Former Postmaster Dies

Harry C. Cotier, former Hicksville Postmaster, of 118 Park Ave., died Tuesday, Apr. 23. He is survived by his widow, Ethel (nee Williams), and two sons, Robert of Hicksville and William of Mantua, N.J. Also three grandchildren.

He is reposing at the Henry J. Stock Funeral Home where Masonic services by the Manetto Lodge F.&A.M., of which he was past Master, will be held Thursday evening. Religious services will be conducted Friday at 10 a.m. The Rev. Cranston Clayton officiating. Burial will follow at Kensico Cemetery, Valhalla, N.Y.

Mr. Cotier was a career postal employee. He started in the service as a substitute clerk at the Brooklyn Post Office on Mar. 19, 1926. He served 23 years in the registry (finance) section. When he assumed the Hicksville Postmaster position on April 1, 1955, he had left the position of Postal Supervisor in the Brooklyn Post Office. During his tenure as Postmaster, the Hicksville Office doubled its volume of business, and the Duffy Ave. parcel post

Mr. Cotier moved to Hicksville with his family in 1938. He was active in civic and fraternal organizations. He was a member of the Ernest F. Francke Republican Club and the Chamber of Commerce of Hicksville. Other activities include membership in the Postmasters Assoc.; district official of the Mail Supervisors Organization; Legislative Representative, Secretary and Vice President and President of the L.I. Federation Post Office Clerks.

He served 20 years as an executive member of the National Federation of Post Office Clerks and was an active member of the National Association of Postal Supervisors, Branch 64, Brooklyn.

Library Bd Contest Also:

Eight Candidates For School Board

The Hicksville School Board crystallized this week as the deadline for filing of candidate petitions was reached. Eight persons are seeking three vacancies on the School Board while a last minute contest for Library Trustee developed as Edward M. Bello of 1 Hollins Rd. filed to run against Ernest G. McClain. An example of the school board election ballot is reproduced elsewhere on this page.

A public discussion of the proposed school district budget providing a tax rate of \$5.745 per \$100 compared with the current rate of \$5.379, was scheduled for tonight (Thurs) in the High School Auditorium. Under the proposed budget, it is estimated the district will receive \$418,738 more in state aid than the previous year or a total of \$5,185,000 on a gross budget of \$10,913,869.25. It was also noted that Federal Aid (under PL 874 will drop off sharply next year from \$70,000 to an estimated \$10,000). It is also anticipated that the District will not have excess cash at the end of the fiscal year in the amount of \$275,000 to reduce the tax rate.

Meanwhile, all candidate groups were busy churning mimeograph machines in an effort to influence voters. The George M. Martin, Francis E. Hester and Harry M. Wagner trio attempted to drag into the campaign the so-called poorer issues.

On the other hand, Irving Lawrence and Herbert Malamud of Westbury picked their opponents on the ballot, charged "costly, piecemeal planning" while "curtailing our curriculum and have wasted the taxpayers money." Going back 13 years, (although the incumbents have yet to round out 6 years), the TEACH candidates commented "curtailed sessions".

It appeared the library trustee contest would hardly attract the attention that the school board race indicated. Bello, a total unknown, was nominated to run against McClain who had been appointed to the Board when John Hansen resigned in December.

An insight into the basic issues of the campaign for the School Board was revealed as a candidate's forum Wednesday night sponsored by the Mid Land Civic Assoc at the new Willet Ave. School.

Herein is attempted a capsule digest of the forum:

HERBERT H. JOHNSEN: Vote for budget. Your choice is between ultra-liberal and ultra-conservative.

FRANCIS HESTER: Cut out all frills. Advocate gripe sessions at meetings for taxpayers to sound off.

HERBERT MALAMUD: Came to Hicksville (Westbury?) because it was one of the better school systems in state. Teachers are unhappy.

CORNELIUS MCCORMACK: Be proud of our school system. Spoke about improved credit rating, better fiscal situation.

GEORGE MARTIN: No consideration given to older folks in community. Distinction between what is necessary and what is desirable.

JERRY ZETTLER: Discussed the record of the Board of Education, its success in eliminating double sessions and made it plain that all elementary school classes except kindergarten will be on single sessions in September.

HARRY WAGNER: Criticized the

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Hartmaier Takes Survival Training

Armado rattle snake or raccoon might have been on the menu for Army PFC Richard Hartmaier, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred J. Hartmaier, 54 Eleventh St., Hicksville, —if he could have caught one.

Hartmaier, with other members of the 2d Armored Division, recently completed seven weeks training in guerrilla fighting and survival techniques on a special reaction course at Fort Hood, Tex.

The soldiers spent a week on the course, in turn. The 60 hours of training included bridge demolition, cliff climbing, hand-to-hand combat and survival techniques like catching dinner.

The 25-year-old soldier, an automatic rifleman in Company D of the 51st Infantry's 1st Armored Rifle Battalion, entered the Army in August 1961 and completed basic training at Fort Dix, N.J.

Symposium Covers Three Topics

The Home and School Assoc. of Holy Family Parish, Hicksville, presented a symposium on the subject "Catholic Responsibility for Public Schools" on Tuesday, April 23.

The symposium was composed of three short papers which were prepared by members of the parish organization. These papers included a discussion of Catholic interest in civic affairs. It was affirmed that one must understand the moral and social teachings of the Church and let them be heard in the community. "This is our debt to our neighbor in Christian charity. There are many today who would restrict the activities of the Church to the sanctuary, but they arbitrarily constrain the mission of Christ and Christians. If the Church does not shed moral light on the social, economic and political problems of our times, who shall?"

Also presented in the symposium was a paper on the moral responsibility of Catholics to give financial support to the public schools. In connection with this, a study of a typical school budget was presented so that members would be better equipped to judge whether, on the one hand, expenses were legitimate, or on the other, whether frugality was reasonable. "Some citizens, it seems, who do not use the public schools, conclude that the most austere budget is best for them. They forget that it may not be best for the community, and our concern here is for the common good."

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Herald Editorial Opinion:

The Happy Medium

We attended a forum, Wednesday night when all eight candidates for the Hicksville Board of Education spoke and answered some questions. Much of what was said will probably be repeated Monday night in the Junior High School auditorium when the PTA Council sponsors another forum. After you hear them, you may come to the same conclusion that we have reached regarding the May 8th election. The three incumbents have a substantial record of achievement in office and are willing and able to carry on and expand upon their known program.

The opposition candidates, stripped of the fancy slogans and catch-phrases, think they should be put on the Board of Education and are willing to say most anything if it will get them votes.

The TEACH group can trace its lineage thru annual group name changes back thru the School Board Campaign Committee (last year), HOPE (the years before) etc. Although the present candidates of this group plausibly denies any intention of promoting the construction of a second high school it still holds the position that the school staff from top to bottom should in effect be given a blank check, even on another building. This year they say, if it costs more money we'll get it out of the state. Meanwhile, however if the state doesn't come thru, the added cost must come directly out of your pocketbook.

The personal slate of William Bruno which goes in heavily for misleading

and truth-twisting slogans and titles claims sponsorship of a brand new group called the Committee for Honesty in Education. The misleading and deliberately distorted items in circulation by flyer and word of mouth challenges their claim of honesty. What started out some weeks ago as a pledge to cut spending for education by a million dollars has now been diluted to a \$600,000 cut and by the day after the election will probably vanish entirely.

Mr. Bruno is intent upon his determination to elect three rubber-stamp duplicates of himself. To win his end, he has threatened officials of the district with the loss of their positions unless they bend to his will. A smiling, tongue-in-cheek prattling of "economy" is merely a thin disguise for a power grab lust which will ultimately cost the taxpayers tens or hundreds of thousands of dollars, destroy personnel morale and cripple the fine educational system we now enjoy.

It is our considered opinion, reinforced by listening to the statements of their opponents in public forum, that Jerry Zettler, Herb Johnsen and Niel McCormack have done an excellent job and should be encouraged to continue to serve the community on our Board of Education. They are neither super-conservatives nor are they ultra-liberal in their approach to the problems before the School District. They represent the happy medium!

In a previous letter to your paper, which you were kind enough to print, I expressed certain qualms with regard to the qualifications of candidates to the post of school board trustee in Hicksville. Since that time various persons have announced themselves as candidates for the positions and are seeking the support of the residents of Hicksville in their election efforts.

In my prior letter I stated that candidates for this position should have a keen respect for the truth, for as elected officials they would represent the community, and should therefore be held in high regard by the children who attend the schools, by the teachers who teach these children, and by the parents of Hicksville.

A good deal of misinformation is being conveyed by those candidates who have set up on the size of the Hicksville school budget as an issue in this election. Irresponsible statements have been circulated that the budget should and could have been cut by \$400,000. A purported analysis largely incoherent, of where such cuts could be made was published by a Board member.

I have made a careful and intensive analysis of the proposed 1963/1964 budget as compared with the actual budget for 1962/1963. I believe I am equipped by education, training and experience to make such an analysis. Based upon my studies, I can say without fear of informed contradiction that the increase in the proposed budget over the last year's actual budget is due almost wholly to required salary increases and other fixed charges over which the School Board has no control. In the area where the Board does have control, it made conscientious effort to reduce expenditures and effected such reductions in 17 lines of the budget, amounting to \$115,000. Accordingly, any candidate who campaigns on the proposition that the proposed budget increases were avoidable or even that there should have been a decrease under the 1962-1963 budget is either misleading the citizenry, or, equally reprehensible is a sincere candidate, completely un-informed.

It is doubtless appealing to opportunistic individuals to better our budget expenditures, with their concomitant tax increases, as a way to inflame voters who have a legitimate complaint against the burden of increased taxes on all fronts. Such arguments however, should not commend themselves to a thoughtful electorate. The price of education, like the price of all other goods and services in recent years, has been on the increase. Many students of the problem feel that alternate sources of revenue, other than the real property tax, may have to be found in order to meet such increased costs.

They do not however, advocate that we cut down the quality of our education or the services provided to our children by the educational system that their money can buy and they want each dollar spent carefully. This is a far cry from irresponsible budget-cutting. Those who advocate the latter course are not friends of the public school system and should not be elected to the office of School Board Trustee.

PHONEY ECONOMY

To the Editor:

As taxpayers, as parents, as citizens of this community, we all have an important investment in our young people and the quality of the education they are receiving here in Hicksville. Moreover, we have the responsibility as well as the right to safeguard that investment.

On May 8 - Election Day in Hicksville - we will be given the opportunity to actively exercise this responsibility by demonstrating through our franchise support for the proposed school budget. Such support is greatly needed to help restore a sense of balance and cohesiveness which our schools and community need; it may also serve as an effective means of silencing a small but extremely loud group of persons who appear to be single-mindedly bent upon attacking rather than helping our educational program.

During the past months, the budget has been attacked by politically motivated "phony economy" groups as an extravagant and wasteful piece of financial machinery. Nothing could be further from the truth! The proposed 1963-64 school budget is, in fact, a strictly "hold the line" budget, taking into consideration the increase in student population and the normal rise in the cost of living in an adequate but stringent fashion. With a penchant for negative criticism, the "economy brigade" apparently overlooked or neglected to mention the several large slices made in the budget before it was presented to the public. As a result, a considerable amount of money was cut from textbook supplies, instructional supplies, school lunch program, instructional equipment, and library books.

It must also be noted that any increases that were made in the budget were required by the state in the form of yearly increments for teachers, administrators, custodial, and clerical help, retirement fund for the same, and debt service, redemption of bonds, and interest. These are, in effect, fixed charges and constitute eighty three per cent of the total budget. Any further cuts, therefore, would apparently have to be made in those areas which deal directly with educational services. Students have already been made in those areas, one is forced to conclude that the plaintive persistent pleas originating in some quarters and calling for even greater economy are being made in the interest of something other than education.

At this time, it might be wise for all of us to remember what Dr. F.J. McCormack stated in his current report on the school plant needs of Hicksville: "All the financial factors surveyed indicate that District 17 is in a healthy position financially."

"...all that remains is for the citizens of School District 17 to use their wealth wisely and quietly toward worthwhile education for their children."

Jericho Board Approves Budget

The Jericho Board of Education, Union Free School District #13, unanimously approved its 1963-64 budget of \$3,611,333.00 at an open meeting Thursday, April 18, in the High School. It will be presented to voters for approval on May 8th.

Under this proposed budget the estimated tax rate would rise slightly to \$5.55 per \$100 of assessed valuation - up 14 cents from last year. This increase is the smallest in recent years. The average rise in the past four years was 74 1/2 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation.

A detailed explanation is contained in the District Budget Bulletin mailed to voters this week.

The Board also approved the replacement of one teacher and the addition of two teachers to the faculty. The candidates were recommended by Dr. Leon H. West-

Civic Board Enlists Help Of Town Board and Nassau Health

Floyd Bennett's flagrant violation of the welfare of our community and their lack of consideration for our residents has forced your Civic Association to enlist the personal help of Thomas Pynchon, Supervisor of the Town of Oyster Bay and Robert Cusumano of the Nassau County Health Dept.

Mr. Pynchon and Mr. Cusumano attended the regular meeting of your Civic Board on Tuesday night, April 16 and were thoroughly informed of the intolerable situation. The civic committee, and Julie Wiener and Dan Sirota, as perimeter residents, recounted the many times that the Floyd Bennett incinerator had caused horribly offensive odors, deposits of soot on autos, screens and lawns, and black smoke which indicated that the trash being burned was in violation of the rules governing such procedure.

Pres. George Frankel expressed the feeling of the entire Board when he asked that Mr. Pynchon and Mr. Cusumano immediately start proceedings to permanently shut down the incinerator.

Mr. Cusumano formed the meeting that Floyd Bennett has been told to raise the smoke stack

25 feet higher than it is and to closely adhere to burning only those items permitted by law. He assured the group that the incinerator operation will be closely scrutinized and that a phone call to his department would bring an inspector down immediately. Furthermore, if such violations are then found to exist, the State Board of Air Pollution would be notified for they have the power to revoke the incinerator license at any time.

Mr. Pynchon then stated that as Town Supervisor he would inform Floyd Bennett, in no uncertain terms, that the nuisance created by the incinerator must be rectified or action would be instituted to forcibly do so.

The nominating committee after due deliberation and much thoughtfulness in its search for a slate of candidates to help carry on the vital functions of the Birchwood Civic Association at Jericho in the same dedicated manner as in the past, submitted the following names:

An Editorial:

School Budget Late Again

Perhaps the most important function that our Civic Assoc. perform is the annual detailed review of the Jericho and Syosset School Budgets. Each year our Education Committees analyze the budget and make a recommendation to the Board of Directors of our Birchwood at Jericho Civic Assoc., who in turn votes on whether to advise our residents to approve or disapprove the budget.

As a result of the experience gained these past years, our committees are qualified to break down the budget and reach a proper conclusion as to its recommendations to our community.

The School Budget is a lengthy and complex matter. The school administration and board spends many months in its preparation. It therefore follows, that we must have the budget in reasonable time in order to work a detailed analysis. For years our Civic Association has urged the school boards to make the budget available to us in time for proper study. The Board of Directors of our Civic Association at one time in desperation, voted to recommend a "no" vote on any school budget not submitted in time to permit proper exploration. Both Jericho and Syosset Schools were notified of our resolution. However only SYOSSET responded by making the budget available in time.

The Jericho School District advised members of our educational committee on April 16, that the budget was still not available. It was therefore impossible for our education committee to make any type of report to the Board of Directors of our Civic Assoc. The Civic Board, therefore was forced to set up emergency methods to attempt to properly advise the community once the budget finally was made available. As we go to press, our Jericho Education finally received the budget for review and will do its best to reach a conclusion. However, our Jericho residents at press time still have not received a copy of the budget altho the voting date is May 8.

Furthermore, we are confused as to why on April 16, our Jericho Education Committee was advised that the budget was not available, and yet the WEST BIRCHWOOD NEWS carried details of the budget in their issue of the same week. To the best of this paper's knowledge, the deadline to print such news had to be in their hands April 15 (one day prior to the day it was denied us). It would indeed be unfortunate that the possibility did exist that the budget in review form may have been available but not presented to the education committee of our civic association. The WEST BIRCHWOOD NEWS' lead may very well be as well as the reply letter by Howard Jankowitz, West Birchwood's Education Chairman. Why were they able to receive the information and not the Birchwood Park Jericho Civic Association?

THE VILLAGER once again strongly urges that the Jericho School Board makes every attempt to prepare the budget and SUBMIT it on time each year, thereby enabling our Civic Education Committees and the residents of our community an opportunity to review the budget. We fully appreciate the fact that the school districts will hold open meetings on the budget at which time questions of the residents will be answered by members of the school board. These hearings, while serving a useful purpose, is no substitute for the detailed study and questioning propounded by qualified members of our education committee. No individual resident without the experience gained in detailed review of previous school budgets can possibly be expected to dig through the maze of statistics of a budget and come up with the correct answer. Fortunately for our community we have such qualified persons available providing, however, that the budget is presented on time.

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2 Top Seniors National Winners

Two of the top seniors at Hicksville High School have earned Merit Scholarships in national competition. The proud winners are John Eugene Mann and Arne W. Yanof. The scholarships are awarded on the results of a National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test taken in the junior year when 596,241 students in 16,024 schools over the country competed for the honor. The examination is a three-hour test of educational development, specially designed for the Merit Programs by Science Research Associates of Chicago. The test covers five areas: English usage, social studies reading, natural science reading, mathematics usage and word usage. The top scorers in each state are named Semifinalists in September of the senior year.

Each Semifinalist, there are about 11,000 each year, is asked to take another examination - the three-hour Scholastic Aptitude Test of the College Entrance Examination Board - and to file a record of extracurricular activities, special achievements and interests academic or other honors. Financial need is determined after the winners have been selected. In 1962, the average stipend paid to freshman Merit Scholar was \$845 or \$3,380 for four years.

John Eugene Mann is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Mann, 17 West St., Hicksville. He is majoring in mathematics, science and Latin and has made honor marks in all three areas. John has been accepted as a New York University Scholar and will attend the School of Education in September where he plans to study to become an English teacher. His honors include membership in the National Honor Society and a runner-up in the competition of the National Council of Teachers of English.

Arne W. Yanof is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Yanof, 15 Straw Lane, Hicksville. During Arne's junior year he received the Paragon Oil Incubator Award as the outstanding member of the Junior Class. In the summer of 1962 he was a G. E. Student Research Fellow at Union College. He was a finalist in the Westinghouse Talent Search and also a finalist in the Westinghouse Talent Search and also a finalist in the National Honor Society Scholarship competition. Arne has been selected as a finalist for the Grumman Aircraft Engineering Corp. test.

Arne is majoring in science, mathematics and Latin and has earned honor marks in all three subjects. He plans to attend Swarthmore College in September.
