He expressed his thanks and appreciation to all who voted in the Primary election

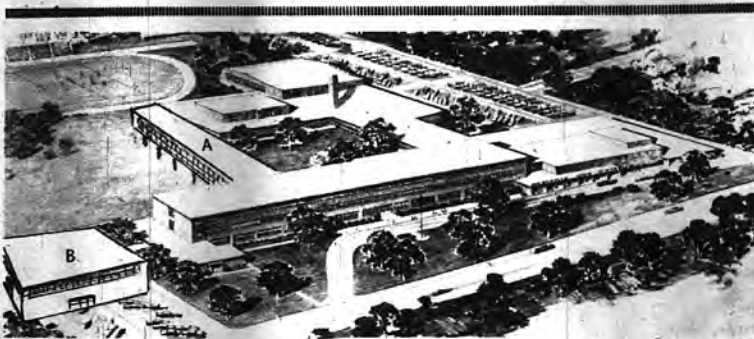

Plan Two Additions for High School

GOP Voters Reject Insurgent Bid

C. Bruce Pearsall, Oyster Bay Town Republican Leader, following the Primary Elections last Thursday predicted the GOP team led by Town Supervisor Thomas R. Pynchon will "carry on a positive and progressive campaign that will result in a thorough defeat of the Democrats in November."

The incumbent GOP designees for Town Councilmen were named in the tally of 173 election districts. Unofficial returns gave Edmund Ocker 9,630, Edward Poulos 9,250 and A. Carl Grunewald (whose name wound up at the end of the ballot by draw) 8,463.

The "insurgents", backed by former GOP Executive Committee member Philip F. Robinson of Hicksville, received the following unofficial tally: William Musso 2,131, Arthur Levy 984 and George E. Bailey 1,127.

Robinson lost his seat as a committeeman in the 39th election district of Hicksville. He received 92 votes and Thomas P. Flannery 162. In the same district, Bailey got 89 votes and Vincent H. Crouchley 149.

Another contested Hicksville district was the 80th where William A. Bruno Jr. received 59 votes to be defeated by his former co-committeeman, Bernard J. Wesnoske with 130, while Edward M. Trehan in the same race polled 41 votes. Hugo F. A. Spadaro was also elected a committeeman there with 129 votes, defeating Bruno's running mate, Edward M. Rello who got 45.

The voting on Sept. 5 was limited to enrolled Republican party members with polls open from 12 noon to 9 PM. Pearsall told committeemen and others gathered at the Old Country Manor in Hicksville to receive the returns that he considered the primary contest between local candidates "a healthy function of politics as it gave all Republicans an opportunity to

examine the primary candidates' qualifications for office before casting their ballots.

"The voters have now made their selection and have chosen the most experienced and qualified candidates to seek office as incumbents under the GOP Party Banner, and to continue their fine work on the Town Board on behalf of the people of the Town of Oyster Bay."

Turning to the November election, Pearsall declared: "The Democrat leader of the Town of Oyster Bay has unwittingly revealed in his statements that his party is committed to the philosophy of citification of the suburbs. In my view and those of the members of the Town Board, this Democrat program would totally wreck our suburban way of life. I am confident that the Republicans, independents and many Democrats will reject this scheme to turn the Town of Oyster Bay into a city complete with high rise apartments and this will result in a resounding victory for Supervisor Pynchon and his running mates in November."

Speaking Tuesday night of this week before 350 GOP Commit-

teemen at the Holiday Manor, Bethpage, where he was re-elected Town GOP Chairman, Pearsall said: "I pledge to you a positive program and hard-hitting campaign that will result in the election of Town officials who have made a shining record in the service of the people of the Township."

"We believe the people of the Township have a real choice in this election. They can support the Democrats who, by their statements and actions, point the way toward citification of the suburbs or they can support the Republican officials whose accomplishments in office are available for all homeowners and taxpayers to see."

Installation of two new traffic signals has been approved by County Executive Eugene Nickerson for Hicksville. They are planned for Old Country Rd and Division Ave. and for Jerusalem Ave at 10th St.

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AROUND THE DISTRICT: Golden Gridiron Years

THE GOLDEN YEARS. Thanks to the efforts of Athletic Director, Chet Jaworski and his secretary, Dot Seide, we've been given the opportunity of looking back at the golden years in Hicksville High School sports. The year is 1925...38 years ago this month and as we head down memory lane, we run smack dab into a young old-timer by the name of Bill Geyer. Bill, whom we had the pleasure of meeting last year at the Alumni Dinner, was a member of Hicksville's first Varsity Football Team. He looked a wee bit younger now as we caught him and the other members of that first team, storming noisily out of the Nicholas St. School.

"How come you had to dress over here?" we asked, knowing full well, that barely two weeks before, the new Jerusalem, Avenue High School, had opened its modern day counterparts, the students moved in, before the building was completely finished. "The lockerrooms" aren't ready yet," said a spokesman, who turned out to be the first Varsity Captain of a Hicksville football team. His name was Walter Schlichting and he was standing, next to another, first (acting captain Lou Millevotte). Both agreed the seasons opener was going to be a rough one. The opponent was the Manhasset "Indians" and they weren't likely to be scalped by this brand new ball club. "If only we knew how to score," said Bill Geyer from the sidelines. He had been talking to other members of the group and all agreed, that Manhasset, would prove, tough braves to slay. And so it went, on that rainy Saturday afternoon, 38 years ago, this month. The other members of the team were, Manager, Stiehler, Tom Morselli, Wallace Heidtman, Abe Israelowitz, Jack Kearney, Ed Donati, Clarence Heller, Russell Graef, Stanley Bergold, Ralph Herberer and Joe Bauer. At the season's end, all were destined to receive the first Varsity football letters, in the History of Hicksville High and as expected by all but themselves, they wound up with a mediocre, 1-5 season. Mighty Manhasset mauled them, 56-0 in the opener; Great Neck, shut them out 6-0 in the 2nd outing in the 3rd game, they finally learned how to score and upset Westbury, 13-0. This was their first and last win of the season. Shutouts by Friends Academy, Malverne and Huntington followed. Both, Friends and Malverne took 6-0 decisions and Huntington ground out a 32-0 rout. A so-so year but nothing to be ashamed of for a 1st year club.

The following year (1926) the situation was reversed. Hicksville won 5 and lost 2. Lou Millevotte was elected Captain and Tom Morselli, acting Captain. Other members of the team were: Ed Donati, Harold and Stan Bergold, Orist Millevotte, Joe Bauer, Bill Humphries, Austin Smith, Abe Israelowitz, Ed Kasten, Bill Geyer, John Ruel, Ed Valentine, Stan Klevanosky and Jack Youldeman as the man-

ager. In the opener, Hicksville knocked off Huntington 6-0. Manhasset came up with another rout (33-0) and Great Neck followed with a 12-0 win. After that Hicksville swept to four straight wins, to close out the season. They bounced Baldwin 2-0 on a forfeit, walloped Westbury 16-0, wrapped Friends 20-0 and wound up a great season, by anesthetizing Amityville, 6-0. The Comets were on their way and in future columns, we'll take you along with them as they wind their way down memory lane.

There'll be more names and more statistics including a Hicksville 26-0 rout of Manhasset in 1928, a fabulous 29 season that saw Hicksville win 7 and lose 1; scoring 158 points to the opposition's 39 and a high scoring 77-6 win over Long Beach in 1931, when present school Board Member, Dom Sabatella was the team captain. This is your life, Comets...So let's go-go in '63 and while we're at it, let's get another plug in for Chet Jaworski and Dot Seide, or providing the statistics, which made this part of the column possible. There'll be more and if there's any old pictures laying around, gathering dust...Let's get them out of the scrapbook and onto the pages of the Mid-Island Herald. Send to Editor Fred Noeth in our care.

WHAT WERE TARZAN'S LAST WORDS? ... "Who greased the vines?"...he said. And now that we've got that curtnail out of our system, what else does a guy write about, when the local sportsbeat is in the socially dormant stage. Does he latch on to the juvenile exuberance angle, vandalism, automation, World War III, the population explosion, or what. Most of these subjects are designed to scare an unwary reader, half to death and things are apt to be a lot worse if he happens to be in the twilight of life and suffering from a slight case of "Sixpakitis". When this happens, you come up with a poor reader, that could go either way with claustrophobic tendencies. But don't laugh dear reader...This could easily have happened to you; especially if you were a middle class working buff and knew from the size of the wallet you were packing that the Japanese wouldn't be selling you bits of souvenir brick, that happened to survive the atomic blast. It was near vacation time and you also came to the definite conclusion, that the hula girls in Honolulu also wouldn't be giving you the Aloha, Mahulu or Lei treatment this year. In fact, the size of that wallet was going to limit you to a fast trip around the island, providing you walked most of the way. So then what happens on practically the eve of your vacation? We hope this part of her letter was written in a moment of haste and does not share the feelings of our residents.

I am, and have been for the past three years, a member of the Education Committee of the Birchwood Civic Assoc.

I must now protest the action of the Civic Association's Board of Directors, together with informing the Community as to the true worth of the Board's recommendations, with respect to the Jericho School District.

In recent months the Board as seen fit to disregard the recommendations of the Education Committee. A governing Board such as this should take action that respects the will of the people rather than arbitrarily telling them what to do!

In May of this year, the Education Committee recommended the acceptance of the Budget, the High School expansion program and the Bus Maintenance Garage. The feeling of the Committee was that the swimming pool, being a personal thing, should be left to the individual to decide for himself. No recommendation was made for or against it.

A letter, together with an already cut stencil, spelling out the above, was submitted to the Civic Assoc. It was never run off and consequently never mailed to the Community (nor was any communication sent in its place). After having spent many hours on these important items, the Committee found itself completely disregarded.

How, then, can the Civic Assoc. Board now make the statement requesting a second "No" on the pool and garage when there never was a first "No"? Furthermore, now can the Board insult the intelligence of the residents of the Community by requesting this "No" without giving a reason other than "that the situation had not changed"? What "situation"? There never had been a "situation" in the first place!

If the excuse is given that the Board was trying to keep the Community informed of latest developments, as they are constantly trying to impress upon the Community that they are so doing, why was no statement made about the 5¢ decrease in school taxes? (19¢ below the expected tax rate; which fact was made public at the School Board meeting of Thursday, Aug. 8th and printed in Newsday of Friday, Aug. 9th?)

The Board, complained, last May, that they received copies of the Budget too late to make a thorough study of it, but that West Birchwood seemed to be getting inside information. This is as good a time as any to answer that ridiculous charge.

The fact is that West Birchwood has constant representation at every School Board meeting as well as a complete column in their newspaper reporting everything that takes place at these meetings. This is the way West Birchwood gets its secret information. If the Birchwood Civic Assoc. showed the same interest the information would be theirs too. The School Board meetings are open to everyone — even Civic Associations.

Last, and by no means least, how can the Civic Assoc. Board justify voting on anything pertaining to the Jericho School District when they have a majority of members residing in the Syosset School District? In May, when the Budget was to be voted on the Board was constituted thusly (as published in The Villager of May 10th, 1962):

By what right to residents of the Syosset School District take it upon themselves to make a decision that will in no way affect them? It will not change their tax rate nor their children's education — they should disqualify themselves.

One of the problems has been with us for some time now and that is the situation with the many dogs that are allowed to run free all day and even into the night. There is a town ordinance which makes it mandatory for dog owners to have their dogs on leashes only. The several home owners who choose to let their dogs run free are being inconsiderate to their neighbors as well as breaking the law. We have received many complaints on dogs in general and in some cases on specific dogs. We as a Civic Assoc. do not wish to enter into the individual problems of home owners, but when the situation becomes general, it is our lot to make the owners aware of the situation and try to remedy it. So to you dog owners who have been in the habit of letting your dogs run free, please in all fairness to your neighbors in the community, try to have some consideration. If the complaints continue, we will have to make some arrangements with the Town on having the law enforced.

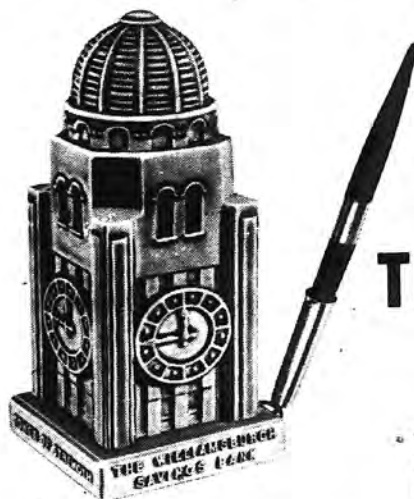
