State Picks up 62% Of Bond Issue Cost

The construction of a 24-room addition together with a gymnasium at Hicksville Senior High School and a combined Administration building-central receiving warehouse, the subject of a District referendum on Nov. 23, will be reimbursed by the State to the extent of 62.8 percent of the debt, a spokesman for the Hicksville Board of Education revealed today. The addition is urgently needed to accommodate increasing student enrollment at the secondary level.

The total estimated cost of the construction project is \$1,595,000. Under the Diefendorf State Aid Law, the state will reimburse the School District \$1,502,144.60 of the debt service cost.

"It will be impossible in the future to secure State Aid for an administration-storage area," the spokesman declared, "since the State Aid now available is relative to the proposed academic expansion."

The net total project cost per year in the District Budget will be \$1.08 for a homeowner assessed at \$4,000, a total of \$1.35 per year for a home assessed at \$5,000, \$1.62 at \$6,000 valuation. While these costs do not reflect any estimated additional custodial or operating cost, they also do not reflect estimated savings possible from reducing the number of instructional personnel.

The School District is currently renting warehouse space for central receiving and a downtown store for administrative space at a cost of \$14,400 a year.

George A. Jackson, president of the Board of Education; Donald F. Abt, Superintendent of Schools, and other members of the School Board are currently appearing before Parent-Teacher Associations and other community groups to explain the details of the Nov. 23 referendum.

Voter registration will take place at seven district schools

on Wednesday, Nov. 13, from 12 noon to 10 PM and Saturday, Nov. 16, from 7 AM to 8 PM. Voting takes place on Saturday, Nov. 23, between 7 AM to 8 PM.

There are three questions being submitted on Nov. 23; No. 1 - \$1,595,000 for 24-classroom and gymnasium addition to senior high school as well as administration building - central receiving warehouse on the high school site; No. 2 - authority to demolish an ancient private home on the present high school site which "represents potential fire hazards and menacing grounds for vandalism"; and No. 3 - purchase of 2.85 acres of land adjacent to the Willet Ave. Elementary School, which is on a limited size tract.

Campaign by Character Assassination

Town Supervisor Thomas R. Pynchon, speaking at a gathering in Midway Jewish Center in Syosset sponsored by the Sagamore Lodge of Bnai Brith where three candidates for Supervisor appeared, was obviously angry and upset. He was appalled to have been served, upon his entrance into the Center, with a document devised to embarrass him in the election next Tuesday. His opponent on the Democratic slate declined to repeat in public, outside of the immunity of a courtroom, the charges made in the action.

The outcome of the suit will obviously come some time after the ballots are counted, if ever. Meanwhile, the suit is planned to raise doubts and suspicions. It is in essence of a legalistic gimmick.

In our great nation a person is innocent until proven guilty. Unfortunately, the more sensational type of publications lick their chops when someone in public office is accused

of wrong doing. Further, the reading public has the unfortunate ability to read the charges and never follow thru to the ultimate vindication.

Aside from the fact that Pynchon was shocked to find his opponent utilizing the premises of a house of worship to further political footwork, he struck at a hard fact of life: If the voters will tolerate character attacks lacking in foundation the public will find, in the future, that men of reputation and ability will not longer stand for election. The hacks and hatchmen will take over.

We have observed this trend in more localized area of government, such as the election of school trustees. Men of ability decline to make themselves available for candidacy because school elections in some areas (and we have no specific reference in this statement) simply will not run because of the kind of campaigning, the kind of behind the back vilification to which they become

subjected.

It is not only the printed and mimeographed literature that does the damage — it is the mysterious phone calls, the back of the hand whispering, the lying and distortion that leaves scars which not even time can erase.

A point in case is the advertisement published in this issue of the Herald by the Nassau County Democratic Committee. It promises nothing. It offers nothing. It DOES insinuate. It is a collection of what are purported to be headlines from (unidentified) newspapers. For all we know the headlines, if they ever were published by any responsible newspaper, may have been referring to another Community in another state. It is mean and dishonest.

It asks the question "Had enough?" Every thoughtful voter must answer "yes" as they re-elect the forward-looking, incumbent Republicans on Nov. 5.

Library Corner

Although there have been many new theories of Young Adult work since 1950, nobody has yet come forward with a more intriguing and concise handbook of the goals and values of the Young Adult book collection than Amelia H. Munson. In her summation, she says that the three important factors are the power of the book to inject ideas and stir the reader to action, the power of the individual to dominate his material and free himself to develop his capacities, and the power of democracy to seek its highest expression in the free circulation of ideas and the greatest possible liberation of individual endowments.

Miss Munson's title comes from Chaucer's, "I have, God knows, an ample field to plow and fertile ones." An Ample Field applied to books and young adults certainly describes the true challenge to the librarian today. Some people may say "Where do we begin?" With so many teen-agers overflowing the libraries throughout the nation, and so many books being published each day, we will always be kept busy enough. The place to begin is with the teen-agers' questions, day in and day out. Only by knowing the teen-agers, will we be able to buy to satisfy the unending new demands.

Amidst short story assignments, the comparison of Russian and American education, and requests for a historical novel that can be read in two days, you will find me tracking down material for teen-agers each busy afternoon at the Library. I am Miss Kiep and might be located at the middle desk in the Reference section, unless I should be in the Young Adult section recommending a book on space, or finding the rules of field hockey for girls in the Adult section, or finding humorous monologues by checking both sections.

Teen-agers must learn to use every section of the library in their search for every topic under the sun. You will find them in the Reference section, browsing the Young Adult shelves, or the Adult shelves, or perhaps on a quick trip to the Children's Room for a book once missed. Some are reading magazines in the Periodical Room, and still others are using the vertical files for pamphlets.

The Young Adult collection has a very Adult emphasis with some of the very best of Adult literature to be found on the shelves.

Although there is something for every teen-ager in interest and reading level, some adults might be quite surprised that they will find current material of interest, also.

Books just added to our shelves include:

How to Serve and Get Along in the Armed Forces, by Jack Raymond, which describes the opportunities for "short-term" servicemen, and includes chapters on the Navy, Air Force, Army, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard.

Stagestruck, by Burt Hirschfeld, about careers in the theatre from stock to Broadway, with chapters about the audition, the stage manager, and the producer.

Pirate, Pawnee, and Mountain Man, the Saga of Hugo Glass, by John Myers, a true story of the West and a man who lived through capture by pirates and by Indians. Hugo Glass not only lived after a battle with a grizzly bear, but then, left to die by his companions, struggled through 2,000 miles of wilderness.

To Conf or not to Conf, by Dick Clark, presents answers to letters about manners and social behavior.

There is a group of Long Island Young Adult Librarians who take turns moderating a teen-age panel discussion program on Radio Station WHAB, 1440 AM, 102.3 FM, Sunday mornings at 9:30 A.M. The Hicksville program will be broadcast Dec. 8th, Jan. 19th, and Mar. 1st. The tape recording in the Library on the "Age of Voting and Drinking" will be played on Dec. 8th. Carey Evaluates Faculty Area

On Thursday, Oct. 24, the Jericho Board of Education held its regular monthly meeting at the Castlegate School in accordance with Board policy to alternate its meetings at the various district schools.

Dr. Thomas Carey, Superintendent of Schools, presented to the Board a list of elementary substitute teachers for approval. All the substitute teachers are certified. It was pointed out that at 6:30 A.M. someone is in the Jericho school office consolidating calls for substitute teachers. Dr. Carey is working on the entire teacher evaluation problem and this will include substitute teachers as well.

The Board appointed Leo J. Sugarman as School District Treasurer to replace Matthew Triggiani who has resigned. Applications were solicited from community organizations and the district at large. Interested and qualified people were interviewed by the Board. Mr. Sugarman resides in Jericho, is an accountant with 15 years experience in civic organizations and departments.

The Board approved closing the schools at the end of the morning session on Tuesday, Nov. 5, Election Day. In the afternoon faculty members will meet to review and discuss procedures, purposes and objectives of the Cooperative Review Service being conducted by the State Department of Education.

The Board adopted a policy entitled "Educational and Instructional Improvement" which will serve as a guideline for the development of the educational program in the Jericho schools.

This policy will implement the statement of State Commissioner of Education James Allen that "Many traditional concepts and conventional techniques in education will have to be replaced by new ones designed to increase efficiency and improve quality."

The policy reads in part - "The Board of Education of the Jericho Public Schools, recognizing the changing patterns in

the instructional program that have been and are taking place in various schools throughout the country, hereby endorses and encourages an organized effort on the part of its professional staff to: 1. Evaluate new practices and devices; 2. Initiate and expand constructive experimentation in the Jericho Schools; 3. Facilitate and accelerate widespread use of practices and devices which have been proved or may be proved successful in schools throughout the county, state and nation."

The Superintendent will keep the Board informed of all plans and actions.

Dr. Carey further said that there will be an appreciable need for on-the-job training for Jericho teachers. He explained that the school system will need a structured training situation whenever a new endeavor is contemplated - whether it be sending teachers to school or having experts come in.

Meadowbrook Seeks Tie To Brookville Village

A request to downzone the Meadowbrook Club property to light industrial was rejected by the Oyster Bay Town Board last spring. Approval by the Town Board of Oyster Bay on the annexation petition is regarded as a virtual certainty since the application will be made in proper form and the landowners in the land to be annexed will be in favor of this move. The Town Board would have no choice but to approve the application.

The Mayor of Brookville is said to be an executive of the Meadowbrook Country Club.

EDITORIAL

Meadowbrook Annexation

When the Meadowbrook Club sought to have its property downzoned last spring so much opposition resulted that the Town Board of Oyster Bay rejected the petition. The Club is now attempting to have its lands annexed to the Incorporated Village of Brookville and it appears likely that this application cannot be disapproved by Oyster Bay unless there is a compelling reason. The legal requirements are apparently being met.

As an incorporated village, Brookville governs its own zoning. The chances are, if Meadowbrook Club is annexed, the next step will be to downzone the property contiguous to Jericho Turnpike and permit light industrial use. This possibility is causing fears in some quarters that although the tax burden in the Jericho School district might be lightened at first, eventually downzoning in other parts of Brookville would follow with a resulting increase in the number of homes and a rise in the school tax rate to accommodate a larger number of children in the schools.

Without going into the pros and cons of this problem it seems to us that the Town of Oyster Bay is going to suffer more than the Jericho School district. If this property is annexed to Brookville, it goes off the Town tax rolls and the loss of tax base might result in an increase in the town tax rate. On the other hand, the Jericho School District will still be the recipient of additional revenues from the industrial property use and this could conceivably result in a lower school tax rate for the entire Jericho School district. Brookville is now zoned residentially for a minimum of two acres. It is conceivable that they would, in the future, downzone their residential area to a quarter or half acre? If so, wouldn't their village taxes go up just as fast as ours? One of the advantages of residing in Brookville is the privacy of the two acre zoning. Would the residents be willing to give up this privacy and see taxes increased as a result of an influx of more homes and families requiring increased municipal services?

We would welcome comment on this matter from our readers. However, on the face of it, the School District stands to gain and the Township as a whole to lose - tax-wise.

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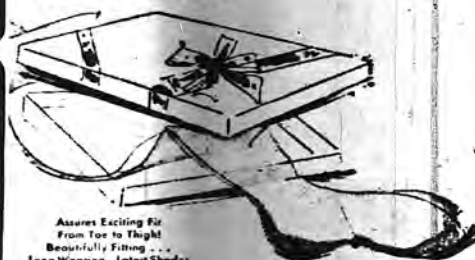

chief building inspector suspends a license he shall give the licensee immediate written notice thereof by registered or certified mail, and also immediately advise the Examining Board of Electricians which said Board will hold a hearing to consider the suspension or revocation of the said license as provided for in Section 8.1.2.

Section 8.1.2 Hearings by Board: Any license issued hereunder may be suspended for a period of not more than three months or revoked by the Examining Board of Electricians if the holder thereof shall have submitted a false application or made false statements in obtaining such license or any renewal thereof, or has failed to perform the work engaged in under the authority of such license in a competent and satisfactory manner, or has violated any of the provisions of this ordinance, or has been charged or indicted for any crime or offense.

ARTICLE IX

Supplementary Regulations
Section 9.1.1 No licensee shall lend, rent, transfer or assign his license to any other person; nor shall any person make use of a license which is not his own.

Section 9.1.2 All licensees shall strictly comply with the provisions of this Code and all Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay.

Section 9.1.3 No person not having been issued a Class "A" license as defined herein shall represent himself as a "Master Electrician" or "Licensed Electrical Contractor" on signs, stationery, vehicles, in advertising or in any other manner.

Section 9.1.4 A Class "B" license as defined herein shall be valid only as it pertains to work performed within the property limits of the firm to which it is issued.

Section 9.1.5 Duplicate: In case a license or certificate of competency is lost or destroyed, a copy of such lost document, marked "DUPLICATE" may be issued upon the filing of an acceptable affidavit attesting to the fact that the said document was either lost or destroyed, and payment of a fee of Five Dollars (\$5.00).

Section 9.1.6 This Ordinance shall not be construed to relieve from or lessen the responsibility of any person owning, operating, controlling or installing any electrical wiring, devices, appliances or equipment for loss of life or damage to person or property caused by any defect therein, nor shall the Town of Oyster Bay be deemed to have assumed any such liability by reason of any license issued pursuant to this Ordinance.

ARTICLE X

Section 10.1.1 If any part of this Ordinance or application thereof be deemed invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, said judgment shall be confined to the part or application directly involved and shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this Ordinance.

ARTICLE XI

PENALTIES, LIABILITY & SEPARABILITY
Section 11.1.1 Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance or of any rule or regulation made pursuant thereto shall be guilty of an offense and upon conviction thereof shall be punishable by a fine of not more than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) or by imprisonment of not more than thirty (30) days or by both imprisonment and fine.

ARTICLE XII

Section 12.1.1 This ordinance shall take effect immediately insofar as the appointment of the Examining Board of Electricians and their authority to act hereunder. For all other purposes this ordinance will take effect on JANUARY 1, 1964.

Panagot Cites Basic Justice

George J. Panagot, Democratic candidate for District Court Judge in the township of Oyster Bay and the city of Glen Cove, told a Hicksville audience last week that a philosophy based on an understanding of human behavior and compassion for one's fellow man is a basic requirement for the administration of justice.

"Something more than legal qualifications are needed in a man who sits in judgement on the actions of his fellow men," the East Norwich attorney said. "He must have a thorough knowledge of human nature and a sincere belief in the brotherhood of all men."

Speaking at a meeting at the Hicksville Jewish Center, Jerusalem Ave. and Magle Drive, Saturday evening, Oct. 26, Panagot cited the varied experiences of his own life which have shaped his personal philosophy. "My first job in a steel mill, the jobs as waiter and doorman that paid my way through college, service as a combat infantry officer in the South Pacific - all have developed in me a deep understanding and sincere sympathy for my fellow man," he said.

"An accused person appearing in court feels fear, and this is something I can understand, for in the fox-holes of New Guinea fear was our constant companion. Understanding and compassion are the very basis for the administration of justice, but they are not taught in our law schools. They are learned first-hand through years of living and working with people."

The East Norwich attorney, who holds degrees from Columbia University and Fordham Law School, is an experienced trial lawyer admitted to practice before all the courts of New York State and the U.S. Supreme Court. He has received qualification for the post of District Court Judge from the Nassau County Bar Association.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL DISTRICT MEETING
UNION FREE SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 17 OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY, NEW YORK

NOVEMBER 23, 1963

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Board of Education of Union Free School District No. 17 of the Town of Oyster Bay, in the County of Nassau, New York, on October 11, 1963, a Special District Meeting of the qualified voters of said School District will be held on NOVEMBER 23, 1963, at 7:00 o'clock A.M. (E.S.T.) in the seven Election Districts stated below, for the purpose of voting upon the following Propositions:-

PROPOSITION NO. 1

RESOLVED:

(a). That the Board of Education of Union Free School District No. 17 of the Town of Oyster Bay, County of Nassau, State of New York, is hereby authorized to construct:

1. An addition to the existing Senior High School building situated on Division Avenue in Hicksville, in said School District to contain classrooms, including the original furnishings, equipment, machinery and apparatus required for the purpose for which said addition is to be used and to expend therefor a sum not to exceed the estimated maximum cost of \$915,000, including preliminary costs and incidental thereto and the financing thereof; and

2. An addition to said existing Senior High School building to contain a gymnasium and cafeteria, including the original furnishings, equipment, machinery and apparatus required for the purpose for which said addition is to be used and to expend therefor a sum not to exceed the estimated maximum cost of \$185,000, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof; and

3. Abutting to be attached to said existing Senior High School building for the purpose of housing administrative and storage facilities, and to expend therefor, including grading and improvement of the site and original furnishings, equipment, machinery and apparatus required for the purpose for which said building is to be used, a sum not to exceed the estimated maximum cost of \$495,000, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof;

(b). That the estimated total cost of all of the aforesaid purposes, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof, is the aggregate amount of \$1,595,000 and that a tax is hereby voted therefor in the aggregate amount of not to exceed \$1,595,000 to be levied upon the taxable property of the said School District and collected in annual installments in such years and such amounts as may be determined by the Board of Education; and

(c). That in anticipation of said tax, bonds of the School District are hereby authorized to be issued in the aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$1,595,000 and a tax is hereby voted to pay the interest on said bonds as the same shall become due and payable. Said Proposition No. 1 shall appear on the ballot label on the voting machines to be used for voting at said Special Dis-

trict Meeting in substantially the following form:-

RESOLVED: (a) The Board of Education is authorized to construct: 1. an addition to the existing Senior High School building on Division Avenue, Hicksville, to contain classrooms, including original furnishings, equipment, machinery and apparatus required and to expend therefor not to exceed the estimated maximum cost of \$915,000; 2. an addition to said Senior High School building to contain a gymnasium and cafeteria, including original furnishings, equipment, machinery and apparatus required and to expend therefor not to exceed the estimated maximum cost of \$185,000; and 3. a building to be attached to said Senior High School building for housing administrative and storage facilities, including grading and improvement of the site and original furnishings, equipment, machinery and apparatus required and to expend therefor not to exceed the estimated maximum cost of \$495,000; (b) the estimated total cost of all the aforesaid purposes, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof above, is \$1,595,000 and a tax is voted therefor in the amount of not to exceed \$1,595,000 to be levied and collected in annual installments; and (c) in anticipation of said tax, bonds of the District are authorized to be issued in the amount of not to exceed \$1,595,000 and a tax is voted to pay the interest on said bonds.

RESOLVED: (a) The Board of Education is authorized to acquire by purchase or condemnation the parcel of land adjoining the easterly section of the Willet Avenue Elementary School site of approximately 2.85 acres described as Lot 916, Section 12, Block A on the Nassau County Land and Tax Map, in Hicksville, designated as a school site by said Board and to expend for such purpose, including preliminary costs of surveys, maps, plans, estimates and hearings and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof, not to exceed the estimated maximum cost of \$70,000; (b) a tax is voted therefor in the amount of not to exceed \$70,000 to be levied and collected in annual installments; and (c) in anticipation of said tax, bonds of the District are authorized to be issued in the amount of not to exceed \$70,000 and a tax is voted to pay the interest on said bonds.

Said School District is divided into seven Election Districts as follows:-

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in annual installments in such years and such amounts as may be determined by the Board of Education;

(c). That in anticipation of said tax, bonds of the School District are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of not to exceed \$70,000 and a tax is hereby voted to pay the interest on said bonds as the same shall become due and payable.

Said Proposition No. 3 shall appear on the ballot label on the voting machines to be used for voting at said Special District Meeting in substantially the following form:

RESOLVED: (a) The Board of Education is authorized to acquire by purchase or condemnation the parcel of land adjoining the easterly section of the Willet Avenue Elementary School site of approximately 2.85 acres described as Lot 916, Section 12, Block A on the Nassau County Land and Tax Map, in Hicksville, designated as a school site by said Board and to expend for such purpose, including preliminary costs of surveys, maps, plans, estimates and hearings and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof, not to exceed the estimated maximum cost of \$70,000; (b) a tax is voted therefor in the amount of not to exceed \$70,000 to be levied and collected in annual installments; and (c) in anticipation of said tax, bonds of the District are authorized to be issued in the amount of not to exceed \$70,000 and a tax is voted to pay the interest on said bonds.

Said School District is divided into seven Election Districts as follows:-

ELECTION DISTRICT NO. 1

On the East: Broadway, from the District's North line to the intersection of Jerusalem Avenue and Broadway; continuing South along Jerusalem Avenue to the intersection of the Long Island Railroad. On the South: The Long Island Railroad, from Jerusalem Avenue to the District's West line. On the West: The District's West line from the Long Island Railroad to the District's North line. On the North: The District's North line from the District's West line to Broadway.

The voting place of this Election District shall be at the Burns Avenue School.

ELECTION DISTRICT NO. 2

On the east and North: Miller Road as projected to the District's North line, South along said Miller Road to Ronald Avenue; then East along Ronald Avenue to Woodbury Road; then Northeast along Woodbury Road to Ardley Gate; then Southeast through Ardley Gate to Dartmouth Drive; then Southwest and South through Dartmouth Drive to its intersection with Haverford Rd; then East to the intersection of Haverford Road and Berkshire Road then East along Berkshire Road to its intersection with Columbia Road; then East along Columbia Road to the District's East line, then South along the District's East line to the Long Island Railroad. On the South and Southwest: Along the Long Island Railroad, from the District's East line Southerly point, to the intersection of the Long Island Railroad and Jerusalem Avenue. On the West: Broadway, from Jerusalem Avenue to the District's North line. On the North: The District's North line from Broadway to Miller Road, as projected to said line.

The voting place of this Election District shall be at the East Street School.

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ELECTION DISTRICT NO. 3

On the North: Northeast and East along the District's North line, from Miller Road, as projected to the District's North line, to the District's East line. On the East: South along the District's East line, from the District's North line, to Columbia Road. On the South and West: Columbia Road from the District's East line, West to Berkshire Road; then West along Berkshire Road into Haverford Road, and continuing West on Haverford Road to Dartmouth Road; then North, and Northeast, along Dartmouth Road to Ardley Gate; then Northwest through Ardley Gate to Woodbury Road; then Southwest along Woodbury Road to Ronald Avenue; then West along Ronald Avenue to Miller Road; then North along Miller Road, and continuing thereon as it is projected, to the District's North line.

The voting place of this Election District shall be at the Woodland Avenue School.

ELECTION DISTRICT NO. 4

On the East-Northeast: The Long Island Railroad, from its intersection with Old Country Road, to the Southerly point of the District's East line. On the South: The District's South line, from the Long Island Railroad, Southwesterly into Michigan Drive, then South along said District's line to the Hempstead Township line; then Northwest along the District's South line to Jerusalem Avenue. On the West and North: Along Jerusalem Avenue, from the District's South line, to Salem Gate; then West along Salem Gate to Salem Road; then North to Harkin Lane; then Northwest along Harkin Lane to Division Avenue; then along Division Avenue, to Glenbrook Road; then Northwest along Glenbrook Road to Newbridge Road; then Northeast along Newbridge Road to Old Country Road; then East along Old Country Road, to the Long Island Railroad.

The voting place of this Election District shall be at the Lee Avenue School.

ELECTION DISTRICT NO. 5

On the East: Jerusalem Avenue, from Salem Gate, to the District's South line. On the North: Salem Gate, West from Jerusalem Avenue to Salem Road; then North along Salem Road to Harkin Lane; then Northwest along Harkin Lane to Division Avenue; then Northwest along Division Avenue, to Glenbrook Road; then West along Glenbrook Road to Newbridge Road; then West; Newbridge Road, from Glenbrook Road on the North, to the District's South line. On the South: The District's South line, from Newbridge Road, On the West, to Jerusalem Avenue on the East.

The voting place of this Election District shall be at the Fork Lane School.

ELECTION DISTRICT NO. 6

On the East: Newbridge Road, from Elmira Street, to the District's South line. On the South: The District's South line from Newbridge Road, on the East, to the District's West line. On the West: The District's West line, from the District's South line, to Arrow Lane as said lane projected West to the District's West line. On the North: From Arrow Lane (as projected to the District's West line) East and along said Arrow Lane, to Levittown Parkway; then South, along Levittown Parkway, to Beach Lane; then east along Beach Lane to Blueberry Lane; then South along Blueberry Lane to Elmira Street; then East along Elmira Street to Newbridge Road.

The voting place of this Election District shall be at the Dutch Lane School.

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ELECTION DISTRICT NO. 7

On the North and Northeast: The Long Island Railroad, from the District's West line to the intersection of the Railroad with Old Country Road. On the South and East: Old Country Road, from its intersection with the Long Island Railroad, westerly to Newbridge Road to Elmira Street to Blueberry Lane to Beach Lane, then West along Beach Lane to Levittown Parkway; then North along Levittown Parkway, to Arrow Lane; then West along Arrow Lane, and as projected to the District's West line, to the District's said West line. On the West: The District's West line from Arrow Lane as projected West to said District's West line. North to Long Island Railroad.

The voting place of this Election District shall be at the Old Country Road School.

The voting will be by ballot on voting machines as provided by the Education Law and the polls will remain open from 7:00 o'clock A.M. (E.S.T.) until 8:00 o'clock P.M. (E.S.T.), and as much longer as may be necessary to enable the voters then present to cast their ballots.

A qualified voter shall vote at the place hereinabove designated within the School District and Election District in which such qualified voter resides.

NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN that the Board of Registration shall meet on:-

Wednesday, November 13, 1963 from 12:00 o'clock Noon (E.S.T.) until 10:00 o'clock P.M. (E.S.T.)

and on

Saturday, November 16, 1963 from 7:00 o'clock A.M. (E.S.T.) until 8:00 o'clock P.M. (E.S.T.)

In the respective Election Districts at the polling places herein designated and set forth in the Notice for the purpose of preparing a Register of the qualified voters of the School District for said Special District Meeting at which time any person shall be entitled to have his name placed upon such Register provided that at such Meeting of the Board of Registration, he/she is known or proven to the satisfaction of such Board of Registration to be then or thereafter entitled to vote at the Special District Meeting for which such Register is prepared.

The Registers of the qualified voters of said School District prepared at the last Annual Election shall be used by said Board of Registration as the basis for the preparation of the Registers for said Special District Meeting. Any person whose name appears on said Registers prepared at said Annual Election will not be required to register personally for said Special District Meeting.

Qualified voters will register and vote at the polling places designated herein for the Election District in which they reside. Only those persons who shall be so registered shall be entitled to vote at said Special District Meeting.

Immediately upon its completion, said Register shall be filed in the Office of the District Clerk, where it shall be open for inspection by any qualified voter of the District between the hours of 9:00 o'clock A.M. and 4:30 o'clock P.M. on each day thereafter (except Sundays) up to and including the day set for the said Special District Meeting.
