3 School Projects Near Completion

Three construction projects in Hicksville School District are expected to be completed by Monday, Jan. 7, according to a revised estimate received by the Board of Education. These include the additional classrooms and labs at the Senior High School, the new gymnasium at East St. School and the new Willet Ave Elementary School.

Partial use of the Willet Ave. School has begun, although classes will not move into the new building until the new year. Storage of classroom furniture in the building began on Nov. 16, the heating plant was put into operation on Nov. 26 and Principal John Maher of 25 Hope Lane and his secretary

moved in on Nov. 27, according to a report of Robert Petross, District consultant on construction.

The report was considered at the School Board meeting last Friday night.

The final half hour of the meeting which concluded shortly before 2 A.M. was devoted to problems of transportation for physically handicapped to Mill Neck and The Bronx. Parents of children involved were present and registered complaints about the equipment used.

By a vote of six to one the Board voted to cancel a contract held by Yellow Cab Co. of Plainview

on the run to the Bronx and to suspend a contract with the same firm on the trip to Mill Neck pending the attachment of "school bus" signs to the vehicle.

The Board on Nov. 9 had suspended a contract on the Mill Neck trip, following a parent's complaint, and upon inspection of the vehicles reinstated the contract on Nov. 20.

The School Board also voted to cancel its meeting regularly scheduled for Dec. 28.

No Good Will in the Holiday Season

Vandalism has become an increasing problem for this and other communities. The destruction of other people's property, not to mention downright theft, indicates a widespread lack of responsibility and at this season, no good will toward fellow men.

A woman with a small child had the wiring torn off her car motor while she was in one of the school buildings one evening recently to register for the Library vote. The destruction was senseless and a considerable inconvenience for the woman and her child.

It would appear that some of the elements of the current holiday season with its message of peace and goodwill would escape destruction, but such is not the case. Every Christmas season

we hear of residents who have the bulbs taken from the sockets on their outdoor lighting. Some have given up this cheery illumination of their property in disgust.

Henry G. Elsemann has good reason to be proud of the fine building of Seaman & Elsemann on Broadway. It is certainly an asset to our main business street which, in certain sections, appears slated for renewal. He therefore had good reason to be incensed and distressed over the weekend. Four giant wreaths were attached to the front of his building. Ladders were required to raise the decorations and heavy wire and metal fasteners were required to hold the load.

Yet, sometime Friday night, two of

these giant holiday wreaths were taken--and it was not the work of some boys. The following night a third wreath was wrenched out of shape in what must have been an attempt to remove it from the brick wall.

The persons responsible for these acts will probably never even read this. We like to think they are not residents of our community.

Let's hope we will not have to turn the clock back so far as to revive some organizations such as the old-time Broadway Protective Assoc. with watchmen hired by the business people, before the days of a police dept., to protect their properties.

It sure can put a damper on the merry spirit of yuletide.

Library Corner

One characteristic of the serious contemporary American novel is the attempt to overcome the naturalistic tradition, which has been strong in American literature. Writers such as Jack London, Theodore Dreiser, William Faulkner and Richard Wright were interested primarily in tracing the effects their environment had on determining the character of their protagonists. Many contemporary novelists attempt to overcome this social determinism by exploring the possibilities of how true love and freedom can be obtained by the individual standing against the social pressures.

Broadly speaking, there are two different approaches to this problem among contemporary American novelists, the urban and the regional.

The urban writer is usually born and bred in the great city and often in a marginal group. He uses the sprawling, shifting industrial milieu of his own background for his protagonist's struggle, against the forces that seem to be trying to crush him, to achieve his true identity to become a person. Saul Bellow and James Baldwin are examples of two different types of the urban writer.

The regional writer, on the other hand, is usually rural born and bred and often of an old family that has seen better days. His is a backward looking society that is being encroached upon by the industrial future. His protagonist, often emotionally attached to the past, is pulled both ways. He often tries to find his identity by attempting to play these opposing forces off against each other. When he cannot achieve an inner balance that allows him to find true love and freedom, he must either make his escape to urban civilization or into the Eden of the past that derives from his own mind. Since the South is the last, but crumbling, bastion against creeping industrialization and urbanization, it is not strange that most of these contemporary regional writers are Southern. Two of the best of them are Truman Capote and Carson McCullers.

Truman Capote's novels, taken together, constitute an almost perfect example of the above characterization. His GRASS HARP

details the attempts of its boy hero, along with several other marginal people, to establish his true identity against the growing commercial and opportunistic spirit of the town by taking residence in a tree house. He and the others find an understanding of their true selves and their love for each other by standing up against the indignant townspeople on the one hand and avoiding the Edenic siren song of an evangelical female fundamentalist outcast on the other. When they make their truce, it is with honor and they can live with themselves again.

Different is the outcome in OTHER VOICES, OTHER ROOMS which portrays the struggle of a boy for love and his true self against an environment that has sunk into archaic evil as a reaction to its fear of modern technological encroachment. After discovering the futility of attempting to find a balanced life in this situation, he first tries to escape it, unsuccessfully. Then he becomes so fascinated by its promise of a deep commitment that he immerses himself in it, thus voiding the uncertainties of modern life. In a lighter vein, the girl, Holly Lightly, in BREAKFAST AT TIFFANY'S, escapes to New York and finds the urban environment as hard as the rural one for retaining her true identity. Letting no social moor clutter her heels, she is rumored as having been last seen in Africa, still pursuing her goal.

Love is the powerful key to true identity in Carson McCullers' novels. REFLECTIONS IN A GOLDEN EYE explores the contrasts and gradations between a deep, archetypal love and what passes for love in a shallow modern society. It shows the impossibility of the former in a typically modern situation. Her short novel, THE BALLAD OF THE SAD CAFFE, however, reveals the power of the lover to rise above her harsh, atavistic Southern environment. But, when shorn of her loved one, she sinks back into the sloth of those about her.

THE HEART IS A LONELY HUNTER is an attempt to show what love means to the true love, how environmental pressures sink into the background under its influence.

These pressures remain enormous to those who try to love but can't and overwhelming to those who have lost their loved ones. A MEMBER OF THE WEDDING, which is in many ways a reworking of parts of THE HEART IS A LONELY HUNTER, shows the frantic, unguided and disheartening attempts of a young girl to find out how and who, or what, to love. The message is urgent that, if she doesn't find the key, her only remaining action must be to escape to the urban north, to keep herself from losing her self.

President's Corner

It was reported to me recently that there were dark areas on some of the streets of our community due to the fact that some of the street lights were not working. Further investigation revealed that, although these inoperative lights had been reported to the Long Island Lighting Co., some time had elapsed without repairs being effected. As a result, I wrote a letter to the LILCO reporting the above outlined facts, and asking for an investigation. W.F. Koop, Manager of the Street and Traffic Lighting Department of LILCO replied to my letter. He reported that seven street lights had been inoperative during the period in question. In each case, the trouble lay in the underground cables that supply power to the lights. In some cases the cables had failed, while in others damage had been done to the cables. However, the LILCO records indicate that all repairs were completed by December 3, 1962, and that therefore there should be no defective lights in Birchwood at the present time.

If any resident of our community is aware, or should in the future become aware of a street light that is in need of repair, he should report the location of the defective light to the Long Island Lighting Company at Wells 1-5800. This number is in operation 24 hours per day, seven days per week. If repairs are not effected in a reasonable period, our residents should contact me at WE 5-8655.

I am very happy that the Birchwood Civic Association has been able to be instrumental in resolving this situation. I want to thank Mr. Koop for his co-operation, and to join him in hoping that no further difficulties along these lines are encountered.

Phone Manager Traces Telstar

County Budget Cuts Tax Rate 4¢

The Nassau County Board of Supervisors on Dec. 12 unanimously adopted the revised 1963 budget which reduces the County tax rate by four cents in the coming year. Faced with an immediate overriding of any veto, County Executive Eugene H. Nickerson signed the resolutions at the special meeting of the Board of Supervisors.

Total expenditures for Nassau County in the year ahead will be \$101 millions, approximately \$1,750,000 less than the total proposed by County Executive Nickerson. Total revenues to the County are expected to be \$32,746,000, \$1,100,000 less than anticipated revenues of the County Executive.

The tax rate established for 1963 is \$2.152 per \$100, assessed valuation. The County tax levy has been set at \$60,642,000.

Adoption of the budget followed a total of six public sessions; two hearings by the County Executive on his preliminary figures; two by the Board of Supervisors on the County Executive's final proposed budget; and two on the Board of Supervisor's revised budget which reflected an addition of \$2 1/4 million in total expenditures to cover what were called "under-estimated expenditures and over-estimated revenues."

Vice-Chairman John J. Burns explained at the final hearing that it was possible for the Board of Supervisors to cut expenditures by \$1 3/4 millions, to restore \$2 1/4.

millions to the budget and yet reduce the tax rate by four cents. Supervisor Burns explained that 2100 unfilled jobs in the budget

for next year were "lapse factor-ed" by 80%, since historically the County has never added more than 1000 employees in a single year.
