Threat of Formal Action To Remove Board Member

Hicksville Board of Education by vote of five to one, Friday night, decided against a proposal to change the official newspapers of the District, thus in effect reaffirmed their support of Trustee George W. Kunz who has been under attack by the Mid Island Times since that paper was deleted from the list of official papers Dec. 13.

Robert L. Morgan, published of Litnor Publications, has demanded Kunz resign from the Board. In a letter dated Jan 17 which Kunz said he was advised by the post office was in existence on Jan 23 (postmarked Jan 22) Morgan served notice of intention to "file a formal complaint" against Kunz for "misuse of your public office on the school board."

Morgan in his letter said the formal action would not be taken if Kunz formally retracted in writing at a Board meeting his position of Dec. 13.

Kunz made the following formal statement at the Jan 31 meeting of the Board after reference to Morgan's demand:

"Mr. Morgan is overlooking a very important point in the campaign of personal vilification he is conducting. I happen to be only one member of this Board of Education. I am of course, flattered by the impression that I have some occult power to control the thinking of the other members. In all due modesty, however, nothing could be further from the truth. I have developed a great deal of respect for the view of my fellow trustees. It just so happened that on this issue they agreed with my motion, even though they may have had their own reasons for doing so."

"Perhaps Mr. Morgan is not aware of one plain and simple fact. A Board of Education has the prerogative of designating any newspaper as its 'official' newspaper. It also has the prerogative of choosing what newspaper to advertise in. I gather

from Mr. Morgan's comments that he thinks that he is 'entitled' to our legal advertising. I doubt that any member of this Board would be willing to go along with such an assumption. "It has been formally demanded that I retract my criticism of Mr. Morgan's editorial. Tied in with this is a demand that I resign from the Board, I have an appropriate reply, but first I would like to review some comments in that editorial which triggered the action I took."

As most people know, the Board was chastised by Mr. Morgan for holding the building referendum on (Nov. 23) the day after President Kennedy was assassinated. The key phrases in his editorial which aroused my ire—and which I considered most unfair and irresponsible—were as follows:

"We suspect that the people backing the building expansion did not want to forsake the possibility that in postponing the elec-

tion it might be defeated by a large turnout."

"And, "The groups for bigger, and they say better schools show some inconsistency to the children when they will use a day of national mourning to achieve their goals."

"If Mr. Morgan had taken the trouble to check into the law, he would have found that the Board could NOT have postponed the referendum. At this point, I respectfully refer him to subdivision 3, Section 2021 of the Education Law. It describes the powers of the voters duly;

"3. To adjourn from time to time as occasion may require. EXCEPT THAT where a special district meeting shall have been called by a Board of Education for the purpose of voting upon an appropriation and the hours of voting shall have been fixed by the Board as provided in subdivision 3, section 416, of this

Set Tentative Fund Goal

A minimum goal of \$5,000 for the John F. Kennedy Memorial Hicksville Fund has been tentatively set, it was disclosed this week in answer to numerous questions from residents. The committee of residents spearheading the project to erect a memorial flag pole at the intersection of Broadway and Jerusalem Ave. with John St. has been collecting data regarding types of flag poles, base and auxiliary equipment.

A 50-foot metal pole is contemplated with a substantial base. It has been suggested, and the matter is under consideration, that in addition to a plaque of dedication to the late President there be some tree planting dedicated to the seventeen Hicksville men who died in the service of their nation, three in World War I and 14 in World War II. It was recalled that when the World War I monument was originally established near the Broadway RR crossing (since moved to the Junior High School campus) it included three trees planted to the memory of Joseph Barry, Walter Wheeler and Charles A. Wagner.

All funds received in excess of the amount required for the memorial will be utilized for planting and landscaping of the entire area. Previously reported:

Fourth Monday Is Mothers' Nite

The fourth Monday of each month is fast becoming the highlight in the calendar of the members of the St. Ignatius Loyola Auxiliary of Christian Mothers, Hicksville. Aprons are put aside and mothers find reawakened interest in the affairs of the school and the education of their children.

Sr. Venard explained recently the three drives that have been inaugurated this year for the benefit of the children of St. Ignatius, in order to familiarize them with good music, each classroom has its own record player as along with this the children have textbooks on the subject and are learning to read notes. On the first Saturday the "Little Choir" sang an entire Mass in Latin. The Remedial Reading Clinic is showing tremendous success, having about 225 pupils. There are some openings in the 6th, 7th and 8th year groups, but there is still quite a waiting list. Along with this Clinic, there is a Regular Reading plan to encourage more rapid reading. Mrs. J. Frawley, one of the Hicksville Public Librarians, is to be commended for the time she gives each day in order to give the children a story-telling hour. The books she reads from are specially selected for each group from grades 1 through 8.

Father Goggin thanked Sr. Venard for the wonderful job she and the teachers are doing. He also explained how, through active participation in the Mothers' Auxiliary, the members help the teachers to help "our children".

The Skating Party of Jan 23rd was a complete sellout and most of those who were able to go (about 700) are hoping for a repeat sometime in February.

Of course the big event of the season is already here - the Winter Ball. On Feb 7th, the School Auditorium will be ablaze with lights while the strains of Art Swanson's orchestra set everyone's feet to dancing. This is not limited to members - all are welcome and a supper will be served later in the evening. After the business meeting Mrs. Patrick McGee introduced the Very Rev. Monsignor Michael J. McLaughlin, Monsignor is the Diocesan Director of Vocations and the Spiritual Director at Immaculate Conception Seminary at Huntington. He spent over 17 years as parish priest in St. Peter Claver's, Brooklyn, which more or less makes him an expert on his topic of the evening which was "Integration".

Monsignor regretted that such a big subject could not adequately be covered at one meeting but he tried to hit a few of the highlights. He explained that the vast majority of the Negroes are not looking for any outstanding treatment different from their white neighbors.

They just want the Civil Rights guaranteed to all by law. They want to attend an ordinary school, an ordinary restaurant, an ordinary department store, an ordinary hotel and live in an ordinary dwelling. Whereas all methods are not approved, and not all of the leaders can be defended in their actions, it must be remembered that over 100 years have passed since the Emancipation and in many places the Negro is still treated as a second class citizen.

Monsignor further explained how God gives certain potentials to all in the human race and said that reason and justice allows their development. Wherever people of a certain race are forced by conditions to live in so-called ghettos they eventually explode and delinquency and destruction of property result. The parable of the Good Samaritan was drawn upon to show how a man from a different ethnic group showed kindness to a stranger in need. This indeed was a true application of Christian and Racial Justice.

A question and answer period followed wherein many other aspects of the subject were explored. The Princeton plan, Monsignor said, is not a true solution to the school integration problem because of the compulsory nature of it. Transporting children from one school district

to another for proper schooling should only be done on a voluntary basis as complete cooperation is needed for such a program to work. In answer to the social mingling question, Monsignor said that a cultural level is the best at which both groups can admire and respect each other's mind and culture and through this a better understanding will develop.

Dr. Arthur Carin, President of the Jericho Board of Education, in his address to the Citizens for Better Education, was very optimistic about raising standards of education in Jericho so that the whole community can be proud of the school system. The Citizens for Better Education held its monthly Jan. 21 and Dr. Carin was the main speaker.

Jay Schachner Vice-Chairman of Citizens for Better Education, introduced Dr. Carin and also stated some of the purposes of the organization in his opening address. Schachner pictured the organization as a liaison between the school system and the community. He also stated that the organization will publish a news letter strictly devoted to education and said that it was the desire of members of the organization to raise the general cultural climate of the community.

Dr. Carin stated that problems in Jericho education have been unique. The district has gone from a handful of students to 4,000 students and 5 buildings. The changes have been rapid and traumatic. He stated that the school board as the administration share the same goals as the Citizens for Better Education in wanting the best education for Jericho children. He further said that the new school board and the new administration are very well aware of current problems and are solving them as quickly as possible.

Dr. Carin discussed improvements that have begun in the areas of teacher supervision and teacher recruitment. He mentioned that the entire junior high school program is undergoing careful scrutiny, in particular the science courses and the administration is currently working on improving math courses throughout the district.

Dr. Carin also reported that the guidance services have to be reviewed and that it is the desire of the administration to improve and broaden specialists in the elementary schools. This year a science teacher has been visiting the schools.

It was mentioned that as a result of the Cooperative Review Survey conducted by the New York State Dept. of Education, sharp and concise areas are being marked out for improvement.

Dr. Carin said that the greatest step forward this year has been in raising teacher morale and it is expected that immediate results in improved instruction will be seen.

The School Board and the Administration in order to insure improvement in education standards in Jericho are working very hard. A majority of improvements have begun and others will begin in the immediate future.

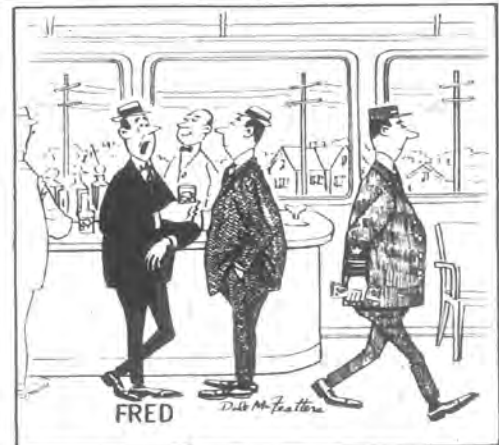
