Bruno Sues Lawrence

Approve Budgets In Heavy Voting

Speculation about the future course of affairs in Hicksville School District and its Board of Education commenced last night almost before the last click was heard from the 16 voting machines. In one of the heaviest balloting in the history of the District, Irving Lawrence was elected to the school board to defeat Board President Jerome Zettler by 645 votes. It was conceded in some quarters that Harry Wagner, running as the third candidate for the same seat probably diluted a pro-Zettler vote and thus contributed to Lawrence's election.

Incumbents Herbert H. Johnson and Cornelius McCormack were re-elected for three-year terms. The new terms of all elected start on July 1.

The school district and library budgets were approved in Hicksville by reasonable margins.

Campaigning and campaign issues continued almost up to the final hour. Shortly after midnight, Sunday, William A. Bruno Jr., served Lawrence with a summons in a \$100,000 slander action which is returnable in Nassau Supreme Court on May 24. Among other allegations, Board Member Bruno asserted that he was slandered by Lawrence at a recent candidate's appearance.

In another unusual last-minute development former Board members Robert D. P. Eaton and Elwood S. Kent came out with an endorsement of Lawrence and Francis Hester for the Board in the interest of "harmony".

Voting was steady and heavy at all polling places on Wednesday and there were lines of voters when the polls were closed at Lee Ave. and East St. despite the installation of extra voting machines. All seven Board members were present for the final tabulation of votes on Wednesday night and a large crowd of interested voters was present to hear the official score.

The passage of the school budget and the defeat of Wagner, Hester, and George Martin was seen as a blow to Bruno who had urged defeat of the budget and the election of three candidates of his choosing.

Lawrence with Herbert Malamud had campaigned on a platform which included, among other things, curbing of Bruno. As a result, some interesting clashes are anticipated when the Board reorganizes in July.

Almost everyone took sides in the election. George A. Jackson and D. F. Sabatella, trustees, came out with an endorsement of Lawrence and Malamud. Bruno had his own slate running. Of all the seven Board members, only George Kunz refrained from any printed or published endorsements.

Zettler is concluding six years (two terms) on the Board and Johnson will be starting his third three-year term while McCormack is commencing his second three-year term.

Family Service Office Coming

A new Family Service office will be opened in Hicksville by Catholic Charities, Diocese of Rockville Centre, on June 3rd, according to an announcement by the Most Rev. Walter P. Kellenberg, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese of Rockville Centre. Initially, the office will be staffed with a supervisor, four case workers and two clerical workers and will provide family counseling services to Hicksville and the surrounding communities.

Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles E. Birmingham, Executive Director of Catholic Charities, said that the Hicksville location was selected in line with Catholic Charities' policy of bringing facilities as close as possible to the areas where the greatest demand for services exists. He extended thanks to Rt. Rev. Msgr. Martin J. O'Dea, pastor of Holy Family Parish, for making parish property available for the new office.

Postal Zone Test Coming

The Hicksville-Plainview-Old Bethpage area has been selected for postal zoning by the Post Office Dept., in preparation for a revolutionary electronic mail processing system to commence July 1, Hicksville Postmaster Irene L. Murphy announced today.

Postmaster Murphy stressed the urgency of each mail user learning the zone within which he lives, as soon as the zone boundaries are announced, and using the number in his return address. Publishers, in particular, should be advised of the patron's ZIP Code Number.

The new postal zone numbers, when coupled with a three-digit number to be given the post office, will form the ZIP Code -- a system by which some out-of-town mail deliveries will be sped by as much as 24 hours.

"Use of local postal zone numbers will not only speed your mail, through the national ZIP-Code program," Postmaster Murphy noted, "but will virtually eliminate the possibility of misdirected mail. For example, in our community, many residents use the address Old Bethpage or Bethpage although they are within the Plainview delivery area. These residents understandably identify with the communities named. If they use their ZIP Zone Number there can be no delay in delivery, as has occurred in the past."

Postmaster Murphy revealed that her own local mail experts, with representatives of the N.Y. Regional Office and the Post Office Dept. headquarters in Washington, have been at work mapping out the city from the standpoint of fast and efficient mail delivery, and assigning zone numbers to sub-stations and neighborhoods.

The zone numbers and boundaries for Hicksville will be announced within the next few weeks, Postmaster Murphy assured.

AUXILIARY NEWS

On Friday May 17, the Charles Wagner Post #421, American Legion Auxiliary will open their annual Poppy Drive. If you are asked to "wear a Poppy" don't be annoyed but think of some of the following facts: Poppy Day is a memorial to American war dead and a tribute to disabled servicemen originated after the first World War. The red crepe paper memorial poppies worn throughout the nation on Poppy Day are made by veterans in hospitals and work shops in 40 states. These disabled service men are paid for each hand-made poppy they make, and the materials are furnished free by the American Legion Auxiliary in the states where the hospitals are located. By "wearing a poppy" on Poppy Day each American can honor the sacrifice made by our service men while assisting the living.

Fed Education Aid is Topic

The Marian Guild of St. Paul the Apostle Parish, Muttontown, heard an interesting discussion on Federal Aid to Education at their April 16th meeting held in the Jericho Fire House. The 150 women present were given a brief background on the Federal Aid question by Rev. Francis G. McCormack of St. Edward the Confessor Church, Syosset.

The Federal Aid proposal as it now stands was discussed by Mrs. William T. Cosulich, P.T.A. President in Syosset, who gave the principal address. She said that the present Aid to Education Bill, if adopted by Congress, could tax out of existence many, if not all, existing private schools and make it impossible for millions of parents to exercise their natural right to choose the type of school they would have their children attend, whether sectarian or non-sectarian. Mrs. Cosulich, an informed

lecturer on the Federal Aid Subject, upheld the traditional American concept of the separation between Church and State, but questioned how it would be unconstitutional to give Federal support to private and church affiliated schools in the United States when it is constitutional to give American tax dollars to support, for example Mohammedan schools in Tunisia.

In Jericho's pursuit of educational excellence, Dr. Carey was chosen after a six-month search throughout the nation "because of the truly outstanding administrative ability he has demonstrated throughout his career in school administration," Mr. Hecht added.

The preliminary screening of applications was done by a panel of three renowned educators--Dr. Willard S. Elabree, Head of the Department of Educational Administration, Columbia University, New York City; Dr. Harold C. Hunt of Harvard University, Cambridge Mass.; and Dean Hollis A. Moore, Jr. of Teachers College of Arizona University, Tucson, Arizona.

After screening 72 applications, the panel recommended six finalists to the board. In all, the board interviewed seven candidates and made several visits to their respective out-of-town districts before making its choice.

In the past ten years, Jericho, has grown from a one-school community with 700 children to a five-building district educating almost 3,500 pupils. On May 8, residents will be voting on what is expected to be the final phase of the community's building program, the expansion of the High School on Cedar Swamp Road.

The Hemingway hero goes through the wars, is wounded, sees the world through mordant eyes but eventually considers that there is nothing for the individual to do to counter a blind, remorse-

less, fateful world but to blunt his sensibilities in sensual escape while the sharks devour him in small bites.

Sergeant X, in Salinger's early short story *For Esme - With Love and Squalor*, goes through the wars. Before D-Day he had met a young girl, named Esme, in England who had asked him to write her an "extremely squalid and moving story". adding "Are you at all acquainted with squalor?" To which he had replied "Not exactly but that I was getting better acquainted with it, in one form or another, all the time..." But now Sergeant X, more sensitive, or at any rate less stoic, than a Hemingway hero, is languishing in Germany with a nervous breakdown shortly after V-E Day.

While idly thumbing through a book by Goebbels which had been owned by a woman who was a minor Nazi official, Sergeant X notes that she had pencilled in "Dear God, Life is hell." He intuitively appeals to this a quotation from Father Zossima in *The Brothers Karamazov*: "Fathers and teachers, I ponder 'What is hell?' I maintain that it is the suffering of being unable to love." Shortly after this he receives a package from Esme which contains a watch that had belonged to her father, who had been killed in the war. This gratuitous act of love, coming on top of his previous intuition, allows Sergeant X to fall asleep for the first time in a long while.

Salinger has been trying to write

"extremely squalid and moving stories" for Esme, with love, ever since.

In *The Catcher in the Rye* squalor is defined definitively through the implacable young eyes of Helen Caulfield. Refusing to back away from his search for truth, he exacerbates his sensibilities to the breaking point. His intransigence leads him to the sanatorium but it has also led him beyond cynicism. He knows what squalor is. He knows now that he wants to be the catcher in the rye who catches the kids before they fall off the cliff. He has the will although he still has to find the way.

As de Daumier-Smith says it, in *De Daumier-Smith's Blue Period*, another Salinger short story, "The thought was forced upon me that no matter how coolly or sensibly or gracefully I might one day learn to live my life, I would always be a visitor in a garden of enamel urns and bedpens with a slightest wooden dummy-deity standing by in a marked-down rupture truss." But what happens?

Suddenly the objects of ugliness and misery in the window of the orthopedic appliance shop turn into "a shimmering field of exquisite, twice-blessed enamel flowers."

But the squalid objects of life seldom, if ever, become permanently transformed so easily. It is to the business of endowing squalor with beauty through love that Salinger turns in his concern with the Glass family.

The Glass family is insulated from squalor by their family self-sufficiency, by their love for each other, but only up to a certain point. Seymour, the oldest brother has been their teacher. They have been formed by him and see the world through his eyes. But why did Seymour do away with himself?

They are committed to Seymour yet somehow have to go beyond him if they are to avoid turning in upon themselves in a destructive manner.

The truth is that they do not love the world. They love only the loveable. They have been brought up to know the techniques of all-embracing love but they have not been able to bring themselves to

apply them to the squalor that they see around them. Zoey has saved Franny, at least temporarily, from a nervous breakdown by convincing her that the Fat Lady, Seymour's symbol for the eternal vulgarian, is Christ himself. However, it seems unlikely that the Glass family members can be eternally moved to love by this conception, in and of itself.

The Glass family saga is truly a work in progress. As Salinger adds a chunk here, a tentative chunk there, he seems at times to be on the way to attaining what he is after but at others to be fearful that he is cracking under the strain that he will soon have nothing more to say.

Hub Haddon has said that Salinger's "most recent stories betray his efforts to discover a language which can reconcile the wordless impulse of love to the discursive irony of squalor." It is to be hoped that Salinger's experiments with form and language will enable him eventually to break through to a true revelation, in literary form, of the potential force of love in the world.
