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## Weiss, Ofenloch File For Fire Commissioner

Stanford (Sam) Weiss, seeking re-election as a commissioner of Hicksville Fire District in the election on Tuesday, Dec. 3, today cited achievements of the Fire Board during his five-year term of office. Five new fire trucks and a new ambulance were acquired. In addition, a telephone alerting system has been installed.

Ex-chief Weiss has filed his nominating petition. Also filed is Ex-Chief B. Medard Ofenloch who has made a previous, unsuccessful bid to seek election. Voting takes place at the E. Marie St. Firehouse on Dec. 3 between 7 P.M. and 10 P.M. All residents over 21 are eligible to vote and no advance registration is required.

Weiss told the Herald "I think a man to be fully eligible for the position of fire commissioner should be free to attend all regular and special meetings of the board throughout the year. During my five years in office, I have missed only one meeting."

He was born and raised in Hicksville and attended the local schools. Married and self-employed as an electrical contractor, he has been active in the volunteer fire dept. for 34 years. He has been captain of Emergency Co. No. 5, Fire Chief and president of the Exempt Assoc. He is a member of the Nassau and Suffolk Firemen's Associations and the Chief's Council of Nassau. He is past president of the Hicksville Lions Club.

"Although Fire Commissioners serve without salary," Weiss declared, "the position nevertheless is of prime importance to all residents and the community." He urges all to vote on Dec. 3 and declares it would be "an honor to continue serving."

Ofenloch is a life-long Hicksville resident, a 20-year member of the Fire Dept. former Captain of Hook and Ladder Co. No. 1, Former Chief, and current president of the 9th Battalion Chief's Council. He is with the Nassau County Police Emergency and Ambulance Service.

# Few Attend Hearing: Architect - Resident Hits School Building Design

Gustave Kilthau, a Hicksville resident who has been an architect for 54 years, was sharply critical of the proposed building project for Hicksville School District at a public hearing held Tuesday night in the High School auditorium. Less than 100 persons attended the hearing conducted by the Board of Education.

The referendum on bond issues totalling \$1,665,000 is scheduled for Saturday, Nov. 23, with voting hours 7 AM to 8 PM. Kilthau who resides at 94 W. Cherry St., Hicksville, claimed that it would be a "sad mistake" to proceed with the plans for additional classrooms, a gymnasium-cafeteria, and central receiving warehouse and administration building at the High School as presently developed.

He claimed that a half million dollars could be saved by various alterations in the plans. He was at pains to indicate that he was not criticizing the school architect, Knappe & Johnson, his comments were directed at the Board of Education, indicating that in his experience the client tells the architects what is desired.

Following a preliminary comment regarding the proposed construction, Kilthau rose frequently during the evening and commented on various questions. He obviously impressed a considerable segment of the small audience which never numbered more than 80 persons.

Board President George A. Jackson presided at the hearing which at certain points developed into a warm debate between various Board members including William A. Bruno Jr. who "officially" admitted he is opposed to the referendum question, George A. Kunz and Irving Lawrence.

Some of the questions came from Francis Hester, Harry Wagner and George Martin, three unsuccessful candidates for the school board last May sponsored by Bruno, Lawrence quipped, when Hester rose to speak, "let's have old home week."

Bruno said he was "one hundred percent opposed to the administration building" proposal, feeling that Nicholas St. School should be converted to this use when available. He and other questioners along this line were told that the use of Nicholas as an administration building has been rejected, because of the cost of renovation, the structure would be unable to support heavy office machines such as the IBM equipment now installed in the basement of the annex at Broadway and Marie St.

Former Board President Jerry Zentler asked several questions. One regarding the future use of the present Administration building on Newbridge Rd. if the new structure is approved brought out the statement that the so-called Pentagon would continue in use for Administrative use. He was assured that, in the face of anticipated increased construction costs, the allowances in the referendum would be adequate to carry out the program.

## 5,282 On Register

As of today (Thurs) there are 5,282 voters registered for the Hicksville school district referendum on Nov. 23. There were 301 names added to the register on Wednesday. A final registration will be held this Saturday, Nov. 16, between 7 AM and 8 PM.

Total registration by election areas is: Burns Ave., 646; East St., 898; Woodland Ave., 764; Lee Ave., 941; Fork Lane, 679; Dutch Lane, 699; and Old Country Rd., 655.

if approved by the voters this month. The architect's representative was not certain this would hold true if the matter had to be resubmitted at a later date.

Alt was scheduled to be guest speaker at the Hicksville Kiwanis Club luncheon meeting, yesterday, a meeting of Woodland Ave. PTA devoted to the referendum was arranged for last (Wed) night. The PTA went on record in favor of the propositions.

Final registration day for voters is this Saturday, Nov. 16, from 7 AM to 8 PM. The School Board will hold its next regular meeting on Friday night, Nov. 22, the eve of the referendum instead of meeting on the fifth Friday, Nov. 29.

## Herald Editorial Opinion..

### Bldg. Referendum

The voters of Hicksville School District who took the trouble to register will decide Nov. 23 in a three-question referendum upon some important proposals of the Board of Education. The big question is a proposed 24-room addition to the senior high school, addition of a gym-cafeteria, and addition to the high school building of a two-story structure to house a central receiving warehouse and administration suite.

There appears to be relatively little interest in the proposals, despite the fact that more than a million and a half dollars is to be expended; the final registration figures will give a clue to the degree of interest.

There also appears to be little serious areas for debate regarding the need for some additional facilities although there are two vocal extremes being heard: (a) too many classrooms are planned and (b) not enough classrooms are planned.

We believe the Board of Education might have been better advised to take just a little more time before bringing the question before the voters. Last April the then majority of the Board declined to give the matter official consideration. Yet, by September a full-blown referendum was upon us. And between the announcement date and the present the propositions have been altered, changed, revised, redrafted almost every other week. There is no deepseated total agreement among individual members on the Board on the "package". Almost every member, including those who finally joined in a five to two decision to offer the questions, confessed reservations on certain phases of the proposals.

We cannot hold any sympathy with those who believe that to do nothing is to save money. It is costing the District taxpayers money every month to rent storage and administrative space. The District can build facilities, with a most generous boost from the State, and actually amortize the net cost for less than the amount now paid out in rentals.

But we do believe that every effort should be exerted to get the best for the least cost. To our mind, some of the questions regarding construction raised at the public hearing this week were not fully answered. We have particular reference to those issues raised by a resident with long experience in the architectural field. You don't answer a serious question with a quip or off-hand pass at humor.

As stated earlier, the need is evident. The answers to the problem, as proposed, leave some nagging doubts.

Questions No. 2 and 3 regarding the demolition of an old building and acquisition of much-needed extra acreage for Willet Ave School, now on a tiny plot, should be approved.

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## Carey Answers Questions

Jericho Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Thomas F. Carey addressed the Education Committee on Nov. 4, at the Castague School. The committee had prepared a group of questions dealing with teacher recruitment, teacher supervision, curriculum, discipline, guidance, homework, and use of schools for after hours, which had been submitted to Dr. Carey for consideration. These issues were discussed at length with the members of the Education Committee.

In so far as teacher recruitment is concerned, Dr. Carey plans to get the best people from the complete North eastern area of colleges and universities. He, and members of his staff, will visit the placement offices, to secure the most qualified applicants. Initial screening of teachers will begin in the Superintendent's office. New applicants will then be referred to the individual school principals, the director of elementary education or to the High School Dept. Chairman, Dr. Carey feels that it is important to view a new applicant in an actual teaching situation. His goal will be the procurement of experienced teachers on the Masters Degree level. A proper balance between beginning and experienced teachers will be made.

Principals should spend a minimum of two hours a day in classroom supervision. Conferences will occur at the end of every session. The supervisor should also try to make an observation of student learning. On the secondary level, Dept. Chairmen are appointed to a non-tenure one year position. To make supervision more effective, the chairmen should have a reduced teaching load and be compensated for the additional responsibility. New mathematical programs have been introduced into the curriculum this year, and other new subjects are being considered for introduction into the curriculum next year.

The superintendent will go through the existing curriculum level by level, for evaluation and implementation. At present the Junior High School program is under complete study as to effectiveness and to future innovations. It is important that teachers view the curriculum in its entirety and to grasp the continuity of instruction from one grade level to another. Dr. Carey believes that discipline should be in the hands of the classroom teacher, and that teachers should refer behavior problems to the administrator only if these interfere with classroom teaching.

There are presently four guidance counselors in the secondary school. The Superintendent would like to add one more. Each class should have its own guidance counselor or grade advisor.

Dr. Carey believes in "homework on all levels". There should be a projection of school activities to the home. A schedule of actual time devoted to homework has been distributed throughout the system.

The school's libraries are presently open one-half hour before and one-half hour after school hours. Dr. Carey has considered the possibility of having one department open each day after school for special help to particular students. The intramural program can be expanded after school hours.

At present the system employs two school psychologists. There is room in the budget for two more. The superintendent is making a thorough search to find qualified members to complete the staff. The district wishes to employ a "Chief" psychologist who will devote his complete energies to handling problems arising in the schools. In summation, Dr. Carey feels that the level of the system can be raised, that there is a need for on the job training of teachers, and that the curriculum must be kept current.

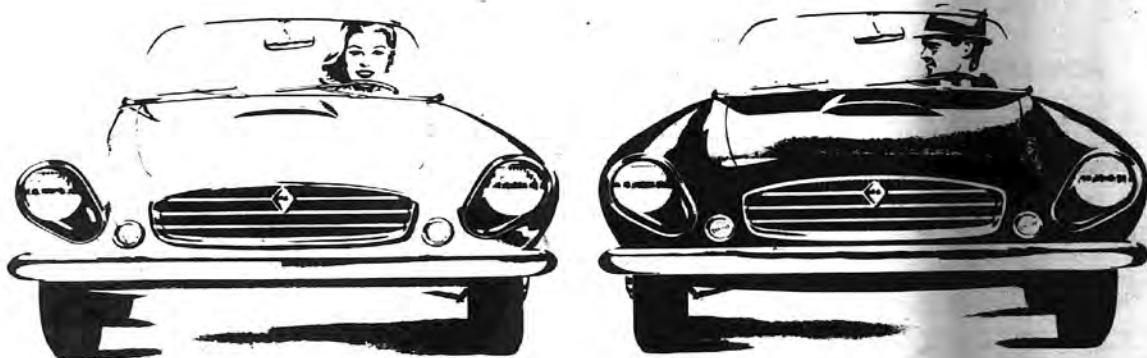
