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Now Fun Begins

Petito Supervisor By Slight Margin

Attorney Michael N. Petito of 23 Oakwood Lane, Plainview, on Jan. 1 will become the first Town Supervisor from south of Jericho Tpke in more than 30 years. He is the first Democrat elected to the office since Benjamin Downing who served a two-year term starting in 1929. Petito defeated Thomas R. Pynchon of East Norwich on Tuesday by a paper-thin margin of about 2300 votes as approximately 90,000 went to the polls.

Petito Made Some Promises

A 25 percent reduction in town taxes, by the elimination of water districts and other special service districts and other devices; electrification of LIRR service for commuters out to Bethpage, evening meetings of the Town Board, and a freeze on all zone changes were among the appetizing things dangled before the voters prior to Tuesday in behalf of the election of Michael N. Petito as Supervisor of the Town of Oyster Bay.

Petito, an attorney with law offices in Hicksville, lives in Plainview. His \$24,000 a-year job starts on Jan. 1.

Many wonderful, glowing promises were handed the voters prior to Election Day. On the matter of massive widening of roads on the north shore, cutting down trees, he said he was opposed although the plan was generated under Democrat County Executive Eugene Nickerson. He also said he was not in favor of high-rise apartments and wanted no part of the Edward Morris rapid transit system with a look thru Levittown. He estimated cost of this plan has run as high as \$2 billion.

Petito's biography released during his 1961 bid for a seat on the town board as a councilman (we saw no biography on him during the current campaign), said he served during World War II in the infantry. He is a graduate of Fordham University Law School, a founder of the Oakmont Hills Civic Assoc and is a member of the Knights of Columbus, Plainview VFW Post and is a trustee of the Italian Sons and Daughters of America. His wife's name is Adeline and he has two daughters.

Following Nickerson's election in 1961, he was appointed as a deputy commissioner of public welfare for the county of Nassau. He took a key role in the fuss about the Jones Institute in Hicksville when a resident there charged mismanagement. There

were investigations and press releases which added up to a total of: nothing about nothing.

His 1961 biography in a flyer carried this comment: "Mr. Petito is a man with a creed—he believes a progressive town should have progressive leaders; a growing town should have far-sighted leaders. He offers these qualifications and so many more."

When he ran for town councilman a press release quoted him as saying "the Oyster Bay Town Board is a rubber stamp operation ruled by party bosses. My opponents all give lip service to 'home rule' but what the people really get is boss rule by a favored few."

Longer Board meetings are obviously in prospect. If they are held at night, the town councilmen may meet the school board members coming home. Petito told an audience in Syosset prior to the election that he has been a resident of Plainview area for "about 10 years". Among other pre-election promises was one to do something about recreation. He seemed to feel the Plainview-Old Bethpage was inadequate for the community, indicating more parks for that section and others.

21 Reservations

Arrowhead Boy Scout District has 21 confirmed reservations for the National Jamboree to be held in 1964 at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania. Units that have reservations in, are Troops, 13, 64, 158, 172, 291, 423, 429, 433, 508, plus Posts 423, 433, 508. Troop 291 has a high of 6 reservations for the jamboree in our District.

Arrowhead District can be mighty proud of one of its own boys—Allyn Lewis from Post 291 sponsored by Trinity Lutheran School in Hicksville. Allyn recently became an Eagle Scout.

Petito ran unsuccessfully for Town Councilman on the Democratic ticket two years ago. He was then defeated by Marjorie R. Post by a margin of about 4,000 votes. He has his law office on Old Country Rd., Hicksville.

The unofficial election night tally compiled in Hicksville gave Petito 45,836 and Pynchon 43,600. Two years ago Republican John J. Burns was re-elected with 50,653 ballots, defeating Robert McGregor who got 39,257. Burns in 1959 got 42,524 to defeat John Nance who received 35,822.

Since his re-election in 1961, Burns resigned as Supervisor to become a state official and he was succeeded by Pynchon, former Town Highway Superintendent.

The vote on Tuesday was relatively light, about the same as the town vote for Supervisor two years ago, despite the recent increase in population. There were 97,000 votes cast in a contest

for Town Councilman last year. Pynchon carried the communities of Oyster Bay, East Norwich, Bayville, Locust Valley, Sea Cliff, Glen Head, Syosset and Massapequa. Petito carried, by varying margins, North Massapequa, Bethpage, Farmingdale, Hicksville, Plainview, Jericho. His margin in Massapequa Park was nine votes in 11 election districts.

Republicans won all other contests in the Town of Oyster Bay and the three re-elected Town Councilmen will confront the new Democrat Supervisor with a solid group of six votes next year. Town Clerk William O'Keefe was the biggest vote getter for the GOP receiving 47,849 votes to 40,950 for Kay Glanville of Hicksville.

Fred Sutter, making his second attempt for a councilman seat on the Democratic ticket got 42,085. Republican A. Carl Grunewald, running re-election polled 46,804.

First voter registration day for the referendum is next Wednesday, Nov. 13, between 12 noon and 10 P.M. The second and final

registration takes place on Saturday, Nov. 16, between 7 A.M. and 8 P.M.

All district residents this week received a 12 page leaflet giving details regarding the three proposals being submitted to vote.

School Superintendent Donald F. Abt at a meeting on Monday of this week explained the propositions to a group of organization and community leaders.

Ask Increase

The Hicksville Board of Education is requesting the County Board of Elections to increase the fee paid for the use of school buildings in connection with general elections to a more realistic amount. Several other Nassau school boards have already taken this position.

The School District received \$30 from the County for the use of schools in elections, a figure which scarcely meets the estimated cost of custodial service, light, heat, etc. The amount paid is stipulated by the County.

In the meantime, the County Board of Elections has increased the charge for the rental of voting machines for school elections from \$20 a machine to \$50.

An old lady now, my memories are bright and clear. One farm I remember very well, and that is still going strong. I saw their side of the road market (Van Sise). I never forgot the strawberries from there and the marvelous cream. I could tell you a lot more, but will say in closing that I love my adopted State of Maine and live on a glorious piece of land, farm it was in the old days, now the family runs another business, but we live on the Maine Point peninsula (Brunswick) jutting out into Casco Bay. We live, high up on a bank, twenty yards from Maquoit Bay. To fill my life further, I am busy as a correspondent on the home town paper, Brunswick Record.

On October 17th President Kennedy signed a bill which will waive payment of a veterans default on a guaranteed loan which resulted in the loss of property where the default arose out of compelling reasons without fall on the part of the veteran.

Veterans Day is an important one, but with many members working that particular day we ask those who are fortunate enough to be off to make every effort to attend the Veterans Day services at the Junior High School at 11 A.M.

16-Month Old Parish Tops Goal

The Church of St. Paul the Apostle was established by Bishop Kellenberg on June 27th, 1962, when he named the Rev. Daniel J. Potterton as founding pastor and the Rev. Daniel P. Ryan as his assistant.

On the first day of their entrance into the newly erected parish, over 700 Catholic men and women welcomed their priests in the hall of the Jericho Jewish Center. From June until December 1962, the two priests resided at St. Dominic's Rectory in Oyster Bay, and with the assistance of the men of their parish, they took up a census which brought them into the homes of nearly every family.

Though encompassing a large area, which includes Jericho, Brookville, Muttontown and parts of Syosset, Hicksville and Westbury, St. Paul's numbers less than a 1000 families. During the course of its brief history, the infant parish has a canonically erected Confraternity of Christian Doctrine organization, which provides religious instructions to nearly 1,000 public school children from the first to twelfth grades. These instructions are given in the homes of parishioners, who, themselves, are taking courses in doctrine and methods of teaching religion.

Other actively functioning parochial societies include The Men's Guild, which is affiliated with The Holy Name Society and The National Council of Catholic Men, The Marian Guild, affiliated with The Rosary-Altar Society and Apostleship of Prayer, and The Nocturnal Adoration Society.

Commenting on the progress of the 16-month old parish, Father Potterton said: "It is the people who make the parish and not the physical structures. Bishop Kellenberg's appeal for funds to erect four diocesan high schools was a difficult challenge to a parish which does not have a church or school of its own. Our people met this challenge generously because they wanted what the Bishop wanted. It is this blessed spirit which bodes well for the future development of St. Paul the Apostle Church."

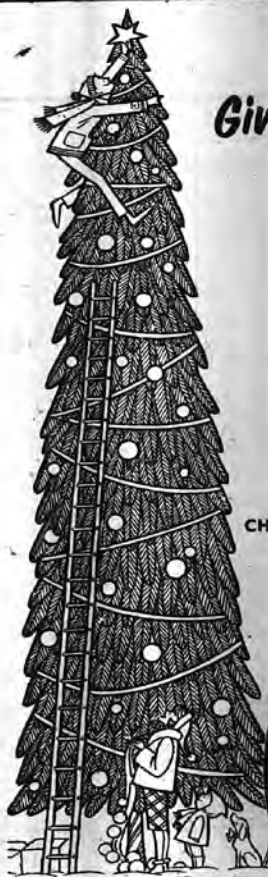
