Cantiague Park Named County Board to Act Monday On \$2,200,000 Plan for Park

The Nassau County Board of Supervisor at its regular meeting next Monday is scheduled to approve \$2,200,000 in plans for a new park in the northwest corner of Hicksville on the former Press Wireless acreage. It will be known as Cantiague Park.

Among the facilities contemplated for the park are a small golf course, golf driving range and the first County swimming pool.

The tract embraces 118 acres roughly bordered by Cantiague Road on the west, Northern State Parkway on the north, John St on the south and the Kuhl Ave on the east.

Supreme Court Justice Howard T. Hogan recently awarded the owners of the property \$3,828,500. The County of Nassau condemned the site for the proposed park in 1961. Opgal Inc had fought rezoning of the property to industrial use, planning to build several hundred residences there.



DuPont Manager Rotary Speaker Legion to Rally For Prayer Law

"The road to increased piety lies not in the confiscation of existing wealth, but in the creation of new wealth," Louis P. Shannon, manager of Du Pont's Extension Division, said Thursday, Sept. 12, speaking before the Hicksville Rotary Club at the Millerside Inn.

In a speech entitled "National Strength Through Economic Growth," Shannon said, "Just as growth is a natural and orderly process in a healthy child, so it is in a healthy economy. Those who would upset the natural process, with either artificial stimulants or artificial restraints, must be prepared to accept the resulting deformities and disabilities. The insidious effect of economic 'thalidomides,' however well intended, can impose monstrosities upon an unsuspecting public."

Shannon pointed out that the direction, quality, and rate of growth is in response to the motivations and desires of a free people. "Growth, and its concomitant prosperity," he said, "cannot be ordered, legislated, or established by decree. It could be, certainly all autocracies would have prosperity."

In defining the role of the Federal Government Shannon believes that it can make its most positive contribution by maintaining a strong national defense, protecting the integrity of the country's money supply, and preserving order in the market place. Tax policies should encourage capital formation by allowing adequate rewards for sav-

ing and risk-taking, and should permit the replacement of obsolete and worn-out tools of production.

A rally in support of the amendment of the United States Constitution to provide for the voluntary recitation of non-sectarian prayer in the public schools will be held at the South Side Senior High School, Shepherd St., Rockville Centre, at 2 P.M. on Sunday afternoon, Sept. 22nd.

The event is being sponsored by the Rockville Centre Post of the American Legion, whose avowed purpose is "to prevent atheism from becoming the state religion."

The speakers will include Congressman Frank J. Becker, who has introduced such a prayer amendment in the House of Representatives. He is currently endeavoring to get the measure out of committee by introducing discharge petition.

Board Refines Details Of Nov 23 Referendum

The Hicksville Board of Education scheduled a special meeting this week on Thursday to complete arrangements for the Nov 23 referendum on a series of five questions, including a 22-room permanent addition to the Senior High School.

The HERALD last week published a sketch of the high school showing the planned addition of classrooms and a combined administration building-receiving warehouse. Following a conference in Albany between State Education Dept officials, representatives of the school district and architect, it was learned that the administration building will not have to be attached to the high school and it may be located on the present site of the so-called Lumm house which is scheduled for demolition. It is also reported the number of square feet involved on each of two floors may be reduced to 14,000, thus reducing the anticipated cost.

High Percentage Of Tax Collection

Out of the Warrant of \$29,650, \$14,94 issued for the 1963 Town Tax Levy, over 98.393% was collected before the tax rolls were returned to the County Treasurer on September 3, 1963, according to figures announced by Frank Hynes, Receiver of Taxes, of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York.

Although final notices have been sent out to that effect, Hynes wishes to point out that all unpaid 1963 Town taxes are now payable to the County Treasurer at the Nassau County Office Building, Mineola.

THE GOLDEN YEARS (CONTINUED) The response was great, so as promised, here's a few more names, dates and statistics, covering the golden years of Hicksville Varsity foot-

ball. Last week, we left off in the 1926 era, where Hicksville, in its 2nd year of Varsity play closed out with a bang-up 5-2 season. In 27, they improved on this record, by losing one thing one and repeating for 5 wins. Tom Morselli had been elected captain and Orist Millevoite, acting captain. Orist was later to develop into one of the finest scabbards on the island; playing his own special wares with the renowned Hicksville Field Club. Watching him in action, doing his, stop on a dime routing was well worth the going tab of admission...that of legally shelling out half a clam or illegally jumping the fence. The latter was the most exciting way for the behemoths of the times, both on and off the field, didn't take any guff from the teen-agers of the era. With or without, inside remarks, if you were caught fence-hopping, you were thrown back bodily. After a few rattles, shakes and rolls, you even stood the chance of losing your 50 cent piece, during the high wire act. Those were the days when 5 to 10,000 fans, stormed the Junior High field to watch the town teams in action.

But let's get back to the '27 season, where 12 more players are anxiously waiting for an intro. Meet Ed Donati, Charley Sholz, Joe Hackett, Stan Bergold, Reginald Greenway, Stanley Arisim, Abe Israelowitz, Stanley Klevanosky, Walter Roettinger, Francis Davies, Ed Valentine and John Laiki. All were awarded Varsity letters, that year and earned them every inch of the way. Starting with an opening 7-0 win over Huntington, they finally brought mighty Manhasset, partially to heel in the 2nd encounter. They didn't wail but they held on doggedly held on for a 6-6 tie, which was Whirlaway and Coast Fleet, all the way considering the fact that the Indians held a point spread of 89-0 over Hicksville, at that stage of the game. But then what happened next, shouldn't have happened to a bull-wooly. Great Neck, stoked things up in the 2nd game and fired up a 58-0 win.

The rest is history...Hicksville banged out 4 straight wins to end the season. They beat Westbury 21-6, Port Washington 14-0, Amityville 21-7 and Oceanside 2-0. Next week the 4-1-1, 28 season, where Manhasset was finally sent back to the wagon with a 26-0 scalp. "All things come to he who waits", we say and as Confucius and Nostradamus once said... This year they are led by Chief Joe Mayz and his deputies, 1st Asst. Vito Nastasi and 2nd Asst. Peter Nastasi. The Department is divided into two Companies each headed by its Captain and two Lieutenants.

Residents of the Jericho Fire District can be proud of the modern equipment that is used by your Volunteer Fire Department. There are three pumpers, one combination ladder and pumper truck, one floodlight truck and one rescue truck. This equipment is housed at the Firehouse, located on Broadway. The Firehouse and Equipment are maintained by the five dispatchers, who work in shifts 24 hours a day, seven days a week and are the only paid personnel within the Jericho Fire District.

reminds us of telephones. So that local residents would not be awakened at night by the sounds of sirens and horns and because it is a more efficient way of calling men out, a telephone alert system was installed in every fireman's home. This telephone alerting system operates 24 hours a day, while the siren operates from 7 A.M. to 9 P.M. The Fire Dept. answers to the Board of Fire Commissioners who are elected by the Community.

The Department is always ready to be of service to the residents of Jericho, whether that service is saving a life or property. Right now the Jericho Fire Department is in midst of their Fund Drive. The entire proceeds collected go to the Welfare Fund as well as necessary additional expenses for proper operation of the Fire Department.

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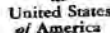

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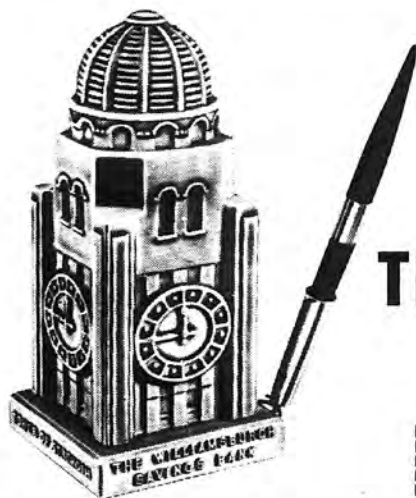
