Young Adult librarian in the extension.

In the basement, we plan to construct a community room seating 185 that will be used for organization meetings, special library programs, children's story hour, and displays and exhibits. We also propose a small extension on the south side of our periodical room enabling us to continue binding periodicals for reference purposes.

WHY DO WE NEED MORE BOOKS?

A sizeable suburban community such as Hicksville, needs a strong high quality book collection to meet the demands of a relatively sophisticated public. Several years ago, we converted one of our main stack rooms to a children's library. We now have a spacious children's library but we have lost space for 40,000 adult books in the process. Consequently, we are nearly out of stack space in the adult reading room. We need 120,000 - 125,000 volumes to adequately

serve all age groups. At present we have 70,000 with little space available to add to this figure. At the same time we are purchasing 10,000 volumes a year. The population explosion in the 13-19 age group plus expanded and ambitious educational programs have placed heavy responsibility on library services. An expanded book collection is the cornerstone of our long range plan to meet our responsibilities in this area. We have already created the post of Young Adult librarian in order to concentrate on this age group and serve them more efficiently.

WHY DO WE NEED MORE SPACE?

It is as important to have reading room facilities as stack space. Every afternoon, Saturdays, and most evenings, the library is filled with high school, junior high school and college students, with seats at a premium. This is difficult for adults, children and staff. In order to serve our adults and young people adequately, we simply must have a larger seating area for these youngsters. Furthermore, if we are to continue the growth and development of our book collection we must provide the stack space. If we have no additional stack space we must soon begin to use the present browsing area in the reading room.

WHAT IS PURPOSE OF PROPOSED MEETING ROOM?

The new community room will be used for organizations to hold public meetings, for children's programs, art exhibits and library sponsored films, book talks, lectures and concerts. Many of these programs are now held in the reading room of the library since our present room is sometimes inadequate to accommodate the crowd. This is very often true of our musical programs which have generally attracted 150 to 200 people. We plan to use our present meeting room for storage of supplementary reference material.

This is important as we will eventually be forced to discard many still useful volumes if we do not have space available for this type of material. Please bear in mind that excavation would be necessary to a degree to install heating and to make a safer entrance to the children's library. The library and the Hicksville Public Library Association have been presenting these special programs for several years and we are anxious to continue and expand this community service.

DO WE NEED EXTENSIVE PUBLIC LIBRARY SERVICE TO STUDENTS?

This question is often asked in the light of school library materials. The answer is that the changing nature of the school programs and the type of student use, place demands on school and public libraries that were not conceived of 20 to 25 years ago. Many reference questions are of a complicated and involved nature that require professional assistance and advanced material to answer. An effective public library by virtue of a substantial book budget, professional assistance and availability serves as a centralized source of material to students of all ages. Of course the function of the public library goes beyond immediate academic needs. We're trying to introduce children of all ages to material that will enrich and further develop the subjects on which individuals are undertaking formal education, and enable them to grow into mature, responsible citizens. This is a challenging age group that needs special attention. At least 65% of our reference work is with this group.

WHY WAS THE LAND PURCHASED?

The library has been concerned for some time with expansion. The library was given first option on the property which otherwise would have been sold on the open market. Since we are so vitally concerned with future needs as well as needs

Seek Town Meeting on Library

The Committee for the Defeat of the Library Referendum met recently at the home of George Martin, 42 Hunter Lane, Hicksville. Martin was a candidate for Library Trustee in the last annual election.

The Committee unanimously passed a resolution to bring all the facts of the currently proposed library referendum to the attention of the taxpayers of Hicksville.

The Committee feels that there should be a town meeting open to the entire community to discuss fully all the pros and cons in connection with this proposition. The Committee is calling upon the Library Board to submit the proposition to open discussion prior to the Dec. 12 referendum.

In the Committee's opinion, a referendum should have been held pertaining to the acquisition of the property upon which the board plans to build prior to the purchase of the property for \$24,000 last spring.

The Committee further feels that

the "Library Board is now asking the taxpayers of Hicksville to ratify an action which they should not have taken without voter approval in the first place. Now, having disfranchised the voters, they are belatedly asking for that approval."

It is the Committee's opinion that the Library Board is "not telling the truth in respect to the cost, and total tax impact of their plan to build an addition to the library. The figure of \$298,500 is not the entire cost of the addition. In fact, this figure for the new auditorium will approach \$500,000. The reason for this is that the cost of books, shelves, seats, racks, cameras, and other fixtures, maintenance, personnel, and interest on indebtedness are not included in the low original figure. The claim that the average tax rise of \$1.30 for the homeowner is final is untrue when in fact the cost will be considerably higher due to the failure of the Library Board to include all the aforementioned costs."

of the moment, it was felt that the best needs of the District would be met by purchasing this valuable property which probably would have been unavailable at a later date. Accordingly, after careful checking of the legality, the land was purchased on a 10 year mortgage, with the understanding that the balance would be paid at the time of referendum. The land purchase was announced at the time of the budget approval and a brochure was sent to everyone in the District explaining the purchase, the reasons and placing the amount of amortization on the budget. Incidentally, the property has been owned since the library has owned it, and will undoubtedly continue to be. This means that it is costing very little.

WHAT IS THE REASON FOR PERIODICAL ROOM EXTENSION?

Periodicals have been most useful in helping us to find material on current problems. There is no area in the library that has grown faster in use and efficiency than this area. Since we have been binding many periodicals and have developed micro-film service, the response has been very gratifying. The space problem, however, needs to be rectified in order to continue this necessary service. We are currently receiving 182 periodicals and binding 88 of them. We are receiving the New York Times on micro-film and filming some of the local papers. Bound periodicals are indispensable to a public library but they require considerable space.

WHAT WILL BE THE COST PER TAXPAYER?

The cost, based on a 30 year bond issue will be about 19.4¢ per \$1,000 assessed valuation. This will cost a homeowner with a house assessed at \$5,000, 97¢ the first year. The maximum cost will be 25.9¢ per \$1,000 or \$1.30 per year based on a 20-year bond issue. This sum will decrease as the assessed valuation of the District increases.

we wish to point out that a public library gives great returns for the tax dollar. For example, the library now costs the average homeowner about \$1.00 a month. For this, hundreds of dollars worth of books can be taken out each year to be used in your schools, homes, businesses, professions or for inspiration, information and enlightenment. Over one half of the circulation of the library is in the non-fiction area, so you can see your library is used as a strong force for community uplift and not merely a hobby shop for recreational reading.

SUPPORTS LIBRARY BOND

To the Editor:

One of Hicksville's finest institutions, the Public Library, has outgrown its quarters. Its services to the community have increased remarkably in the last several years; nearly 30,000 residents have established borrowing privileges and its annual circulation now exceeds 350,000 items. The library, which adds nearly 10,000 new items a year, is now out of stack space. Even worse, its modest reading room no longer can pretend to hold the ever-growing number of young people who use its extensive and valuable research facilities to their studies.

A proposal to build a substantial addition on adjacent property will come before the voters in December. The new wing will more than double reading room accommodations and will provide stack space for years to come; it will particularly benefit the rapidly growing teen-age population of the city. Its cost to the taxpayer will be modest indeed—about one dollar per year on a home appraised at \$5,000. I urge all civic-minded citizens to vote their support for this project at the referendum on Dec. 12; it is an investment which will pay lasting dividends to both present and future generations in Hicksville.

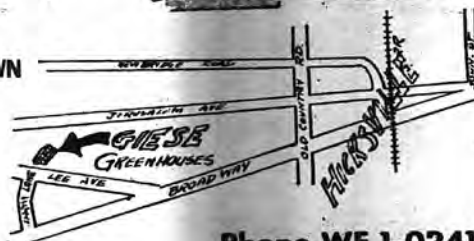
