# Library Trustees Try Again on Bond Issue

The Hicksville Public Library Board of Trustees will try for a second time on Mar. 7 to win the approval of voters of the school district for a proposal to enlarge the library building on Jerusalem Ave. at Second St. The proposition has been modified as compared with the question defeated in December 1962. The new proposition calls for expenditure of \$262,500, a reduction of \$36,000.

Elery W. Bean, president of Hicksville Library Trustees; Philip Robinson, attorney for the library; and others appeared at the Board of Education meeting, Friday night, to request that the referendum be held. The trustees have agreed to pay the costs incidental.

The land (former Christ property and house) fronting on Jerusalem Ave. and adjacent to the present building will be utilized for the 20 foot by 50 foot addition. The land was bought by the library trustees in Feb. 1962 with a purchase price of \$24,000. It is being paid for largely by fines and fees. A balance due of \$6,000 will be paid as part of the referendum.

The addition will make 82 seats available and provide space for 40,000 volumes. It was said this week.

"A library spokesman explained the proposed extension will enable the library to adequately serve the large numbers of junior and senior high school students and college students that now use public libraries for reference and research purposes. At present the library has almost exhausted stack space and badly needed seating space during crowded afternoon hours, Saturdays and vacation periods. It is estimated about two cents will be added to the present tax rate of 24.9 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation."

The addition will include an unfinished basement area for future development.

All voters who were registered for the Nov. 23 school district referendum on an addition to the high school will, in general, be qualified to vote on Mar. 7. Additional registration days will be provided just prior to the vote.

## Ice Skating at Local Schools

The "red ball" will be up for ice skating at at least three Hicksville schools, provided the cold weather continues, according to School Recreation Director Joseph F. Madden. Lee Ave. area has been flooded, Woodland Ave. is being worked upon and the tennis courts at the high school off Newbridge Rd. are being prepared.

All skating areas will be supervised during daylight hours and weekends. There will also be skating under lights on weekends at the high school.

## Post Office Closes For Holiday

Christmas day, Dec. 25th, and New Years day, Jan. 1st, will be observed as legal holidays by the Hicksville Post Office and its branches, according to Acting Postmaster Irene L. Murphy. There will be no delivery service except for Special Delivery mail, and no window service. Holiday collection schedules will be observed.

## Bomb Scare Forces Students Out Into Cold, Snow Storm

Another bomb scare in Hicksville Senior High School, the second for the week and possibly the tenth for the term, led to a near riotous period on Wednesday morning in the midst of a heavy snow fall. Nearly 3,000 students were told to get their outer garments and herded out into the parking fields at about 10 o'clock in the morning. The report was a bomb would go off between 10 and 12.

About an hour in the freezing cold and wet snow, the students began to chant and moved to leave the school property. A couple of hundred did soot away by rushing a line of hand linked teachers, leaping over a six foot chain fence and just breaking for it. Police assisted faculty members in rounding up some of those who broke for it.

In effort to curb the bomb scares, the school administration has been keeping the entire student body after regular classes. This week's student body assembly on the last day before the Christmas recess has been cancelled.

# Travelling with Nancy: Kennedy Rites in West Berlin

Nancy Johnson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert H. Johnson of Myers Ave., Hicksville, by car is travelling in Europe with two friends. This is another of her interesting letters to the folks at home—Ed.

Hi,  
We went to the opera and saw Macbeth, Tonight (12/1) we are going to see Madam Butterfly. We went to East Berlin for three days. The difference between the two zones is like night and day—people living in bombed out houses. There is one main modern street; Karl-Marx-Allee. You go a half block off this street and you run into trouble.

Anywhere you drive you eventually run into The Wall. They practically tore the car apart at the checkpoints looking for stow-aways. The East Berliners are poorly dressed, the only place where we have found this so far. We went to a memorial service for President Kennedy in front of City Hall, West Berlin. A quarter of a million people—it was unbelievable. Reminded us

of Times Square on New Year's Eve except a strange quiet prevailed here. The ceremony was in German but was very impressive. They changed the name of the square to John F. Kennedy Platz, then sounded taps; the second bugler was across the street on a roof. They had a tremendous portrait of the President on the bell tower, turned off all lights except one and then rang all the bells in the city for 15 minutes. We got home sick for the little things like a good shower, a pizza or a washing machine. We are heading for Bavaria this week.

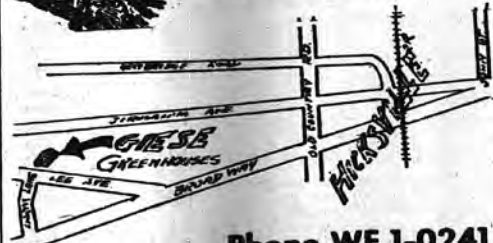

The Head Custodian's make their bob or two strictly according to the rules set down by the local Board of Education. The take is meager and never at any time fluctuates on a year to year basis. There's a set salary scale and it's strictly adhered to at all times. There's extra's of course but they always come in the form of occasional tributes, such as the one written by Bill Mehlman of the Hicksville High School Comet staff. Bill addresses his "TRIBUTE OF THE MONTH TO ANGIE AND THE CUSTODIAL STAFF." . . . Almost everyone is aware of the excellent jobs done by those concerned with the academic life of our school, the teachers, the administrators, the guidance counselors. There is, however, one group of people in our school who do not receive the respect and gratitude which they unquestionably deserve. . . our custodial staff. One of the primary services performed by these people is that of keeping our school clean. This is taken for granted but imagine what would happen if it were not done. Think what it would be like to eat in a cafeteria which had not been cleaned for a week. If our halls went unswept, we would soon be wading knee deep in paper. Conditions like these would more than create a bad atmosphere in which to work. . . they would soon become unsanitary and dangerous. Along with being cleaned, our school must be kept in good repair. The men of our custodial staff do most of the minor maintenance work around the school, including repairs and adjustments of the heating plumbing and electrical systems. To understand how much work these men do, just consider for a moment the job of keeping all the thousands of lightbulbs in our school in working order. "This staff consists of two groups of people. . . the day staff, comprised of four men and two matrons and the night staff comprised of ten men. The men on the day shift do both cleaning and maintenance and those on the night staff do custodial work only. Perhaps this would be an appropriate place to give Mr. Angelo D'Amato recognition as the head of our custodial staff.

## Library Corner

One hundred years ago, the United States was torn by Civil War. News from the South was on the first page of every day's issue of the New York Times. The Hicksville Public Library has the day-by-day accounts on microfilm, in the special series on the Civil War, 1861-1865. There are twenty rolls of microfilm, each containing three months' of newspapers, and there are indexes.

Your Hicksville Library card entitles you to see these films. The rolls are stored in the Periodical Room and Mrs. Klein will help you by putting the rolls you request on the reader.

Do you think that guerrilla warfare is a recent technique from World War II? The following excerpt is from the December 23, 1908 issue of the New York Times:

"GUERRILLAS, Guerrillas are still sticking to us. Yesterday, they made an attempt to destroy a railroad bridge between Burke's Station and Bull Run. They were driven off before they had time to do much damage."

Listed in the "New Publications, The most unique and elegant illustrated books of the season" section for Dec. 24, 1863, was a poem still popular today, "A Visit from St. Nicholas," by Clement C. Moore, price 50 cents.

Of course, there wasn't the Wollman Skating Rink in Central Park, but on Dec. 24, 1863, there was ice skating under the heading "Skating on Central Park lakes and other ponds." The ice was in fine condition on the Central Park Lakes and the large attendance can be judged by the fact that nearly 4,000 pairs of skates were loaned by the parties licensed for that purpose by the Commissioners, and these in addition to the immense numbers who own ice skimmers themselves. Thousands were on the lakes last night, enjoying skating by moonlight."

On Christmas Day, 1863, we find as front page news: A gunboat blown up by a torpedo, and the press on Rebel Privateers.

On Dec. 26, 1863, there was the collapse of Confederate finances, the treatment of prisoners, President Lincoln's amnesty proclamation, and resolutions offered in the Rebel Congress.

If you prefer to read a newspaper in newsprint form, we have Living History's reprints of the Harper's Weekly, from the beginning of the Civil War through December 1863. More issues will be printed and we will receive them as they are printed. This newspaper run is also indexed.

Among the many books in the circulating section on the Civil War are: THIS HALLOWED GROUND by Bruce Catton, Doubleday, 1956 (973.7 C) - the

story of the Union side of the Civil War; THE CIVIL WAR, A NARRATIVE, PORT SUMTER TO PERRYVILLE by Shelby Foote, Random 1958 (973.7 F); THE UNITED STATES DURING THE CIVIL WAR by Auguste Laugel, Indiana University Press, 1961 (973.7 L). The following biographies should prove of interest: LINCOLN: A CONTEMPORARY PORTRAIT by Allan Nevins, Doubleday 1962 and 12 MODERN STUDIES IN REAPPRAISAL OF THE MAN AND THE COMPANY HE KEPT, Carl Sandburg's volumes on Abraham Lincoln. Many fiction books have been written about the Civil War, among them ANDERSONVILLE by MacKinley Kantor, RED BADGE OF COURAGE by Stephen Crane and GONE WITH THE WIND by Margaret Mitchell.
