## Group Consults Goebel:

# Court Test Looms On Library Issue

Harry F. Goebel, former Hicksville school attorney has been consulted by a group of citizens to "test the capacity and right" of the trustees of the Public Library and the Board of Education to have authorized a referendum on a \$298,500 bond issue for expansion of the library on Dec. 12, the HERALD learned today. It appeared possible that a court test may be undertaken prior to the referendum date.

In addition, the legal test may consider whether the Board of Trustees of the Public Library had the right to make an arrangement to purchase property for the proposed addition initially.

Goebel said that his preliminary look at the problem seemed to indicate that the Library Board "went a little too far and exceeded its rights and powers" and that in addition the Board of Education may have authorized a referendum "without full and proper investigation of the facts."

It is understood the committee for the Defeat of the Library Referendum, including George Martin, Howard Van Allen and Harry Wagner, has asked Goebel to look into the situation in their behalf as taxpayers and voters in the District.

Advertising of the referendum on Dec. 12 has been started and registration dates for voters not presently enrolled for school district voting purposes have been set for Saturday, Dec. 1 and Wednesday, Dec. 5.

The notice of the special meeting to vote on the proposed bond issue appears in this issue of the HERALD as a legal advertisement on page 8.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Hicksville Library Assoc. the full support of the town's referendum for a new library addition was reaffirmed, it was said this week.

Furthermore, a unanimous resolution condemned misleading attacks by opponents of the proposition. It was pointed out that the property for the addition adjacent to the library "was legally acquired for only \$24,000. This action was in fact confirmed to be fully in accord with the State Education Act by counsels for both the school board and library board."

All sorts of figures for the cost of the addition are being quoted except the actual number of \$298,500, which will appear on the voting machine, it was declared.

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## Library Corner

The Hicksville Public Library faces three building problems in the fairly immediate future: lack of stack space for books and periodicals, lack of seating space, lack of meeting room space.

Our present book capacity is 70-75,000 volumes. Our present library holdings are more than 70,000 volumes. American Library Association standards indicate that the book collection for a community of our size, 50,000 people, should be 2.2 books per person, or 110,000 volumes. We are presently adding to the collection about 10,000 volumes per year, so that the problem of where to put them is imminent.

Stack space could be added to the present building only at the expense of seating capacity. Our present adult seating space, for about 60 people, is often far less than enough, especially during weekdays from 3-6 P.M. and all day Saturday, when students, mainly, often completely fill the tables and make it difficult for an adult to find a place to sit down.

The fact that we lack a special seating area for Young Adults is a distinct disadvantage. The difference in temperament between our spirited young people who like a little noise and bustle, and many adults who want the library to be a quiet place tends to produce an irritant that is annoying to both groups.

Our present meeting room, which is very well used, is fairly adequate for small organization meetings. The problem arises with programs of greater general public interest where the space is not adequate to hold the numbers of people who come. For these types of programs, our only alternative is to hold them upstairs in the public service area of the library. Here they must be held late, after the library has closed, so as not to disturb our regular library use.

These space problems seemed insurmountable since all land adjacent to the library was occupied with dwellings. Therefore, when the property immediately to the north became available for purchase, it seemed to the Board of Trustees a heaven-sent opportunity which, in the future interests of the district, they couldn't afford to pass up. So, after getting clear opinion from the library and school attorneys as to the legality of this move, the property was purchased on a 10 year mortgage. If this hadn't been done right away, the property probably would have gone on the open market and been sold elsewhere.

The purchase was announced last May and a brochure was sent to all taxpayers explaining the reasons and details.

The referendum you will be voting on, Wednesday, December 12th,

proposes an extension, most of which will be to the north of the present library building.

The plans include the extension of our present main floor to the north, providing stack space for 40,000 additional volumes. Part of this space would be utilized as a Young Adult area, to provide them with a cohesive seating space contiguous to an appropriate book collection and at a reasonable distance from the rest of the of the library. The present reading area would thus be freed, and presumably toned down, for adult use.

Beneath this addition, on the lower, or basement, level, the plans for a larger meeting room to replace our present inadequate one. The meeting room would have a capacity of 185 people. The chairs would be moveable and the floor level so that it could serve many different purposes. The replaced meeting room could thus be made available as an added stack area when that becomes necessary.

The plans also provide for a small extension on the south side of our present periodical room, but large enough to solve the problem of our rapidly multiplying periodical holdings.

These, then, are the proposed solutions to our space problems -- if the referendum passes. If it doesn't pass, we will sooner or later have to resort to makeshift measures, such as discarding of books that may still be of considerable value, that will cut down the effectiveness of the library work to the disadvantage of the district in the long run.

The overall cost has been set at \$298,500. If the referendum passes, it will probably be financed by a 20-year bond issue that would cost the average homeowner, whose property is assessed at \$5,000 \$1.12 the first year and progressively less in subsequent years as the assessed valuation of the district increases.

The referendum will be held on Wednesday, Dec. 12th, from noon to 10 P.M. Unless you registered at the time of the last school budget vote in May, you will have to register on one of the following dates to be able to vote.

Saturday - Dec 1st, from 10 A.M. - 5 P.M. Wednesday - Dec 5th, from 4 P.M. - 11 P.M.

## Driver Education Provides Benefits

In an address on Nov. 14 at the Hicksville High School before the Long Island Driver Education Assoc. (members of whom teach Driver Education at the High Schools in Nassau and Suffolk), Leonard Gordon, an officer of Gorman Agency, Inc., Insurance Agents, 300 South Oyster Bay Road, Syosset, pointed out the immediate financial benefit of Driver Education, since the cost of teaching Driver Education runs between \$50 and \$60 per student. A male driver who passes Driver Education makes up this cost in the reduction of his insurance premiums, in the first two years. Actually the savings to a male driver until he is 25 is more than \$300.

From the viewpoint of the community at large, it is estimated that male drivers under 25 who have passed the Driver Education course have 25% to 50% less accidents. Since one out of five drivers in the United States in 1961 had an accident, any reduction in accidents due to Drivers Education is most promising. The resulting reduction in cost to the community should induce every parent and taxpayer to insist that all new drivers take Driver Education before the issuance of a license, Gordon said.

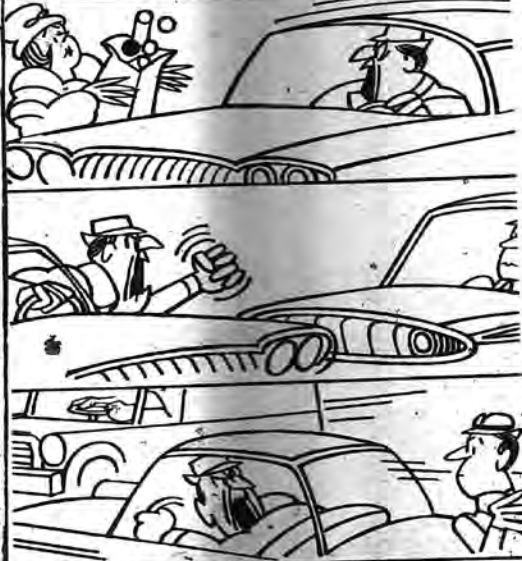
