Kiwanis: Quarter Century of Community Service

Twenty five years ago the Hicksville Kiwanis Club was organized by a group of 29 men who assembled in the Hicksville Courthouse. Little did those who gathered for that initial meeting realize what a tremendous record of service this organization would pile up to the benefit of the community during the following quarter century.

Hicksville is fortunate to have several public-spirited service organizations, including the Rotary and Lions Clubs; however, to Kiwanis must go the credit for the longest period of establishment and hence probably the greater records of achievement.

We recall those initial meetings when Leland A. Rider was president and Leon Galloway was secretary. Early luncheon meetings were held in a restuarant at the corner of Herzog Pl. and Broadway, later moving to the Hicksville Inn which has since been demolished.

Some people in the community, 25 years ago, were active members of a Rotary Club in a nearby village and when the movement to form a Kiwanis Club here got underway an effort was made, belatedly, to have prospective members join the other organization. There is of course room in the Hicksville of today for several service organizations and they do much good which never is reported in the newspaper columns.

At this Thanksgiving period is appropriate the recall what an asset Kiwanis has been during its first quarter century and to look forward to its continued service to the community. The annual distribution of food baskets at Thanksgiving and Christmas time has been continuously under the supervision of Dr. Charles J. Masek, charter member of the Kiwanis and its president in 1941.

Perhaps one way in which the work of the Hicksville Kiwanis can be evaluated is by comparing its record of achievement with other Kiwanis Clubs. Six times the local Club has been cited state-wide for the best achievement in Kiwanis activities.

The Hicksville Public Library faces three hillding problems in the fairly immediate future: lack of stack space for books and me fairly immediate futuret lack of stack space for books and periodicals, lack of sesting space, lack of meeting room space. Our present book capacity is 70-75,000 volumes. Our present library boldings are more than 70,000 volumes. American Library

lthrary boldings are more than 70,000 volumes. American Library Association standards indicate that the book collection for a community of our size, \$0,000 people, should be 2.2 books person, or 110,000 volumes. We are presently adding to the collection about 10,000 volumes person, so that the problem of where to put them is imminent. Stack space could be added to the present building only at the expense of seating capacity, our present adult seating space, for about 60 people, is often far less than enough, especially during

than enough, especially during weekdays from 3-6 P.M. and all day Saturday, when students, day Saturday, when students, mainly, often completely fill the tables and make it difficult for an adult to find a place to sit

tables and an adult to find a place used an adult to find a place used down.

The fact that we lack a special seating area for Young Adults is a distinct disadvantage. The deference in temperament between our spirited young people who like a little noise and bustle, and many adults who want the library to be a quiet place tends to produce an irritant that is amoying the groups.

Our present meeting coom, which is very well used, is fairly adequate for small organization meetings. The problem arises with programs of greater general public interest where the space is not adequate to hold the numbers of people who come. For these types of programs, our only alternative is to hold them upstairs in the public service area of the library. Here they must be held late, after the library has closed, so as not to disturb our regular library use.

These space problems seemed insurmoustable since all land adjacent to the library was occupied.
