

A group of Hicksville School Administrators led by School Su-per intendent Donald F. Abt toured the Brookhaven National La-boratory out in Upton, Suffolk County, during the reach Winter of George A. Jackson, president of the Hicksville School Board of the



It is probably here that a new mome particle with the name Omega Minus was just located. The final stops were the bio-logy laboratories and the new medical research centre with its unique medical reactor. The medical centre includes a 48-bed research hospital to ac-comdate patients referred to Brookhaven for special obser-vations or therapy. The Hicksville delegation was

out in Suffolk. Speaking to the educators, Dr. Bond pointed out that the road to scientific ability can start in elementary school training by application to studies. He noted that many capable people come to Brookhaven and its associated universities with the interest in scientific research but far too

universities with the interest in scientific research but far too many lack the basic drilling to follow thru. Perhaps the most interesting talk of the afternoon was given by Dr. John E. Jesseph, as-sociate attending physician and an aswediate scientist who IIan associate scientist who fl-lustrated his discussion with slides.

There were guides at each of the facilities visited, giving the visitors a description of what they were about to see with the use of models.

Employs 2800

Brookhaven employs more than 2800 persons of whom 750 are scientists and engineers and 1300 technical personnel. In addition, there are over 500 other U.S. scientists and graduate students from universities, colleges, re-search Institutions or Industry vorting at the Laboratory for working at the Laboratory for short periods. Research and vided for about 1300 students are pro-vided for about 1300 students and 200 students during the summer. In line with the Atomic Energy Commission's program in inter-national cooperation, many fornational cooperation, many for-eign scientists who represent over 20 countries are puril-cipating. In research projects, On the day of the visit by Hicks-ville educators, seven Soviet scientists also toured Brook-haven having arrived In New York on Feb, 10. The visiting scientists are experts in the field of solid state physics and are in the US as part of the overall US-USSR agreement on exchange in the scientific, tech-nical, educational, cultural and other Helds.



#### Editorial Opinion **Town Youth Program?**

Town Supervisor Michael N. Petito since taking office on Jan 1 has been issuing a string of press releases, most of which are received at our office too late for publication in the issue specified. Few have been worth much space in any event.

In an almost frantic effort to attract attention to himself as a Democrat in a position previously held by Republicans for many years, the Supervisor has really been scratching for new gimmicks. A couple of weeks ago it was the announcement of a Citizens' Cabinet which is nothing more than a fancy name for Citizens' Advisory Committees device quiet ordinary in the affairs of school districts, towns and other governmental units.

Last week a statement quoted Petito as "lashing out at what he termed the complete inertia in the area of Town programs for youth in recent years," He called for a professionally organized recreation program in the township.

He notes that there are 132,000 youths under 21 ears of age, according to the 1960 census, and the town could get reimbursement of up to \$52,500 a year in state aid on a town recreation program. He does not say what such a program would cost but considering that Hicksville School District spends \$65,000 a year (not counting such items as maintenance of buildings, custodians, power, light Petito's program could add three and heat) quarters of a million dollars a year with a town-wide program and most of this money would go for staff. State aid of \$52,500 is not much help when you are spending \$750,000.

If the town did embark on such a program would the Hicksville Recreation be a duplication? Or would, Hicksville be charged double -- for its own program in the school district AND for its share of a town-wide program?

And as this was written a report came thru that County Executive Eugene Nickerson, also a Democrat, is in favor of a county-wide recreation program. He and Supervisor Petito really should coordinate their press releases better.


