## ZIP Postal Code Effective on July 1

Local ZIP Code numbers to be used by all Post Office patrons were announced this week by Acting Postmaster Irene L. Murphy. The Hicksville-Plainview Old Bethpage area will be numbered as follows:

11801 Hicksville  
11802 Hicksville Boxholders  
11803 Plainview  
11804 Old Bethpage

Local ZIP Directories will be distributed to all patrons in the near future. The ZIP Code goes into effect July 1st nationwide and all patrons are encouraged to use the ZIP Code numbers of their correspondents as well as their own Code number in return addresses. The ZIP Code number should be placed after the name of the State in the address.

The Hicksville Post Office, which is already a transfer point or sectional center for eleven nearby offices, will serve a larger number of offices in the future. The Hicksville Sectional Center number will be 117 and each of the offices served by it will be numbered 117 plus its own final two digit number. Thus Amityville, served by the Hicksville Sectional Center, will bear the number 11701. Numbers of other nearby Sectional Centers are as follows: White Plains 105; Suffern 109; Long Island City 110; Mineola 115; Riverhead 119; Monticello 127; Poughkeepsie 125.

The ZIP Code serves to speed the flow of mail by shortening the time involved in distributing mail and by reducing errors caused by improper addresses. It is estimated that the use of the ZIP Code by large mailers will promote the use of electronic sorting equipment and other devices to cut down on mail handling time.

## Plan Surfacing On Lenox Ave

The finishing touches will be placed on the Lenox Ave. area of Hicksville which has been undergoing storm water drainage treatment this summer. It was announced by Supervisor Thomas R. Pynchon.

On motion of Councilman A. Carl Grunewald the Town Board approved the resurfacing of the area with a bituminous mix. Bids will be received, publicly opened and read at Town Hall, June 20.

The project was recommended by Highway Superintendent Norman T. Wolf, covering about 4,600 linear feet of roadway on Lenox Avenue, William Place, Thorndale Avenue, Notre Dame Avenue, Emmett, Ormond and Desmond Places.

Resurfacing will cover about 30 feet in width. The engineer's estimate was \$16,685.

## First in Latin Test

Stephen M. O'Brien, representing Hicksville High School, won \$35 and first prize in the two-year Latin division in the New York Classical Club scholarship examination held May 10 at Columbia University. # Long-Awaited Verdict: Nix Library Buy With Tax Money

The long-awaited decision by Supreme Court Justice Joseph Suozzi on the challenge by a group of taxpayers regarding the purchase of some Jerusalem Ave. property by the Hicksville Library Trustees came thru this week and seemed to emphasize the shortcomings of the State Education Law regarding public library operations.

Harry H. Goebel, attorney for George M. Martin and nine other taxpayers, felt that the decision was a victory. "The principal is established by this decision that the Library Board is subject to the same limits regarding public property as the school district and any other governmental agency," he said.

"The decision established as fact that all pledging of credit of the taxpayer must be in accordance with the terms and conditions prescribed by the Local Finance Law."

The plaintiffs raised two issues: They questioned the authority of the library board to purchase property without prior approval of the voters of the school district, and the power of the library to execute a purchase money mortgage which they contended was in violation of the Local Finance Law.

The issue went to court prior to the unsuccessful Dec. 12, referendum on a bond issue to enlarge the library building, spreading north into the former Christ property (now done) which became involved in the litigation.

The action was brought against the School Board, which was involved largely because under the Education Law the School Board must conduct referenda, sell bonds, etc for a library proposal. Also named were the five trustees of the Public Library, two of whom (Elizabeth Scherer and John Hanson) have since resigned, and

John E. and Anna B. Christ.

There was a battery of legal talent on hand. Joseph C. Catalano represented the school board, Kenneth C. Smith, the library trustees and C.H. Tummel Jones, the Christs.

What Justice Suozzi said in his decision was this: "The Court will defer granting summary judgment to plaintiffs if the defendants Library (trustees) and Christ are prepared to do the following: (1) defendants Christ return so much of the down payment as come from tax moneys, to wit, \$1,000, and that portion of the fines and fees, if any, which were offset in the budget in computing the tax levy for that year; (2) defendants Christ accept a mortgage, not containing a covenant to pay, without a bond, for the full purchase price less that portion of the down payment which need not be refunded in accordance with this decision; and (3) defendants Christ and the Library fix the periodic mortgage payments at a level that will permit the rental income from the property to satisfy the mortgage obligation."

Elery Bean, vice president of the Library Trustees, said he had no comment to make regarding the decision and would await the report of Attorney Smith to the Library Board at its next meeting.

Jerome Zettler, president of the Board of Education, told the HERALD "there always had been

a question in my mind if budget funds could be used by the library trustees for the purchase of property without a specific voter approval of such purchase."

It was unofficially reported that an appeal may be taken from Judge Suozzi's decision because of the precedent setting nature of the verdict and its effect upon other public libraries in the state. Some people in the legal division of the State Education Dept. were also, unofficially, reported most unhappy with the decision.

What the Judge said, in simple language, was that the Library trustees can use fine money (which had not already been figured as applying toward reduction of the tax rate) and other income, such as rent from the house on the property, to pay off a mortgage. However, the trustees may not use a dime of tax money unless the purchase has been submitted to a referendum.

The decision could have the effect of stalling for years the expansion of the library. The property cost \$24,000 with a down payment of \$7,000, \$1,000 of which must be returned because it was tax money. Presumably the rest of the house and fines collected for overdue books might pay off the mortgage in ten or 15 years. Then the Trustees could deed the land to the school district and the way would be clear to build a structure on it with tax money.

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# Herald Editorial Comment:

## Inhuman Torture Along B way

In these days of great concern about civil rights and human relations, the great State of New York thru its Department of Public Works is practicing a form of inhuman anguish and torture here which should not be tolerated.

Our gripe is the Sword of Damocles situation regarding the possibility or likelihood of widening Broadway, Hicksville, thru the center of town. Many property owners along the west side of Broadway between the LIRR and Old Country Rd. live in a world of rumor, speculation, uncertainty.

It all began about five years ago when it became known that somebody at the State Dept. of Public Works office in Babylon had drawn a red line on the map of Broadway, which is a state highway, indicating a 30-foot widening. At that time, and ever since, all anyone can get officially about that line is that planners must look ahead and such a widening is contemplated for "some day we ought-to" projects.

We said editorially five years ago that it was going to be a long time, if ever, for the State to get around to this "we ought-to" plan. For one thing, there are many other more pressing state projects in our immediate area

(including widening of Newbridge Rd.) for which no money has been appropriated. A 30-foot taking off Broadway would cost millions for property condemnation alone.

But every once in a while the rumors start flying again and the worries and fears are rekindled. The Chamber of Commerce has been trying for about three years or more to get something definite out of the State people: yes or no, and if yes, when.

We know business people and property owners in this sector who have invested considerable sums in property improvements that they fear will be wiped out. Others and delaying needed improvements because they can't get anything definite. Will it be this year, next decade?

It took 40 years for the State to get around to the urgently needed Hicksville RR grade crossing elimination and then it only moved because a great deal of heat and pressure was generated locally. At that rate, we can expect the widening of Broadway may take place about 35 or more years from now --- and by that time we'll all be riding helicopters and won't need a state highway.

lican administration and the Democrats.

"This exposition has revealed the Democrats to be inextricably tied to big city-type centralized government, through their support of the construction of high-rise apartment houses in our Town's suburban communities. Kilt later signed up with the New York Yankees as a \$70,000 bonus baby. Oceanside won 3-1, behind the overpowering smokos, tossed by Kilt. "But that's all Stone Age Jive", said the local buff who will probably be glimmering this column. So let's get back to the age of modernity. In 63, we had a great southpaw, named Jim Erwin, going for us. "Ernie", as they call him, held on to that 1 run lead, like an old pickaninny with halitosis. ## Police Advise Residents

The Nassau County Police Dept. recommends that all residents adopt the following procedures to curtail and discourage burglaries in their homes.

1. WHEN YOU LEAVE HOME FOR THE DAY OR EVENING:
  - a. Lock all windows and doors, including basement.
  - b. Leave a light burning at night.
  - c. Close and lock your garage door.
  - d. Don't leave notes explaining your absence.
  - e. Don't leave a key under the mat or in the letterbox, or any other place.
  - f. Don't leave a ladder where a burglar can use it to gain entry.
2. WHEN YOU LEAVE HOME FOR AN EXTENDED PERIOD, FOLLOW ABOVE AND:
  - a. Notify police, so they can check your home.
  - b. Stop deliveries of mail, milk and newspapers.
  - c. Ask a neighbor to remove circulars from letterbox, and to keep an eye on house and property.
  - d. Eliminate as much as possible any indication that you are absent.
3. NOTIFY POLICE IMMEDIATELY IF:
  - a. Stangers, young or old, ring doorbells and ask vague or

- strange questions.
  - b. Persons without credentials ring doorbells, seek employment, or attempt to gain admittance to your home to solicit or sell.
  - c. Stangers seek information about your family or neighbors, or their whereabouts.
  - d. You receive a number of phone calls, and the caller hangs up when you answer.
  - e. Suspicious persons or cars are in your neighborhood.
- (If any of the above instances make note of a license plate number if possible.)
4. ALWAYS:
    - a. Safeguard money, expensive jewelry and pocketbooks, and do not display same when strangers are in your home.
    - b. Ask to see the license and/or credentials of salesmen. Most communities require door-to-door solicitors to be licensed, and legitimate firms provide their employees with identifying credentials.
    - c. Know whom you admit to your home, and deny admittance to anyone who is not properly identified.
    - d. Maintain a list of your valuables, including descriptive numbers and markings.
    - e. Eliminate opportunity for burglars and thieves.

## Speaker Explains Financial Aid

Mrs. Naomi Gelman of the Long Island School Finance Committee addressed the West Birchwood Civic Assoc Education Committee on May 27, at the Canticque school on the subject of state aid to education.

She pointed out that state aid is paid on the weighted average daily attendance of the school district. Weighting is assigned on the basis of the class level; e.g., a Kindergarten child would be rated .50, first through sixth grade would be 1.00, and grades 7-12 would be 1.25. Aid is also based on the ability of the district to pay. The criterion employed is the true property value of the district, that is, the value of real estate in relation to property values all over the state. The true value of the district's real estate is divided by the weighted average daily attendance, and this result determines the ability of the district to pay.

Contrary to what many taxpayers believe, she went on to state aid is not granted on the basis of Assessed Property Value (what property is assessed at in a particular area), but on the Equalization Rate (the ratio between the localities' assessments and the

real property value of the state.) The district gets its state aid on the basis of the Diefendorf Ratio which equals 1 minus the district's ability to pay-divided by the State's ability to pay-times .51. If the district's ability to pay is .51, the state would pay .49. Some districts have more than the ability to pay. These districts are given what is called a flat grant. Jericho is one of the districts which receives such a grant. In Jericho, every weighted average daily attendance receives the flat grant of \$130.

State Aid is paid in three categories:

1. Current expenses.
  2. Allowable debt service (interest and amortization on loans for school bldgs.)
  3. 90% of allowable transportation costs. (based on Nassau transportation)
- Mrs. Gelman stressed that State Aid would be increased if State income taxes were raised. This would permit a drop in school and property taxes. The Long Island School Finance Committee advocates a change in the present law which sets a \$500 limit in state aid for each child.

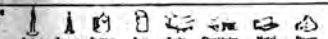

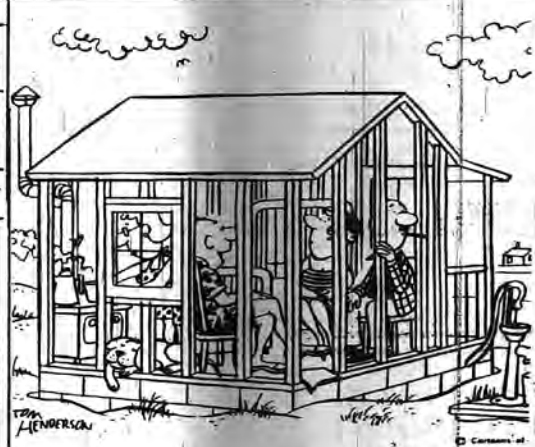

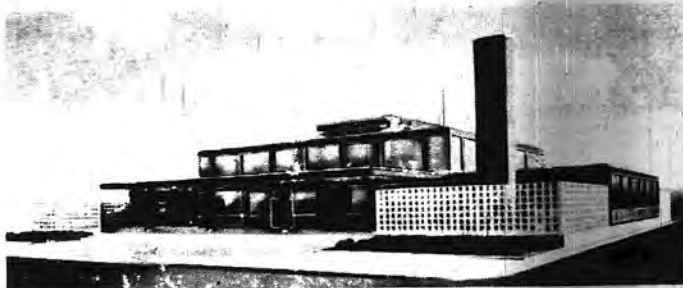
