## Editarial Opinion

## Town Youth Program?

Town Supervisor Michael N. Petito since taking office on Jan 1 has been issuing a string of press releases, most of which are received at our office too inte for publication in the issue specified. Few have been worth much space in any event.
In an almost frantic effort to attract attention to himself as a Democrat in a position previously held by Republicans for many years, the Supervisor has really been scratching for new gimmicks. A couple of weeks ago it was the announcement of a Citizens, Cabinet which is nothing more than a fancy name for Citizens' Advisory Committees device quiet ordinary in the affairs of schoo districts, towns and other governmental units

Last week a statement quoted Petito as "lashing out at what he termed the complete inertia in the area of Town programs for youth in recent years,' He called for a professionally organized recreation program in the township.
He notes that there are 132,000 youths under 21 years of age, according to the 1960 census, and the town could get reimbursement of up to $\$ 52,500$ a year in state aid on a town recreation program. He does not say what such a program would cost but considering that Hicksville School District spends $\$ 65,000$ a year (not counting such items as maintenance of bulldings, custodians, power, light and heat) Petito's program could add three quarters of a million dollars a year with a townwide program and most of this money would go for staff. State aid of $\$ 52,500$ is not much help when you are spending $\$ 750,000$.

If the town did embark on such a program would the Hicksville Recreation be a duplication? Or would, Hicksville be charged double -- for its own program in the school district AND for its share of a town-wide program?

And as this was written a report came thru that County Executive Eugene Nickerson, also a Dernocrat, is in favor of a county-wide recreation program. Heand Supervisor Petito really should coordinate their press releases better.

with the school disuricts. Most school districts recelve from the sate a percentage, varying from bout $50 \%$ in an average discrict, to about $90 \%$ in a "poor"r" district and much less in a "wealthier" district, wealth being based on real estate valuation in the districts. A few of
the more wealuhy districts, such as ours, recelve a flat grant of $\$ 180$ per chlld rather than a percentage since in these few cases the district would recelve cotirely too small a return on
