Bruno Requests Albany Listen to His Charges

William A. Bruno Jr., controversial member of Hicksville School Board who a few weeks ago was scheduled to be the subject of a formal complaint by the Board to the State Education Commissioner, this week initiated his own complaint to James E. Allen Jr., Commissioner of Education.

The Board had planned to bring the matter of borrowed and withheld text book to Allen's attention. During the interval when it was decided to go to Albany, after repeated efforts to get the missing books returned had apparently failed, Bruno sent most if not all of the books back.

Bruno in his letter to Allen, copies of which were served on various school officials and Board members, charged that Donald F. Abt, superintendent of schools, "over the last several months, repeatedly refused to supply me with information concerning the economic and administrative affairs of the School District. And on one important occasion the six-man school board majority ruled that Abt need not supply me with information. Then, again, just recently the Board President George A. Jackson, in a 'presidential directive', told the administration not to give me copies of school district bills."

The matter was expected to

come before the Board at its meeting this week on Thursday night.

Charges Beaches 'Disgraceful'

Michael N. Petito, Democratic candidate for Oyster Bay Town supervisor, accused town officials this week of ignoring numerous complaints from residents about outsiders turning town-operated beaches into "beer can-littered honkey tonks."

The town Republican administration allowed an entire summer to go by without making badly needed improvements at the beaches, Petito told those attending the opening of Hicksville Democratic Campaign Headquarters on Broadway, Monday night.

"I have personally gotten many complaints about disgraceful conditions,"

Design of Six Million Dollar High School In Hicksville

HOLY TRINITY DIOCESAN high school as it will appear when it is built on a 20-acre site on Newbridge Rd., Hicksville, at a cost of six million dollars. The five-story building designed by

George J. Dippell of Massapequa will accommodate 1200 boys and 1200 girls and is one of four planned by the Catholic Diocese of Rockville Centre for Nassau and Suffolk Counties.

The teaching staff will be housed in two separate residences, one at either end of the academic classroom building. On top of the classroom block living quarters will be provided for

four priests, among them the principal of the school. The gym, cafeteria and auditorium complex of buildings will be served from the main lobby. The gym will seat 1200 specta-

tors and a cafeteria will serve one thousand students at a sitting. The auditorium with 1250 seats is designed to function also as an auxiliary chapel.

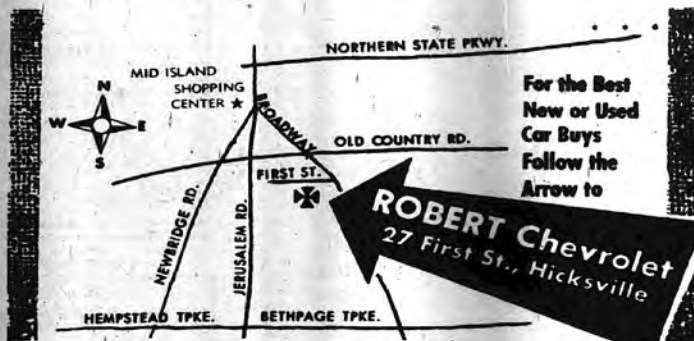

FALL'S FANTASY... Now! Let's see where it hurts! said the witchdoctor to the hypochondriacs, who in this case happen to be some of the High School football coaches. Many have the crying towel out and are wailing like the proverbial beggar with 2 loaves of bread under each arm.

A few seem to be afraid that a note of optimism could very well portend a grave future. But as usual in Connecticut... things are a bit different. Talk head coach, Jim Grantham and line coach, Ron Benezio, as cases in point. Both agree their softbustlers are loaded for bear and patiently waiting for the hunting season to blast off on Oct. 5th. "This is still one of our better Varsity teams", Grantham said during a last afternoon practice session "... our line is big and fast and our backfield shapes up with the best of them". On the strength of this optimistic note we decided to stagger downfield, where line coach, Benezio was putting his charges through a brisk workout. The muscle grinding maneuver of the moment happened to be, a fast break downfield... then an abrupt about face and while still running backwards, making alternate turns to the right and left. This one looked like a real night's muscle emporium and if a blast past 30 tried it, it's a clack he'd never reach 40. But that's the way things go for the linemen, the workhorses of the football team. They seem to enjoy the head to head combat of line play and fully realize that conditioning during the practice sessions, makes the difference between the head liner and the also-ran. It's hard, monotonous work and only the guys who love football manage to make the opening LINE-MEN'S LINEUP.

So with that thought in mind, we decided to collar line coach, Ron Benezio, for some of the cuff slants on what's going for us this year. But first a short portrait of the man, whose charges are behind the scenes of the long touchdown, pass completion the bolts through tackle, guard and center and the wide sweeping end runs, that end in paydirt. Benezio knows the lot of the linemen and goes about the task of conditioning these youngsters quietly and efficiently. "The team attitude is good", he said... the boys like to play ball and seem to enjoy the rough-house, lot of the linemen. All are hardnosed and it's going to take a mighty rough bunch to get the best of them. They have fine leaders in Santo Cafora and Bruce Cerone and the majority of them are big and fast. "How many turned out for the team, this year?", we asked. "About 35", he said... 13 for the line, but they're all good ones he added quickly, as if anticipating our next question, of "why the turnout seemed unusually small, when compared to past years." He went on to drop a few names and in the process, took care of the returning veterans first. Boys mentioned were Pete Martin for the center spot, Santo Cafora, guard, Cliff Giles, tackle and Paul Rondone.

Orist Millevolte had been elected Capt. and Charles Stolz, Capt. Elect. Other members of the team were Bill Rennie, Abe Israelowitz, Joel Abramson, Ray Reigal, Reginald Greenway, Frank Davies, Frank Morselli, Charles Rytznay, Al Stenier, Uldimer Katsanok, Lawrence Riemhart, Stan Arslan, Jim Looney, Donnick Sabatella, Nat Albert, Fred Kuhne and Sam Schiener (Manager). The record was a 4-1-1 season, with wins over Manhasset (26-0) Port Washington 6-0, Amityville 20-7 and Huntington 14-0. Westbury managed a 6-6 tie and Great Neck pulled off a 42-6 win. And then to the year 1929, where the locals went on a diet of raw meat and blooded the opposition to the tune of a 7-1 season. Great Neck was the only fly in the ointment by grabbing off a 19-15 win. After that Hicksville played adding machine football. They shutout Glen Cove 6-0, pounded Port Washington 26-6, aggravated the N.Y. Aggies 20-0, humiliated Huntington 13-0, authorized Amityville 39-7, bludgeoned Boro Hall Academy 18-7 and mauled Manhasset 21-0. A bang-up season and the following boys received Varsity letters, Charles Stolz (Capt) Lawrence Riemhart (Capt. Elect) Orist Millevolte, Bill Rennie Dom Sabatella, Fred Kuhn, George Hartmiller, Reginald Greenway, Nat Kanton, George Becker, Bob Westby, Morris Glucher, Joe Israelowitz, Paul Hicks, Frank Roettinger, Bill Christenson, Jim Hill, Harold Looney, Art Eberhart, Bill Humphreys, Herb Small and Joe Katz (Mgr.) 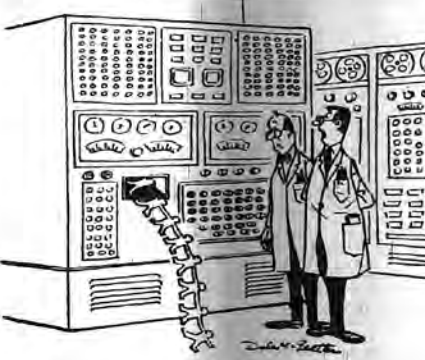

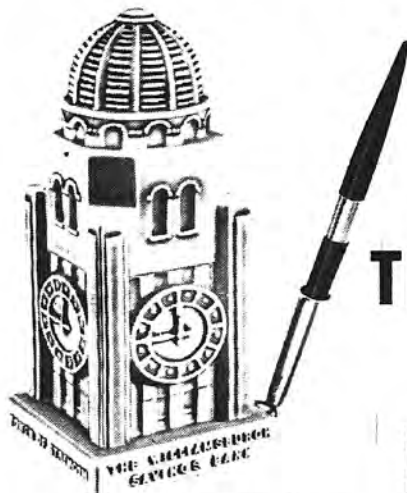
