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Requiem Saturday For Wells; Jones Fund Bd Chairman

A requiem service will be held at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church this Saturday morning at 10:15 for LeRoy S. Wells of 22 California St., Hicksville, who died suddenly at 2:28 AM Wednesday while testifying before the Nassau County Grand Jury. The chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Jones Institute is residing at the Vernon Wagner Funeral Home, Old Country Rd. and Jerusalem Ave.

Born in St. James, Mr. Wells was a Hicksville resident for 25 years. He graduated from schools in Suffolk County in 1927 and following graduation from the Bentley School of Accounting and Finance in Boston, he immediately went to work in New York City area for a well-known bank. He was for 35 years an auditor of the Trust Administration Dept.

He is survived by his wife, Alice Norton Wells; two sons, Peter M. and Jeffery S. Wells; his mother, Wilhelmina Wells and his favorite niece, Mrs. Nancy Sheldon.

He was an exempt fireman and a longtime vestryman of the Episcopal Church. He was active in Scouting, a veteran of World War II and adjunct of the Charles Wagner Post, American Legion. He was a member of the Manetto Chapter of the Masonic Order. American Legion and Masonic services were scheduled for Friday night. Interment on Saturday will be at Cold Spring Memorial Cemetery.

He had last been re-elected a trustee of the Jones Fund at the general election of 1961. The Jones Institute in Hicksville provides shelter and comfort for some 100 elderly indigent men and women of Oyster Bay and North Hempstead Towns. The fund was established in 1837 by subscription and is named after Samuel Jones, New York's first comptroller and the



LeRoy S. Wells was credited with bringing about the State's ratification of the US Constitution.

Recently the Jones Institute came under criticism from some former trustees and the superintendent of the Institute was suspended pending a full investigation of the alleged charges.

Mr. Wells, not under attack or investigation, was being questioned in connection with a probe by the Nassau County District Attorney in his role as chairman of the board of trustees.

Also trustees of the Jones Fund are Bertha Gifford of Bethpage, Fremont David of Glen Cove and two residents of North Hempstead.

Dedicate New School Sunday

Cornerstone laying and dedication ceremonies for the new Willes Ave Elementary School in Hicksville, opened earlier this term, will take place this Sunday afternoon starting at 3 PM, according to School Board President Jerome G. Zettler, and the entire community is invited. Principal speaker will be Dr. E. H. LeBaron, former superintendent of schools.

President Zettler will preside at the cornerstone ceremony at 3 o'clock when the Rev. Douglas MacDonald, pastor of Parkway Community Church, will give the invocation and benediction.

He will also officiate at the dedication which follows at 3:30 PM. Rabbi Joseph Grossman will

give the invocation. There will be dedication prayer by the Rev. Dominic C. Clannella, pastor of Holy Trinity Episcopal Church; selections by Burns Ave School band and Woodland Ave School chorus. Fourth grade pupils will accept the building from A. Henry Johnson of the architectural firm of Knappe & Johnson.

The Rev. John Rowan of Holy Family Catholic Church will give the closing benediction.

The structure was built by Dobson Construction Co. Inc.

The project had a long and colorful history of development. Twice voters of the District rejected plans for a more elaborate building on the site.

Last Peak Was in 1960:

All-Time Record As 7,484 Enroll

An all-time peak registration of 7,484 voters are on the books for the annual school election and vote upon the Hicksville school and library budgets scheduled for next Wednesday, May 8, between 12 noon and 10 P.M. The total enrolled for the special referendum of last December was nearly doubled as 3,135 signed up on Saturday and Wednesday of the past week. The last previous high was 7,160 registered for the 1960 annual meeting.

With an estimated 24,000 eligible voters in the Hicksville, the enrollment represents about 51 percent. Past experience has shown that only about 75 to 80 percent of those registered get down to the school-library election polls to cast their ballots which would put the total anticipated vote at about 5,900.

Curiously in 1960 the present incumbents - Jerome Zettler, Herbert Johnson and Cornelius McCormack - were elected as only 3,800 out of 7,160 registered cast ballots. Johnson and Zettler carried everyone of the seven voting districts and McCormack carried six, dropping Dutch Lane.

There were a total of 2,162 voters registered on Wednesday, the last day, achieving peaks in almost every election area. Extra clerical assistance was pressed into service at Lee Ave. and East St., each of which came close to the 1500 mark.

Meanwhile the electioneering and campaigning continued as it was likely to do until the last hour. More than 600 persons attended a well-conducted candidate's forum at Junior High School, sponsored by the Hicksville PTA Council, Monday night. Many of the comments and presentations were a duplication of the forum held the previous week before the Midland Civic Assoc.

At a public discussion of the proposed school budget which ran from 8:15 to 1:20 AM in the High School auditorium on Thursday night, there was considerable detailed discussion of the entire budget item for item. However no basic changes were made in the form of the budget, detailed copies of which were mailed to all residents earlier this week.

The budget as now offered stands at \$10,913,869.25 compared with

Order Extra Voting Machines

\$10,327,080.62 this current year. The current school tax rate is \$3.379 per \$100 and is expected to rise about 36 cents to \$5.745, although this is subject to possible down ward revision when the final tax determining assessment is fixed on Aug. 1.

The library budget as proposed calls for a tax rate of 24 cents per \$100 or a gain of .007 cents to make the total estimated school-library rate \$5.965 as of the April 1 assessment estimate.

The race for election of a five-year trustee of the public library attracted little notice with neither of the two candidates releasing any information to this newspaper regarding themselves or their platforms. Ernest McClain who was appointed to the Board in December is seeking a full term. He is opposed by Edward M. Bello.

The slate of candidates sponsored by William A. Brubio Jr., self-styled minority member of the Board, in a press release this week switched its pitch from "economy" to "education" demanding after-school schooling to "aid failing students and others needing help in various subjects."

The slate consists of Harry M. Wagner, George M. Martin who ran unsuccessfully for library trustee last year, and Francis E. Heuter who has had his name on the school ballot, unsuccessfully, four times in the past.

No press releases or statements were received for publication this week from The

Taxpayers' Educational Assoc. for the Children of Hicksville which is sponsoring Herbert Malamud of Westbury and Irving Lawrence for the school board. The Assoc. this week was claiming a membership of 600 in the community.

Another new group, recently organized and calling itself the Time for a Change Committee, announced endorsement of Wagner, Martin, Heuter and Bello and issued a lengthy last minute barrage of charges thru co-chairmen Henry Chapen and Fred Bado claiming their candidates were the only ones to know certain things about per pupil costs, the district debt load and credit rating, financial soundness of the district, overstaffing in the schools and salaries paid teachers, supervisors and assistant principals.

No special claims were made on behalf of the Library Trustee candidate, except that he is not an incumbent.

The large Committee for Zettler, Johnson and McCormack, continued to stress their record of achievement. They urged all voters to first, approve the budget, and then re-elect Jerome Zettler, Herb Johnson and Neil McCormack. A special plea for their re-election was issued by George Moore, president of the Police Boys Club, citing the cooperation given by the Board of Education with PBC and other youth groups in making school facilities available.

Close RR Crossing Next Week

After several false starts and warnings, signs were posted this week at the Old Country Road RR grade crossing giving notice that barricades will go in place there at 6 AM on May 6 and the crossing will close to traffic for 4 to 5 days, according to Town Councilman A. Carl Grunewald. Steel for the overhead span is due to arrive at the site on Thursday. During the close down the hard back crown of the road will be reduced to make the overhead clearance 14 feet three inches.

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Herald Editorial Opinion:

Only Two Real Basic Issues in School Board Election

Because of the substantial registration of voters for the Wednesday, May 8, Hicksville school and library budget and trustee voting, apparently stimulated by a variety of reasons; and because of the numerous distorted and unrelated issues being circulated by flyer and word of mouth, we believe the real situation can be brought more sharply into focus by pointing out what ARE NOT ISSUES in the election.

School prayer is NOT AN ISSUE. Shortly after the Supreme Court decision on the New York State Regents' prayer, the Board adopted a stanza of the Star Spangled Banner and noted that it may be said as a prayer. This was by unanimous vote of the Board as constituted in June. This decision was taken by a taxpayer to the Commissioner of Education and berated that the adoption of a "prayer" is contrary to the Supreme Court ruling. No further appeal from this ruling has yet been taken because, upon advice of the school's attorney, there are several other "prayer" cases pending before the Supreme Court which may resolve the entire matter. In addition, there are legislative proposals pending in the state and in Congress to permit adoption of a prayer. Meanwhile, the Board has prescribed a period of daily silence.

The number of students passing or failing in studies IS NOT AN ISSUE. True all administrators, teachers and Board members as well as parents have a keen interest in seeing that pupils learn to the extent that they will achieve passing scores and much more. However, it is not a matter which can be legislated by a Board of Education. Actually, regular HERALD readers must have noted the excellent academic achievement of many of our boys and girls, which is a tribute to their teachers and to their own ability and application.

Patriotism IS NOT AN ISSUE. We believe that every candidate for the school board is a patriotic American citizen. There are not degrees of patriotism measured by the volume of noise generated by individuals. The School Board, working in cooperation with the Administration, has adopted workable safeguards to protect our children from subversive publications or works of subversive authors. This is a constant, never ending process. It requires alertness and intelligence.

Proposed or planned new or temporary school construction IS NOT AN ISSUE. The School Board has been giving careful attention to the development of our enrollment on all levels. Over the years the school board, with the cooperation of the voters, has submitted various proposals which reflect the McCormack projects and administrative recommendations. We have come thru a decade of tidal wave growth. If anything, the program approved by the voters has been right down the middle. This, too, is a never ending process, requiring constant study and attention. In this connection certain preliminary recommendations have been made to the

Board and to assist the Board in its considerations it is necessary to have rough cost estimates. Such very preliminary estimates have been circulated unethically in an effort to stampede the voters into one candidate group camp or another. Any proposal for new construction is a year-long process which climaxes with the submission of the proposal to public vote. No Board of Education can "slip one over on you". The people who raise this false issue know better and therein lies their dishonesty and shame.

There are many trivial side rumors being circulated, too numerous and all unable to stand even casual study, which ARE NOT ISSUES.

What are the real issues? First, the Annual District budget. In previous issues we have detailed the steps and time-consuming attention given to preparation of this massive fiscal estimate of what it will cost to operate the public school system, and such related matters as providing transportation for public and parochial or private school students, providing cooperation for the youth-serving groups of the community under the overall umbrella of the recreation program, etc. The basic interest of the Board of Education in preparing the budget is to provide what is necessary, and at as reasonable a cost as possible.

Failure to approve the budget results in increased costs to individual parents, the inconvenience of additional appearances at the polls and may eventually, under an austerity budget, result in the curtailment of those very special services which the people of the community value most: transportation, cafeteria, free text books, use of school facilities by non-school groups.

The second real issue is what kind of a Board of Education shall we have. Shall we have a Board composed of the kind of men who have brought our system along the road to the point where we have earned educational stature nationally and yet have retained per pupil cost at a comparatively low level? We earnestly believe the re-election of Jerome Zettler, Herbert H. Johnsen and Cornelius

McCormack represents our only opportunity in this election to preserve and develop this sane and logical approach. The other blocs of candidates in this election, as we detailed last week, fall into the extreme right (chop, cut, fire, intimidate, slash and eventually destroy) and the extreme liberal (spend more, build excessively, dump the time-proven McCormack projections and then hope the state or federal government will save us from bankruptcy).

The late Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, just prior to his retirement a little over two years ago from his

position of superintendent, wrote this previously unpublished capsule comment of how the school system had fared during his tenure which is worthy of thoughtful consideration of the eve of this fateful balloting: "Now the District is nearly saturated with population and school enrollments are approaching a peak. Periods of rapid growth are apt to be years of stress and strain. Major readjustments have to be made. Hicksville has its growing pains. I believe that the salient feature of these past seven years as Hicksville has matured has been the welcome change from bitter school controversy to relative harmony both within the school system and within the community. Without the development of this comparative harmony, educational gains could not have been made. As we face the future, I feel certain that we are on the right track. Perhaps the greatest resource, as we face the future is the interest of the people of Hicksville in education and their determination that the instruction of our schools shall be second to none." This was written by Dr. Lamb on Feb. 7, 1961.

The issues should be sharply in focus. Give your "yes" vote to the annual budget and re-elect Zettler, Johnsen and McCormack.

Dark Clouds Confusing Voters

I fear for the continued well being of our Hicksville School District. So many dark clouds have been manufactured to becloud and to confuse the voters of our community.

The poor school board member who is doing his best to "school-orient" the community and to "community orient" the school family, is always in the middle.

The arch-conservative beclouds his every effort with claims that he is watching the taxpayers' money--and the ultra-liberal on the other sides throws out his smoke screen claiming that the opposition is not doing enough for the school family.

Dear Mr. Zettler:
At the suggestion of Mr. Bruno in a mimeographed brochure I received last week, I am writing to you as president of the Board of Education to express my thoughts on school taxes.

As a taxpayer and retired teacher I am well aware of the bite that these taxes take from my annual income. Nevertheless, I hasten to affirm my belief that taxes should not be the first concern in planning an educational program. The first concern can only be the welfare of the children to prepare them adequately to be useful and intelligent citizens in the community. This is particularly true today when the poorly educated worker finds it increasingly hard to find satisfactory employment.

A good education, like most things of value, does not come cheap. It is paying lip service, indeed, to our concern for our children and our community if we are not willing to forego some luxuries and sacrifice a little, if need be, to give them the benefit of a first class education.

As supervisor of vocal music in Hicksville for over 30 years, it was my duty to help in the preparation of the budget. I know how difficult a job it is, how prices of all materials and equipment have risen, and how much more of everything has been needed to meet the needs of an increasing school population.

I have never felt that the Board of Education was extravagant. On the contrary, I had every reason to know and respect the fine tooth comb with which budget requests

were gone over. In the years in which I worked with the present Superintendent of Schools and School Board, I came to appreciate their integrity and conscientious devotion to the cause of education in Hicksville.

I was proud to be a member of the staff and sincerely hope that the gains they have made will not be lost in a short-sighted desire for cheap education. I do not believe cheap education is really what conscientious citizens want. At present Hicksville has an enviable record in New York State. Much of the credit belongs to the Superintendent and present Board of Education.

As one who has worked for them and with them I wish to extend my personal thanks for the good work they have done. I, for one, trust them to continue to work for the community welfare.

Mrs. Coffey is tired of listening to the "groaners", and I'm a bit nauseous because I think they are too few in number. Maybe we should split a bromel I imagine there would be more but, and I quote (1) "I wouldn't dare complain they'll take it out on the kid for the rest of the time he's in school." I think education in Hicksville has deteriorated gradually in the past few years and I'll go farther and say the fault lies directly in the laps of the proponents of the 20-60-20. What was wrong not too long ago when the brightest children in the class got the highest marks? Who objected? I don't think any child felt inferior then. There are still children who get marks in the 90's and those whose marks are in the 30's in the same class.

My daughter took the elementary algebra course in seventh grade and passed the final test in June, after having passed each quarter

too. She was relegated to second track the following year. When I dared ask why, I was told "It wasn't a regents, it was a New York State test and we can add or delete as we see fit." Indeed! There have been numerous deletions since.

I think education in Hicksville is geared to one group, out of which appear to be springing "special groups". The parents of the balance of the children are just the bulk of the Finance Committee.

I would like to know why, in the Jr. High School:

1. There is very little or no homework assigned to second track students. (Study period is 7 to 9 in this home)

2. Why are test papers not returned? I find having the children correct their errors is one of the best means of learning.

3. Why are marks on report cards in multiples of five? Couldn't this be a loss of from 8 to 15 plus points on a card in a single quarter?

4. Why doesn't somebody put ink in the mimeograph machine so the kids won't go blind trying to read "note sheets" and possibly tests?

5. Why is there a comparison made as a result of achievement tests between, let's say, the 8th grader who has had only normal grade level work all the way up and the 8th grader who has had five years of advanced work?

6. This is a little late in the term, but why did the regular 8th grade students not use the "Work and Handbook-Building Better English - 8"? Could it be because the first track children in lower grades are using it?

7. In the Sr. High School:

Why doesn't somebody clamp down on the minute number of teachers who add to marks outrageously? e.g. (a) a 32 class mark and a 35 quarterly mark is a 68 average, (b) a fifty average is shown as 75, (c) an 84 quarterly rates a 98 report card mark wouldn't the class average have to be about 104? and so on.

In view of the fact that the students are expected to act adult isn't it immature on the part of the teachers. I certainly wouldn't put it under the classifications of char-

Civic Board Takes Stand On Candidates, Issues May 8

Board Opposes Downzoning Plea

By Selma Constant

The Jericho Board of Education held an open meeting Apr. 25 to discuss plans for downzoning 75 acres of land owned by the Meadowbrook Country Club and presently used as a polo field. This area is now zoned for two-acre estates. Richard Charles, attorney for the Club said he wanted to sell 75 acres to be used as a site for an industrial plant.

When asked the nature of the proposed plan, Charles indicated that at the present time he was not at liberty to disclose this information.

Samuel Hecht, President of the Board, displayed maps of the area to the audience. He stated the Board's position in opposition to downzoning the area. The Board fears a chain reaction to downzoning in this instance, and expressed concern that such a result would have a devastating effect on the community. Once there is a zoning change for an industrial plant north of Jericho Turnpike, it would be impossible to deny applications for downzoning the 2 acre estates into 1/4 acre or 1/2 acre lots for housing purposes, he said.

The massive construction which would clearly follow would cause district school taxes to skyrocket. The Board's attorney was asked to present the views of the Board at the Town meeting on Tuesday, April 30. Members of the community who spoke at the Board meeting unanimously supported the Board's position.

Myron Kanter, President of the West Birchwood Civic Assoc. stated that the Board of Directors of the Civic Assoc. was present and had held a meeting after the presentation. The Board of Directors voted to oppose the downzoning, and to have representatives at the Town Board meeting to make their views known.

Long active in civic affairs, Meyers helped organize the Brookville Taxpayers Assoc., serving as president the past three years. Without the considerable state aid and additional resources that other Nassau communities have, we paid a lower

Complete approval of the High School expansion program and endorsement of Hal Felsher and Ira Hyams for the School Board was voted by the West Birchwood Civic Assn. Board of Directors at their last meeting. The endorsement was recommended by the Education Committee.

The Board of Directors also voted in favor of building a swimming pool at an estimated cost of \$100,000. The building of the pool, if approved, is contingent upon approval of the High School expansion. The High School and the pool issues are propositions number one and two on the ballot.

Propositions three and four were opposed by the Board. These would lower the eligibility age for the 1963-4 summer program (at a cost of \$3500.00), and provide transportation for children in kindergarten through third grade who live between a half mile and three quarters of a mile from the school.

Due to a lack of information, there was no vote on proposition number five — to build a school bus garage at an estimated cost of \$30,000.00.

The necessary additional space for the high school expansion will cost an estimated \$1.25 per month per homeowner beginning 1964-5. The Board of Directors feels that this amount is indeed moderate to pay to provide space definitely needed by 1966, when the school would be completed.

The construction of the pool would cost an estimated 7 1/2¢ per month per homeowner. The pool would be built in lieu of gym station required by the State Dept. of Education.

The voting on the 1963-64 school budget and propositions will take place in the High School gymnasium on Wednesday, May 8, between two and ten P.M. Registration of voters prior to the voting date is no longer a requirement in this district. Thirty days of residence in the district is still a requirement.

The Board of Directors urges all eligible voters to come out and vote.

equalized tax rate than 23 Nassau school districts did in 1962.

Yes, the costs of education go up each year, like the costs of everything else. The Jericho Board of Education is asking the taxpayer not for \$2000 but for fourteen cents per hundred dollars of assessed valuation. So far this month, Massapequa is asking for \$3.36, Plainview for \$3.77, Roslyn for \$3.20, Baldwin for \$3.31, Oceanside for \$2.27, Freeport for \$3.36.

A county school system would be ideal. It would offer, among other advantages, pooled resources and specialized high schools. During this month, there were indications that the separate attempts of a group of nine northern Suffolk school districts to merge are doomed to failure. Centralization may not be achieved in Nassau County for many years. It is not necessarily true that a centralized system will cost less. Wealthier districts will have to carry poorer ones.

It seems futile to deny Jericho students facilities in the hope that Nassau County will provide them tomorrow.

So far as a public library is concerned books and good teachers are the heart of a good

school system. Jericho needs both, and both cost money. I have advocated a public library and adequate school facilities for many years. They are separate and necessary parts of any civilized community.

Assoc. Backing Syosset Budget

After extensive investigation and discussion by its Syosset Education Committee and its Executive Committee, the Birchwood Civic Association at Jericho, Inc. has recommended a YES vote on the proposed Syosset School Budget (Central School District No 2) for the 1963-64 school year.

However, it takes exception to several parts of the proposed budget, and wishes to take this opportunity to bring these parts to the attention of the residents the School Board, and the School Administration.

There is a consistent over-estimation of student enrollment each year. This results in monies being appropriated which are not necessary. While it is true that these funds are saved for the opening balance of the following year, it is possible that there is an inclination to spend these amounts in areas and projects which would not be possible if the funds were not available.

On the subject of teachers' salaries, it was felt that it would be preferable for increases to be granted for reasons other than "everybody else is getting it." A committee should be formed to study the competitive wage-paying between school districts. Perhaps a county-wide salary scale would benefit all concerned and put an end to this annual game of fiscal tag!

The Syosset School District has decided to pioneer in the area of vocational training. While granting the necessity and desirability of such education, the Civic Assoc. questions whether this district can afford this effort in view of the alarming tax rate.

Faced with this tremendous budget increase, the timing of salary increases for clerks and maintenance personnel is questionable.

The Civic Assoc. recommends a YES vote on the proposition to sell the school property bordering Forest Drive and surrounded by Forest Lane in our community. It does this fully cognizant of the fact that the tax-saving realized from the sale will be one year only, but in the anticipation that the area will be developed and improved with homes built in conformance with Residential "C" zoning regulations.

In conclusion, the Birchwood Civic Assoc. would remind the School Board, Administration and residents that the day of reckoning...the breaking point when the budget will zoom beyond the ability or willingness of the taxpayer to pay...it will soon be here! Before this happens, it is hoped that the State officials will realize that means of school support and aid other than property taxes must be found.

This can only come to pass through enlightened political leadership or an aroused citizenry.
