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## Hickville Educators Tour Nuclear Research Center

The scientific world focused its attention upon Brookhaven National Laboratory at Upton, out in Suffolk, this week when it was announced on Wednesday that a new atomic particle turned up at the business end of the 33 billion volt Alternating Gradient Synchrotron. It has the Greek name: Omega Minus. A group of Hickville educators made a tour of Brookhaven recently. Story on page 4.

## Chamber Backs Library

The Hicksville Chamber of Commerce has gone on record in support of the Public Library referendum of March 7 for a bond issue to finance an addition to the Library.

The resolution declares the Chamber "supports the efforts of the Hicksville Library District to provide facilities for the community, and particularly, for the expanding needs of youth both in their academic needs and in general reading. We recommend that everyone give very serious consideration to the March 7 library referendum."

In the meantime, George M. Martin of 42 Hamer Lane, Hicksville, in a letter to Mrs. Edith

Berg, of Woodland Ave. School PTA, asked for the privilege of speaking against the referendum at a PTA meeting.

Noting that he and nine other residents have brought suit in court against the Library Board regarding the acquisition of land for the library addition and questioned "the desirability of spending thousands of dollars for a referendum at this time when an unfavorable decision to the Library Board would invalidate all their efforts."

Registration of voters for the Mar. 7 referendum will take place Feb. 26 and Feb. 29 at seven school voting places. Those registered for the Nov. 23 referendum will not need register again.

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# Hicksville Educators Tour Brookhaven Laboratory

A group of Hicksville School Administrators led by School Superintendent Donald F. Abt toured the Brookhaven National Laboratory out in Upton, Suffolk County, during the recent Winter recess. They were the guests of George A. Jackson, president of the Hicksville School Board and an administrator of the Medical Dept. at Brookhaven.

Men who went into the Army thru Camp Upton during World War II and their fathers who went the same route in the first World War would hardly recognize the place today 17 years after the National Laboratory began there in early 1947. True, there are still a few of the old barracks but they have been painted in bright pastel colors, reshingled and modernized.

## 3500 Acres

On the 3500 acres of scrub oak and pine have been erected a number of substantial new buildings with purposes undreamed of 20 years ago or less. Construction is continuing on all sides.

Under the jurisdiction of the Atomic Energy Commission, Brookhaven is operated under contract by a private institute, Associated Universities, Inc. This nonprofit educational corporation serves as an agency through which universities and other institutes can cooperate with one another and with the Government to further research and education. Basic nuclear research is the shell purpose of Brookhaven as described to the group of 25 visitors from Hicksville, including school principals, assistant principals, and department heads.

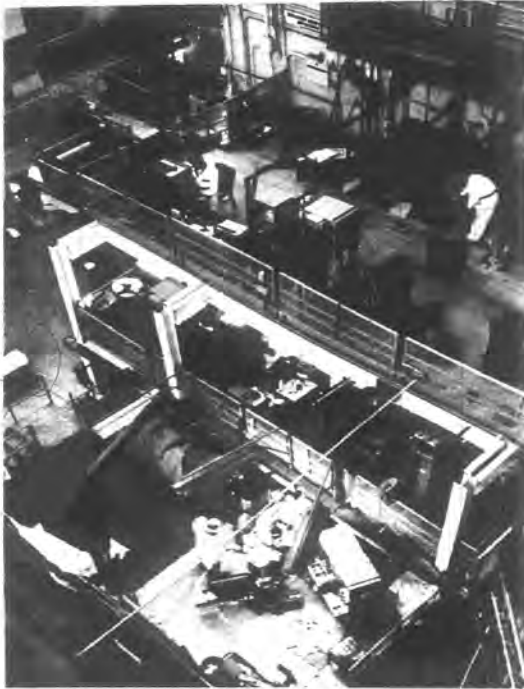
It was fascinating four hours spent touring just three of the various installations. Very impressive was the Graphite Research Reactor and Hot Laboratory, a massive five story building surrounding and housing the reactor.

Next came the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron with its half mile ring housed in a vacuum chamber wherein a beam of protons is boosted to a final energy of 31 billion electron volts.

It is probably here that a new atomic particle with the name Omega Minus was just located.

The final stops were the biology laboratories and the new medical research centre with its unique medical reactor. The medical centre includes a 48-bed research hospital to accommodate patients referred to Brookhaven for special observations or therapy.

The Hicksville delegation was welcomed by Dr. Victor P. Bond, a senior scientist and chairman of the administrative staff of the

Medical Dept. Like Jackson, he is a member of the Board of Education in his home community out in Suffolk.

Speaking to the educators, Dr. Bond pointed out that the road to scientific ability can start in elementary school training by application to studies. He noted that many capable people come to Brookhaven and its associated universities with the interest in scientific research but far too many lack the basic drilling to follow thru.

Perhaps the most interesting talk of the afternoon was given by Dr. John E. Jesseph, associate attending physician and an associate scientist who illustrated his discussion with slides.

There were guides at each of the facilities visited, giving the visitors a description of what they were about to see with the use of models.

## Employs 2800

Brookhaven employs more than 2800 persons of whom 750 are scientists and engineers and 1300 technical personnel. In addition, there are over 500 other U.S. scientists and graduate students from universities, colleges, research institutions or industry working at the Laboratory for short periods. Research and training opportunities are provided for about 1300 students and 200 students during the summer.

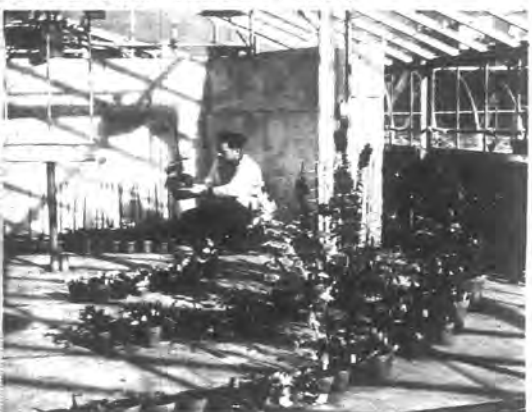
In line with the Atomic Energy Commission's program in international cooperation, many foreign scientists who represent over 20 countries are participating in research projects.

On the day of the visit by Hicksville educators, seven Soviet scientists also toured Brookhaven having arrived in New York on Feb. 10. The visiting scientists are experts in the field of solid state physics and are in the US as part of the overall US-USSR agreement on exchange in the scientific, technical, educational, cultural and other fields.

The Associated Universities Inc include Columbia, Cornell, Harvard, John Hopkins, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Princeton, University of Pennsylvania, University of Rochester and Yale University.

The objectives of the Brookhaven National Laboratory are stated in a handsome booklet distributed to visitors:

1. To seek new knowledge in the nuclear and other related sciences;
2. To encourage appropriate use of its facilities by qualified scientists of university and other laboratories and industrial research groups;
3. To assist the Atomic Energy Commission in the solution of specific problems;
- and 4. To aid in the training of scientists and engineers in nuclear science and technology.



IN THE GAMMA GREENHOUSE at Brookhaven, plants are arranged around a 15-curie source of Cobalt - 60, which bombards the plants with gamma rays for 20 hours each day. While biologists are in the greenhouse, the source is lowered about fifteen feet underground.

## Editorial Opinion Town Youth Program?

Town Supervisor Michael N. Petito since taking office on Jan 1 has been issuing a string of press releases, most of which are received at our office too late for publication in the issue specified. Few have been worth much space in any event.

In an almost frantic effort to attract attention to himself as a Democrat in a position previously held by Republicans for many years, the Supervisor has really been scratching for new gimmicks. A couple of weeks ago it was the announcement of a Citizens' Cabinet which is nothing more than a fancy name for Citizens' Advisory Committees a device quiet ordinary in the affairs of school districts, towns and other governmental units.

Last week a statement quoted Petito as "lashing out at what he termed the complete inertia in the area of Town programs for youth in recent years." He called for a professionally organized recreation program in the township.

He notes that there are 132,000 youths under 21 years of age, according to the 1960 census, and the town could get reimbursement of up to \$52,500 a year in state aid on a town recreation program. He does not say what such a program would cost but considering that Hicksville School District spends \$65,000 a year (not counting such items as maintenance of buildings, custodians, power, light and heat) Petito's program could add three quarters of a million dollars a year with a town-wide program and most of this money would go for staff. State aid of \$52,500 is not much help when you are spending \$750,000.

If the town did embark on such a program would the Hicksville Recreation be a duplication? Or would, Hicksville be charged double -- for its own program in the school district AND for its share of a town-wide program?

And as this was written a report came thru that County Executive Eugene Nickerson, also a Democrat, is in favor of a county-wide recreation program. He and Supervisor Petito really should coordinate their press releases better.

## Urges Revision In State Aid

By Howard Jankowitz

Unless the State brings the aid to education formula up to date we here in Jericho and school systems throughout the island will be facing the bleak picture severely increased taxes.

Under the present system, the State is not sharing with each school district the cost of education as originally intended.

While the average cost to educate a child in the State has risen in the past three years from \$520. to \$641., the State is still using an outdated \$500. ceiling which they will share with the school districts. Most school districts receive from the State a percentage, varying from about 50% in an average district, to about 90% in a "poor" district and much less in a "wealthier" district, wealth being based on real estate valuation in the districts. A few of the more wealthy districts, such as ours, receive a flat grant of \$180 per child rather than a percentage since in these few cases the district would receive entirely too small a return on the percentage basis.

The fact that the \$500 per child ceiling and the flat grant allowance have not been raised in the past few years in the face of spiraling costs is creating a financial burden for most school districts.

The Bridges-Waters bill now before the legislature attempts to rectify the situation by increasing the ceiling to \$585. and the flat grant by \$30.00. This would not be the complete answer but it is certainly a step in the right direction.

If we are to receive much needed tax relief, the Bridges-Waters Bill must be passed. This would bring an estimated \$100,000.00 in additional aid to Jericho. I strongly urge that all of you request our legislators in Albany to push hard for passage of this bill.

The vote will take place, any day now so it is imperative that we all act now without delay

## Group Acts On Traffic Controls

A traffic survey conducted by the Nassau County Police Dept. at the intersection of Saratoga Drive and Cantlaque Rock Road was completed recently at the request of Bob Kravitz, Chairman of the Community Services Committee. The survey resulted in recommendations to the Town Board to the effect that a stop sign be erected on Saratoga Drive sign be erected on Saratoga Drive, and that a sign warning of an intersection be installed on Cantlaque. The stop sign would require westbound traffic on Saratoga to come to a full stop at Cantlaque Rd. The intersection warning would be installed on the east side of Cantlaque south of Saratoga.

Mr. Kravitz was informed of these results in a letter from Town Clerk William B. O'Keefe on Feb. 5. The letter advised that the recommendations will be included in the next proposed Amendments to the Jericho Parking Ordinance to be heard by the Town Board on Feb. 18. Upon approval by the Board, the signs will be installed as soon thereafter as possible.

In another development, Kravitz was notified by N.C. Parsons, Traffic Engineer for the New York State Dept. of Public Works, that a traffic survey would be instituted to determine the need for a left-turn green arrow on the signal light governing northbound traffic on Broadway.

At its last meeting, the Welfare Committee of the Civic Assoc. resolved to change its name to the Community Services Committee. On the agenda for that meeting were discussions of the Westbury Drive-in noise abatement campaign, a proposed community questionnaire concerning civic interests and community experience with local contractors, and negotiations with the builder for portals at the entrances to the development. It was learned that there would be at most one more entrance in addition to the existing two.
