Far - Reaching Plan

May Seek Urban Renewal Aid Here

A far-reaching plan for the redevelopment of the entire area bounded by Broadway, Jerusalem Ave. and Old Country Rd -- to be coupled with the widening of Broadway -- has been unveiled before the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors.

Architect Larry Scaler, who developed the plan as a voluntary project for a Chamber committee set up to deliberate and suggest a plan for the west side of Broadway, explained it was "one of several possibilities" presented at the Chamber meeting on Friday morning at the downstairs meeting room of Seaman and Eisenberg, he declined to hazard a guess at the total cost.

The Chamber committee is now engaged in obtaining information regarding an urban renewal program. Under such a program the federal government would provide three quarters of the financing, the state one eighth and the municipality (township) another eighth, President Lawrence C. McCaffrey said.

Eventually a meeting of all property owners in the area involved in joint session may be called.

The accompanying sketch was made from memory and is not a true to scale copy of the proposal. However, it serves to outline the basic details. In about two years the State Dept. of Public Works is scheduled to shave 44 feet off the front building line of every structure on the west side from the LIRR south to Old Country Rd., leaving relatively little depth to permit reconstruction of many buildings now in existence.

The plan shown to the Chamber directors covers three general areas; from Herzog Pl. south to W Marie St. would be a "back" complex surrounded by off street parking; the section between W Marie St. and Nicholas St. would contain, in addition to parking, the Trinity Lutheran Church and School, Masonic Temple (now being reconstructed) and a third building tentatively designated as a community center.

A sixteen-acre section from Nicholas St. south to Old Country Rd. would undergo vast changes, taking the form of an "urban shopping centre". Only the NY Telephone Co. building would remain in this section, all other buildings being demolished. Portions of Cherry St. and Carl St. would be discontinued.

The shopping centre would have three or more underground levels for parking, whisking shoppers to ground level by escalators. All truck deliveries would be made thru below surface tunnels.

In addition to covered and enclosed malls for shoppers, there would also be six or more story-tall sections containing offices, a motor hotel and other facilities. Space in the shopping centre would be more than adequate to accommodate all existing businesses now in the five-block section from Herzog south to Old Country Rd., it was pointed out.

It is the most imaginative plan for the redevelopment of a major section of Hicksville since a group of Cooper Union architectural students over ten years ago undertook to redevelop all of Hicksville (on paper of course)

of the west end property in the two-block area bounded by Broadway, Nicholas St., Jerusalem Ave. and Herzog Pl. There is also currently a little-used parking field in the block south of Cherry St.

Reveal Plans For Memorial

All residents are being encouraged to contribute to a fund to develop a community memorial to the late John F. Kennedy. Contributions may be left at the Long Island National Bank main office at Broadway and Herzog Place.

LI National Bank President William E. Koutsensky has graciously consented to arrange for establishment of a special account in the name of the Memorial Fund.

A group of citizens have worked out preliminary details of the project and won the approval of the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors this week. The plan is to raise funds for the purpose of providing a flag pole to be located in the mall area between Broadway and Jerusalem Ave north of the LIRR.

This area is scheduled to be improved and landscaped when the RR crossing elimination work is completed. A center marker at the base of the flag pole would indicate that it is dedicated by the entire community to the memory of the late President.

Receipts for cash contributions are now being prepared. Checks should be made payable to the John F. Kennedy Memorial Fund, Hicksville. Contributions may also be mailed to the HERALD, Box 95, Hicksville.

It is planned to acknowledge donations by publishing the names of donors unless otherwise requested to withhold.

Mrs. Ann Bellevue and Mrs. Elizabeth Breen are serving as executive secretaries for the campaign.

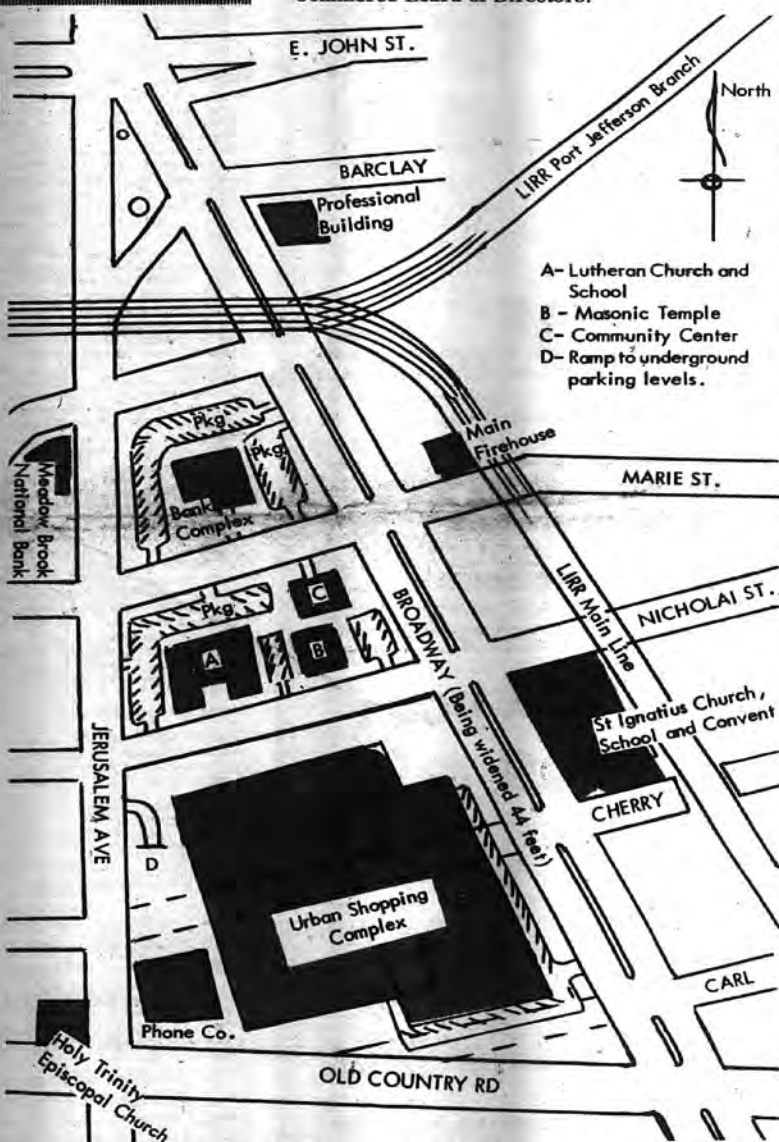

Everyone Likes Plan with Reservations

All who commented upon the plan developed by Larry Scaler for the reconstruction of a major downtown portion of Hicksville, particularly at the Chamber of Commerce directors meeting, were agreed on one point -- it is a tremendous plan.

However, as a longtime resident and business leader noted, the plan represents an ideal but he did not concede much hope of it becoming an established fact.

Another prominent property owner was inclined to cite

North Broadway as an example of what individuals may do on their own. Broadway north of John St. to Jericho in recent years has been widened to approximately the new width of South Broadway. In the north end various new buildings have been erected, most of which are occupied.

It does appear likely that the matter may become the subject of an application for Federal Urban Renewal in which case the government would first conduct an extensive survey of all facts including the economic feasibility of the plan.

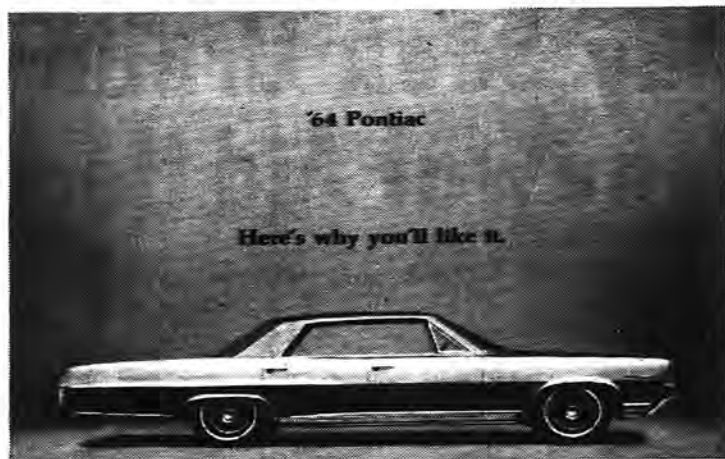
Development of such an urban shopping complex has been the successful applicant for federal assistance in other parts of the nation.

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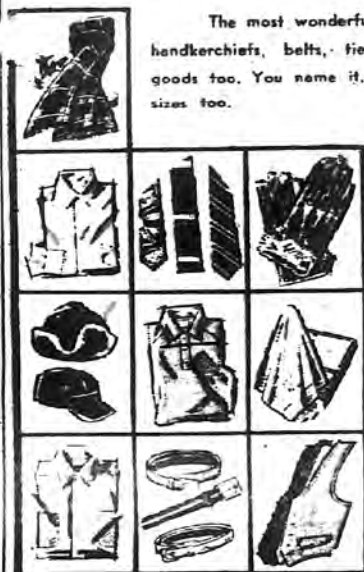

After considering all the resolutions in both bills the National Council of Administration rejected HR 2332 and called for the VFW to continue all out support for their HR 33 feeling that this one was a more generous bill for the veterans of World War I.

See Tax Rise In Downzoning

The possibility of the Meadowbrook Country Club being annexed to the incorporated village of Brookville and eventually downzoned promises to set into action a chain of events which could lead to a critical situation in Jericho school system as well as the school district tax structure.

In an interview with Howard Jankowitz, a member of Jericho Board of Education, it was disclosed that the Club has applied to be annexed with Brookville. Earlier this year application was made to the Town of Oyster Bay to downzone some 75 acres of the Country Club for industrial use. In the light of the vigorous opposition by the Jericho School Board and others this application was turned down.

At that time a strong letter in favor of the application was sent to the Town Board by R.C. Van Tuyl, Mayor of the Village of Brookville. The interesting aspect here, as Mr. Jankowitz pointed out, is that Mr. Van Tuyl has an invested interest in the Meadowbrook Country Club. The profits that would ensue as a result of downzoning are said to be in the millions.

The Jericho School District could be adversely affected since rezoning would greatly change the Town's comprehensive master plan. The new zoning from two acres to quarter acre could result in a great influx of children into our schools with resulting tax increases that would be felt by all the members of our community.

Residents of Brookville have indicated an overwhelming objection to such downzoning. The Brookville Mayor is said to be actively connected with the Country Club. All the residents of this area should concern themselves with what is occurring and should actively express their feelings.

Civics, School Board To Fight Downzoning

The Birchwood Civic Assoc. at Jericho pledged its full support to the Jericho School Board in their battle to avert what promises to be a disastrous blow to the Jericho School District tax structure. As soon as our Civic Assoc. learned of the impending annexation of the Meadowbrook Country Club property to the incorporated Village of Brookville and the possibility of an immediate downzoning of said property, a meeting was arranged.

This meeting took place at the Jackson School on Wed. night, Dec. 4. In attendance were Dr. Thomas Carey, Sup't. of Jericho Schools, who acted as chairman; Hal Curtis Felsner, Ira Hyams and Howard Jankowitz of the Jericho School Board, the eight man Executive Committee of our Civic Assoc. and a resident of Brookville.

Sometime in January, 1963, the Meadowbrook Country Club applied for a down zoning of its polo field property along Jericho Turnpike just before the junction of the turnpike with the Long Island Expressway. TOBAY demanded this request on the grounds that it did not follow the TOBAY master plan of zoning and would cause great hardship on the Jericho School District.

Soon after this, the Meadowbrook Country Club made application to the Inc. Village of Brookville for annexation of this property to Brookville. If this could be accomplished, and all it needed was a yes by the Brookville Village Board. TOBAY would no longer have any zoning jurisdiction over this land. At this point it seemed an open secret that the request for annexation was just the first step to the desired down zoning.

At present Brookville is in the Jericho School District and as such uses our Jericho Schools. It is feared that once the industrial down zoning would become a reality, great parcels of adjacent land, previously zoned for 2-acre lots may become available for 1/4 acre residences. Past history has shown that the courts will permit the down zoning of land when adjacent to industry or commercial enterprises, so this could open the door to any or all of the estates in Brookville to be sold and eventually broken up into 1/4 acre lots. The influx of these many hundreds of homes would completely disrupt the present Jericho School District and cause the school taxes to rise to never before dreamed of heights.

In the event that the land is down zoned it is estimated that from a present value of about \$6,000, an acre the price would probably go to about \$30,000 an acre. The total sale price could

be as much as \$10,000,000 if not more.

There are about 350 families in Brookville and it is reported that the great majority are against this annexation. But, unfortunately, they seem to have very little say in the matter. The decision, is vested solely in the Village Board which consists of the Mayor and four trustees. Some of the residents have organized and are trying to pressure the Brookville Board not to go through with this annexation but reports are that they have not made such progress.

The village board's decision to consummate this annexation and follow through with the down zoning seems inevitable. The effect of this is somewhat puzzling. In the face of the opposition by the majority of the Brookville residents and the absence of any apparent benefits accruing to the Village of Brookville, the Mayor and his Board of Trustees nevertheless seem adamant in their stand to approve the Meadowbrook Club's application.

Brookville's last chance to prove their opposition and possibly forestall this annexation will take place on Dec. 12 at C. W. Post College when Brookville Village Assembly First will hold a hearing.

The Jericho School Board and Dr. Carey will attend this meeting and voice the Jericho School District's great objections to the down zoning on grounds that the School District's master plan will be greatly affected. It is also hoped that the Brookville residents will make their presence at the meeting felt in such overwhelming numbers, and voice their opposition so, that Mayor Van Tuyl and his trustees will respond to Brookville's public opinion.

Your Civic Assoc. went on record and unanimously voted the following resolutions: The Birchwood Civic Assoc. at Jericho hereby appropriates \$50, to oppose any action that may lead to industrialization of the Meadowbrook Country Club property in the Jericho School District.
